NOVEMBER MEETING

Julia Gosier, Town Historian for the Town of Lyme is in charge of the Town of Lyme Heritage Center. She addressed the members of the society at our November meeting.

Over a period of time Julia has gathered together information on approximately 1600 families. All information she can find on past and present families from Lyme and surrounding towns such as Cape Vincent, Clayton and Brownville go into family or subject files. Since families moved back and forth over town lines, it became neccessary to collect for all four towns. Julia said that she had boxes of family scrapbooks to go through. Some were water damaged. She still has about 20 books to go through, however the ones that she has done have been photo copied and all data have been put into the files. Vital records have been made up from these files, put on index cards and are available to the public. She clips and files current news notes for future generations. It took her a few years, but now the Lyme Heritage Center, a room within the Lyme Free Library, has been

Taken from a clipping from the Carthage Republican. In a scrapbook owned by Irma Repas

The following item was sent to the Informer by Marion Smith Tait, a member from Dunnville, Ontario, Canada.

Item from the Gouverneur Herald dated Dec 24,????

"Mrs.Henrietta Kinney sewes Together First National Flag seen in Town"

"In this village lives Mrs. Henrietta Kinnie, the woman who made the first American flag ever seen in Hermon. The house where the flag was made is still standing and is known as the Sayers house. Mrs.Kinnie's husband, Andrew Kinnie, was in the south fighting for the union when, on August 22,1863, she held a party in honor of her niece, Miss Ruth Kinnie. Several of the young girls were present, and at that time the stars and strines were cut out and sewn together. After the flag was made, the girls formed in line and marched down the principal street carrying the banner before them. It was then raised on the liberty pole, amid public ceremonies. The banner was raised on many occasions, such as Independence Day, Memorial Day and that day when the troops came home from the South. When, after long usage, the flag had worn itself out, it was divided among the original members of the party.

Mrs.Kinnie, in telling of her life, said that she was born in Fowler October 6,1826, and was the daughter of David and Ruth Bowhall. Her father was a soldier in the War of 1812 and her grandfathers on both sides were Revolutionary War veterans. She can trace her ancestry back to the Mayflower. At the age of 6 she moved to Watertown where her father helped build the bridge from Beebee's Island to the Mainland. A Mr.Gould was the contractor. She lived in a stone apartment house on the island and attended school at the Factory Street schoolhouse, where Alson P.Sigourney, afterward president of the Jefferson Agricultural Society, was teacher. She has a pair of spectacles made by Harrison Sigourney, an old time jeweler of Watertown. She also has an old leather-bound Bible over 200 years of age. She moved to Hermon when young and has since resided there. She is in very good health and has fair prospects of living many years.

NOTE: The Sayers house was later known as the Hunkins House. Ruth Bowhall was Ruth Glovd. David's tombstone in Hermon (old) cemetery shows the information that he was a War of 1812 veteran. Mrs.Bowhall died in 1908, tombstone for her and her husband Andrew 1824-1884 show the name as Kinne."

b.7/18/1749, of Marcus Cunterman; m. Catharine Margretha Becker, 4/30/1780, Ref. Dutch Church at the Castle; d.3/31/1817, (Catharine Margaretha Countryman, b.6/?/1760 in Germany, dau. of John Adam Becker; she lived in Orleans, Jefferson Co., N.Y. in 1839.) Children: Marks (resident of Jefferson Co., N.Y. in 1839). Conrad was a sergeant in the 1st. Regt., Tryon Co. Militia; he was a participant in the battles of Fort Stanwix, Oriskany, Dorlach, Johnstown and West Canada Creek. (RWPA: #W16920)

Gerrit Dingman

b.1763/4; m.Catharine Hendrickson; d.8/?/1842, Chaumont, Jefferson Co., N.Y. (Catharine Dingman, d. [date unknown], Lee, Oneida Co., N.Y.) Children; Julia, b. 11/23/1804, Amsterdam, Montgomery Co., N.Y.; d. 12/?/1878, Beloit, Kansas (m. George Strong of Columbia, Herkimer Co. 11/?/1825); John (resident Chaumont, Jefferson Co., N.Y. in 1842). [Data on Catharine Dingman and succeeding generations are contained in a letter, dated 1/28/1904, written by Gerrit/Gerardus Dingman's granddaughter, Mrs. Phoebe (Strong) Cowen, 6489 Peoria St., Englewood, Illinois.] (Children of Julia (Dingman) and George Strong; Phoebe Susanna, b.4/8/1838, Lee Oneida Co.,; m. William H. (both residents of Englewood, Illinois in 1904.) Gerrit enlisted at Schenectady in October 1780 from his home in Warrenbush and served in Col. Van Schaick's Regt. of the N.Y. Line: he was stationed at West Point until the spring of 1781, at which time he returned to Albany and in July 1781, Gerrit went south under the command of Gen. Washington where he [Gerrit] was present at the capture of Lord Cornwallis; he returned to New Jersey and was discharged in June 1783; he stated that his discharge had been signed by Washington, "but has long since been lost". (RWPA: #S46224)

John Dieterich Failing

m. Elizabeth Smidt, 3/15/1785, Dutch Church, German Flats, N.Y.; d.5/27/1838. Pamelia. Jefferson Co., N.Y. (Elizabeth Failing, b.ca. 1765; resident of Pamelia, N.Y. on 3/16/1846.) Children: Mathias, bapt. 12/?/1789, St. John's Church, St. Johnsville, N.Y.; Henry, Richard, Nancy, John Thomas, Margaret, Esau. John Dieterich was a private in Col.Jacob Klock's 2nd.Regt. Tryon Co.Militia and was listed on the roster from 1781 through 1783; John Dieterich was taken prisoner by the enemy and carried to Canada where he was kept for about two years; "That where he was taken prisoner, it being on a farm subsequently occupied by her said husband, herself [Elizabeth Failing] and family". (RWPA: #W19242)

John Jost Folts:

m.Margaret [?] (d. ca.1824); d.ca.1835. Children John, b.1786/7 (resident of Pamelia, Jefferson co., NY. on 8/30/1855); Margaret, b.1779/80 (m.[?] Streeter and resident of Fowler, St. Lawrence Co., NY. 8/30/1855). John Jost was a sergeant in Capt. Harter's Co., Col. Bellinger's 4th Regt., Tryon Co. Militia; he was wounded during the war on 7/9/17[?] and was unable to continue in military service. (RWPA:#S27800)

John Kessler: b.9/8/1761; resident of Brownville, Jefferson Co., NY. on 9/10/1832 John enlisted from Canajoharie in the spring of 1775 and served each year, at various times, through 1781; he was a private under Cols. Cox, Yates, Hay and Willett; John was a participant in the battles of Oriskany and Stillwater. (RWPA #S12681)

George Schiff:

b. 1756/7; (sister; Mary, wife of [Jacob?] Multer; living in Oneida Co., NY. in 1818); m. Christina Vorbos; d.4/9/1820, Deerfield, Oneida Co., NY. (Christina Schiff, d.9/23/1842 or 9/25/1842, Deerfield, NY.) Children; George, b.6/27/1788; Olive, b.8/9/1790; Eve, b.5/1/1793 (m.Abraham Weaver); Conrad, b.4/18/1795; Margareta, b.2/4/1801 (m. Stephen Luther; resident of Clayton, NY. in 1846); Mary, b.ca. 1804 a. [?] Finster; resident of Ellisburg, NY. in 1846). [All other children residents of Deerfield, NY, in 1846] George took his father's place in the military in 1776 at Fort Stanwix and served in Capt. Swarthout's Co .. Col. Peter Gansevoort's 3rd.N.Y. Regt.: He was in the siege of Fort Stanwix and marched on the Sullivan expedition; he also served in Col. Van Schaick's Regt. of the NY line; George's father, while at work in the field was scalped by the indians and died in the spring of 1781; George was granted a furlough to return home; he enlisted again in 1782 and served for nearly eight months as a corporal in Capt. Abner French's Co., Col. Marinus Willett's Regt.

(RWPA:#W19029)

Jacob Shew: b.4/15/1763,son of Godfrey Shew, Johnstown, NY .; (brothers; Stephen [RWPA:#W1090]; John, Godfrey, Jr. [b.1770/1]; m.[wife not named]; resident of Northampton, Montgomery Co., NY. on 8/22/1828 and of Broadalbin, NY, in 1848;

1/23/1853. Children; Godfrey (resident of Jefferson Co., NY.in 1848). Jacob's father moved the family from Johnstown to Sacondaga, NY. about eight years before the Revolution and it was there on 6/2/1778 that Jacob, with his father and brothers. Stephen, John Godfrey Jr., were ordered out by Sgt. Solomon Woodworth of Col.Fisher's 3rd. Regt., Tryon Co. Militia on an alarm in pursuit of indians; they were captured by indians, their home was burned and their mother was driven back to Johnstown; Jacob and the other members of his family were taken to Canada and kept on a prison ship which moved from Montreal to Quebec and Halifax; Jacob was sent to Boston about December 1778 where he was exchanged; he contracted small pox and upon reaching Sudbury (about twenty miles from Boston) remained there until his health improved and reached Johnstown on 3/17/1779; Jacob returned to his regiment in the fall of 1779 and continued to serve as a private and corporal until the end of the war. (RWPA: #S22985)

Stephen Shew:

b.1760/1; m.Susannah Wells, summer of 1802/3 at Providence, Saratoga Co., NY.; 9/4/1832; d.3/27/1841, Wilna, Jefferson Co..NY (Susannah Shew.b. 1776/7; [brother; Job Wells]; resident of Wilna, NY.on 9/6/1853.)Stephen was called out on alarm on 6/31/1778 by Solomon Woodworth of Col.Frederick Fisher's 3rd. Regt., Tryon Co.Militia; he marched to an area fifteen miles east of Johnstown to guard against an impending attack by the enemy; Stephen and other members of the company were captured by the enemy; he was taken to Canada and while there "encouraging proposals were made to them to enlist in the British Army which the claimant, and the others rejected with disdain", he was exchanged at Boston the following December and returned to Johnstown; Stephen enrolled in Capt. Little's Co. on 1/1/1779 and served at the garrison in Johnstown; he was in the battle of "Hall field, a little below the village [Johnstown]". (RWPA:#W1090)

Henry Timmerman:

b.1/1/1750, Manheim, Albany Co., NY .; m.[wife not named; b.1764/5]; resident of LeRoy, Jefferson Co., NY. on 12/4/1832. Henry enlisted from Manheim in the spring/summer of 1775 and was a private for eleven months in Capt. Christopher P. Yates' Co., Col. Goose VanSchaick's 3rd. Regt.of the NY. line; he went on Gen. 





2. Have their membership become effective the next anniversary.





Smithville As It Was 1915 To 1933

by Harold C. Weldon

From The Jefferson County Journal, August 1992 "Having lived happily in Smithville as a boy and young man during the years from 1915 to 1933, it is my pleasure to reminisce over the various activities and some of the people who were active during those years. I hope that there may be people who will remember those long-ago years. For others I hope "Smithville As It Was 1915 to 1933" will be interesting.

In early 1915 I moved to Smithville with my Father and Mother. Father (Bill Weldon) was to operate the general store in the middle of the village which he and his partner, Mr. Manford C. Lee of Ellisburg, had purchased from Mrs. Cora LaFountain. The general store was operated as Weldon & Lee. Groceries, shoes, dry goods, meat, patent medicines, gas and oil and many other items were sold there. Store hours were from early morning until 9 p.m. or later. Credit was granted and many miscellaneous services rendered.

