Jefferson County is now up and running on the USGenWeb Project. The address is <http://bl-12.rootsweb.com/~nyjeffer>. The USGenWeb Project began in Kentucky in March and April 1996 with a group of genealogist who wanted a single entry point for all counties in Kentucky where collected data bases could be stored. Now it is a world wide network of genealogy information. The United States is organized first by state, with most of the states now participating, and then by county. After being hosted for a while by society member Robin Holden in Texas (click on "Upstate New York Genealogical Research Page" on the Jefferson County Page to see his beautiful "Jeffco" page). Mr. Holden decided he didn't have the time for it. Society member Nan Dixon volunteered to take Jefferson County GenWeb page over with tech support from husband Bill. As of the last week in November, with plenty of Help from the state coordinator, they felt they finally began to get the hang of it.

The purpose of the USGenWeb Project is almost identical with that of the society: to gather and disseminate genealogical information from each county, and in our case, Jefferson County. It is a volunteer organization, from the national coordinator, John Rigdon, to the state coordinators, in our case Kim Myers, to the county coordinators. The function of the GenWeb is not to answer specific queries, but to present each county's resources in such a way that the inquiring genealogist can help himself. A query section allows queries to be directed to one or several counties. Queries are posted for all to see.

Do visit Onondaga County's page, chosen a national county of the week, to see what can be done with dedication, talent, and time. Society member Jerry Reed hosts tow counties, Lewis and Otsego, with which he has ties. Nan feels that Jefferson County is very much the Society's page, and several members are helping it. Jon Holcombe will be providing scanning capability for pictures, Julie Gosier and Ed Lee are providing information, Ellen Bartlett, Maurice Herron, Larry Corbett, Faith Lustik and Jean-Michel Simoneau are providing look ups.

The page is just beginning. Please email, or snail mail, or give ideas to Nan Dixon at our next meeting.

John Rigdon, national coordinator of the USGen Web Project, reports that the US News & World Report is planning on featuring the USGenWeb Project for an article to appear approximately Jan 1st. Jefferson County GenWeb page is a part of the project.

Meeting called to order at 6:35 by president Helen McDonald at the Town of Watertown Municipal Building with 12 members and guests present. President thanked members for her election. minutes of previous meeting read and approved, with the note that not all 320 members have paid dues

It was again noted that minutes are to be published in the "Informer".

The treasurer reported \$440. taken in the last month; a balance of \$1432.14.

The executive officers met to set up the advisory council consisting of six to twelve members, including the immediate past officers. The council now includes John and Ellen Bartlett, Faye Rice, Eleanor Ducatt, Larry Corbett, Jon Holcombe, Sharon Patchett, Beverly Galaydick, Ralph Gebo, Clancy Hopkins, Pauline Zach. From this group the president will choose people to work on specific committees as listed in the constitution.

Clancy Hopkins and Ralph Gebo have consented to co-chair the program committee. Publicity is yet to be announced. Larry Corbett will chair Research Materials committee. Preservation Committee will be chaired by Eleanor Ducatt. Ellen and John Bartlett are the Newsletter Committee.

Larry Corbett reported on the Pedigree Sheet committee. Alice Corbett has sorted out the duplicates and has them in order. The committee is now looking for a good indexing facility.

Azilda Baker has been copying the 1850 Jefferson County census,

which Helen McDonald has been putting on computer. The president expressed her thanks to Dilly Baker for doing a great job of copying.

Eleanor Ducatt asked for more guidance on just what the Gazetteer committee was supposed to accomplish. Julie Gosier suggested expanding information already available, such as the pedigrees, which is what people usually look for. Bill Dixon stated that we have a valuable resource in the memories of the present members of the society who can contribute anecdotes of Jefferson County citizens who were never mentioned in the published histories, gathering from our 300 members anecdotal history that might lapse from the world. Larry Corbett mentioned many resources now available which will be available for the foreseeable future, such as telephone directories, census material, tax files, pedigrees, family group sheets.

Julie reminded us that the Gazetteer information is similar to what is found in a modern newspaper obituary. After further discussion, Eleanor Ducatt agreed to keep the committee, which will decide what they want to do.

The over 1000 surnames given Nan Dixon are now on 3X5 cards, alphabetized by surname, and will be brought to each meeting so that members can look through them. Connection is made through membership lists, which can be obtained from the society.

The IRS forms for the society have been returned for further information. Maurice Herron and Sue Grant will send it back, corrected, tomorrow.

The Jefferson County Genealogy homepage will not be the soci-

ety's homepage, since the New York State coordinator wants a single person to be responsible. However, Nan Dixon begs for help from anybody for things to be put on the homepage.

Clancy Hopkins has submitted the Society's name to the "Genealogical Helper".

The committee to collect materials and sources for every one of the 22 towns of Jefferson County has not finished its job. It will continue.

Suggested that a computer user group be formed so as not to take up time from other genealogy.

Clancy mentioned the Genealogy series to be aired on Public TV. He also requested volunteers for answering phones for their fund raising.

Dillenback room will hold 50+ people. Clancy has dates locked in for the year except October. Parking, seating, heating, assurance of firm dates, length of time we can spend were all discussed. Eleanor Ducatt moved and Bill Dixon seconded that we hold meetings at the library. Carried.

Holding January and February meetings was discussed. Those members who wish may hold meetings then to work on genealogy, but we will have no formal program.

Clancy read one of Erma Bombeck's columns on step families.

Clancy resigned his election as corresponding secretary. The president will announce nomination next meeting.

Meeting Adjourned.

Chris Nichols of IMC.Net presented a program on computer use, demonstrating the use of a genealogy program, and how to surf the net for genealogy.

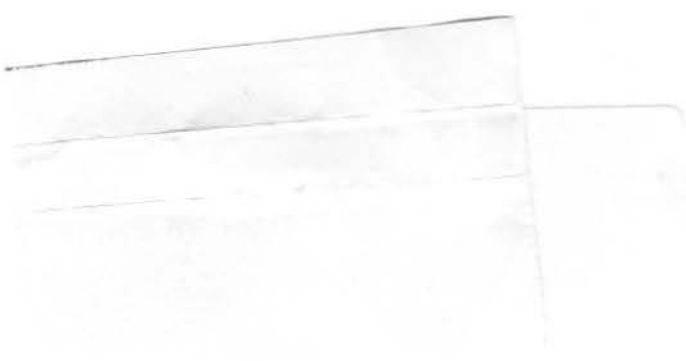

The clock ticked loudly on the dresser in the large bedroom over the kitchen, the only sound I could hear. In a corner of the room was my little brown bed. It was empty for I was in the middle of my mother's large bed covered with a pink and grey outing blanket and two heavy patchwork quilts. I was so warm that I felt I couldn't stay in that bed a minute longer but Mama had said I had to stay in bed until the Dr. came.

Soon I heard the rattle of dishes in the kitchen below. Then Papa stomping the snow from his feet in the shed and I knew he was bringing in the pails of milk from the Jersey cows and I wanted to be downstairs with the rest of the family. But I was sick. My head ached and my throat was sore and I supposed I'd better mind what Mama had said.

I had awakened in the night with a very sick stomach and called Mama. 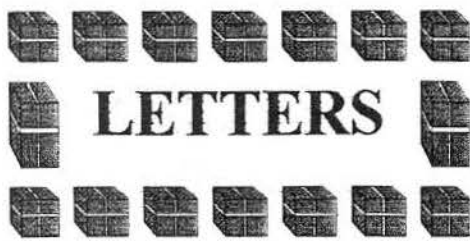
Later I heard the children leave for school and Mama called after them, "Now be good and if it storms Papa will be after you when school is out at four o'clock."

AN OLD-FASHIONED ROMANCE

Anton Salm was his name, a romantic figure about whom Jane Austin might have fashioned a classic novel, but this here was of the flesh and blood type, and, as it turns out, one of the more interesting twigs of my family tree.

The original emigrant ancestor of mine to this country was Lawrence Constance who came about 1835 to Cape Vincent in Northern New York at age 46. Some of his nine children were married in Germany before emigrating. There may be some interesting tales here also, but I'll leave that for another time. Of his nine children, five settled in the Cape Vincent area and four continued west to the state of Wisconsin. In 1982 a cousin of mine published the Constance Book, which concerned itself with the descendants of the five local off-spring of Lawrence. In 1994 my cousins and I updated the 1982 version and at this time discussed the seemingly impossible task of locating the descendants of the Wisconsin relatives.

My ninety-two year old aunt recalled that a "good-looking young man" relative from Wisconsin had visited my Grandfather when she was a young lady and that over the course of the visit he became "sweet on" her. But she could not remember the name of the Wisconsin town from which he came, it having been 65 years ago. She remembered that he also made a second trip to Cape Vincent, but by that time she married the man to whom she has been married these last 65 years.

I knew that this was a needle-in-a-haystack type of challenge, the sort that I tend to put aside in favor of the dozens of more approachable tasks that are always on the back burner. But then came the AH HA! In an old scrap book of another relative I discovered a small article that said a Constance Family reunion had been held to honor Anton Salm of Cleveland, Wisconsin. Would the Constances had gathered for anyone except a relative. No.

Now I had a town to go with the state of Wisconsin. Next Move: write to Anton in Cleveland. Of course he would be in his 90's, but the one he was "sweet on" was still living.

So, I took a chance, I wrote to Anton. But after two weeks there was no answer, what to do? This time I wrote to the postmaster of the town and enclosed a copy of the first letter. I asked the postmaster to deliver the enclosed to anyone of the last name in Cleveland who was interested in genealogy. This time I hit the jack-pot. The lady who answered this query is a family history nut and was delighted that there were family members searching them out. As a result, Carol Salm and her husband Eugene, Anton's nephew, attended the Constance Family reunion in August and my husband and I returned the visit a few weeks later when we met several family members.

But about Anton, the romantic? Anton's oldest niece told me that, indeed, he was "sweet on" my aunt and had, in fact, returned to Cleveland from that first trip east and built a house on a parcel of land on the family farm. He intended to bring home a bride from his second trip to Cape Vincent. But, alas, he had not been outspoken enough in regard to his feeling for the young lady, and found that she had married in his absence. Anton did finally marry at the age of 50, moved to California, and lived to the age of 99, dying about 6 months before my first letter.

But for Anton making the original trips in 1931 and 1933 to visit family members, and becoming romantically involved, I might not have found this branch of the family tree, at least not for a very long time.

When Eugene Salm, Anton's nephew, came to Cape Vincent in August and attended the Constance Family Reunion, he was retracing the route that his uncle had made 65 years before and so reestablished the family circle.

Hopefully the next Constance Book will be greatly augmented by the addition of our Wisconsin Kin.

We are family: or at least We were, some 50 generations ago

"Each of us has, of course, 2 parents, 4 grandparents, 8 great-grandparents, 16 great-great grandfather, 32 great-great-great grandparents, and so on.

If you trace your family tree back just 30 generations, and assume 25 years for a generation, your ancestry over this 750 years encompasses first 2 people, then 4, 8, 16, 32, 64, 128, 256, 512, 1024, 2048 — finally, 1,073,741,824 people.

But 750 years ago, it was the 13th century and there were fewer than a billion people in the world. Which means that more recently than a scant 30 generations ago, your mother's and father's genes were merged with ancestors common to both.

Follow your lineage back say, 50 generations and the number of common parental ancestors grows enormous. In fact, according to Guy Murchie ("The Seven Mysteries of Life") the entire human species can be encompassed "within the scope of fiftieth cousinhood."

If this estimate is correct, it would mean, Murchie says, that your ancestors include not only some whites, some blacks, some Asians and some Arabs but ALL of those and "every other possible ancestor who lived on Earth around A.D. 700."

"It is virtually certain, therefore, that you are a direct descendant of Muhammad and every fertile predecessor of his, including Krishna, Confucius, Abraham, Buddha, Caesar, Ishmael and Judas Iscariot."

Ancestor Hunting in Jefferson County

The primary institution in Jefferson County for genealogical information is the Flower Memorial Library in Watertown. The collection has recently been tremendously expanded with the use of a large legacy. Located on Washington Street, Watertown, NY 13601, you MUST include SASE to receive a reply. It maintains a large file of local names, census microfilm, including those of St. Lawrence, Lewis and Oswego counties as well as Jefferson, indexes, many new references books, genealogies and notebooks. This is, of course, only an indication of its holding.