Across the street from Weldon & Lee was the hardware store operated by Mr. A. A. ("Ab") Robbins and Mr. and Mrs. Joe Robbins. They carried a full line of hardware including glass and metals, and sold gas and oil. The local hardware was the store you went to when you needed any kind of glass, metal or other farm or household item. At election time the polls were upstairs over the hardware store.

Across the street in the other direction was the Cheraw Hotel where meals were served, rooms were rented and there was a pool table. On many Saturday nights public dances were held in the upstairs ballroom. In the early days there were different operators, followed by Mr. and Mrs. Bullis and Miss Leath Bullis. In later years the wooden portion was removed and the brick building was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Higgs as a residence, with the Post Office in the rear of the building.

Bringing much business to the village

were the two milk plants, the Rosemary Creamery and the cheese factory. The Rosemary Creamery was located on the north side of the creek and was operated for years by Mr. Roy Gibbs. The cheese factory was located on a street back of the hotel and was operated at one time by Mr. Cleon Thornton. In the morning it was a common sight to see horse drawn, milk laden wagons lined up as far as the hotel, waiting their turn to deliver their milk either to the Rosemary Creamery or the cheese factory.

The U. S. Post Office was an important facility in the village, efficiently and pleasantly operated by Mrs. Frank Higgs, post-mistress and a lovely lady. It was located in the beautiful stone house (one of the original houses of Smithville) in which Mr. and Mrs. Higgs lived in the center of town. At intervals an inspector riding a horse would come to inspect the Post Office.

The two-room school was an important place to the families of Smithville and the surrounding area. Teaching the first four grades were several teachers in my remembrance, but the one teaching the longest was Mrs. Berenice Tousley, an excellent teacher and a kindly, motherly person. The upper four grades were upstairs, taught by Mr. Elon Pope. "Mister Pope" was a scholarly, clean cut Christian gentleman who commanded everyone's respect. Both classrooms were heated by large stoves. At intervals the superintendant, Mr. Linell, visited the school. We were also served by the state with library books which came from time to time in a wooden box.

Across from the school was (and is) the Baptist Church, a beautiful stone building. This was served by the Baptist minister in Adams Center and was used at times for special school performances and community functions. The church had a pump organ on a raised section for the choir and pulpit. There was a long shed in back of the church

A VISIT HOME 1910

submitted by Ellen Rogers Bartlett

Harrison A. Hill was born 11DEC1846 in Clayton, NY., son of George Washington Hill and Mary Boyce. At the age of 17 he enlisted in the civil war, serving in th 14th NY Heavy Artillery, Co. M. He suffered a leg and shoulder wound at Ft. Stedman, Petersburgh and was partially disabled during the rest of his life. After the war Harrison went to homestead in Kansas where he was successful and raised a large family. In 1910 he came home to Clayton to visit, while here he wrote the following letter to a friend and schoolmate, J. D. Share of Wellington, Kansas.

"Albert Hill and I went over to grandpa's (*Daniel Hill*) farm. Albert's father's farm and stopped to look at your grandfathers (*Andrew Share*) place, nothing there now, but the trees and grass, but I thought of the times that I had had with your uncle Lon.

I came near falling into a rather gloomy mood, but my health and company were good. The day was haleyou {sic} and the scene of my boyhood, so I was drunk with joy. We went back to the house, saw our sunny Aunt Margaret, now nearly ninety, for a few minutes.

We hitched up our rig and slowly drove up what used to be the old plank road, trying to notice every rock, crooked rail fence, stone walls and old beechwood trees that were there when we came and even the humble mullen stalks that grew by the way-side just as it used to be when life was young and we were barefoot boys.

We finally came to the old Fox house and turned down the hill of the old home road. Nobody in the Fox house, our house is gone. The Hawn house is empty, Hurds house, Garners, McKinleys all gone. We stopped to look where we used to live, nothing in sight but grass, I felt queer. There used to be ten housefull of life and babies, now, all are gone or empty.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS HOLDINGS TO BE DIGITIZED

From the genealogy section of Antique Weekly.

"Genealogists should be interested in a new program recently announced by the Library of Congress."

"This large library has set in motion a project to convert its holdings to digitized images, making it possible to transmit books, manuscripts, and pictures over computer networks so that they can be viewed by researchers using computer screens and high-definition televisions sets. Their purpose- to make their vast resources easily available - will also benefit the library as it frees shelf space, now crowded with over 140 million items. Rapidly deteriorating documents can be seen without the wear and tear of handling. Copies can be made without injuring originals. The project will cost millions of dollars, and the library hopes to finance it with a mixture of private gifts, donations from industries, and Congressional appropriations. It is hoped that the project will be completed by the year 2000. A committee, composed of libraries, engineers and fi-

nancial leaders from many universities and firms connected with the computer industry is preparing plans and setting standards.

Problem-solving underway will cover copyright restrictions, hackers, viruses and power system failures, as well as setting standards for image quality.

It is hoped that major libraries will join to form a nationwide network where researchers (including genealogists) can easily tap into resources needed by them.

OLD D.A.R. CEMETERY RECORDS MAY NOT BE COMPLETE

At the last meeting the question was asked, "has anyone had any problems with DAR cemetery records?"

When the DAR recorded the cemetries in Jefferson county sometime in the 1920s not all who had stones were written down. We do not know why, however you should not take these records as gospel. Dates are not always correct either, so when your records differ from the DAR records don't automatically assume you are wrong, there is a good chance that you are more accurate than they.

Ellen Bartlett along with her dad, Gus Rogers and her husband, John, have recorded nine of the towns in the northern part of Jefferson Co. and have found that in many cases stones were overlooked. They had to be, says Ellen, because you know that a person with a death date on his or her stone of 1885 or so had have been there in 1920 when the DAR read that cemetery.

So as in everything else "let the researcher beware".

where horses and carriages were kept during services.

Back of the Weldon & Lee store on the street going to Sackets Harbor was the Grange Hall, a two-story frame building, the scene of many pleasant community functions. In addition to Grange Meetings the Hall was used for various community dinners, for card parties and many other happy gatherings. Meals were served in the spacious downstairs dining room and community functions were held in the upstairs hall.

Toward the creek from the Grange Hall was the machine shop operated by Mr. "Bill" Allen. Here were many interesting and powerful pieces of machinery. These were operated by Mr. Allen to make various items and to repair farm machinery used in the area. Mr. and Mrs. Allen lived in a large house across the street from the shop, in one room of which Mrs. Allen sold Watkins Products.

Behind Mr. Allen's machine shop, located on the mill pond near the dam, was the grist mill and saw mill owned and operated by Mr. Frank Higgs. The grist mill was supplied feed for surrounding farms, as a cider mill in fall to make cider by grinding apples, and as a saw mill. During certain seasons of the year the yard around the mill was full of logs waiting to be sawed. The mill was operated completely by water power from the beautiful Smithville Pond. In winter time, when the pond was frozen, ice would be cut, hauled away on sleighs and stored in ice houses in town and on farms for use in summer.

Across the creek on the left was the farm of Mr. "Len" Hill. He and his family lived in a beautiful large stone house (one of the original houses of the village) until it burned in later years. Mr. Hill's farm was very productive. In addition to being a dairy farm, it furnished milk (picked up at the barn in a tin pail) and "pick yourself" strawberries to the village residents. I remember beautiful old-fashioned roses growing by the old house.

In later years (perhaps after 1933) Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Robbins operated a commercial flower garden and nursery. They grew and sold a line of beautiful annuals and perennials and were patronized by customers from a wide area. Living in the house formerly occupied by Mrs. Alice Hill, Mr. and Mrs. Robbins' home was surrounded by beautiful flowering plants. During the summer they supplied resorts in the Henderson Harbor area with cut flowers to grace their tables.

Mr. "El" Elmer owned and operated a blacksmith shop on the north side of town near the pond. With his home nearby, he operated his blacksmith shop for years. Mrs. "Lil" Mullen operated a small grocery store in her home opposite the Post Office.

There were several self-employed individuals who lived in Smithville and served the community well in one way or another.

Mr. "Art" Richmond was an excellent carpenter who worked in the community and at times in other towns. He was very ingenious working on various remodeling jobs.

Mrs. Alice (Trot) Hill was an accomplished seamstress working in her home, and a lovely lady. She was a tremendous help to Smithville ladies, making new clothes and altering old ones. On each side of the walk leading to her front door was a row of peonies which presented a beautiful showing of pink, red and white flowers in summer.

Mr. Norva Collins was a talented mechanic and a good salesman. He sold cars, repaired cars and was a mechanic of much talent. He repaired anything and everything.

Remembering those long-ago days it is hard to realize that, until about 1927, we did not have electricity, that in the early days there were few telephones in the village and not many automobiles. In winter roads were not plowed so that in stormy weather we were actually "snowed in" except for travel by horses. There was no TV and, in the early days until 1924 or so, no radios. There were, however, places which served the public with materials and services and a happy community spirit."

Abraham Covenhoven: b. 2/13/1759, Windsor, Middlesex Co., NJ; (twin brother, Isaac, also served in the militia [RWPA#S12531]); m. Charlotte Bennett, 12/10/1832; d. post 1832, Charlestown, Montgomery Co., NY (Charlotte Covenhoven, b. 1779/80; m. 2nd.[?] Lake and was living in Cape Vincent, Jefferson Co., NY in 1856.) Abraham enlisted in the 3rd. Regt., Tryon Co. Militia in 1775 and was a private under Capt. Gardenier; in the summer of 1776 Abraham went to NJ and on 9/21/1776 he enlisted in Capt. Nixon's Vol. Co. of Calvary for six months; Abraham returned to NY in 1777 and entered the Tryon Co. Militia for nine months; in 1781 he went to Cranbury,NJ where he lived for five or six years; he then returned to Montgomery Co., NY where he remained through 1832 (RWPA#W12108).

John G.Helmer: b. 2/15/1758, son of Godfrid Helmer, d. 8/5/1837, Theresa, Jefferson Co., NY John was a private in the 1st. Regt., Tryon Co. Militia and served from January 1777 until October 1781; he fought in the battles of Oriskany, Canajoahrie, Sharon, and Johnstown; John G. also marched on the Sullivan expedition. (RWPA# 13348).

Abraham Hodge: b. 1756/7; resident of Adams, Jefferson Co., NY, on 4/13/1818 and of Brownville, Jefferson Co. in 1820; he stated in 1820 that "he had no family dependent upon him" and signed his name Abram Hodge, 2nd. Abraham enlisted in April 1776 and served until the end of October as a private on the Mohawk River; he then served in Capt. Robert McKean's Co., Col.Goose VanSchaick's Regt. of the NY Line until 12/15/1776; he enlisted again in January 1777 from Florida, Tryon Co. and served in the same regiment. (RWPA#S43700).

Michael Kaiser: b. 12/?/1760, son of John Keyser; m. [wife not named] (brother; John Keyser); moved from Montgomery Co., NY in 1813 to LeRay, Jefferson Co., NY.; he was a resident of Tecumseh, Senawee Co., Michigan on 7/5/1839; Children; Henry (lived in Tecumseh, MI. on 6/30/1840) Michael entered the military as a substitute for his brother, John, who was ill during his nine month term of service in 1777; he served in Capt. Michael Myers Co. and was stationed at Fort Herkimer and German Flats; Michael was on duty as a scout and spy in March 1778 with his father, Capt. Johannes Keyser; [Michael's brother, John Keyser, as well as[?] Klock and Henry Shaver were all taken prisoners at Yankee Bush and transported to Montreal where they remained until their release after the close of the war] (RWPA# R5900)

John Phillips: b. 1758, Johnstown, NY.; (brother: Abraham Philips[RWPA.#S99861]); resident of Pamelia, Jefferson Co., NY. on 9/11/1832. John enlisted for nine months in 1777 and served in Capt. John Clute's Co. in the Batteau service on the Hudson river transporting army stores from Albany up to Fort Edward; he volunteered again in March 1778 and served for nine months in Col. Christopher Yates Regt. as a Batteauman; John "saw Burgoyne when he laid down his arms" and he was a participant in the battle of Johnstown. (RWPA# R8200).

John Phillips: m. Yaniche Deline, July/Aug 1779, Johnstown, NY.; d. 4/15/1835, Pamelia, Jefferson Co., NY. (Yaniche/ Jinney Phillips, b. 1753/4 d. 5/20/1835, Pamelia, NY.) Children: Elizabeth, b. 1780/1 (widow of Christian Casselman in 1839); John, b. 1782/3; Lewis, b. 1788/9; Nancy, b. 1790/1 (m. Garet Francisco); Benjamin, b. 1795/6. [all children living in 1829; John and Nancy deceased by 1844] John served as a private from Johnstown early in the war and was in Capt. John Davis' Co., Col. Frederick Fisher's 3rd. Regt., Tryon Co. Militia; he fought in the battle of Oriskany; John enlisted for 1 yr. in 1778 under Capt. Simon DeGraf in the Bateau service on the Hudson and Mohawk rivers; he also served from the spring of 1781 through the fall of 1782, for a total of eighteen months, in Col. Marinus Willett's Regt. (RWPA#S23844)

John Jost Scholl: b. 1751, Nassau Dillenburg, Principality of Prince of Orange, Germany; m. Anna Eva Godman 7/8/1788, Reformed Dutch Church of Stone Arabia [John Jost was a widower at the time of their marriage] d. 1/10/1837.(Anna Eva Scholl, d. 3/4/1841) Children: Joseph, Jacob, John, Catharine (m. Peter Smith)[all of Danube, Herkimer CO., NY.]; Nancy (widow of Jacob Getman; resident of Frankfort, Herkimer Co.); Delia (m. Peter Dillenbach); Lany (m. Abraham Smith) [both of Orleans, Jefferson Co., NY.]. John Jost entered the military in 1775 and served at various times until the end of the war; he held the ranks of Corporal, Ensign and Lieutenant during the war. (RWPA# W16396).

Adolph Wallrath: b. 4/4/1761; m.Anna [widow of Christian Fink who had been killed in the battle of Oriskany], 2/26/1781; resident of Oppenheim, Montgomery Co., NY. in 1832; d. 6/15/1837. (Anna Wallrath b.1754/5 resident of Pamelia, Jefferson Co., NY. on 5/24/1839.) Adolph entered the military from his home in Palatine and served at various times from 1777 to 1782; he was a private under Capts. Breadbake, Miller, Lipe and Zilley in the Regts. of Cols. Klock, Wagoner, Clyde, Brown and Willett; Adolph marched on the Sullivan expedition and he fought in the battles of Stone Arabia, Johnstown and West Canada Creek. (RWPA# W18275).

RESEARCHING IN JEFFERSON COUNTY

The Watertown Daily Times offers the genealogist an opportunity to find old obituaries in their library. They have clipped from their papers on a regular basis since about 1928. The library is filled with file cabinets arranged by surname. Anything that has to do with an area person is clipped and filled. You can expect to find marriage notices, obituaries, birthday announcements and much more.

Besides having all of these clippings, they have on microfilm copies of many old newspapers of the area that have long since disappeared, a listing of which will follow.

The following is a list of conditions the Watertown Daily times issues to each library patron.

1. The library is open between the hours of 1 p.m. and 3 p.m., Tuesday through Thursday.

2. Only Times staff members are allowed to open file drawers.

3. Under no circumstances are clippings or envelopes to leave the library. Copies of articles may be purchased at \$.75 a copy and patrons of the library will be charged a \$1.00 library fee.

4. Research for commercial purposes, that is, for profit, is permitted but is subject to the following charges: Minimum research fee of \$10.00 that is good for the first 15 minutes of research. An additional \$10.00 will be charged for each additional 15 minute block of time. Copy charges as listed above.

5. The Watertown Daily Times Library is a private library maintained for use by the editors and writers. Therefore, they are the library's priority. In the event that the library is understaffed, the library may be forced to close to the public with no advance warning.

SPECIAL NOTES TO THOSE DOING GENEALOGY RESEARCH.

6. Although the Watertown Daily Times has been publishing a newspaper for over 100 years, the bulk of the clippings in the Library, filed under the names of individuals, date mostly from the 1930s only. Looking for an ancestor who died in the late 1800s for example, or the early 1900s would be impossible. However, if you have the date of death, or the date of an article you are trying to find, newspapers are on microfilm and are available to the public at Flower Library.

7. Also, wives are filed under the husband's name in the library files. You must know the husband's name, and possibly where the family lived on common names such as Smith, Jones or Brown, in order to conduct research.

While I was visiting the Watertown Daily Times library I was told that if you wanted to view any of the following newspapers on microfilm,they will sign them out to you and you can take them to Flower Libray across the street to view. I was also told that this could be done during regular hours of the day and did not have to be between the hours of 1 and 3 p.m.



had finally set my dinner pail and gone off to war- where I had kindled so many fires for teachers, is no more.

The grass, rocks, hills and beautiful trees are there, but the houses are empty, the creek gone dry, road unused and as I looked my eyes bothered me little and I wished I was back in Kansas. I could have thrown myself down and cried, but my cousin was with me and it would not have done for me, a hero of many battles and a pioneer of the mid west to have shown so much weakness."



Things I Remember by Mina Herrick King:

Mina King has given us a slice of northern New York life from the standpoint of a life-long resident. Born in the Goose Bay area, she spent her life in the Town of Alexandria. The book is filled with references to the people she knew during that long span of years (1890 - 1940): relatives, neighbors, children she taught in school and their families. This is a book of reminiscence, not a researched history, and its charm is its spontaneity. When the topic is rural schools, for instance, she gives us an accurate and fascinating view from the standpoint of both pupil and teacher. Then she goes on to enumerate the various districts in the Town of Alexandria, lists some of their teachers, and names some of the pupils. It takes a thorough and longstanding knowledge of the subject and the area to do this successfully. particular interest to family historians are the two chapters on old farms and abandoned farms. She gives us a wealth of material on the owners and their families. She discusses entertainment in past years, the duties of a housewife, early farming, early cheese factories, the glass factories in Calaboga and Redwood, and the local grange and its beginnings, mentioning names relationships in passing. It's a small work, just 196 pages, but it's packed full of names and sometimes descriptions of real people.

The book is a delight to read, not just from the topics covered and the clear prose. The type is large and clear, and the snapshots and photos illustrating the various chapters are well chosen and presented. Anyone with roots in this area from 1890 to 1940 is almost certain to recognize one or more of the many people she mentions in various connections. This is neither a fromal history nor a genealogy, but it is a valuable resource for both historians and genealogists.







AN ANDERSONVILLE SURVIVOR

Brief Account of the Experiences of an Adams Man in the Famous Southern Prison Pen

"Just now with war against our Mexican neighbors a live prospect, business at the army recruiting offices has become brisk. There is something alluring to youth in a life of adventure and danger. Doubtless many tales told by veterans of the civil war have had their part in fostering this spirit, for as warlike events fade into the past they become enveloped in a halo of romance sure to attract the imaginative mind of youth. The following, we think, ought at least to induce such of our young men as may happen to read it, to count the cost before entering the military service of Uncle Sam.

The recent reunion of survivors of Andersonville reminds us that, after all,

we are still near the days of civil strife. We are reminded, too, that we have in our own community those who experienced the horrors of the southern prison pen, whose histories should be written, both to teach the lesson of unselfish patriotism which they convey, and that war, even when called just, is full of horror and misery and should never be engaged in until every human means or prevention has been exhausted.

Raymiro E. Spicer, a resident of Adams, now showing signs of advancing years, though still in vigorous health, is a survivor of Andersonville. It was his privilege to attend the late reunion. It occurs to the Journal that the story of his war experiences, briefly recounted, cannot fail to be of interest to our readers.

Mr. Spicer enlisted September 25, 1861, in Co. K, 24th regiment of NY Volunteers. This was the company led by Capt. Jack Barney. He was in the second battle of Bull Run, when Capt. Barney, who for gallantry had been made major, was killed. Mr. Spicer served in this regiment for twenty months. He fought at South Mountain and Antietam and in both battles at Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville. After these thrilling experiences, which had transformed him and thousands of comrades into veterans, he was in May, 1863, transferred to the 76th New York.

In July, 1863, he was in the great battle at Gettysburg, in the first corps, the first division and the first brigade, of which Gen. Reynolds was corps commander. It was this corps which opened

WHISPERS OF THE PAST AUTHOR, HAROLD SANDERSON, ADDRESSES SOCIETY

Harold Sanderson, author of "Whispers Of The Past", gave society members some insight into the research he did while writing his book. His book and his research has to do with Jefferson County civil war soldiers, primarily the 94th regt. Harold said that he was a historian and not a genealogist, however it became very clear to him that they overlap.

Prior to the war, farmers were having a hard time making ends meet. For some, the money paid by the government was more than they could make on the farm. Some farmers hired laborers to work the farms while they went off to war. After the war many large farms sprouted up due the pensions and bounties paid to these soldiers.

He has found out that some of the men who enlisted from Jefferson County were from Canada. Some others were deserters from the Brisish army who deserted their post in Canada to pick up the bounty money (\$1000.00) that was being offered. These deserters were taken to Watertown where they enlisted with an alias name. This makes it particularly hard for the genealogist to track theses soldiers.

Mr. Sanderson is currently entering all the information on approximately 6600 men into a computer at Jefferson Comunity College. When this project is completed it will be made available to the public. You will be able to go to JCC and use the computers to search for information on any of the soldiers and in some cases there will even be pictures.

A big thankyou to Mr. Sanderson, from the society.

the battle, on the first day of which Gen. Reynolds fell. Just 30 years to an hour from the opening of that decisive battle, the survivors of the 76th assembled on the battle line and held a reunion. About 85 veterans were present. What their emotions were on that anniversary we shall not attempt to describe, but their gallant service in preserving the Union and bringing peace and prosperity to generations yet unborn will never be forgotten.

Mr. Spicer saw hot times at Gettysburg, where he was severely wounded on the first day of the fight. For some eight tedious months, while his regiment was doing things in the field, Mr. Spicer was in the hospital. As the fire of youth burns more fiercely than in age, it is likely that his impatience to be with his comrades retarded recovery, but he was declared fit for service in the spring of 1864, when he rejoined his regiment.

Big events had transpired while he lay on his hospital cot. Ulysses S. Grant, victor at Fort Donelson, Vicksburg, Shiloh and Chattanooga, the man who couldn't talk, but whose lion jaw betokened the firmness of a bulldog, and whose successes had deserved and won the confidence of Lincoln, was at the head of the Union armies. With him Sherman, Sheridan, Meade, were Thomas, and a multitude of others whose fighting qualities had been tested, and when Mr. Spicer rejoined his regiment, ready for whatever the fortunes of war had in store, the battle of the Wilderness had been conceived in the mind of Grant.