Next in importance come two very different volunteer institutions: Historical Society of South Jefferson, located in Adams, New York, and Lyme Heritage Center in Chaumont. South Jeff, as it is called, is building a computer data base index of several genealogical sources. Its information covers the southern six towns of Jefferson County: Adams, Ellisburg, Henderson, Lorraine, Rodman and Worth. Lyme Heritage, on the other hand, is dedicated to collecting and disseminating genealogy and family history for the four townships of Brownville, Cape Vincent, Clayton, and of course Lyme. Operating almost exclusively as a Cape Vincent source is the Cape Vincent Historical museum, Cape Vincent, NY. They have a large collection of scrapbooks, all indexed for easy access, and, like the others, copying capability on premises.

All of these institutions are strictly voluntary, and depend on donations for their existence. SASE is a courtesy, and a small donation is a necessity if you want to see them open next year. Always write or call ahead for hours. Volunteer organizations are just that. If a volunteer fails to show up, the building won't be open. For all of the above, service is generous and helpful. These people really want to promote family and local history.

Town historians in New York State are prohibited by law from "doing" genealogy for people. They can, however, supply historical material, which is often helpful to the family historian. While historians receive a small stipend to cover of operating, bear in mind that they, too, are largely volunteers, donating their time.

Many village libraries maintain small genealogy files, and nearly all have county histories and general local historical information

PROBLEM SOLVED

We had searched for over 15 years for the death of **Sophia (Greenley) Glass** wife of **Lorenzo Glass** and daughter of **Timothy Greenley**. While in Flower Memorial Library Genealogical Department we found that they had indexed some estate papers (some on bits of paper). Within these were many belonging to **Timothy Greenley**. Included was a receipt for him buying his own coffin and a little later one for his daughter **Sophia**. He dies 19 Feb 1852. **Timothy** must have realized that **Sophia** was dying as his will leaves part of his estate to children of **Sophia Glass** wife of late **Lorenzo Glass**. The trustee of his estate must have been instructed to pay **Dr. W. Christie** for professional attendance and medicine from Sept. 2 to Nov 5, 1852. There were a total of 15 visits for \$28.75. Payment was made in full on 8 Nov 1852 in Rodman. We have interpreted this as proof of her death on 05 Nov 1852. We suspect that she is buried in cemetery near Talcott Stand on Falls Road between Watertown Center and Adams Center. **James Glass** father of **Lorenzo** has a stone with died 18 Dec 1834 age 56 years. Next to him is **A.G. Glass** died 30 Jun 1851 age 37 years. We believe this is **L.G. Glass**. We would like proof that **Parthena (Woodward) Glass**, wife of **James** and **Sophia** are buried next to husbands. We also need proof of **Sophia's** birth. It is supposedly in 1813. **Timothy Greenley's** first wife **Ruth Kellogg** dies 27 Mar 1813 during an influenza epidemic. This is date given in cemetery records at Flower Library. In our observation of the stone we think the 1813 could be 1818. According to land records he remarries a **Polly** (—) before 1820.

BOOK REVIEW

ANDREW NELLIS

Several genealogies have appeared in recent years dealing with the descendants of the Palatine immigration of 1710. One of the more attractive books is R. Robert Mutrie's Andrew Nellis: a New Canadian, 1798. While the foreword estimates that this book covers only about one or two percent of the progeny of the first immigrants, it does so with a completeness not often found. Nearly every page has photos or maps or charts.

Although the genealogical numbers only reach 523, the book probably mentions well over 2500 names. Each family group has a factual background sketch, and modern publishing methods allow copies of Bible records showing the original handwriting, newspaper obituaries photocopied intact, and clear maps of the townships discussed. Spaces for family notes to continue the saga follow each chapter.

While acknowledgments mentioning Hank Jones, Donald P. Fox, Helen Nellis and Doris Dockstater Rooney do not guarantee accuracy, they certainly point to that end. Familiar Palatine names found in the index include Bader, Dockstader, Dygert, Ecker, Fox, Klock, Saltsman, Wagner, and naturally, pages of Nellis in all its spellings.

This is an attractively presented history of the Nellis family in Canada, with appendices covering the Palatine movement; Willem Nollles, the immigrant ancestor; his son Andreas; the Fox ancestry; the Dockstader ancestry; the Wagner ancestry and others.

- Trowbridge** At the Crouner House in Watertown, N.Y., Dr. Amasa Trowbridge d. Apr. 10, 1859 aged 80 yrs. (Dr. Trowbridge was for a long time a distinguished physician in Watertown. He was born in Pomfret, Conn. May 30, 1779 and was married at Lanesboro, Mass. Sept. 16, 1805 to Glorianna Havens Billings, dau. of Andrew & Glorianna Billings. Mrs. Trowbridge died in Watertown June 27, 1849. Dr. Trowbridge was appointed surgeon in the War of 1812.
- Mather** In Adams June 6, 1859, Mr. Williams Mather in the 70th year of his age.
- Hubbard** In Champion, June 12, 1859, Noadiah Hubbard aged 95 years, (Noadiah Hubbard was born in Middletown, Conn. Oct. 11, 1765. He is called "The Pioneer" of Jefferson County. Mr. Hubbard in 1793 constructed the canal locks in Little Falls, NY. A history of Noadiah Hubbard is found in Evert's History of Jefferson County.

The December meeting of the Jefferson County Genealogy Society was called to order at 6:35 by President **Helen McDonald** at the Town of Watertown Municipal Building with 28 members and guests present. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and accepted. Treasurer reported last month's balance: \$1,432.14, expenditures of \$81.58 in mailing the newsletter, leaving a balance of \$1,350.56.

Pauline Zach will head the Publicity Committee.

Boni Schafer is now corresponding secretary.

The Watertown Daily Times still erroneously places our meeting at the Carriage House.

Boni Schafer reported on the upcoming PTV series on genealogy: 10 episodes will air beginning 19 January at 5 PM. A viewers' guide will accompany the series. It will also be available on video cassette. **Clancy Hopkins** will contact the television station on our behalf. **Boni** also mentioned an internet discussion group which will have an online genealogy course beginning 13 Jan which can be reached through RootsL under Pennsylvania Dutch.

US News and World Report will soon publish an interview with **John Rigdon**, US Coordinator of the USGenWeb Project, in conjunction with the PTV Television series on Genealogy.

Sylvia Schwandner, one of our members, died this past week.

Helen McDonald reminds us that her telephone number is correct in the informer. A wrong number is listed in the membership list.

John Bartlett reported the January newsletter is finished and is ready to be processed for mailing. Actual paid membership is 244. He suggested schedules and programs be posted on the Jefferson County GenWeb page.

Clancy asked for volunteers for the March PTV fund drive. He also asked for volunteers to help at the Flower Memorial Library, so that the genealogy room might be open oftener.

John Burtch, town historian for Le Ray, is looking for information on Mr. Evans who founded Evans Mills.

Progress on copying the 1850 Census: Pamelia and Philadelphia are done. **Alice Corbett** is working on Watertown, **Shirley Wagner** is working on Rutland, and **Boni Shafer** is doing Orleans. Each town needs to be checked against the original after it is printed. Lyme is to be checked by volunteers from Lyme Heritage Society. Lorraine and Rodman were taken by **Maurice Herron**. **Nan Dixon** took Alexandria, leaving Brownville, Cape Vincent, and Clayton to be checked. Names are to be left exactly as the census read, using a ? for undecipherable words.

Pedigree Chart Committee: **Larry Corbett** reports progress on sorting and classifying the charts. Search still continuing for an alphabetizing system. Computer Committee: Will report next time.

Web page is up and running. Queries are now posted. Jefferson County and surrounding counties only are considered.

We're working on pictures: **Jon Holcombe** is supplying graphics. Several people volunteered to answer specific queries for the page.

Clancy suggested that since the next two meetings are open, we discuss computer topics then.

Lyme Heritage Center will bring any extra clippings left over from their scrapbooks in to Society meetings from now on for anyone to take.

Clancy Hopkins reported that the library is available for our meetings for entire 1997. We should start promptly at 6:30 in order to finish promptly.

Not for profit status is being worked on.

Second **Ernest Cook** book is at the printers.

Azilda Baker is looking for any stories about the early Mormons in Jefferson county. Please send her any you have for her collection.

Program was a discussion of genealogical materials available at the office of the clerk of the City of Watertown. **Donna Dutton** spoke. A charge of \$11., not refundable, is made for each record extracted, but along with the record, the city clerk's office also includes material from other sources: city directories, Watertown Times Office among others. Much of the material is on microfilm, and the office contains a microfilm reader/printer. Patrons wishing to do research in the office are requested to call ahead and make an appointment. To request information by mail, the address is City Clerk's Office; 245 Washington St. Watertown NY 13601.

Marriage records only go back to 1883, when the state required them to be kept. She explained that early birth, death, and marriage records were neglected because some doctors and ministers, as reporting agents, refused to fill out the necessary forms. These are confidential records, and the public may not go through them. They will do genealogy searches when their forms are filled out. The city historian, Emerson Laughland, has his office in the same building. The clerk can get access to that office if the historian isn't in. City directories, news clippings, correspondence, county histories, and some family histories.

A partial list of materials available includes minute books of city officials, communications, school board records (not pupils), village Board Common Council and City Council Minutes; Board of Health Minutes; Board of Charities Minutes; Public Safety Board Minutes 1885-1919; Public Works/Waterworks 1853-1919.

Azilda Baker called for volunteers to help at the Family History Center, in view of an expected flood of family historians after the upcoming PBS program starts. Hours are Mondays and Thursdays, 10-2, and Wednesday evenings, 6:30 - 8:30. Call ahead if one needs the computer. Numbers are 788-4151 or **Ms Baker** at 788-5422.

Next two meetings will be open.

Clancy Hopkins called for suggestions for future meetings: one is French Canadian research. He has **Father O'Daugherty** lined up, as well as someone from Montgomery County speaking on unusual places to search.

Meeting adjourned.

JANUARY MEETING

The January meeting of the Jefferson County Genealogy

Society was called to order at 6:40 by Vicepresident **Phyllis Putnam** at the Dillenback Room of Flower Memorial Library with 27 members and guests present. At least four new people attended. As this was an informal meeting with no program, no business was transacted.

The vicepresident asked each of the newcomers for the names they were working on.

Sue Grant brought a journal of some Jefferson County institution (possibly the County Farm) made up of names, with dates admitted, dates discharged, dates died, and some births.

Boni Shafer, who is now volunteering a day a week at the society's archives, reported on her activities with the society's holdings at Brookside. She is answering correspondence, and setting up a filing system. The society has 28 new members since last meeting.

The second volume of **Ernest Cook's** Watertown Daily Times columns is now ready and on sale at \$10. These columns appeared roughly from 1929 to 1935. Some of the topics covered are Theresa Area Quakers; Dr. Santway, Theresa Physician; Theresa Area Pioneers; Robert Sixberry; French Pioneers in the North Country; Edus Emigration; Old Champion; and Scotch Pioneers. **Phyllis Putnam**, who prepared it for printing, has added a 900 item index. The publication is a joint effort of the Lyme Heritage Center and the Jefferson County Genealogical Society. Checks can be made out to either entity.

Work on the 1850 census is progressing. Most of the towns have been copied from the original, and now many are being compared against the original to correct any mistakes or typos.

An email address sheet was passed, and those members with email addresses recorded them. The treasurers' name is now the contact person for the society on the Jefferson County GenWeb page: **Maurice L. Herron**, the direct email contact is: jcnys@imcnet.net

Boni Shafer reported on genealogy on the internet. She recommends a course titled Genealogy for Newbies.

Maurice Herron discussed the Brookside Cemetery Repository. He explained that he and **Ed Lee** are involved in indexing the "Jefferson County Journal" for births, deaths, and marriages at the Historical Association of South Jefferson, in Adams, NY. The Jefferson County Journal is a weekly newspaper that has been published continuously since about 1855 to the present. So far, they have accumulated over 150,000 names in one computer generated file. The material is kept on two or more computers for secure back up protection. In addition to the Genealogy index of the Jefferson County Journal's there are some 32,000 or 33,000 names from cemetery lists, including the Six Town in the southern Jefferson County area as well as the recorded burials in Brookside itself. Eventually, most of the same information will be on a computer in the Historical Association of South Jefferson in Adams for the visiting public to access. **Ed Lee** reminded everybody that the project was inclusive, not exclusive, and if duplications were made, it was preferable to having some needed information left out. They welcome corrections and additions. In addition to the material being recorded on their computers, they have also accumulated family history files that have been donated since about 1975, all of which need to be organized and properly filed. These will also

be added to the computerized records at some point in the future. **Maurice** explained that we (the JCGS) are a clearinghouse for information, not a research facility. The computerized index is to help find information. In his personal file, he has records from a local monument company dating from 1901 to 1973, as well as individual burial records. He believes Brookside Cemetery contains 4000 - 6000 burials without recorded records that have no stone marking their graves previous to the period of required record keeping.