Gen. Wadsworth was his brigade commander. It was on the 6th of May, while the intricacies of the Wilderness campaign were being worked out, that Mr. Spicer met his personal Waterloo. A line including Wadsworth's brigade had been formed south of the Rapidan, near Culpepper, in a dense thicket. The enemy was in front, invisible, and the fire was hot. Wadsworth's brigade was close to the extreme left. At this juncture a large body of the enemy swung to the left and Gen. Wadswoth was shot. Three of our companies, hemmed in on two sides by a largely superior force, were gobbled up and made prisoners. Mr. Spicer was one of the unfortunates. It was the end of his service in the field. The prisoners were disarmed and marched to Gordonville, where they were sent by train to Andersonville. The train was made up of box cars, in which they were herded like cattle. They reached the famous prison pen on the 22d of May, and had been five days without food. It is doubtless true that the Confederacy was not at that time flush with wholesome rations, but history has never vindicated our old time foes from the charge of deliberate cruelty. Mr. Spicer has not forgotten that those who had charge of the prisoners at Andersonville made no secret of their preference for a dead "Yank" over a live one. It is probably just as well, however, to bury the memory of it if, indeed, forgetfulness of such cruelty is possible.

Mr. Spicer recalls that their five days' fast was broken with an issue of five hardtacks, followed later by a small piece of corn bread and a portion of rice soup, cooked in infected swamp water, which made them all sick. At Charlotte, NC, Mr. Spicer purchased some potato pies from an enterprising woman cook, priced at ten dollars each in Confederate money, or one dollar in greenbacks, and ten cents in silver. They were very appetizing after the scanty diet of hardtack, and cured the complaint caused by the infected rice soup.

They arrived at the celebrated prison pen in Andersonville on May 22. Most of our readers are familiar with Andersonville experience from the many accounts heretofore published. Mr. Spicer endured them all. He knows all about the famous "dead line," to cross which was sure death to the hapless "Yank" who was venturesome enough to brave it. As every sentinel earned a furlough for each prisoner shot, of course they were keen to bag their human game. It was a barbarous practice and we do not believe Providence ever granted victory to a cause which permitted such cruelty. The food was insufficent in quantity and poor in quality. Boxes of provisions sent from the north were never delivered, but were confiscated by their keepers. The inhuman treatment of prisoners in Andersonville and other southern prisons

contributed more than anything else to keep alive the bitterest feelings is dying out, and the new generation in the south no longer seeks to condone the barbarous acts of their fathers.

The prison, which was without shelter or shade, was watered by a brook which ran across it, which received the drainage of the vast camp, and therefore was always filled with filth. This was the only water available for drinking, cooking and bathing. The inevitable result was sickness, and deaths were frequent. It was a condition which even their captors could not remedy, and bade fair to result in a terrible pestilence. Nothing, it would seem but Providential interference could save the vast camp from a fearful fate. And this, as Mr. Spicer believes, is precisely what occured. The prisoners had dug deep wells within the enclosure which yielded no water, but one day during a terrific thunder storm a lighting bolt struck within the enclosure, and from the spot where it entered the ground there gushed forth a spring of pure water. It was within the dead line, but the prisoners were allowed to conduct it within their own lines. From that time they enjoyed the blessing of pure water. The spring, known as "Providence spring," is still in existence. A pavilion has been erected over it and Mr. Spicer brought from the reunion a bottle of the water which he treasures as a memento of his experiences fifty years ago.

Historical Association of South Jefferson

Ed Lee, Trustee of the Historical Association of South Jefferson, addressed our members at the March meeting. Ed advised of what projects they are working on.

Besides entering all of the lower sixtowns cemetery records into their computers, they are also extracting all events from the Jefferson County Jouranls which have been published since 1855. At present they have about 90,000 entries. They also have a card file that refers back to the Journal.

Ed says they hope to have all the information in the computers by next year. All information is available to the public at 9 Church Street, Adams, NY 13506. They are currently open five days a week from 8 am to 3 pm. There are no user fees, however donations are appreciated.

FIRST WATER POWER ON BLACK RIVER

In 1806 brothers, **Harvey and Isaac Cleveland** built a sawmill on the south side of the Black River in the village of Lockport (now known as Black River) in the towns of Rutland and LeRay. This was destroyed by flooding in 1807 and rebuilt the same season. This was the first dam in the village of Black River and the first water power on the Black River.

Harvey was a volunteer in the war of 1812 as a member of Capt. Lampson's Company. While serving at the battle of Sacket's Harbor he lost his left arm. On 2 MAR 1863 a letter of administration is filed in Jefferson County stating that Relief Cleveland a resident of Hounsfield, being duly sworn deposes and says that she is the widow of Harvey Cleveland a resident of Hounsfield aforesaid who was a pensioner of the United States at the rate of eight dollars per month, and who died in said town of Hounsfield on the 23 DEC 1862 and that she was present at the death of her husband. Philander Cleveland also duly swears to the foregoing affidavit.

According to the 1810, 1820, and 1825 censuses Harvey and Relief are living in Rutland as neighbor of Isaac Cleveland. In 1820 Harvey sells 119 acres in lot 38-31 (next to Abel Sherman in Rutland) for \$360.00 to Isaac and Ann Bronson of Fairfield, CT. In 1833 Harvey and Relief Cleveland of Rutland sell lot 38-31 next to Abel Sherman for \$1250 to Josiah Crosby of Norway, Herkimer county. In 1833 Harvey of Rutland buys from Samuel and Phebe Field to Ebenezer Allen farm on lot 38-40 acres in the town of Hounsfield for \$610.00. In 1843 Harvey and Relief of Hounsfield sell this same 40 acres (Ebenezer Allen farm and Henry Storrs) in town of Hounsfield to V. DeCastro. Harvey and Relief in deed dated 8 FEB 1850 buy Allen farm from Philander Cleveland.

Harvey Cleveland born 20 AUG 1782 in Claremont, NH, was the son of Isaac and Mamre (Matthews) Cleveland. In March of 1808, in Rutland, NY, Harvey Cleveland married Relief Cross, daughter of Abel and Desire (Palmer) Cross. She was born 5 OCT 1791 in Bennington, VT and she died 20 MAY 1885 at the age of 92 yrs 7mos 15. Harvey Cleveland died 24 DEC 1862 at the age of 80 yrs and they are both buried in Sulphur Springs cemetery, Hounsfield, NY.

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER OF
STONINGTON, CT AND
HOUNSFIELD, JEFFERSON COUNTY

David Bennett, son of Stephen Bennett and of Mehitable Stebbins was born about 1762 in Stonington, New London, CT. He died 7 NOV 1843 Hounsfield, Jefferson Co., NY. He was married about 1787 in CT, to Rebecca Miner, daughter of Samuel Miner and Abigail (widow) Miner. She was born Stonington, CT 28 JUN 1763 and died Hounsfield, NY 14 FEB 1824 and is buried in Sulphur Springs cemetery, Hounsfield, Jefferson Co. NY.

David's American Revolution pension, S12201, shows that he had CT service under Capt Richards, Col Starry. On 25 SEP 1832 David appeared at the town of Cicero, Onondaga Co, NY aged 69. He stated that he enlisted at Stonington, he thinks in 1779. Served at Ft Griswold under Capt Wm Latham, Lt Ledyard and Adj Ledyard, the year Major Andre was hung. He served and saw Major Andre hung. He served in Washington's army under Starr and was discharged in New Jersey. Shortly after his brother, Aaron, was drafted and David served for him. Later he served in an artillery co., then served as substitute for Thomas Smith for a period of 3 months at Ft Griswold. He served until 1782. At this time he had resided in Onondaga Co for only about a year and was but little acquainted except with Gurdin and Noyes Bennett who are his sons.

Jefferson Co, NY, 3 JUL 1839. David Bennett appeared, he had been on pension rolls of NY, transferred to CT, lately removed to Hounsfield, Jefferson County, NY, where he intends to remain. His son Daniel Bennett lives in Hounsfield and David will live with him remainder of his life.





> SURVIVED HORRORS OF ANDERSONVILLE PRISON JESSE BUSKIRK OF LAFARGEVILLE By Mrs. Flora S. Upton

Veteran of Civil War, Will Celebrate 85th Birthday On August 8.

Lafargeville, July 26 - Here and there in the north country are many men pursuing their everyday tasks and carrying in their breast stories of their lives. unknown to their fellow man. Could we but read their thoughts we might find therein something more thrilling than many a book of fiction. There lives a man in the town of Orleans, near here, who expects to quietly celebrate his 85th birthday on Aug. 8. He seldom speaks of the past years of his life, and of those days when he was serving his country in her great struggle. Jesse Buskirk was born in the town of Clayton. As soon as he was old enough he began going to school and helping on the farm out of school hours. At the age of 22 he heeded the call of his country and he enlisted in Company K of

the 14th New York Heavy Artillery. Captain Cooper was in command. From Clayton Mr. Buskirk went to Rochester, where he was made corporal. That winter he spent in Staten Island. In the spring of '64 he arrived in Washington, and from there marched direct to the front. History will recall the famous Battle of the Wilderness, and here Mr. Buskirk met his first engagement. It was here that for miles and miles the trees were blazing as a result of fire started from heavy firing. The next battle was Spottsylvania and here the captain suddenly disappeared from their midst. Captain Underhill took command. Battle at North Ann river. Cold Harbour and Saint Petersburg followed. In a great mine dug under the Rebel fort, the Yankees had carefully laid their plans to blow up the fort. The plan failed to work. The Union soldiers attempted to capture it in a hand to hand fight. Through a misunderstanding the men who charged were not followed by the support of the rest of the company. As the Stars and Stripes were shot from the hands of the sargeant, young Buskirk jumped to save it from the Rebels. Perhaps only one ever knew what became of that flag, but Mr. Buskirk has proudly remarked that no Rebel ever captured it. Matters were growing from bad to worse. With other prisoners he was taken to that terrible place from which few ever returned to tell the story. This place was the famous Andersonville prison in Georgia. There were 30 acres of land enclosed by a stockade. Around this field holes were dug and logs set in on Smallpox broke out ------- do and undoubtedly it saved the life of more than one. They knew that dectection meant death but they took the chance, and as the work grew, hope came to them and it began to look as though it was nearly finished when a sentry passing by stepped into a little hole outside. One of the men grabbed for him to silence his tounge forever, but too late. He made a get away. Then came orders from the commander of the prison. "Three days and nothing to eat". After the starvation rations they had

Some lived to tell how that stockade became a living mass of suffering, scarcely room enough to move. How many of them fought in vain to ward off disease as it spread among them. In three months the Rebels became alarmed, thinking help was coming and moved the prisoners to Havans. Before they went, the story is told of how an unknown Irish woman threw bread over the dead line for the men to eat. They called her as "the angel of light". It seemed ages afterwards to Mr. Buskirk when he was moved to Camp Lawton, where he was one of those to be let out on parole of honor. The price of their first meal of wheat bread, a dozen eggs and a piece of bacon and a bit of salt was \$600. Confederate money was worth two cents on the dollar. The boys could begin to earn a bit if their health allowed and they began to have more comforts of life. They were moved from camp to camp, however, for fear of aid coming to them. They met with all sorts of experiences. In one camp a Rebel Lieutenant had heart enough to bring in a hogshead full of peanuts, but he was arrested for his act of kindness. After a time the men were moved back to Charleston, then to Goldsboro, then on a transport to Maryland, where for the first time they had clean clothes and good quarters. Then came the furlough and the men were mustered out with their regiment. There are very few left in the town of Orleans and probably none who could tell such a tale as he. It is understood the following veterans still live: Edwin Ostrander, Jacob Snell and Fred Dickson of Lafargeville. Martin Fetterly has moved to Utica where he lives in the Masonic Rob Sheeley lives at Fishers Landing and George Schryver lived near Omar. Mr. Buskirk has several children. Ernest of Depauville; Ned and George of Lafargeville; Edwin of Evans Mills; Mrs Dolly Walters of Lafargeville; and Mrs. Millie Bergan of Chaumont.



News of the find was posted on the Internet by Diana H. Bailey, who publishes a genealogy quarterly for northern Vermont and Quebec's eastern townships.

The marriage data is contained in two small autograph albums, one belonging to a young woman named Carrie (surname unknown), possibly born 18 October 1870, the other to Cora R. SHEVALDINE of Lorraine, NY. Many people signed the book belonging to Carrie, who appears to have been a student at Adams Coll. Inst. in Adams, NY., and may have taught school afterwards. Her family appears to have centered in Lorraine. Diane Bailey was able to find six of Carrie's realatives in the book — her mother (no name), grandmother (signed Grandma H.), a sister Hattie, and 3 cousins with the surnames JOHNSON, CARSWELL, and STEBBINS. One entry suggests Carrie may have married a man named EGGLESTON and had a daughter named Grace. Towns mentioned in Carrie's book include Lorraine, Adams, Worthville, Gouverneur, Pierrepont Manor, Ellisburg, Three Mile Bay and a few others. The person selling the books was vague about how they had been obtained, but apparently it was from the sale of an estate, probably in southern Jefferson county.

Diane did the data extraction from the two autograph books, and after a little "online" negotiation, Jefferson county Genealogical Society member Dave Simonds, who also "hangs out" on the computer networks, agreed to purchase them from her for a very reasonable price.





MOTHER NATURE SERVES UP A MICROBURST !!!!!

John Bartlett It has been a hot summer, humidity has been very high, but nobody was expecting what has been billed as a Microburst. On July 15th, Ellen and I were spending the weekend at Ellen's mother and fathers, we were having a garage sale. Early in the morning, around 4:30, a storm with winds in excess of 80 mph ripped through upstate New York and across the state to Vermont and Massachusetts. Nothing was spared the wrath of MOTHER NATURE. Homes were blown off there foundations, barns collapsed onto cattle, trees were uprooted and lives were lost.

We sustained little damage at the Rogers' farm, however there was much damage in the village of Cleaton. Power was out for party for the state of the state for

We sustained little damage at the Rogers' farm, however there was much damage in the village of Clayton. Power was out for upwards of 200,000 residents of the state for up to five days, which left many residents without water. Our family pitched in together, Gus and I taking turns pulling up buckets of water from the well, Ellen and her mother Marion filled 25 gallon containers so that we could fill the water trough for the cows. Later that day with the help of Don Delaney, a neighbor, arrangements were made for the Depauville volunteer fire department to deliver water to fill the troughs. Gus took the pictures on this page and on page 20, they show some of the damage that was done in Hillside cemetery, Antwerp. He has been busy there recording gravestones, there is also a picture of some damage done in Clayton village cemetery. Ellen and I went to Hillside cemetery to help Gus about a week after the storm, we

Ellen and I went to Hillside cemetery to help Gus about a week after the storm, we couldn't believe the damage. There were about 20 Hickory trees, each being about 40 to 50 feet tall, uprooted, laying on the ground with their root systems ripped up. Several stones have been damaged, repair or replacement of them is unlikely. The Hillside cemetery in Antwerp suffers the same fate as do many other cemeteries in the area, NO MONEY. There budgets just about cover mowing the lawns.

If these destroyed gravestones are not replaced or repaired and if these cemeteries go unrecorded, then some poor soul in the future may never find his family lines. All of

families buried in one or more of the Jefferson County cemeteries, could make sure that those burial listings are placed with the JCNYGS, we can make sure they are preserved for future generations.

SOCIETY NEWS

"The Historical Association of South Jefferson is tackling a project that uses "the cutting edge of technology," says Robert Gummer, Adams, vice president of the association. "Nobody's taken a bite this big," he added.

At the Historical Association's Museum and Family History Research

Center, 9 East Church St., several people are working to "complete an alphabetical listing of every birth, death and marriage in the South Jeff area, including six towns, for at least 150 years, Mr. Gummer said.

The goal of the association is to assist in people's attempts to research genealogical roots in the north country.

Workers from the Job Training Partnership Act write all the vital statistics contained in old newspapers from the Jefferson County Journal. From there, the information is entered into computers, which were loaned to the association. The compiling process is long, but Mr. Gummer hopes to produce a hard copy of the list by Christmas, he said.

The Association received an alphabetical listing of all the people buried in a local cemetery. Although, the cemetery's record includes only 900 names, Mr.Gummer says at least 4,000 people were buried there. The original number was reached by counting each tombstone but "a lot more people were buried there than the number of tomb-stones," Mr., Gummer said. "Two hundred years ago, people

didn't have much education so records didn't mean all that much, Mr.Gummer said.

The family research center is also looking for a microfilm reader, Mr.Clark said. "To have a microfilm is one of our dreams and we need it desperately," he said.

The Museum and Family Historical Research Center is open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily, Monday through Friday.

An obituary for Edward G. House of Gotham St., Watertown, appeared this spring in both the Watertown Daily Times and The Thousand Islands Sun. Though it should have been of interest only to family and friends, genealogists might take note. The first paragraphs described the life and lineage of Mr. House, an X-ray technician of Watertown, following the usual form. Tucked into the middle of Mr. Houses' obit was a paragraph on Eddy House of Alexandria Bay and Florida. Eddy, who never uses the name Edward, owned House Chevrolet - Olds in Redwood and Central Square. The second family was deluged with calls of unneeded sympathy, Eddy being quite alive. A careful reading of the obituary would reveal the discrepancy, but in cases of common names, the researcher should exercise caution and common sense. An X-ray technician would probably not own two car dealerships, nor, probably, would a resident of Central Square or Redwood be a deacon, elder, and trustee at Stone Presbyterian Church, Watertown. Newspapers are put together under the pressure of a deadline, and as several recent corrections on the obituary page of The Times demonstrate. they don't always get it right the first time. Most collections of obituaries, such as the excellent one at Flower Library, Watertown, cannot be expected to pick up all the printed corrections and dis-claimers. BALCH'S OLD HOMESTEAD

Found in the back of an old scrapbook recently purchased at a garage sale by John & Ellen Bartlett, for \$1.00

In the year of 1825, Hiram Wheeler, my great, great, grandfather came into the wilderness and staked out a farm in the southern part of Jefferson county. The farm known today as the William Balch farm. After having built a log cabin, on the most sightly spot on the farm, that is the hill from which can be seen Old Lake Ontario from Oswego point on the south to the Gallup Islands on the north. Hiram returned to his former home at Broadalbin, Fulton County.

A few weeks later, there might have been seen a yoke of oxen slowly wondering their way along the Mohawk Valley hitched to an Oxsled, on which was Hiram Wheeler, his father and mother, Aaron and Sally (my great, great, great grand parents) two brothers, James and Lauren, two sisters, Laura and Electa, also their household goods.

They arrived at their new home just before dark on March 11th, 1825. They followed blazed trees back about one mile from the main highway as there was no road laid out at that time. After settling their few household belongings, they prepared their supper, which consisted of salt pork & potatoes and johnnie cake with sap coffee as a beverage.

Three years later in 1828 Hiram married Polly Hill of Lorraine. In ten years he had cleared his farm of 100 acres, built a commodious frame house, the one still standing on the hill. Three children blessed this union namely Allen only son, two daughters Sarah and Mary.
Allen married Harriet Balch, Sarah
married William Balch my great grandfather and Mary was wed to Ira Balch all of one family, a rather unusual circumstance. In the meantime Aaron and Sally had passed to the great beyond.

About a year after their marriage, William and Sarah Balch bought the old homestead, thus changing the name of the owner, but not leaving the family. For nearly fifty years they lived there in peace and harmony, raising a family of four. Then after growing to old to work the farm, they sold to their son Melvin Balch (my grandfather) he in turn sold it to his brother Ira F. Balch who passed it on to his son Volney W. Balch, but Volney soon tired of the old farm, and thinking to better himself sold it to Raymond VanEpps the present owner. Thus after providing for and sheltering five generations of the one family the old farm passed into the hands of strangers.

GERRETT SMITH BARNES

The society received the following letter from Frederick Wayne Barnes. "Enclosed please find an article of Gerrett Smith Barnes from the (Portrait and Biographical Record of the State of Colorado), which has Jefferson and Oneida County references".

Hon, G.S. Barnes, deceased, who for years was one of the most successful merchants of Colorado Springs, embarked in the hardware business in September, 1873, his first location being a frame building on the corner of Huerfano Street and Cascade Avenue. In 1876 he removed to No. 17 South Tejon street, which property he purchased on the death of the owner, D. Russ Wood. The store, a building of sixty feet, backed by extensive warehouses, is supplied with the largest stock of hardware of any similar establishment in the city, two floors being devoted to the stock. On the corner of Costilla and Wahsatch streets there is a warehouse stocked with jobbers' goods, where may be found, as in the retail store, hardware of all kinds, wagon works' supplies, agricultural implements, etc. In 1886 he took into partnership his son, James P.[Pierce], from which time until his death, September 3, 1898, the firm title was G.S. Barnes & Son. The active management of the business was placed in the hands of the junior partner, Mr. Barnes having practically retired in 1895.

In an early day three brother came to this country from England. From them the Barnes family descends. In religion, as her husband, she adhered to the Presbyterian faith. Her father, Zebediah Coburn, was born in CT. and served an enlistment each year of the Revolutionary war. For

some years he | and his wife Luna | made his home in Jefferson County, NY., but died in Cortland Co., NY., at eighty four years of age. His occupation was that of a cabinetmaker, and he manufactured large numbers of chairs, one of which is in the possession of our subject. The family to which he belonged was of English origin.

Of nine children | Randall, Gerritt, Maria, Russell, Pamelia, Candace, Eliza Wealthy & Theresa | who attained matured years our subject and sister alone survived until death of the former. He was born in Florence, Oneida Co., NY., November 28, 1818, and spent his boyhood years in Florence and that neighborhood, and was educated in evening schools and later at the Homer Academy. At sixteen years of age he left the farm and went to Homer, where he was employed for four years in his uncle's store. Afterward he traveled with his uncle, who was an incle's store. (Eliza) Pierce, daughter of James Pierce [and Lucy Barnes], who was an early settler near Sangerfield, Oneida County. [James Pierce was born at Paris Hill, Oneida Co., NY.] Their golden anniversary was held amidst much congratulation and good wishes of friends here and by letter and telegrams from distant points at their home on Kiowa Street, February 25, 1897. Their union was blessed with five children, the eldest of whom, James P.[Pierce Barnes], was his father's partner, while the other son, Marion O.[Oscar], is also in the store. The three daughter are: Lucy [Coburn Barnes], Etta D.[Decker Barnes] and Irene [Stillman Barnes], wife of Hon. H.H. Seldomridge, of Colorado Springs. [Son Gerritt Smith Barnes was born in 1860.]

Lamberton Clark enlisted in New York 177 in Capt. Robert Warner's Co., Col. Samuel Wylly's Regiment, General Parson's Brigade of CT line. He served until June 1783 at which time he was discharged from Capt. Buell's Co., Col. Zebulon Butler's Regiment, at Westpoint, New York. Lamberton was in the battle of Long Island and the retreat from New York York.

Lamberton Clark made his declaration for pension 06 May 1818 in the town of Charlotte, Chittenden Co., VT., age 59. He stated that he was a resident of Lysander, Onondaga Co., NY. On 12 Oct. 1838 his widow Martha (Rexford) was allowed pension of \$80.00 per year, at which time the was residing. which time she was residing, Antwerp, Jefferson Co., NY.