Pat James has sent boxes of materials, including newsletters from other counties for research purposes. These are stored at our repository.

Clancy Hopkins has asked for society volunteers to help in the Flower Library Genealogy Department. He is now on the library board, and hopes to see fuller representation of genealogical concerns at the library. He would like to see the genealogy room open every day of the week.

Maurice Herron suggested a project to index all the microfilmed "Watertown Daily Times" issues in the Flower Library, as they have done for the "Jefferson County Journal". He estimated it would be a ten year project. One of the most expensive aspects of doing the Journal was for doing the original microfilming. **Helen McDonald** reminded us that the "Thousand Islands Sun" is also on microfilm and in need of indexing. Other suggestions are to extract data from reunion notices, wedding anniversary write ups, news notes from the county correspondents for the various weekly papers in the county.

Clancy Hopkins has arranged for **Father O'Daugherty** to speak in March, and asked for ideas for future meetings.

Larry Corbett suggested people bring locations for their favorite internet genealogy addresses, and showed a source of French/French Canadian information on the internet. **Clancy** agreed, and elaborated on the idea with a clipping from the "Syracuse Post Standard." **Boni** added another source for German ancestors.

Helen McDonald has Tanguay, the seven volume French Canadian source. She offered to do look ups for members from that.

There was no formal closing.

FEBRUARY MEETING

The February meeting of the Jefferson County Genealogy Society was called to order at 6:30 by President **Helen McDonald** at the Dillenback Room of Flower Memorial Library with 22 members and guests present.

The only business to come before the meeting concerned a typographical error in our constitution and bylaws to which the state took exception. **Sue Grant** explained the difficulty, and read the relevant passage from our constitution. 501 C2 organizations cannot be taxexempt, where 501 C3 organizations can. The constitution, though correctly stating the figures elsewhere, in Article 3 line 26, had a typographical error. **Sue Grant** made a motion that this be corrected, and it was seconded and carried.

President McDonald welcomed back the newcomers from last meeting, as well as those who attended this meeting for the first time, and went around the room having each member introduce himself. She thanked Pauline Zach for the great publicity, mentioning that both she and Maurice Herron, treasurer, have received calls from people who since have become members through the publicity.

Boni Shafer, the corresponding secretary, read letters of appreciation. The "Informer" was singled out as being especially attractive to new members. Boni noted that our members are joining from all over.

A box of genealogical material on the Bibbins family from Clayton was received. The Mr. Byington, the donor, mentioned he had other material on the Griffin, Harriman, Root, Curtis, Barnet, and Collins and that he would share his information on them.

The Antwerp census is ready to be checked. Clancy Hopkins accepted that one to correct. Dilly Baker has copied the censuses. Helen McDonald has put them on computer, and they now have to be checked against the original for the inevitable errors that will creep in. Maurice Herron has Adams, Boni Shafer has one, Dixons have the Town of Alexandria. Whoever has Hounsfield should contact Helen McDonald, because she has some help for that person.

Each person present had a chance to make any comment. Phyllis Putnam started off with a description of the Ernest Cook books. She went on to talk about Lyme Heritage Society's Public Forum on Old Rural Schoolhouses". People are invited to contribute their memories or to just listen, as teachers and pupils alike share their educational experiences in the one room school. Julie Gosier will moderate, the event will be held 12 March 1997 at 7:00 PM. This will be on the same model as the one on farm life, held two or three years ago.

She also mentioned that Lyme Heritage Society is seeing activity from the GenWeb page. Phyllis brought a notebook of queries Lyme Heritage has fielded. In closing, she sent out another request for Ernest Cook columns for future volumes of the Ernest Cook series. She has enough for another couple of volumes, but she is sure there were more written.

"Things I Remember" by Mina Herrick King was recommended as good reading, as well as having many names from the Town of Alexandria. Dan Grant commented on a new book on Grindstone Island, to come out soon, written by Audrey Lashomb.

Someone has just found a 1855 Jefferson County map, and offered to bring it to a meeting for members to examine. A discussion of other old Jefferson County and New York State maps followed.

Paul Smith is looking for material on the 1905 Benson Mine explosion in which his grandfather was killed. He would appreciate names of any places he could research in St Lawrence County.

Larry Corbett wondered if there could be an index to the "Informer". He stated that he kept all of his issues at hand because he used them a lot, but they would be so much easier to refer to if they were indexed. He went on to explain a service on the internet which is indexing obituaries, mostly in Canada,

but they will accept submissions from anywhere. They are getting. Larry added, 2,000 obits a day. They are looking for people who will send information from all the daily or weekly obituaries from a single paper.

Bill Dixon made a plea to everyone to notify him when a mistake is found on the web page. Tina Moore brought a genealogy on the Moore family of Sandy Creek. This book is for sale at the Sandy Creek Library. Clancy Hopkins asked for suggestions for topics for future meetings. Father Daugherty will discuss Catholic records for the March meeting.

each carried a dinner pail which I always looked into when they came home in hopes of finding something they had not eaten. It wasn't that I was hungry but there was something wonderful about carrying a dinner pail and they often left a cookie or something for my benefit.

We lived in the caretaker's house on the estate "The Ledges" owned by J.M. Breitenbach of New York City and was at the end of Anthony Street in Alexandria Bay, New York, in the heart of the Thousand Islands..

Well, after awhile I heard my father go out the back door again and this time I knew he would go to feed the flock of white leghorn hens and gather a basket full of pure white eggs. Then I must have drifted off to sleep again because the next thing I knew my mother and Dr. Jim Ryan from Redwood were standing by the bed. "Well, Well, my girl, what seems to be the trouble?" he said in his loud cheery voice. I said, "Oh, Dr., I'm awful sick and Mama won't let me go downstairs. Can I have some medicine?" "Well, we will see.

If we can find the trouble and then I think I can give you some medicine," he said. He laid the black bag on a chair by the bed, opened it so it laid out flat with two trays full of beautiful pills of different colors and bottles of liquid medicines. He felt of my forehead and said "A-ha". Then he told me to open my mouth, stick out my tongue and say "A-h-h". Again he said "A-ha" and then looked at my chest, neck and tummy and again said "A-ha" and announced that I had the measles. My mother said that she was quite sure that was what I had but that I didn't have much rash earlier. It must have been those hot blankets and quilts that brought out the rash.

The Dr. asked Mama for two glasses each half full of water and a teaspoon. When she came back he poured pretty red medicine in one glass and clear medicine that looked just like water in the other. Then he said that I was to have a teaspoon full of each every two hours all day and then he poured lots of the pink pills from a large bottle into an envelope and said to take one each time I took the other medicine. Then he wrote my name on the envelope and some numbers. "Is that my name for sure and what are the numbers for?" I said. "You bet that is your name and a very pretty name too, Laurel Lambert and the numbers mean that today is November 6, 1910." I felt important and grown up to have my own medicine with my name on it. Mama gave me some of each medicine. I liked the red one better because it tasted like cherry juice, but I liked the pills even better because they tasted exactly like the wintergreen drops which we always had in the cupboard and which our Aunt Marion always brought us when she came to visit. (She was housekeeper for Mr. and Mrs. John Raton and lived in a big house near the river which is now the Homestead Restaurant.)

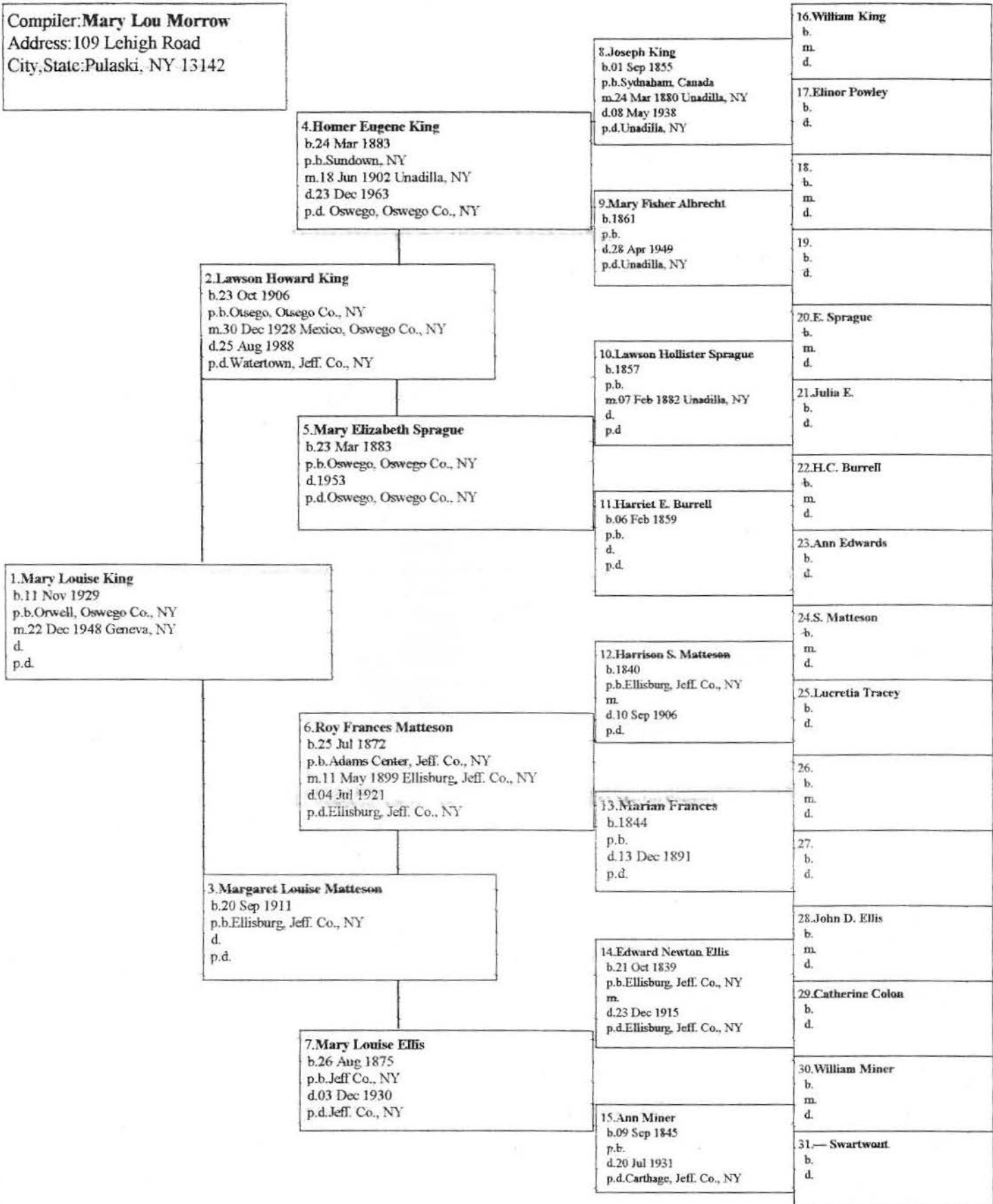
Dr. Ryan said for me to be a good girl and I'd be all better soon. Then he gave me a shiny new penny and left. I liked the penny but it wasn't much comfort as I wanted to be outdoors playing in the snow, the first of the season. Mama had told me last night that we would go to the store today and now here I was in bed with measles and the bed was so hot. I decided I'd get some cool air so I got out of bed and went out into the hall. How good that cold brown and tan linoleum felt to my burning feet! I started to run up and down, but not for long. The door at the foot of the stairs opened and Mama said "What are you doing out of bed?" I said "I'm getting cold cause I'm too hot." Up the stairs she came and again installed me between the pink and gray blanket and put the quilts on too and told me to stay there or I'd bet real sick and couldn't go to the sunbeam sewing circle with Pearl and Lettie.

Auntie Ben, as everyone lovingly called the wife of our minister, Rev. Fred Benjamin, had told my sisters to bring me to the sewing circle and she would teach me to make a quilt block.

Soon Mama came up with a cup of nice beef broth. I didn't feel hungry but I took some and said I'd rather have ice cream and Mama said she was going to make some for supper as enough snow had fallen to freeze it. I decided that there was something good about being sick if I could have ice cream for supper. I slept a lot and the day passed quickly and when the children came from school each one brought me something from the store on Walton Street. My brother brought me a whole stick of candy, Molasses flavor. My sister Pearl brought a bright red sucker and my sister Lettie brought two gumdrops, one licorice and one lemon, my favorite flavors. You see, I was ten years younger than Parker, nine years younger than Pearl and seven years younger than Lettie and they babied me alot.

Well, I had ice cream for supper and my sisters read me lots of stories until I got sleepy and wanted to go in my own little bed for the night. Next day I was much better and the measles were soon over and soon I got to the sewing circle and made a quilt block. Auntie Ben praised me and said I might even become a dressmaker some day. But I never did. However I made many quilts and even did quilting for our church and others years later.