ROBERT MULLIN HOUSE IN TOWN OF BROWNVILLE

Watertown Daily Times "Small and plain of type is the native limestone house built about 1830 by Robert Mullin on the Mullin Street road in the town of Brownville. In an obscure and little traveled district about a mile and a half to the north of the village of Brownville the Mullin street road leaves the Brownville - Limerick highway back of the state game farm and connects with the Perch River road out of Brownville village.

The house, out buildings and about 84 acres of land are now owned by Mrs. Leone Robbins, wife of Walter Robbins, who purchased it in 1934. Prior to that it had a long list of owners over a long period of years.

It was Feb. 1, 1830 that Robert Mullin purchased 104.76 acres of land, where the house stands, from Col. Edmund Kirby for \$382 and is believed to have constructed his house that year from native limestone quarried nearby. Five years later Mr. Mullin sold off 20 acres of land to David Sibbison for \$160. \$160

Not much is known of Mullin. His wife's name was Margaret and on Nov. 24, 1856 they sold a lot adjoining the St. Paul's Episcopal church rectory in Brownville village. Mullin died intestate and his house and farm went to his sons, Robert A. and John Mullin. On Jan. 15, 1882. John quitclaimed his interest to his brother. At that time John and his wife Mary R. Mullin were resident of Rice county, Minnesola.

Robert A. Mullin held the place only a short time after that, he and his wife Marietta disposing of it April 1, 1884 to Charlie E. Jones for \$2,500.

On March 1, 1887 Jones sold the property to Mrs. Priscilla Hubbs, who retained it until July 17, 1889 when Inri Johnson bought it. After that it had several owners, including George Hoover, William Cook, Caroline E. McGuire, Mrs. Ida A. Ball and Carrie Arnold Frederick of this city.

The fact that Col. Edmund Kirby once owned the land upon which this house is built had a been a few for the collections.

house is built lends the most interesting bit of history to it, for Colonel Kirby, born in Litchfield, Conn., April 18, 1794, was the son of Ephraim Kirby who was an American officer in the Revolutionary war, member of the order of the Cincinnati and Judge of the Connecticut supreme court.

Colonel Kirby himself was a man of distinction, entering the War of 1812 as a lieutenant, serving on the northern and western frontiers and being stationed at Detroit from 1815 to 1820, when he joined Major General Jacob Brown at Brownville as aide-de-camp. He married General Brown's daughter, Filiza. When General Brown went to Washington, D.C., in 1821 to become general in which of the results army Colonel Kirby went there also as come general-in-chief of the regular army Colonel Kirby went there also as adjutant general. He served in that capacity through 1823 and the following year was appointed to the paymaster's department. Between 1832 and 1840 he served in the Black Hawk, Creek and Seminole wars and later bought General Brown's estate at Brownville, the General having died early in 1828. Colonel Kirby died Aug. 20, 1849, at Avon Springs, N.Y., and is buried in the Brownville cemetery

In Memory of Captain Joel Parmelee Rice

One of the few remaining early pioneers and settlers of Champion — an aged, respected and pious citizen, who has made a mark not to be despised in the local circle where he was once a power, has departed, and something more than a brief announcement seems called for.

Joel P. Rice was born in the town of Greenfield, in what was then Hampshire County, but now Franklin, in the state of Massachusetts, Feb. 11th, 1781 and he died at his old residence on Martin street, in Champion, Jefferson Co., NY, May 7th, 1873 at the age of 92 years and 4 months, very nearly. His parents were poor, hard working people, but virtuous and respectable. Joel continued subject to them until 21 years old, and his wages, earned when away from home, went to support his parents and their family.

Soon after he became of age, he hired by the month to his uncle Enos Rice, and in his employ drove a team of four oxen from Greenfield to Champion, starting on the 24th of February, and arrived here in 20 days. He had to stop twice to shoe anew with wood the heavy runners of the sled on which the load of furniture was drawn. He found his uncle Enos and family at the house of Ephraim Chamberlain, somewhere in what is now called West Carthage. The next day, March 17th, 1802, Joel drove the first team of any kind that over traveled Martin Street. It was the same team he had just driven from Massachusetts, and the road had to be underbrushed to enable the team to proceed. Its destination was a few logs just laid up for part of the body of a house, on the same farm where Capt. Rice died. His uncle came on and the house was covered and so far finished that the family moved in a day or two after. Their first night's lodging was

not the most encouraging, for the morning revealed the beds well covered with snow, which had drifted in through the unstopped chinks. But nothing daunted, they perserved to make a comfortable home and get an honest living.

But the first year's work was hard enough. They had no feed but brouse for the stock, and frequently the cattle, remembering the fare of earlier days, straved away, making towards Massachusetts, and on one occasion they strayed as far as Lowville. The flies were almost intolerable for man and beast. The work was heavy and unpleasant. Big trees had to be felled and chopped into logs, the logs rolled together and burned, the brands gathered and consumed, rails to be split and fences made, and all this before a little patch of clearing was available for a crop. There were at first no schools, no churches, and but few neighbors. There was no house or clearing then between the home of Enos Rice and Felts Mills. Other parts of the town settled earlier than Martin Street. Thomas and Joel Hopkins moved in the same spring, (1802), and Capt. Martin later in the season.

For several years Joel vibrated between Greenfield and Champion, and spent considerable time at work for one Diefendorf, of Warren, Herkimer county, of whom he used to speak as his "old friend". He afterwards purchased of his uncle Enos, 83 1/2 acres of land on Martin Street, and in 1805 made a clearing of four acres and raised a fine crop of com and potatoes. The same fall he built a comfortable log home, fatted two pigs, pickled the meat, and prepared to bring on his father with his family, the next winter, which he did.

By 1807 he concluded it was time to select a partner for life, and his selection seems to have been highly fortunate for both. On the 20th of January he was married to Miss Elizabeth Crowner, by Rev. Nathaniel Dutton.

She was a high spirited and energetic woman, a help mate, indeed. They were blessed with seven sons and four daughters. One of the sons died in infancy, of the measles, the others grew to man's estate, respectable and useful citizens. He lived to see his four daughters respectably married. By hard labor and persevering economy, besides providing for his parents, he was enabled to rear this large family, and also to acquire a good substance.

In the War of 1812 he and his neighbors were frequently called out on alarms, and were much annoyed in many ways. At one time he was absent in the service 18 days, at another 30 days. At the time of the battle of Sackets Harbor he started from home with his company while the roar of cannon was distinctly heard. He arrived in time to witness the horrid sight of the dead on the battle field, and came back with but little relish for war.

He embraced religion about the year 1832 and united with the M. E. Church of Carthage, where he ever maintained a standing as one of the most pious and devoted members. It would be pleasant to enlarge upon his religious life and experience, but space will not allow. He frequently regretted that he had not started to serve the Lord in earlier life, but blessed God that he was at last made an heir of salvation.

As an instance and illustration of the general respect which was accorded to him, we mention that very frequently he was called on to arbitrate and settle disputes between his neighbors. His decisions were always acquiesced in as just and final. He filled several town offices, always faithfully and creditably. In the militia he was commissioned first as ensign, afterwards as lieutenant and lastly as captain.

We have read, with great interest, some memoranda of his early life, written by him. He mentions a narrow escape from drowning, June 16, 1799. Himself, his father, his uncle, his younger brother and a young man

names Morley, had been fishing on Goat Island below the falls of the Connecticut. In coming off, the water got the better of them and filled the boat. His father and uncle stepped out and escaped back to the island. Joel, being a good swimmer, tried to save his brother and Morley. They all three clinched together and sank, and then floated several rods underwater and over a dam, when they were separated of course. Joel was dashed on a ledge of rocks which formed the shore, and was saved, as by a miracle. His brother and Morley were drowned. This event impressed him deeply and was ever lasting.

He speaks frequently of the hard work and deprivations of the early settlers, their kindness to each other, etc., as those only can speak who speak from experience. Some money they must have, and the only article sure to sell for money was black salts or potash. They gathered their ashes, leached them and boiled the lye down to black salts, and thus they got most of the money which paid for their farms.

One by one the old pioneers of the Black River settlements have mostly departed. A few remain, but their places will soon be vacant. They were hardy, honest, industrious men, who lived and dicd respected. But none among them have maintained a better reputation, or lived more worthy of respect, than did Capt. Joel P. Rice. Blessed be his memory!

In a related newspaper story of 1958 we find the following information relating to Captain Rice.

"In June, 1813, Captain Rice and his wife purchased 83 1/2 acres from his uncle, General Henry Champion, and the latter's wife. General Champion had been part of a speculative land-holding association which had purchased most of northern New York from the state and the Indian tribes fol-

lowing the Revolution. The association had divided the county into townships and General Champion, who owned the town later to be named after him, sold the land in relatively small divisions to setters. He himself did not build houses and hence it can be assumed that the Rice homestead was not built before Joel Rice purchased the land in 1813. Presumably the house was built shortly after that date. According to histories of the area, Captain Rice raised crops of potatoes on the land he purchased from his uncle.

Captain Rice was the great grandfather of LeRoy Wood, who has just sold the farm. Mr. Wood's grandfather, Alfred W. Rice, was born on the homestead in 1828.

Captain and Mrs. Rice had seven sons and four daughters. He died May 7, 1873.

The 83 1/2 acres were sold to Alfred W. Rice by his father in November 1859.

Deeds show that the house was put up for tax sale auction in 1860, at which time Alfred repurchased it.

Alfred Rice, whose wife was Susan E. Rice, died Nov. 1, 1912, leaving one daughter, Susan Rice Wood, the wife of William E. Wood. Mrs. Susan Wood, the present LeRoy Wood's mother, inherited the farm from her father. She owned it until her death March 1, 1949, when she willed it to her six children. In 1951 LeRoy A. Wood and his wife, Geneva bought out the shares in the farm of Mr. Wood's five brothers and sisters.

In December, 1953, part of the land in the back part of the farm was sold to **John W. and Ione Roggie**, Carthage, Route 3, for dairying.

The Wood side of the family tree also dates back to the earliest settlers in the section. William E. Wood, the husband of Susan Rice Wood, was the son of LeRoy Wood, one of the town pioneers who came here in 1811 and who lived on Martin street for 30 years

on the old Wood homestead, nearer Great Bend than the Rice homestead. The mother of William E. Wood was Anna Eliza Mix Wood, daughter of James Mix and granddaughter of Joel Mix, the first settler of West Carthage.

The farmhouse was endangered by fire five or six years ago. The back porch and the partitions leading upstairs caught fire, and created a blaze which could be seen from the village of West Carthage. However, quick action by the West Carthage volunteer fire department, with aid from the Great Bend department, kept the historic building intact."

Peter married 13 Nov 1828 Clarissa Steele, They were married in the First Reformed Dutch Church in the Town of Glen, Montgomery Co., NY., she was born in Vermont 04 Jan 1809. Her parents are not known at this time, Clarissa died in Clayton, NY. 03 Feb 1892, she is buried in Clayton Village cemetery. He remained in Montgomery County until about 1836. After selling his possessions he moved to Jefferson County settling first in the Town of Lyme, at a later date he moved again and settled about two miles north of Clayton, known as "The Bennett Homestead" to later generations. Peter died in Clayton 05 Feb 1883 and is buried Clayton Village cemetery. Peter and Clarissa were members of the First Baptist Church in Clayton, Peter was also a Deacon. A stained glass window in the church bears the following inscription: "Deacon P.C. Bennett and Clarissa, his wife". Their children were:

Stone Mills

Stone Mills

Stone Mills got its name from the pioneers
who used to live in that area who, when asked
where they got their grain ground would reply
"At the Stone Mill." Before that it was supposed to be known as Collins Mills. A veteran
of the Revolution war, William Collins had
come to the place and with Peter Pratt built a
grist mill. Those who came to settle there at
about that time knew the place as Collins
Mills, but the term so often used by the settlers
residing some distance out, who came to get

Mills, but the term so often used by the settlers residing some distance out, who came to get their wheat ground at the "stone Mill." in time took the place of the first name.