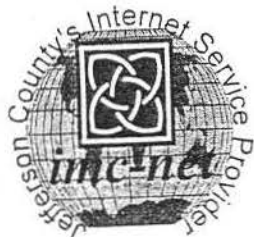

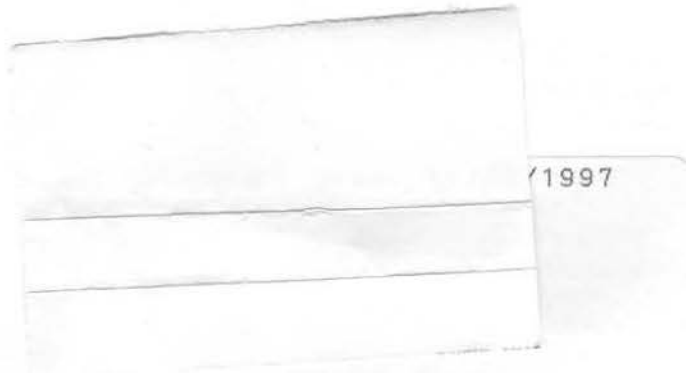

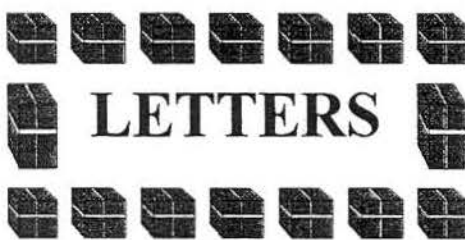

HOW I FOUND MY MAYFLOW ANCESTERS

It was January 1992—middle of winter. By now I'd been successful in tracing my SMITH ancestors back to my 4th great grandfather Elias Smith Sr. Elias was a Loyalist and came to Canada in 1787 with a wife and 8 children. He was married to Catherine SECORD, daughter of John SECORD Sr. Their son Elias SMITH Jr. married Ann (Nancy) SECORD, daughter of Lt. Solomon SECORD; Granddaughter of James SECORD Sr. John SECORD Sr. and James SECORD Sr. were brothers—sons of Daniel SECORD Jr. And Catherine Mabie. The SECORDS and MABIES have been well documented, so I've been fortunate enough to gather a lot of information. I had also decided to apply for my first Loyalist Certificate as a direct descendant of John SECORD Sr.

But what about my mother's family! I knew about the GIFFORDS and WIND-ECKERS, the MILLERS and the HOOVERS. I was now curious about my great grandfather Ambrose GLOYD. I knew he was born in

1816 in Lowville, Lewis County, New York—he came to Canada in 1843, and in 1845 in Beamsville, he married Frances MILLER—a great granddaughter of Pioneer Jacob HOOVER. He died in Rainham 1884.

The first thing I did was write to the Chamber of Commerce in Lowville for addresses of the Town Clerk, and the Newspaper. I wrote to the Town Clerk, sent a U.S. Money Order, and asked them to do a search. They couldn't tell me anything about Ambrose—but they did have two old Deeds. One was dated 1806 where James GLOYD and his wife Mary, James GLOYD Jr. And his wife Esther, had purchased land in Stow Square. (Although I didn't know it at the time, I had correctly assumed these people were my 2nd and 3rd great grandparents). The Chamber of Commerce also sent my name and address to the Historian, who sent me a page from the HISTORY OF OXFORD, MA., showing the names of James and Mary (Snow) GLOYD.

Then I found the name and address of a lady in Massachusetts from an old Newsletter. Marilyn's husband was a GLOYD, and she had done a lot of research on the family, going back to Salem, MA during Witchcraft Trials, and several generations in England. All I needed to do was to connect my great grandfather to this line! Marilyn kept sending me all kinds of information. meanwhile I had placed an ad in the Lowville Journal and Republican—but had no response. About the same time Marilyn informed me that the GLOYDS had moved from Lewis County to Jefferson County, and she sent me more Census and Vital Records information. I could

put a family together, but couldn't prove a connection for Ambrose.

By now it was September, and my next step was to place an ad in the Watertown Daily Times. Within days I had a phone call from Gus Rogers, plus letters from two other people, each with a bit of information. Gus couldn't tell me anything about Ambrose, but he knew the family name since there was a connection with his family. He would put me in touch with his daughter Ellen in Syracuse, NY who is a professional researcher. Within a few weeks Ellen had located an old Will (1911)—one of the beneficiaries was my grandfather in Rainham, Ontario; a Death Certificate showing my great great grandparents as James GLOYD and Esther PRENTIS. And as luck would have it, Bible Records for my 3rd great grandparents, James and Mary GLOYD, with 10 children, complete with birth dates, all of whom were born in MA. Bible Records were found in Onandaga County Public Library, Syracuse, NY.

Marilyn in MA. also sent me a copy of Pension Papers (American Revolution) for my 3rd great grandfather, showing his movements from Abington to Cummington to Hatfield, MA., then to Lowville and Watertown, NY.

I now had my GLOYD family together, along with names of their spouses. I knew that my 3rd great grandfather was a Minuteman in the American Revolution. That was pretty exciting, and in less than one year. And now I knew that my 2nd great grandmother was Esther PRENTIS—my 3rd great grandmother was Mary SNOW, whose father was Captain Nathan SNOW—also a Minuteman, so I would be eligible to join the D. A. R.

I was still working on my Loyalist application, and by now it was February 1993, when my copy of O. G. S. Families arrived. I always look at the Queries first, and found: PRENTICE—Oliver b. ? lvd US Albany dist

NY in 1790's. MAR. Lydia DELONG USA in Etobicoke Twp by 1805 poss Markham 1802. CH. Jacol 1799-1867 mar. Hannah DEVINS; Hannah; Alver; Benjamin; Lydia; Oliver Solomon; David. Who were Oliver & Lydia & prnts? Birthplace & origins (UEL?) info re above to CarolAnne E. Prentice Chepurney, Holland Landing.

Thinking Oliver PRENTICE might have been a relative, I wrote to CarolAnne. By return mail I had several pages copied from "VALENTINE PRENTICE—His Origins—Desc. Of his Grandsons John, Jonathan, Stephen and Thomas, from 1514 to 1992", and there on Page 38 was my Esther PRENTIS-PRENTICE, b. 1784 Westfield, MA. Who had written two Volumes on the PRENTICES. I immediately ordered the books, and now I had my PRENTICE line back to the 1500's in England. That was really exciting.

Esther's parents Nathaniel and Mercy (Green) PRENTICE were both born in Preston, New London, CT. Joe tells me that our common ancestor is Joseph PRENTICE who married Hannah CRESEBOUGH, who has an interesting ancestry. Joe has traced her roots back 1,000 years. I'm waiting for his book to be printed.

Now I not only had my GLOYDS, but PRENTICES as well.

Then, within a few weeks I had a phone call from Bill in Trenton, NJ. He'd got my name from Joe in California. Bill went on to say that we were related through the PRENTICES and the SNOWS, so Bill is my 4th cousin. Bill also went on to say that Captain Nathan SNOW was a descendant of Peter BROWN—a passenger on the Mayflower—and that Peter BROWN's grandson Joseph SNOW had married Hopestill ALDEN, a granddaughter of John ALDEN and Priscilla MULLINS. I think I was in shock! Suddenly I had 5 Mayflower ancestors—Peter BROWN,

John ALDEN, Priscella MULLINS, and her parents William and Alice MULLINS.

Bill sent me a whole packet of information, including a copy of his Mayflower Application.

The 'Mayflower' carried 102 passengers. The winter was so bad that about two thirds of them died the first year, including William and Alice MULLINS and their only son Joseph. There are only 24 families with descendants. Heads of households were: John ALDEN, Isaac ALLERTON, John BILLINGTON, Governor William BRADFORD, Elder William BREWSTER, Peter BROWN, James CHILTON, Francis COOKE, Edward DOTY, Francis EATON, Edward FULLER, Dr. Samuel FULLER, Stephen HOPKINS, John HOWLAND, Richard MORE, Degory PRIEST, Thomas ROGERS, Henry SAMPSON, George SOULE, Captain Myles STANDISH, Richard WARREN, William WHITE, Governor Edward WINSLOW, the progeny of William MULLINS and John TILLEY is absorbed by that of their respective sons-in-law, John ALDEN and John HOWLAND. Moses FLETCHER left Dutch but no Colonial American descendants.

The first 5 generations of descendants have been well documented, and there is a "5 Generation Project Publications"—published by General Society of Mayflower descendants (Mayflower Families Genealogies through five Generations). This series traces descendants of the Pilgrims down through the fifth generation, to the birth of the sixth generation children. They are carefully researched and contain the best documented genealogical data that is available.

Another one of my ancestors was Moses Simonson of Leiden, Holland, who arrived in America in 1621 on the "Fortune". He was a Purchaser. His daughter Mary SIMMONS married Joseph ALDEN, a son of John ALDEN and Priscella MULLINS.

Because I have two Patriot ancestors who were both Minutemen, and who answered the Alarm on 18th of April, 1775, I have now decided to join the Katharine Pratt Horton Buffalo Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. I have my documents ready, and am working on my Application.

I had visions of my ancestors riding alongside Paul Revere—"Listen, my children, and you shall hear Of the midnight ride of Paul Revere, On the eighteenth of April, in seventy-five"—Paul Revere's Ride, by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Well, they were out at the same time and for the same cause, but a few miles apart!

This would not have been possible had I not got curious about my ancestors. Although I was lucky in making connections, it has been a lot of work—with some frustrations—and a lot of letters.

Our ancestors want to be found, and there are many clues out there. So get you pen and paper, typewriter or Computer—and go out there and find them! Don't worry about the "horse thief". I'm still looking, and can't find one!

SOCIETY MINUTES

The March meeting of the Jefferson County Genealogical Society was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by President Helen McDonald at the Dillenback Room of Flower Memorial Library with 36 members and guest present. Minutes of the February meeting were approved with corrections. Treasurer's report: shows a total of 291 membership as of last newsletter mailing.

Report of advisory council meeting—1 March—given by the president: present were Helen McDonald, Phyllis Putnam, Nan Dixon, Maurice Herron, Boni Shafer, officers; Pauline Zach, Larry Corbett, Jon Holcombe, and Clancy Hopkins.

First on the agenda was the renewal of the purpose of the Jefferson County Genealogical Society. It was thought that it should be restated for the benefit of the new members. They are not necessarily in order of importance.

1. Indexing of records found in Jefferson County.
2. Defining where information can be found in Jefferson County.
3. Speakers for eight meeting and sharing of information and question from those present for four meetings to be determined as time goes along.
4. Compilation of a newsletter which will include research, compilation of five generation ancestor charts, queries, new-found materials.

5. Compilation of members' research, that is pedigrees and family histories. Also suggested a pamphlet be prepared for beginning genealogists. It would include information as to what can be found in each of 22 townships, who could give help in the town and a copy of blank pedigree sheets, family group sheets, and a copy of a program from the Internet for new people starting out in genealogy. This has been copied and edited by Boni Shafer. The members of the society need to make more effort to help those who want help with their research. We would like to encourage people who have not sent in their pedigrees or their early histories on first and second generation of ancestors in Jefferson County—so these can be filed for use by others.

The Jefferson County Historical Society is sponsoring a Heritage Day on April 12th at the State Office Building and would like us to participate with a booth. It was also suggested that we have a booth at the Jefferson County Fair on selected days. We now have our federal Tax Exempt status—thanks to Sue Grant and Maurice Herron. Computer discussions suggested to be left to the last half hour of each meeting, as many do not use computers. It was thought that two groups, computer users and non-computer users, could be formed at that time to discuss their needs.

The president announced, sadly, the deaths of two members: Francis Rusho, from Adams, a faithful attendant at our meetings, and Sarah Blenis of south Plymouth, originally from Woodville—who had done a great amount of genealogy.

Other sad news is that John & Ellen Bartlett will finish their long association with our newsletter with the May issue. To compensate for this, the president has appointed a committee to work on the format, collect materials, type the materials if needed. We would very, very much like all of the members to participate in giving material for the newsletter. Some people have done it over the past very faithfully. John & Ellen thanked those who have contributed but we need more help at this point, because John & Ellen did a lot of the research that they put in. Maurice has offered to format the newsletter, but he has little

time to collect the material. Helen McDonald, Boni Shafer, Maurice, Betty Farr and Sue Grant are now on the committee. The committee would like to get four or five issues ahead with basic articles and materials. We need help—now! John & Ellen devoted 30 to 40 hours per newsletter, and no one feels he has the time. It was moved and carried that the corresponding secretary write a letter of appreciation for all the work the Bartletts have done in the past.