For years the postoffice was located in the old stone store, a building with massive walls in which is located the general store of the Irwin "boys," who have been merchants for years. They also had the postoffice for a long term of years. In the early days the Irwin family was located on the homestead just north of Stone Mills on the LaFargeville road. The house sets back from the road quite a distance and near the creek. In the early days, and on down through the years, the stone store was a stopping place for the stage where the passengers could go in and get meals and refreshments the while the mail was put off and on and the horses were changed. and the horses were changed.

"When Ethel (Wilson) told me LeRay
De Chaumont NSDAR Chapter was going to do a grave marking ceremony for Rufus Richardson, I said "Oh, let me do something. Maybe we can share some of the information we found on George Wahsington's Guard".

Believe me, the information was hard to come by and we searched for more than a few years. There is nothing in the usual history books. We didn't know what was fact or fiction, or perhaps folklore, that took root and flourished.

After many trips to the Albany State Library, the DAR Library in Wahington, D.C. and the U.S. Army Military History Institute, Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania I feel we have a pretty accurate, factual account of Washington's Guard.

By the way, in shuffling through the quantity of notes and papers amassed in this hunt, I came across referrals to this cemetery as the Reed Cemetery, Stowell's Cemetery and Lakeside Cemetery. I hope I am in the right place! The area is indeed fortunate to have such a well preserved. well cared for old burying ground which has to be approaching 200 years of age. Too many cemeteries have been sacrificed to progress and covered with macadam, or relegated to a cow pasture where the cows have destroyed the monuments with their incessant scratching. Such a desecration, wether the graves of war heroes or just ordinary people, is a

George Washington, early in the war, saw the need for a detachment of men to guard, not only himself, but his camp, his

papers, his luggage, his plans, etc.
His men must have looked like rag-amuffins in their homespuns and buckskins when compared with the svelte Red Coats. He envisioned a group in uniform. This would be a constant challenge as there always seemed to be a shortage of cloth and clothing even to keep the body warm.

insisted that there representatives from each and every colony to avoid animosity. To build his group, Washington had various criteria the men needed to meet. He worried about the honesty of these men. He worried

Imagine his chagrin when the very first man in the war to be tried and convicted for mutiny, sedition and treachery was a man from his own guard. Thomas Hickey was hanged for treason near the corner of the bowery. It would have been small consolation that the plot was traced back to Governor Trace of was traced back to Governor Tryon of New York. New York in general was a

hot bed for Tories due in part to the take over of New Amsterdam by the English.

Washington was in the Boston area when he conceived the idea of forming the guard. Rufus Richardson was born in Worchester, Massachusetts, near the Boston area and enlisted for service here.

The guard was dismissed in 1783 at

Newburgh, New York. Rufus received his discharge here. You will never find his name listed as serving in the guard for the simple reason that there was never any record kept of the enlisted men - only the officers. However, he was always in the right place at the right time (he was there when the guard was formed - he was there when the guard was dismissed). I expect with regard to the pensions, the government was forced to rely a lot on sworn statements from former comrades and acquaintances.

and acquaintances.

In William H. Tuttle's pioneer Settlers on Madison County, New York (1984) on page 211, Rufus Richardson is listed as born in 1759, Veteran of the Revolutionary War, served in the Massachusetts Line, pensioned at \$96.00 per year in 1818.

Prior to 1818 there had been no pensions granted except to officers and

pensions granted except to officers and men disabled in service. The Act of March 18, 1818 covered officers and enlisted men of the Continental Establishment of the Army and Navy who were in "Reduced circumstances"

The Act of May 15, 1820, known as the "Alarm Act", required all pensioners then on the role to file a schedule of property in their possession. As a result, many were dropped from the rolls.

We find a record of Rufus being in the Court of Common Pleas in Madison County on the 5th day of February, 1824 to make a declaration of the value of his property and a plea for his pension. He valued his property at a total of \$39.25 which included one cow, worth \$14.00, 2 beds and bedding valued at \$8.00, a small old table and 4 chairs and various small items including one ax.

He is again in court on the 3rd of July, 1832. All pensions had run for a term of five years and it was not until the Act of June 3, 1858 that all pensions were granted for life.

The 1840 Census of pensioners, published in Washington, D. C. in 1841 lists Rufus Richardson, aged 79 years, living in the Town of Ellisburg

living in the Town of Ellisburg, Jefferson County, New York. The Acts of July 4, 1836, July 7, 1838 and March 3, 1843 were all designed to provide for the widows of

soldiers in varying degrees of criteria.

We find a record of Ruth
Richardson, aged 82 years, appearing
before the Court of Common Pleas in Jefferson County on the 27th day of July, 1843 accompanied by her daughter, Sally Fillmore, aged 56, of the Town of Ellisburg, Jefferson County. Ruth was granted a pension of \$120.00 per annum.

Genealogy of the well known Lewis family

A carefully prepared sketch in which many readers of the Republican will be interested. Tribute to the late Mary Jane Lewis, who died at Great Bend, Dec. 9, 1904.

In the death of Mary Jane Lewis on Dec. 9, 1904, at her home in Great Bend, NY, passed away the youngest and last of the family of Eseck, or as he was more familiarly called, "Squire" Lewis. She was born Feb. 19, 1829, and I think it safe to say in the town of Champion, as that was the home town of the family after coming to this county. In the year about 1850, or a little previous to that, the subject of this sketch married Joel Odell. To them were born a son, Alden, and a daughter, Hannah, now deceased. Mr. Odell died June 25, 1897, at the age of 78 years. Mrs. Odell has lived at or near Great Bend nearly all her life, except a few years in the town of Wilna, and it was during their residence in North Wilna that the daughter, Hannah, died. She passed away Feb. 22, 1876, on her seventeenth birthday. Mrs. Odell was much respected by the many who were fortunate enough to form her acquaintance, and she won the friendship of all her quiet and unassuming manner. The esteem in which she was held was clearly demonstrated by the large concourse of people who gathered at the Baptist church on Sunday, Dec. 11, 1904, to pay the last sad tribute to the silent dead. Interment was made in Sunny Side cemetery, where many of her kin already lie. Mrs. Odell had been a great sufferer for some time, needing so much tender care, so that now she will be doubly missed by her son, Alden, who alone is left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother.

Just at this time I deem it not out of place and perhaps of interest to some to note a short sketch of the family which Mrs. Odell represented. Richard Lewis was a native of Wales, as were nearly all the early ancestors of the Lewis race. He came to this country settling in Rhode Island. From thence came his son Arnold Lewis, locating in the town of Champion about the year 1800, taking up a tract of 700 acres of land, situated on the road now leading from Great Bend to Champion village. The said land is

known as the farms of N. J. Fuller, A. Z. Taylor, G. W. Swain, G. J. Soults, Emerson Peck, C. P. Clark and F. L. Barr. Mrs. F. L. Barr (daughter of Chas. E. and Sarah A. (Lewis) Parker) is the only one of the Lewis descendants now living upon any portion of the original tract. Arnold Lewis served seven years in the French and Indian War and the same in the Revolutionary War, holding a colonel's commission. He was ever after known as Col. Arnold Lewis. He was also surgeon in the Revolutionary War and Mrs. Barr has the old turnkeys he used at that time beside many other interesting relics. Col. Arnold Lewis married Ann Crandall. He died in 1825 and his wife in 1831; both were buried in the Evergreen cemetery, situated on the above mentioned land, said cemetery having been given by Eseck Lewis, after he came into possession of the land.

To Arnold and Ann Crandall Lewis were born the following children, ———, born Sept. 24, 1766; Lydia, born Feb. 28, 1769; Nicholas, born Mar. 2, 1773; Esther, born May 3, 1775; Sabrianna, born ———; Eseck, born Sept. 14, 1783; Saloma, born Apr. 8, 1786.

The son Nicholas married and had two children. Rodea and Abel Potter Lewis. Abel Potter Lewis was born June 20, 1800; married Mary Stoddard June 4, 1820; she died June 3, 1861, when he again married July 6, 1863, Ann Dodge. By the first marriage occurred the births of fifteen children, all of whom grew to maturity except two, who died in infancy. They were as follows: Nicholas P. Lewis, born Feb. 1, 1822; John Stephen, born Nov. 15, 1823; he married Martha Ford, with whom he lived for 55 years. On Jan. 14, 1897, they celebrated their 50th anniversary and both died at the home of their daughter, Mrs. C. C. Mason of Antwerp, in the year 1902; Rodea B. (Mrs. L. Muzzey of Great Bend) born May 2, 1825; Cornelia E. (Mrs. Benj. V. Hinds) born Oct 13, 1826; Cynthia A. (Mrs. Wm. Grems) born June 10, 1828; Matilda W. (Mrs. H. S. Taylor) born Dec. 17, 1829; Wm. I. Lewis, born June 5, 1831, living at Black River, N.Y.; Cordelia M., born Oct. 5, 1833, married E. J. Pennock and resides at Great Bend. On Nov. 10, 1902, they celebrated the 50th anniversary of their marriage. Mary

Ann, born May 22, 1835, married Chas. Cross Apr. 30, 1854. They celebrated their 50th anniversary Apr. 30, 1904, thus making three in one family who lived to acknowledge the 50th year of their marriage, not an occasional occurrence. Mr. and Mrs. Cross reside at Philadelphia, N.Y.; Prudence M. (Mrs. Robt. H. Olley) born June 29, 1838; Emily A., born Dec 21, 1840; Henry N. Lewis, born July 2, 1843; Lucy C. (Mrs. G. C. Ward) born May 3, 1846. Mrs. Ward resides in Chetopa, Kansas.

Eseck Lewis married Hannah Springer. He died Apr. 14, 1879; she died Oct. 1, 1857. To them eleven children were born, Benajah A. Lewis born June 11, 1804; Rockey L. (Mrs. W. P. Babcock) born Sept. 19, 1807; Esther M., born Mar. 11, 1810, died at the age of 4 yrs.; John N. Lewis, born May 30, 1812, died Oct. 26, 1904, at the advanced age of 92 years; Nehemiah B., born May 19, 1815; Sabra Ann (Mrs. Dirgy Townsend) born Oct. 20, 1817; Richard F., born Mar. 29, 1820; Sarah A. (Mrs. C. E. Parker) born Apr. 20, 1822; Demarquis L., born June 23, 1824; Mary J. (Mrs. Joel Odell) born Feb. 19, 1829. Eseck Lewis lived to the age of 95 years. Saloma Lewis married Obediah Ackerman Jan. 17, 1803. As a result of this union seven children were born. Lydia Ackerman, born May 3, 1805; Lewis, born Mar. 30, 1807; Salinda, born Oct. 13, 1809; Lyza Ann, born July 9, 1815; Seymour, born Sept. 15, 1814; Emily M., born July 19, 1823; Arnold I., born July 29, 1828. Mrs. Salinda Fuller, whose death occurred March 23, 1903, at the home of Mr. Ira Lewis of Black River, was the last of the children of Obediah and Salinda Lewis Ackerman.

Of the remaining children of Col. Arnold Lewis there are no records, though possibly some of the many Lewises scattered through the country may be descendants of said Arnold Lewis. If such should prove to be the case, I would consider it a great favor to correspond with them as I am an enthusiastic genealogist and much interested in the work. Should any one interested in the above desire more information in this line, I would be glad to correspond with them.