The April meeting has Nelson Eddy lined up to talk on the Four River Valleys Historical Society. The May meeting is Persis Boyeson. The Society will provide volunteers to help public TV fund raisers. Clancy has a sign made up for the TV appearance, and will also use it at the State Office Building. Pauline Zach asked if anyone ever heard her publicity on the radio? She sends cards to each station. Please notify her if you hear it.

The LeRay, Clayton and Hounsfield—1850 census are to be checked. Yet to be done are Cape Vincent, Pamela, Philadelphia, and the last half of Rutland. Alice Corbett is working on the Town of Watertown. Boni has almost completed Orleans. John has Champion and Wilna. Betty Farr took LeRay, Francis Jackson is doing Hounsfield, Danny & Sue Grant will do Clayton. Julie Gosier mentioned that the census microfilms are also at the Lyme Heritage center, with readers, and people could go there to do them. She also announced the Lyme Heritage Center has census microfilms for Jefferson County for the years 1850, 1860, 1870, 1880, and 1900. Within a couple of months they should have 1910. She has copies of the listings of the towns in order.

Phyllis brought a copy of the queries from the GenWeb page, and offered them to whomever might answer them. The answers can be given to her or anyone with access to the Internet.

Julie told of a special event—June 14—at Catamount Hill in Colerain, MA. Catamount Hill is now a National Park. It was a very poor settlement dating back to the Revolution, of about 30 or 40 families. Many migrated to St. Lawrence and Jefferson counties (Spragueville area.) They are celebrating the first raising of an American flag over a school house, which was done at Catamount Hill. A reunion is held every 5 years. The flag was made by women of Catamount Hill, and is still in the possession of their heirs. The U.S. Postal Service is issuing a postage stamp of this flag raising to come out next year. Some names from Jefferson County which may have originated there are: Franklin, Shippee, Cool, Brown and you might be descended from the settlers of Catamount Hill. Julie had a booklet with more names.

Plans are made for attending the Heritage Day at the State Office Building with a table adjacent to the Brookside Cemetery and the Historical Association of South Jefferson, with computer data base information on: births, deaths, & marriages and perhaps Azilda Baker with the LDS church.

Helen announced that the Jefferson County GenWeb page has been chosen County of the Month for New York State for March. Tom Bogenschutz gave information that Family Tree Maker has been made available for Macintosh users. He has a telephone number and URL for this. It has CD disc with surnames.

Clancy Hopkins introduced Father Liam O'Doherty. He has been teaching genealogy for 45 years. He suggested the best way to learn your genealogy is to run for office. He has a wealth of information, not only on Irish backgrounds, but on the origin of names from many European countries. He fielded questions from society members until the building closed.

WATERTOWN—(Saturday, 25 May 1895)—Next Thursday brings another observance of Memorial Day, one of those fast succeeding anniversaries which stir the hearts of those who love their country and those who fought to keep it great and make it wholly free. Joe Spratt Post, of Watertown, through its committees and members, with Colonel J. T. Outterson as chairman of this general committee, will, as it always does, make the day a notable one in this section. Colonel Outterson makes his announcement as follows:

"There will be the usual visits of committees to veterans' graves, which are to be decorated with flags and flowers, and the public exercises, in the afternoon at 2:30 at the soldiers and sailors' monument on Public Square and in the evening at the Coty opera house, with Senator Clarence Lexow as the orator, and a carefully selected program.

"We are very forcibly reminded when our attention is called to the fast thinning ranks of our old comrades, that the last of the surviving veterans of the late Civil War will soon have attended their last campfire here on earth, and gone to answer the roll call above. And it will be seen that the years for the observance of Memorial Day by the survivors of the forces in whose honor it was established are numbered."

Civil War Regiments In Jefferson & Lewis Counties

CIVIL WAR REGIMENTS In Jefferson and Lewis Counties

Copied in part from Evert's 1890
History of Jefferson County.

Scarcely had the echoes of the guns fired at Fort Sumter, in April 1861, died away when over the Northland rolled a wave of intense excitement and men at once sprang to arms in defense of their country.

The 94th Infantry Regiment was organized at Sacket's Harbor to serve three years. The companies composing of men from Jefferson and Lewis County. It was mustered into service on March 10, 1862. The Regiment participated in the Battle's of Cedar Mountain, Second Bull Run, Chantilly, Chancellorsville, South Mountain, Antietam, Gainesville, Fredericksburg, Gettysburg, Tolopotomy, Bethesda Church, Petersburg, Weldon Railroad, and Mine Run. In March of 1863 the 94th Infantry consolidated with the 105th Infantry. The Regiment was mustered out of service on July 18, 1865 in accordance with orders from the War Department.

The 20th Cavalry Regiment was organized in Sacket's Harbor to serve three years. Its men were principally from Jefferson County, although the counties of Lewis, St. Lawrence, Oswego, Onondaga, and Albany were also represented. The Regiment was mustered into service on September 3, 1863, and on July 31 1865, mustered out in accordance with orders from the War Department. The 20th Cavalry was known as "*McClellan Cavalry*".

The 24th Cavalry Regiment was organized in Auburn, New York to serve three years, and contained men from Jefferson, Lewis, St. Lawrence, Oswego, and Onondaga Counties. The 24th was mustered into service on January 1864, and on June 17, 1864 was consolidated with the 10th New York Cavalry Regiment. The united force being called the 1st New York Provisional Cavalry. The Regiment participated in the Battle's of Wildness, Spottsylvania, Guinea Station, North Anna, Tolopotomy, Bethesda Church, Cold Harbor, Petersburg, Cemetery Hill, Weldon Railroad, Ream's Station, Peeble's Farm, Vaughan Road, and Bellefield.

The 1st Regiment US Light Artillery (Governor Morgan's) was raised at Watertown and Carthage, for the term of three years, and mustered in to service on July 24, 1861. They became part of the 2nd New York Light Artillery. The Regiment was consolidated into part the of the 9th New York Artillery on June 27, 1865, and mustered out of service on September 29, 1865. They were in Battle's at Second Bull Run, North Anna, Spottsylvania, Tolopotomy, Cold Harbor, Petersburg, Strawberry Plains, Deep Bottom, New Market Road, Charles City Cross-Roads, and Ream's Station. The Regiment lost

over 841 men.

The Third Battalion of the "Black River Artillery", assigned to the Fifth Artillery Regiment consisted of Companies I, K, L, and M were raised in Jefferson and Lewis counties. Being mustered into service on September 1862, to serve three years. This Regiment participated in the engagements at Point of Rock, Berlin, Sandy Hook, and Harpers Ferry.

The 10th Artillery Regiment was composed of the 1st, 2nd, and 4th, Battalions of the "Black River Artillery" raised in the counties of Lewis and Jefferson part of the "Eighteen Senate District." They were mustered into service September 11, 1862 to serve a term of three years. In accordance with orders of the War Department, they were mustered out on June 23, 1865.

The 186th Infantry Regiment was recruited principally in Jefferson and Lewis counties, and mustered into service on September 8, 1864. It was organized in Sacket's Harbor for a period of one year, and mustered out, in accordance with orders from the War Department on June 2, 1865. The 186th Infantry went out 980 men strong. They lost 130 killed and wounded, 120 by disease and discharge, and returned with 730 men. The Regiment participated in the Battle of Southside Railroad on October 27, 1864. They were part of Warren's command in his raid to Nottoway on December 10. They were highly complimented by Brigade and Division Commanders for gallantry in the charge on Fort Mahone, and joined in the pursuit and capture of General Lee. The 186th was among the first to enter the rebel fortifications at Petersburg.

The 26th (Frontier) Cavalry Regiment was organized in the States of New York and Massachusetts and Vermont, under special authority from the Secretary of War, to serve of the frontier for one year. It was principally engaged in protecting the northern frontier, looking after suspicious characters, "*bounty-jumpers*," rebel sympathizers, etc. One detachment was stationed at Sacket's Harbor. Five companies were organized in New York, composed of men from the counties of St. Lawrence Jefferson, Lewis, Franklin, Clinton, Essex, and Erie. The regiment was mustered in from December 29, 1864 till February 22, 1865, and mustered out by companies from June 29, 1865, to July 7, 1865, in accordance with order from the War Department.

The First Regiment "Veteran" Cavalry was organized at Geneva, New York, to serve three years, and mustered into service from July 25 to November 19, 1863. The 17th New York Cavalry was consolidated with it on September 17, 1863. The regiment was mustered out on July 20, 1865.

The 13th Cavalry was organized in New York City to serve three years and a detachment of four companies

of men from Jefferson County joined it. They were mustered into service from February 1863 to March 1864. On June 23, 1865, the Regiment was consolidated with the 16th New York Cavalry, and the consolidated force became known as the 3rd New York Provisional Cavalry. The Regiment principal engagements were in the Battle's at Aldei, Fairfax Station, Centerville, Culpeper, and Piedmont

The 18th Cavalry Regiment was organized at New York City, to serve three-year. The companies of which it was composed were raised in the counties of Albany, Jefferson, Lewis, Franklin, Herkimer, and Erie. It was mustered into service from July 18, 1863 to February 3, 1864. On June 12, 1865, it was consolidated with the 14th New York Cavalry, with the consolidated forces retaining the name 18th New York Cavalry. They remained in service until May 31, 1866, when it was mustered out in accordance with orders for the War Department.

The 6th Cavalry Regiment, "Second Ira Harris Guard", Jefferson County furnished a number of men for this regiment. They were mustered into the service from September 12 to December 19, 1861. The original member were mustered out on the expiration of their term of service. The organization, composed of veterans and recruits, retained in service, and on June 17, 1865, consolidated with the 15th New York Volunteer Cavalry. This consolidated force became known as the 2nd New York Provisional Cavalry. There list of engagements embraces the following: South Mountain, Anteat, Fredericksburg, Spottsylvania, Chancellorsville, Beverly Ford, Middleburg, Upperville, Gettysburg, Brandy Station, Rappahannock Station, Mine Run, Mechanicsville, Wilderness, Todd's Tavern, Hawe' Shop, Cold Harbor, Deep Bottom, Opequan, Fisher's Hill, Cedar Creek, Ap-

tomattox Station, and the Siege of Richmond.

The 1st New York Light Artillery Company C, under Captain John W. Tamblin, was organized in Jefferson County, and mustered into service from September 6 to October 24, 1864. They participated in the Battle's of Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Rappahannock Station, Mine Run, Spottsylvania, North Anna, Tolopotomy, Bethesda Church, Petersburg, and Weldon Railroad. They were mustered out in accordance with orders from the War Department on June 17, 1865, after nearly four years of active service.

The 1st New York Light Artillery, Company D, under Captain Thomas W. Osborn with men from Jefferson County. Its list of important engagement is a long one, and tells a truthful tale of bravery and hard service. It took active part in the Battle's of Yorktown, Williamsburg, Seven Pines, Peach Orchard, Savage Station, White Oak Swamp, Glendale, Malvern Hill, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Rappahannock Station, Mine Run, Wilderness, Spottsylvania, North Anna, Tolopotomy, Bethesda Church, Petersburg, Weldon Railroad, and Chapel House. They were mustered out on June 16, 1865.

The 1st New York Light Artillery, Company H, under Captain Joseph Spratt, was raised principally in Jefferson County, and mustered into service from the 10th to the 28th of October 1861. They were engaged in the Battle's at Yorktown, Fair Oaks, White Oak Swamp, Malven Hill, Mine Run, Wilderness, Spottsylvania, North Anna, Tolopotomy, Bethesda Church, Petersburg, Weldon Railroad, Peeble's Farm, and Hatcher's Run. They were mustered out of service on June 19, 1865.

BEGINNING GENEALOGY

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LESSON 1

WHERE TO START?

Many of you have a program on your computer for doing genealogy, and those of you who don't will be buying one. These programs do many things automatically, but there are a few that I want to mention anyway:

Before you start be aware that to do a complete genealogy it takes a commitment of time. Too many times I have witnessed people who start a project with great enthusiasm, but after a couple of months and a few dead-ends, they give it up as an impossible task. Know that it's going to take time and dedication (and money).

DATES should always be written as day / month / year—using the three-letter abbreviation for the month, i.e. 10 Dec 1996.

NEVER write a date as all numbers. If I wrote a date as thus: 10/12/96, you wouldn't know if I meant 10th of December or 12th of October or 1996 or 1896 or 1796, etc.

EVERY ENTRY about a person needs a complete name, a date, and a place, or the entry is considered incomplete. Too many times people compile a list of names and dates without any places (or additional information about the person).

That ends up being a "list", not a genealogy.

You will need to set up a FILING SYSTEM for correspondence and documents that you receive. This is something that the computer can't do for you!

I have a personal favorite that is detailed in the book "*File... Don't Pile, a Personal Filing System*" by Pat Dorff. (Minneapolis: Willowtree Press, 1983)".

Other ideas can be obtained from genealogy how-to-do-it books at your public library.

When start your research there are two kinds of information to search for—PRIMARY SOURCES and SECONDARY SOURCES.

Primary Source is one which had its origin with someone directly involved with the event being reported near the time of the event.

Examples: are a *Birth Certificate*, the death information on a *Death Certificate*, a *Marriage Certificate*, and some of the information on a

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Klondike Gold Rush... 100th Celebration Year

One hundred years ago, on August 17, 1896 a huge quantity of gold was discovered in Alaska. CHARLES LEE ALLEN went to the Klondike in search of this Gold, he was my grand-uncle. He was born in Henderson, 18 Aug 1855, a son of WILLIAM & HARRIET GALLEA ALLEN. With the exception of ten years, CHARLES lived in Henderson, in 1888 he went west and lived in Denver, Colorado for seven years. He then spent the next three years in Alaska during the Gold Rush, returning to Henderson in 1898.

The discovery was to be the greatest gold rush in history. More than 100,000 people swarmed toward a land that they had heard nothing about and endured hardships they never could have imagined. While dreams of gold propelled them forward, thousands of miles of wilderness, murderous rapids, mind-numbing cold (during the winter, temperature regularly dropped to 50 below and received up to 200 inches of snow per year; sounds like Upstate, NY) and frontier gunslinging stopped many dead in their tracks. They were greeted by obstacles created by both nature and man. "Neither law nor order prevailed, honest persons had no protection from the gang of rascals who plied their nefarious trade," wrote Mounted Police Officer Sam Steele, describing the scene at the base of the teachers Chilkoot Pass.

Seattle became a major staging point for those heading north by steamship, via the Inside Passage to Skagway or Dyea. From Dyea it is thought that CHARLES proceeded through the Chilkoot trail to Dawson city as North West Mounted Police records at Chilkoot Checkpoints listing people who entered the Yukon you find the following: "3 Jun 1898, ALLEN, CHAS, Henderson, Jefferson County, NY" (found on the Internet). In 1897-98, the North West Mounted Police set up a border crossing into Canada at the summit of the Chilkoot. They ordered every stamper to carry a year's worth of supplies. The city of Dyea offered departing miners

everything, complete outfits, temporary room and board, gambling and dance halls. Before the lonely men could leave town they faced the temptations of 80 saloons, the lure of painted ladies and the quick finger of gamblers and thieves such as Jefferson "Soapy" Smith and his ruthless gang of over 300 men.

Stamperders faced their greatest hardships on the Chilkoot trail out of Dyea. The Chilkoot was the toughest on men because pack animals could not be used easily on the steep slopes leading to the 3,000-foot pass. CHARLES must have made it through the pass as he checked in with the Mounted Station at Lake Bennett on the other side. It states: "ALLEN, CHARLES, Henderson, NY, Lake Bennett, boarded a Skow #1416".

Other tracing of ALLEN, C. in the Klondike are Places Mining Applications. These are the actual claims. Claims to be checked are: 769, 25493, 25494, 25496, 29149, 35770, 35771, 35850, 35908, 39497, 41140, 40765, 57349, 78271, 18980047M, 010ORIGLO182, 76904. I list all of these claims as I hope one of his descendants will go to Alaska some day and make a hit.

Census return.

The birth information on a death certificate isn't primary because someone who wasn't present at the birth is recording it many years after the birth, quite probably. The residence of a person is about the only primary source on a census return. Many times the ages, birth places and other dates are all being recorded long after they happened (and could have been given to the census taker by the neighbor if the family didn't happen to be at home!).

Secondary Source is everything else and should be used as clues. An obituary is a secondary source. Except for the death date and funeral information, someone who was not present gives all the information when the event happened.

A tombstone presents a different type of source! It's obvious that the birth date is a secondary source, but if it's a new stone with an old death date (meaning the stone wasn't erected at the time of the death), it is definitely a secondary source.

If you come up with two or three dates for a person's birth consider when each was recorded and choose the one that was recorded closest to the time of the birth. This isn't a 100% guarantee that it's right, but the odds are better that it is. In law another name for primary evidence is "best evidence". The best evidence available must be considered before judgment is made. A book on this subject is

"Genealogical Evidence" by Noel C. Stevenson (Laguna Hills: Aegean Press, 1989). The author is a lawyer and a genealogist.



WHO TO START WITH?

Start with yourself and work backward generation by generation. Too often a new researcher will want to start with great-grandfather because he did something outstanding in his lifetime, but that's not the way to go. Recording information about yourself and each generation allows you to gather information as you progress, and in the long run you will find out even more about great-grandfather.

Don't start your research at the county courthouse. So many new researchers think that they will find everything they need in birth, death, and marriage records at the county courthouse or town clerk's office. Not so! In many states those records don't start until the last half of the 1800s and may not be complete until after 1900. Even the colonial states where we think of our country starting don't have these records before 1860s. (Each state needs to be checked individually, though.)

Talk to the senior citizens in your family and learn what they know about the family. It's important to talk to them today because tomorrow they may not be here. Using a tape recorder is good for this, if you can put the microphone in an out-of-sight

place. A microphone intimidates too often oldsters. These recorded conversations can become some of your most treasured possessions!

Then I suggest you go on a "snoop mission" in your parent's house or your grandparent's house. There are many, many things that can give you clues to your family. Some example are, **Bible Records, Diaries, Old Letters, Photo Albums, Scrap Books, Baby Books, Wills, Deeds, Diplomas, Hospital Receipts, Business Papers and Account Books, Lodge Records, Memorial Cards from a funeral, Passports, Tax Records, Newspaper Clippings, a Sampler or Friendship Quilt, and Monograms on jewelry and silverware.** My maternal grandparents had a big square house with a full basement and walk-up attic and grandma collected antiques and "stuff". It was a fascinating place to visit! Most of the antiques and collectibles that she had were family heirlooms so they were doubly important. Not everyone has a house like that to visit but, whatever your grandparents, aunts and uncles have, talk to them about it and get the story that goes with it.

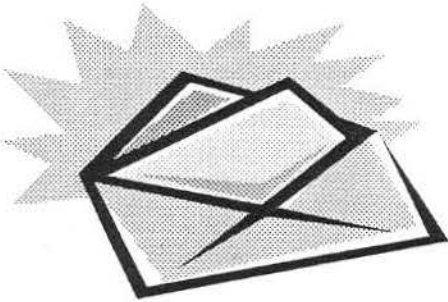
As you get into the old records, you will find your names spelled umpteen different ways. These records were entered by people who could read and write but didn't necessarily have a secondary education. An Englishman would pronounce and spell a German name quite differently than our German immigrant. I advise you to say a "misspelled" name out-loud to see if it sounds like your name. "Saying" beats "looking"!

TRADITIONS

Every family has "traditions" or "family stories". Some of these stories get bigger with each telling! Don't ignore them but don't take them as fact either. Use them as clues and check them out. Often you will find that there is a crumb of truth to the story and that it has just grown bigger with each telling!



CORRESPONDENCE

This is a subject that can be a lesson in itself. You will have to do some correspondence because neither everything you want is on-line nor will you be able to travel to all the places to do research in person. **A few points to remember:**

- Use business-sized paper, envelopes, and style for writing your letters. Get a book from your public library on correct correspondence forms if you have forgotten what you learned in high school. I have an English handbook from 12th grade that is very helpful.
- Keep your requests short and to the point. There is no need to go into great detail about your family. Ask for the record you want and then quit.
- Include a self - addresses, stamped envelope (SASE) if you expect a reply. Include a check in the correct amount

for the record/information you are requesting. Cost of birth, death and marriage records for the various states is available on-line and in several publications. Other record repositories have set charges for their research. It's advisable to write to them first asking about their charges. The National Archives and some other Government Agencies have forms to use for requesting records.

- When you write to relatives for information, make it a business letter. This is not the time to chit -chat about the family. A family group sheet often intimidates non-genealogists (especially older people), so it is better to compile a questionnaire form to send to relatives. They will understand the questions better than a group sheet. Don't forget the SASE!

LESSON 2

LIBRARY AND ARCHIVAL RESEARCH

Library and Archival materials are secondary resources and should be used for clues and background. The genealogy section in a library catalogued under the *Dewey Decimal System* can be found listed as 929 and 929 (reference).

There are many types of libraries that can be helpful in your research. Some of these will have their catalogue on-line so that you can search for a specific title. The contents of the books are not yet on-line, however. Many libraries and archives won't loan their genealogy books on inter-

library loan because of the demand for the title, so that means you will probably have to make a trip to the library to view the book. An alternate route would be to have the holding library copy the index and / or table of contents of the book and then you can tell if the book really contains the information that you want and you can order copies of specific pages. You could also check at a *Family History Library* to see if the book has been micro-filmed. There are also specialized library businesses that loan books through the mail.

TYPES OF LIBRARIES

1) **Public Library**

- a. Local
 - Where you live.
- b. Large city
 - Such a library will often have a special genealogy section/room.
- c. Near your ancestor's home.
 - This library will have material specific to your area of interest.

2) **Historical Library**

- a. Local
 - Where you live.
- b. State
 - Where you live.
- c. Ancestor's home (or) state
 - I think that too often these historical and genealogical society libraries are overlooked. They can contain material that can be found nowhere else.

3) **College/University Library**

These libraries are especially good for ethnic research or they might contain a special collection of another type, such as maps or a collection of local history. I am most familiar with St Olaf College, Northfield, MN (that has a Nor-

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wegian Collection), Gustavus Adolphus College, St Peter, MN (that has a Swedish Collection), and St Thomas College, St Paul, MN (that has a Irish Collection), but there are others throughout the USA and Europe.

4) Genealogical Library

a. Family History Library—Salt Lake City and local

5) Special Collections

a. Library of Congress

b. Allen County Public Library, Fort Wayne, IN

- This library's genealogy section is second only to the Family History Library.

c. Newberry Library, Chicago

6) Out-of-Print Book Dealers

a. Higginson Book Co.

- They reprint old books, especially genealogies, on demand.

7) Borrow Books by Mail

a. Hoenstine's

- This library specializes in Pennsylvania books.

(Dewey Decimal or Library of Congress) that the library uses and acquaint yourself with the numbers of the types of books you will want to use. In some large libraries you may not be able to go into the stacks. You will have to fill out a request form and wait patiently (!) until the book is brought to you.

Many genealogy books are old and fragile and you won't be allowed to put them on the copy machine. Therefore, you need to know how to take complete notes. Documenting *ALL* of your research is very important. A helpful book is *SITE YOUR SOURCES* by Richard S. Lackey (New Orleans: Polyanthos, 1980). These books are available from many genealogy book dealers.

A. Maps and Atlases

B. Gazetteers

- This is a geographical dictionary but also contains names of people.

C. Local Histories

- These volumes contain biographies, plus information on businesses, schools, churches, etc. They are usually printed on the county level.

D. Compiled Lists

- Such as: Mayflower descendants, Revolutionary and Civil War soldiers, ship passenger lists, etc.

E. Biographical Lists

- Such as: Who's Who Volumes.

F. Published Genealogies

G. Genealogical Magazines

- Such as: Everton's Genealogical Helper, Ancestry, Family Chronicles, etc.

H. Newsletters Published

by Genealogical and Historical Societies

- Those published by the local and state societies, plus those from the National Genealogical Society, New England Historical and Genealogical Society, etc.

I. Newspapers

- Directories of newspapers are available. Many newspapers have been microfilmed and often are available on inter-library loan. Local societies and individuals are undertaking projects of indexing newspapers for obituaries, births, marriages, anniversaries, probates, etc. Newspapers are a wonderful source of information on people and their day-to-day lives. It takes time to search them but it will be well worth your time.

J. Genealogy Columns in Newspapers

- These aren't as common but, if one is printed in your research area, they can be a great source.

K. City Directories

- Helpful in tracking a person during the between census years.

L. Telephone Directories

M. Postal Directories

N. Genealogy How-To-Do-It-Books

O. Biographies

- These will often be found under .016.9R.

A reprint from the Watertown Daily Times of: August 6, 1945

75 Years Ago, Today. August 6, 1870.

Thomas D. Spicer, a Civil War veteran of the Town of Hounsfield, who died June 23, aged 86 years, was a native of Stonington, Conn. He came to Jefferson County with his wife in 1809 over the old Rome State Road, which extended from the Mohawk to the St. Lawrence River. He fought in the battle of Sackets Harbor as a sergeant. He also was the superintendent of construction when Camp's Ditch was built from Huntingtonville to Sackets Harbor.