Flower Memorial Library is in line to receive \$200,000 from the estate of a patron who died in August, said Library director Kenneth G. Hodosy Jr.

At first it would appear the bequest could help solve some of the major problems facing the library, such as a leaky roof and a failing heating system, but Mr. Hodosy said that might not be the case.

The money was left specifically for the genealogy department of the library, said Mr. Hodosy.

The money was left by Anton P. Schobel, formerly of 246 Haley St., who died Aug 26 in Samaritan Medical Center at age 86. He had no known survivors.

Mr. Schobel was a tool room inspection clerk at New York Air Brake Co. from 1942 to 1973. He was born in Watertown, son of Joseph Albert and Helene Fairand Schobel, and graduated from Watertown High School.

A sister, Antoinette P. Davies, died Aug 27, 1981.

Mr. Hodosy said he did not know Mr. Schobel, but some of the patrons of the genealogy room knew of him.

"He used to genealogy room on a regular basis, I'm told," said Mr. Hodosy. Mr. Schobel donated some records of his French ancestors to the department in 1992.


"It's certainly a valuable contribution that we've greatly appreciate," said Mr. Hodosy. However, he said, some questions need to be asked on the flexibility of the bequest. "We'll have to ask the courts some questions on how the money can be spent," said Mr. Hodosy. "There are some very pressing needs around here."

The genealogy department does not have any employees and it does not have a separate budget. Mr. Hodosy said the department is staffed by volunteers and very little is spent each year on supplies.

Key Trust is executor of Mr. Schobel's will, said Mr. Hodosy. The bequest will be discussed when the library board meets Tuesday afternoon.

The library is facing another season of snow, ice and water with a leaky roof.

MYSTERY REVEALED

Woman's Death Clears Up Dark Page of Tragedy

SEAL REMOVED BY DEATH

The Hermit of Maple Island in the River St.Lawrence in the Early '60s Believed to be J. A. Payne, Conspirator, Connected with Lincoln's Assassination. — Now First identified Through Death of Girl Confidant

[The Carthage Republican]
In last Sunday's Syracuse Herald appears the following well written story from the pen of F. W. Dove, well known in Antwerp. A portion of the tale appears in Haddock's "Picturesque St. Lawrence." How authentic the entire story is we leave

the reader to judge.

THE MYSTERY OF MAPLE ISLE
For two score years from the rocky crest of Maple island in the St. Lawrence, has the blood of a mysterious murder cried from the ground for vengeance, while the victim's identity and the object of his ghastly removal have remained matters of conjecture to inhabitants of the Thousand Island regions. The death a few weeks ago of the murdered man's only confidant has removed the seal of silence from the lips of the one to whom that story had been related and the secret of the victim's identity thus revealed furnishes a key to the mystery of his bloody taking - off and adds a page to one of history's most tragic chapters.

DEATH CLEARS GREAT SECRETS.
A few weeks ago in Bagot Street,
Kingston, died the widow of an old lake sailor. Her maiden name was Jennie Hickey and during the summer of 1865 she was employed as a domestic in the family of Peter Rusho, a farmer living on Grindstone Island, one of the largest of whose bride she later that summer became. After the death of her husband, a few years later, she for the first time related to her daughter a romantic episode of her summer's sojourn on Grindstone Island, away back in the '60, and told the tragic ending if her youthful romance, with which she had never vexed her somewhat jealous husband.

The hero of the romance was the victim of the mysterious tragedy of Maple Island, which horrified the residence of the Thousand Island region late in the summer of 1865. The story of the tragedy of Maple Island, and of the victim's dra-matic career, as discovered by the Kingston woman's revelations follows: GENTEEL YOUNG SOUTHERNER

In the early summer of 65 while the great Civil war was scarcely yet ended and the country was still shuddering with the horror of Lincoln's assassination, a genteel young stranger of unmistakable Southern extraction appeared at the little river hamlet of Fishers' Landing a few miles below Clayton. After a few days

spent in excursions among the islands he purchased a skiff and rowed away. The little tavern kept no register and no one inquired the swarthy man's name. Before leaving Fishers Landing he had purchased a hammer, nails, an ax and a few gro-ceries. Those he took in the skiff, together with his gun, fishing tackle and the heavy portmanteau he brought from the steamer that landed him there.

HERMIT HOME ON ISLAND

Soon after the young Southerner disap-peared from Fishers Landing, the few boatman who visited Maple Island, a lofty wooded islet of a few acres in extent, lying some three miles off Clayton and near the foot of Grindstone Island, found that isle had an inhabitant, a swarthy young hermit who had built for himself, from the planks and beams of a ruined fisher hut that had stood up on the shore, a cabin, hidden from the view of passing skiffs behind a dense thicket and with a ledge of rocks for a shelter on the landward side. The scanty furniture of his hut the young hermit as he came to be called by the few who knew of his existence there, purchased from Clay-ton during his few trips to that village, or from the farmers of Grindstone Island his supplies of eggs, butter, vegetables and milk.

During his infrequent visits to Clayton he had bought a large number of books and musical instruments and at eventide, above the rippling of the waves could be heard by the passing boatman the mellow tones of the flute or the sweet notes of the viol, as the hermit beguiled his hours of

loneliness

MADE FRIEND OF DAIRYMAID

The disclosure made to the Kingston women by her mother, formerly Jennie Hickey, indicate that the handsome young hermit of Maple Island beguiled the tedium of his sojourn there by at romantic acquaintance with Peter Rusho's pretty dairy maid, who sold to him the butter and eggs for which from time to time he visited the farm on Grindstone Island

Many a Sunday afternoon the girl stole away to a trusting place in a grove near the farmhouse, from whence she and the young Southerner would seek his skiff, moored nearby, and spend the golden summer hours floating among the beauti-ful isles that here divide the river into a

maze of waterways GIRL GOT STRANGER'S STORY

On one of these trips the stranger yielded to the girl's importunities and conducted her to his home on Maples Island. On this occasion he unbent somewhat from his usual reserve regarding his antecedents, and told the girl that he fought under Stonewall Jackson and Lee.

Among his books was a little volume of Confederate war songs including the "Bonnie Blue Flag," "Maryland" and a poem lamenting the "Death of Jackson," of which he told her he was the author. The name printed below the poem was "
John A. Payne." which he admitted was
his own name but charged her to whisper it to no one, as it might cost him his life if his identity became known.

TELLTALE PICTURE On the same occasion a thunderstorm

having kept them imprisoned in the cabin until almost nightfall, the young South-erner took from a portfolio a small card photograph of himself, together with one representing John Wilkes Booth, in one of the tragic poses in which the actor was so frequently pictured.
"This," he said, pointing to the picture of Booth, "was my dearest friend."

The picture of himself he presented to the girl proposing to destroy the other, as he told his companion that it had been an unwise thing for him to keep the little card so long in his possession. The girl beg him to allow her to keep both pictures, and although he refused, he apparently forgot the matter for the time and she retained that of Booth as well as of her companion.

STORY OF STRANGER PARTY.

During the early days of September

During the early days of September, 1865, a party of half a dozen men of unmistakable southern origin arrived at Fishers Landing, making inquires regarding a man whose description tallied with that of the young stranger who had visited the place the previous spring. Learning that he had purchased a boat and gone up the river, the strangers bought a large skiff and departed in the same direction. They told the landlord that they had been employed by the man for whom they were searching near Montreal, that he had drawn the money for their pay and then run away

NIGHT OF STORM AND MURDER
The party went from Fishers Landing to Clayton, and after stopping there a day or two disappeared. The night following their disappearance from the village a heavy thunder storm prevailed along the river. Consequently, when about midnight a bright glare lighted up the rocky crest of Maple Island, it was though that the hermit's cabin had perhaps been struck by lightning. As the waves were rolling high, no one ventured to cross.

On the morning following the storm a party of fisherman landed on Maple island and proceeded to the little opening among the evergreens where the cabin had stood. They found a heap of ashes alone to mark the site of the hut. The ground around the ruins of the cabin was trampled by the prints of many feet and spatters of blood were found upon the leaves and the surrounding bushes.

THREE BLOODY CROSSES

Continued from page 14 in his throat had nearly decapitated him, while a dagger had been driven to the hilt in his breast and still remained transfixed in his heart.

Upon the ghastly breast of the corpse a dagger blade had slashed three red crosses, shaped like the letter X, the three forming a triangle, two outlining the base and one the apex, the secret symbol of the Knights of the Golden Circle or Knights of the Blue Gauntlet during the Rebellion and of the Ku Klux during the days of Re-construction. To the discoverers of the construction. To the discoverers of the body and to those who afterwards investigated the crime, these crosses seemed to have had no particular significance.

The murdered man was known to have had in his possession at least on canvas sack of gold pieces, from which he had taken money to pay the fishermen and other folk, and this was thought to have been a sufficient incentive for the murder. The coroner's verdict was that he was robbed and murdered by unknown parties, the body of the stranger was given a de-cent burial, and the tragedy of Maple Is-land was forgotten by all save the few who knew the mysterious stranger.

MYSTERY OF PAYNE BECOMES CLEAR

What became of John A. Payne, one of the Lincoln conspirators had always been a mystery, which the revelation made by the Kingston woman now solves.

Payne was one of seven brothers, mountain feudists from Eastern Kentucky, who headed a bushwhacking gang that a detachment of United States cavalry hunted down. Three of the brothers fled to South America and became soldiers of fortune there. Four escaped to Canada, where the headquarters of the Knights of the Golden Circle were, of whom two were captured in the St. Albans raid and sent to the Dry Tortugas. One of the remaining two was Lewis Payne, who was executed under the name of Lewis Payne Powell after having attempted to murder Secretary Seward on the night of Lincoln's assassination

PAYNE AND SURRATT FLED John A. Payne, the other brother it was shown at the time of the investigation into the conspiracy, fled back to Canada, in company with John H. Surratt. Surratt's part in the conspiracy it was claimed was to proceed to Toronto, and if the conspirators were successful, to their claim the reward of gold which the Knights of the Golden Circle then known as the Knights of the Blue Gauntlet, has deposited there with a trusty agent, to be paid over if "Old Abe" as the members of the traitorous league called the President, was removed.

Surratt, whose mother was under sentence of death, was too badly frightened to go to Toronto for the gold, but after being concealed at Three Rivers P.Q. by Father Boucher, he fled to Italy, joined the Papal Zouaves, and after being denounced by a comrade named Massie, was extradited, tried, acquitted and now lives in Baltimore.

TRACED BY OFFICERS Secret service officers traced John A.

Payne from St. Albans to Rideau lakes where he was discovered to have been in May, 1865. He was then penniless. A week later a man answering Payne's description appeared, jauntily clad and well provided with gold, at Gananoque. He disappeared and shortly thereafter a stranger answering the same description, and who later located on Maple island where he met his doom, appeared at Fishers landing. That the stranger was John A. Payne is shown by the Kingston woman's story

The natural inference is that Payne went to Toronto after leaving Rideau lakes, drew the gold offered as a reward by some fraud, and then hid himself away from both the secret service officers and his defrauded brethren, the Knights of the Golden Circle or Blue Gauntlet Knights, on Maple Island. Here he was evidently hunted down by his incensed brethren, the party of men who appeared at Fishers Landing and Clayton just before the murder, and who meted out to him the fate which that oath-bound league, the Knights of the Blue Gauntlet, visited upon those who betraved them.

Thus would be accounted for the three livid crosses slashed upon the breast of the murdered refugee, and the mystery of Maple Island would be solved.