Thomas Draper Spicer Was Great-Grand-Father of Edward G. Spicer of Adams, NY
And He Recanted The Following Legacy

**1812 Battle Singer
Had Colorful Career**

Published August 14, 1945 Watertown Daily Times

The Times now has the final and complete chapter on the colorful career of Thomas Draper Spicer, the youthful soldier at Sackets Harbor in 1812, who stood on the bluff and sang "Yankee Doodle" as the British fleet retired from the battle in defeat. Two weeks ago on August 6, The Times in this Looking Backward column noted the death of Thomas D. Spicer 75 years ago.

The story has been substantiated by Edward G. Spicer of Adams, great grandson of Thomas D. Spicer, who has the full family record. Mr. Spicer says that family diaries report the full facts of Thomas D. Spicer's participation in the first battle of Sackets Harbor, of how he stood with a cheering band of fellow soldiers on the bluff overlooking Black River bay and how he broke into song in celebration of the American victory.

Thomas D. Spicer was then in

his late 20s. He was a native of Groton, Conn. When he was ten years of age his parents moved to Oswego County. The Spicers were among the earliest settlers of that region. In 1805 Thomas D. Spicer married Abigail Button, a neighbor, and two years later, in 1807, they came up the Rome Road through the pioneer forest and settled in Hounsfield. They made the journey by wagon and spent nine days coming from Oswego.

Tom Spicer was one of those who dropped their plows and hurried with musket to Sackets Harbor to defend that spot. He was a powerfully built young man, six feet in height. One of the favorite family stories deals with his finding a bear stealing corn from a field at the rear of his home. He allegedly grabbed the bear, hurled the animal to the ground and killed it with his hands.

For 60 years he was a widely known resident of Hounsfield. Colonel Camp hired him to direct work on Camp's Ditch during its ill-fated construction. He was one of the superintendents during the building of Madison Barracks. He was a force in the community. He was chairman for 40 years of the July 4th festivities and ceremonies at Sackets and Hounsfield. He was an active member of the Hounsfield Methodist church for a half century. On Sundays when the minister was absent he would mount the pulpit and deliver the sermon himself. Two son and nine grandsons fought in the Civil War.

Edward G. Spicer recalls attending the funeral of his great grandfather in 1870. Services were held in the Methodist Church and the large crowd overflowed the church and stood on the lawn.

Edward G. Spicer is now in his 80th year. For 50 years he has been a resident of the Adams section. For the past 30 years he has operated his 100-acre farm between Lorraine and Adams in the Allendale section. He runs the farm alone and this year cut 100 tons of hay, filling his barn and stacking the rest. A few years ago he sold his livestock so that he could spend winters with his sons, Karl H. Spicer and Harold W. Spicer, in Rochester. He has one other son, George E. Spicer, Adams, and a daughter, Mrs. Jennie Best, Lorraine. His wife, Mrs. Cornelia VanValkenberg Spicer, died in August, 1933.

Mr. Spicer descends from Nelson Spicer, the eldest of Thomas Draper Spicer's nine children. His father was Ramio E. Spicer, long a resident of the Adams section.

We are severing our connection with the "Democrat," and retiring from the printing business. We wish it distinctly understood that it is not from any lack of faith in the ultimate triumph of the principles of the party with which we have acted since the inauguration of the present imbecile National Administration. Nor is it from any withholding or lack of sympathy, or "Material Aid" on the part of the Democratic Party of the County.

They have nobly stood by and sustained us through evil as well as good report--in the darker as well as brighter days of the party. 28 June 1855

A New Map of Jefferson County

We would call the attention of our readers to the advertisement of a new map of this county, published by J. B. Shields, 17 and 19 Miner Street, Philadelphia, PA.

To those who have already seen it, commendation is unnecessary; the map itself contains the highest guarantee of its accuracy and beauty.

For the benefit of those who have not seen it we would say that the map is very large about 50 by 54 inches, handsomely colored and mounted on rollers, and giving from actual surveys the boundaries of all the towns, the course or location of every public road. The name of almost every farmer or landholder lying on the highways together with plans of almost every village showing streets etc.

The border of the map is very handsomely ornamented with lithographic view copied from daguercotyped of public buildings and private residences in various parts of the county. A fair proportion we notice of the buildings in this place and vicinity is represented.

The contrast between this and the last map we had of the county previous to the publication of this is indeed striking, the one covering about 4 superficial feet, while this covers over seventeen.

It will unquestionably be many years before another map of the county will be published, and thus every one will see the importance of seeing a copy, during the limited time they are offered.

23 August 1855

A Sudden Death

On Wednesday 22nd inst. Mr. Wells Spencer, fell dead almost instantaneously in the road, a few rods west of the Rail Road Bridge in this Village (Adams).

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Mr. Spencer was running when first noticed, and as if afterward appeared was endeavoring to reach the Depot in a season for the 52-2 clock train going north. He was noticed to stumble once or twice, but recovered himself, but fell again, and not seeing him rise assistance was at once rendered, but he only gasped a very feebly a few times and all was over. Medical help was promptly procured but it was fruitless. Mr. Spencer we understand was the son to Job Spencer near Adams Centre and was about 26 years of age.

02 August 1855

Collision on Lake Ontario.

The Oswego Palladium gives full particulars of the loss of the schooner Emblem, by collision with the steamer America. The sad affair occurred off the mouth of the Genesee River, at three o'clock Friday morning. The Palladium says:

"The America, Capt., Masson, was bound from Toronto for Oswego for St. Catherine's. The night was dark, and considerable sea was running. Capt. Masson was standing forward with the mate when the accident occurred. He says he saw no light on the schooner, and the first indication of her presence was a terrible scream from her crew. The engine was reversed, but not in time to prevent a collision. The steamer cut the schooner nearly in two. Capt. Donald Malcomson, of the Emblem, William Malcolmsen, mate, Thomas Malcolmsen, hand before the mast brothers, and John Malcomson, a cousin of the others, and John Bease, also hands, and Alexander Leith, said to be a passenger Oswego, took to the vessel's small boat. Before the painter was cut off, the schooner capsized, which upset the small boat, and all five men drowned. A boat took three others of the crew, Wm. Ross, George Anderson, and the colored cook, who remained on the wreck, off from the America which was immediately lowered. The steamer lay by till day light, took off a dog, and left the wreck

still a float. The men rescued state that they carried no light on the Emblem. Capt. Masson says that though the night was dark, he could see the lights of Canada, which he had just passed, also those of the May Flower, bound for Toronto. It is strange that the crew of the schooner should not have seen the steamer's lights in time to change their course."

30 August 1855

Tidbits of Information

The Cochineal Insect, from which a beautiful scarlet dye is imported into Great Britain to the extent of 1,000 tons annually, the value of which is estimated at 149,000 pounds. From the silkworm we obtain no less than 2,710 tons of silk, 2,200 tons of which are in the raw state, and are manufactured in the country: the remaining 510 tons are already fabricated. One thousand tons of pearl shell are imported; the whole of which are manufactured into buttons and studs. "For better or worse," they import no less than 8,000,000 leeches.



06 September 1855

Common School Celebration

The common schools of the towns of Adams, Henderson and Lorraine, held a Common School Celebration on Thursday last, the 30th, which we regret, the want of room prevents our giving a full description.

The turn out of the Juveniles, from these towns upon the occasion, was by the thousands. Young America was well represented, and as we noticed on one of the Banners, "Our

Country's Hope," we could not but think, that with such an array of bright intelligence's, who would soon be on the stage of action, that there was something reliable to hope for.

The Schools from the different Districts of this town and Lorraine met in front of the Presbyterian Church, (now the Sixtown Meeting House of the Historical Association of South Jefferson, Adams, NY) and formed in procession and proceeded to Jackson Hall, one of the largest in the County, which was found insufficient to seat it was estimated, more than one half who were anxious to obtain admittance. The Schools from Henderson had in the meantime arrived, via: Sacketts Harbor & E.R.R. and W.R.R.R. filling alone 15 cars.

Giving the children the preference the Hall was literally crowded with them, when addresses were delivered by Mr. Smith, Dep. State Superintendent, Mr. Rice, being unable to attend, and the Rev. Mr. Bingham, in a very interesting practical manner, when an adjournment was had for the purpose of doing justice to the Pie Nie, which was prepared with the most ample liberality and profusion of edibles, and preparatory to the excursion on the Rail Road to Watertown.

In the afternoon addresses were delivered by the Rev. Pritchett, and Hon. Mr. Barney, Supt. of the Public Instruction in Ohio.

We cannot find space to give a synopsis even of the remarks of any of the Speakers. The whole affair passed off exceedingly pleasant, and the Glee Club, who furnished music for the occasion, not only afforded the sweet melody for the audience, but done themselves great credit.

To the Superintendents of Schools of the different towns, Mr. Walker, of Adams; Mr. Dwight, of Henderson; and Mr. Kellogg, of Lorraine, much praise is due for the completeness of the arrangements and for the happiness, and good and wholesome influence which the occasion gave to so many thousands.

THINGS I REMEMBER

Excerpt taken from Mina Herrick King's book "Things I Remember" submitted by Judy Pierce, Chapter #8.

District Number 9 is located at Browns Corners. We find that the school house is no longer there. But some town buildings have been put up near the same location at Browns Corners which is about two miles from Redwood on the road to Alexandria Bay. A few of the early settlers in the area were Darwin and Caroline Olney with their daughter, Minnie. Mr. Olney was a cheese-maker in the factory which still stands there.

Across the corner was Charles Harris and his wife who had two sons, Bervin and Frank. Other old residents were John Dickhaut and his family with their four sons who all

went to school here: Edward, Frank, George and Charles. Frank later took over the farm with his wife Jennie Fox, and they had two children, Lena and Francis. Two large German families lived near each other: Peter Bickelhaupt, whose children Ida, Albert, Emma, and I think John. Philip Hofferberth's family were Adam, Philip, Clara, Elizabeth, John, Emma, and Leonard.

Also living in the area were Lewis and Mary Haas and their children, Edward and Ina; Squire Putnam and children, Frank, Charles, and Lula. Frank and his wife Blanche, later took over the farm and their children were John, Myron, and Gilbert. Later on Myron took over with his wife, Rena. They had a son Douglas and a daughter, Joan, but I think the school was closed before they went to school.

Edson Frost also lived at the corners and had two sons, Carl and Guy, also a daughter, May, who married Edward Haas and they had one daughter Gladys. Near the Haas farm was the Ashel Hough family with children, Etta, Nellie, and Charles. Etta married Adam Flath. Other residents included Joel Dayton, 1869, John Vanbrocklin and Albert Frost, 1872, Mattison Vanbrocklin, 1874, George "Jerry", and in 1872 Jacob Matic, 1897 William Deyoung and 1905, William Draper.

In 1906 George Hartman and his wife, Sophia, and their children, Louise, Lotha and Adam. In 1917, Edward McAllister, James Lambert and his wife

Charlotte, and their children Parker, Pearl, Lettie and Laurel. Others were Wallace and Agnes Bates and children, Raymond, Glenn, Roland, and Guy; The Charles Stevens family with Clover, John, Sally, Theresa and Arthur.

Some of the teachers were: Mary Rundlet--1885 and later there were Jennie Hart, Elsie Leonhardt, Clint Hoover. The school finally closed.

APRIL 14, 1997

The April meeting of the Jefferson County Genealogical Society was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by President, Helen McDonald at the Dillenbeck Room of Flower Memorial Library with 42 members and guests present. The President welcomed the many new visitors. Each attendant introduced himself. Minutes of the March meeting were approved with corrections. Treasurer's report: deposits for the month were \$443.00, expenditures were \$662.00, leaving a balance of \$1,338.00. Total membership now stands at 322. 7 Earnest Cook books were sold during the month, and the society took in \$13.00 of donations.

Boni Shafer brought copies of the Beginners Lessons in Genealogy as copied from the internet for new members. Older members can sign up for a copy. There are 6 lessons in total starting people from the very beginning.

Teachers are interested in doing genealogy for schools. Some approached the society at the Heritage Days held at the State Office Building and wondered if we had any members who would volunteer to visit the classroom at the schools? Clancy Hopkins described how it was done in Adams at their Pioneer Days Program each year.

President McDonald thanked those member who put in so much time to prepare for the Society's table at the Heritage Day Program, and mentioned that they were busy all day with visitors at the tables. Many people joined the society at that time.

We must have articles for the future newsletters. Members are urged to send in their pedigree sheets, and also to provide short articles on their families ancestors in Jefferson County. The materials should be sent in to the Society's mailing address: PO Box 6453, Watertown, NY 13601.

Program Committee report by Clancy received a nice thank you from the public TV station for the

society's help at their fund raiser.

Persis Boyson will be our next speaker, and will be speaking on Quebec and St. Lawrence County. Ruth Ann Messick will be from the Albany area for another speaker, date not yet set.

Other speakers will be from Herkimer and perhaps Fonda. It has been suggested the Father O'Doherty return.

President McDonald explained the 1850 census project to the new members. Dilly Baker, Francis Jackson, Gus Rogers and others have copied the records, Helen McDonald and John Bartlett have put them on computer, and various people are checking them against the original.



Julie Goshier reported on the committee to update genealogical write ups, such as the ones done in Child's History of Jefferson County. The committee felt that to do the entire county would be an impossible task. They suggested that to take the names of the different families each of us is working on, such as those in the surname list, and link that name to a resource person who could help the seeker of such information would be a more practical set up. The committee thought that it would be more useful to cite references or sources for finding more information, rather than to do the genealogy for each name. Even Child's

History of Jefferson County did only a sampling of each town, and perhaps a third of them are incorrect. Such a project would be insurmountable. The surname and the township is very useful, since many queries coming from outside the county have no idea of the location of the family within the county. People only know their ancestor came from Jefferson County.

Question: How does this project fit in with the Society's surname project?

Answer: It is expanding the surnames already collected with the addition of township and resource person to narrow down the research.

Evelyn Charlebois suggested that SASE for any help is a must, and preferably a large envelope. Others agreed that this should be included with any help brochure the society puts out.

(Bill Dixon, another committee member but not present at the meeting, was asked to give his view of the project. He maintains that each member of the society is a resource for his own family, a repository of family stories. This is a resource that can be lost and cannot be matches. Each member should be encouraged to write up some family history in story form: where they came from, what they did, and such. These stories are not written anywhere, and would be a marvelous resource for future generations. These would also answer the pleas for more information for the "INFORMER". Only a paragraph per person).

Someone mentioned she had a diary from a prisoner in Andersonville. Clancy said he had a wanted poster for one of his ancestors.

Homepage this month features 1864 Jefferson County Atlas, by Stone, thanks to Jon Holcombe who scanned them in and Bill Dixon who put them on the site.

Old Business: Julie handed out flyers on the Lyme Heritage Center, lists of the census that the center now has, and mentioned that their new microfilm reader is a pleasure to use. She also showed pictures of the origi-

nal flags from Catamount hill, and has lists of the early settlers from Catamount Hill many of which ended up in Jefferson and St. Lawrence Counties. In addition, she had a booklet from one of the descendants.

Maurice Herron report that we now have a supply of the Ernest Cook books, Volumes 1 & 2. AGLL has a Genealogical Bulletin, of national interest, usually available for \$18.00 per year. As a special offer to the society for subscribing a minimum of 12 members it can be had for \$12.00 a year. The contains queries and research stories.

Sue grant had a 1921 organizational report for the Depauville Dairyman's League.

Maurice Herron described the Memorial Day supplement for next month's INFORMER, containing Civil War veterans buried through-out the county before 1895. They are listed by cemetery. The back two pages lists each regimental company, where it was formed, and where they came from. There was a discussion of the Huntingtonville cemetery. Julie Gosier quoted state law, which says each town is responsible for mowing and fencing abandoned cemeteries, but that it is often necessary for the citizens to insist that they perform their duties. Often prisoners can take care of the cemeteries.

Clancy Hopkins introduced Nelson Eddy of the Four Rivers Historical Society. He mentioned that Four Rivers has printed Harold Sanderson's "Whispers from the Past" and is working on his next book which may be out this summer some time. They have reprinted the 1864 Jefferson County Atlas. Over the past 20 years they have put out a bulletin, and now that the issues are becoming depleted they are being reissued in a five year format, with each five year volume having table of contents, as index, list of illustrations. They have overcome the reluctance to writing by offering to transcribe articles spoken on tape.

Mr. Eddy spoke on the Eddy Family Organization, started in 1920, which now maintains a museum from the original settler's home in New

England. He brought a quilt made for him by an older family member, the blocks of which told the family history, and he passed around copies of the Eddy genealogy and various 10 year supplements to it.



MAY 12, 1997

Meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by President, Helen McDonald.

The speaker for the evening, Persis Yates Boyesen from Ogdensburg in St. Lawrence County was introduced. Mrs. Boyesen gave an interesting presentation on where to go and where to look in St. Lawrence County and in Quebec, Canada.

Mrs. Boyesen commented on the many museums and libraries in the small communities of St. Lawrence County such as Parishville, Norfolk, and Hopkinton which you might easily overlook. She also told of the difficulties of searches in French speaking areas of Canada and of her personal experiences.

She left a copy of her presentation for our use.

The business meeting was called to order at 7:45 p.m. Forty three persons present.

The minutes of the April meeting were read and after corrections were approved. Clancy Hopkins reported that Ruth Ann Messick of Saratoga Springs will be the speaker at the

June 9 meeting and Father Liam O'Doherty at the July meeting.

Maurice Herron reported that the May "Informer" will be mailed at the end of this week.

Volunteers are still working on the 1850 census.

Maurice Herron gave the treasurer's report. Balance is \$1187. There are 317 members. However, after this mailing 20 will be deleted for non-payment of dues. The policy will be that persons will be deleted with the anniversary of their membership. Ernest Cook books are selling well. He needs six more people to sign up for the AGLL publication in order to get the special price.

Phyllis Putnam reported that she has been given the church records for the Rosiere Church which are written in Latin and she has indexed them.

Judy Pierce reported that the pastor of the Redwood Lutheran Church has given her the marriage and baptismal records for 1860. She also has the records of the Browns Corner School #9.

The "Informer" committee is asking for contributions they can use such as stories, cartoons, pedigree charts. Dan Grant suggested using information from old scrapbooks.

Azilda Baker has 15 generation charts for sale at \$1.

President McDonald spoke on the need to raise dues. Motion by Julia Gosier, second by Clancy Hopkins that after July 30, the annual dues be raised to \$15. Carried.

Tina would like to know the loca-

tion of a flag made by Lucy Barrett, daughter of Jonas and Mary Barrett, when she was nearly twenty years old. It was hung proudly in the old Barrett doorway in Ashby, MA, during the inaugural of George Washington as first president of the United States of America on 30 April 1789.

The blue field is made of dark blue wool bunting, and the red stripes made of woolen cloth of a peculiar weave. The white material through out is unbleached cotton.

The casual observer would hardly notice that there are but twelve stripes. A plausible explanation would seem to be that as the blue field had already been cut and finished, there was not room for the outer red stripe, so it was left off. To make the edge to come out even, a wide hem was made in the blue.

When not in use for special occasions, the flag was put into a "pillow-bear", as pillowcases were then called, and laid carefully away.

There were no written records, but facts were conveyed by word of mouth, as this flag was handed down from generation to generation.

Lucy Barrett Johnson (the maker) gave it to her daughter Lucy Johnson Goodhue, who, in turn, passed it on to Laura Goodhue Kendall. It probably lay in the old Amos Kendall house on the Piper road for many years without seeing the light of day. Then it descended to the next generation in Fitchburg.

I would like to know if the flag is still in existence, and if so, who is in possession of it now.

I have my 2nd great-grandfather **George Rockwood** born in 1819 in NY all the way down to my great-granddaughters. I am positive that **George** was the son of **Elam** but so far have been unable to prove it.

George b NY m **Susan Elvira Clark** 17 Mar 1844 in Dexter NY, this from a newspaper called the Christain Advocate, I think. Early census records **Elam** is the only Rockwood who had a son in the correct age frame.

? Siblings of **George: Harvey** b 1805—**Lewis** b 1805—**Daniel** b 1808 (twin to Harvey?) m Laura Winegar, sister to Charles—**Laura** b 1814 m Charles Winegar ca 1832. There were probably other children but I do not have a clue as to their names. I believe their mother was **Clarissa (Goodrich?)**. In the 1850 census Elam is living with one of his sons, Daniel I believe. I can find no record of what happened to Clarissa. Neither she or elam are listed in the Dexter Cemetery. 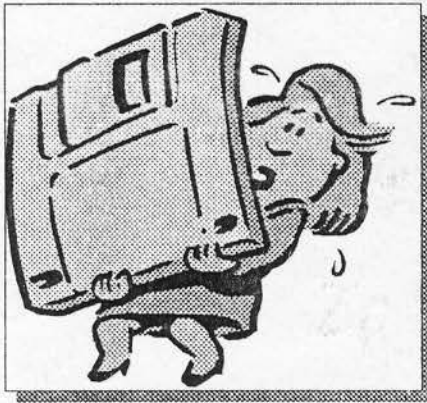

LESSON 3

COURT HOUSE AND COUNTY RECORDS

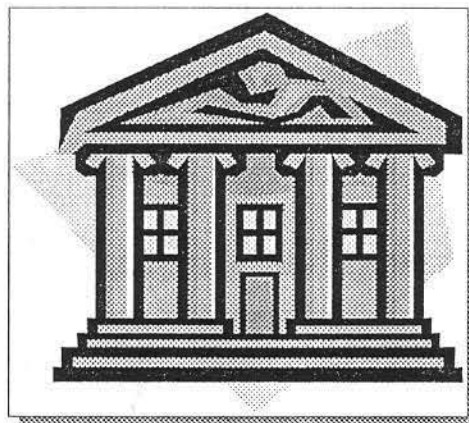
The definition and use of records, as well as the differentiation as to whether a record is to be considered as public or non-public, is regulated by state law. The laws differ from state to state. What is a public record in one state may be non-public in another. Acquaint yourself with the laws in the states where you will be searching.

Where these records are kept can also vary from state to state. In some states, especially the northeastern states, these records are considered as town, municipal, or village records and will be found in these repositories. In other states they are county records and will be found in the county courthouse.

County boundaries changed so what is considered Washington County now may well have been a part of a neighboring county during the era you are researching. It has also happened that a county has two courthouses! A good reference to help you determine county boundaries, years, and record locations is **THE HANDY BOOK FOR GENEALOGISTS**, 8th ed., Edited by George B. Everton (Logan, Utah: The Everton Publishers, 1991)

Call ahead to determine the hours and record availability. When you go to a courthouse or town office, know

what you are looking for. Be firm (genealogists aren't the clerks favorite customers!) but friendly. Dress as a businessperson, not in blue jeans and a sloppy sweatshirt. Treat the records with respect. Thank the clerk when you leave.

Correspondence****Subject: Christopher & Nancy (Snell) Fox of Three Mile Bay.**

There has been confusion about the year Christopher Fox emigrated to Three Mile Bay, Jefferson County, NY.

Family lore is that a son, Simeon, left from the town of Oppenheim, three days ahead of the family, to drive the cattle to their new Jefferson County Home. This was remarkable because Simeon was ten years old. This deed established the year of the emigration. [Also Gazetteer of Jefferson County, p. 569.]

The confusion arose when The Dochstader Family, Vol. 2 published 1987 (pg. 2047), traced the Nellis-Merriam-Cole-Fox family connection including Simeon Fox. The Article included the item that Simeon Fox came to Jefferson County in 1826, (a year before Simeon's birth.) The year of emigration was 1837.

Christopher & his wife, Nancy (Snell) I. Fox were born in 1799 & 1802 & married 31 Dec 1821. Simeon was born on 30 Apr 1827. The parents of Christopher Fox are not reliable established. The parents of Nancy (Snell) Fox were Johann Jacob & Marie (Empie) Snell of Ephrata, Montgomery County, NY.

According to a 1978 edition of the Watertown Daily Times, the town of CANTWELL, Alaska was for sale. It is located on the Alaska Railroad & the Anchorage-Fairbanks Highway, 28 miles from Mr. McKinley Park.

It was named after Lt. John C. Cantwell who surveyed the area in 1884-85. Several revues were published, one in 1885, with Capt. McLenegan USRCS; and one in 1887 by Capt. Healy. Also, a 'Village Profile' was published in the Cantwell Tapestry by Gregory Nicholas in Jul 1975.

Therefore, when a friend of the Cantwell family was on the train to Mt. McKinley this spring she photographed the town from the train window. The same permanent buildings on one side of the tracks and on the other several modern mobile homes, quite a contrast to the awesome beauty of the evergreens and glaciers.

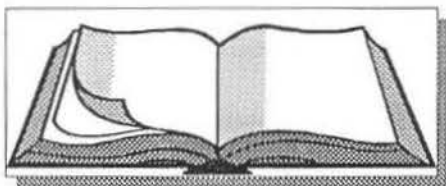

Only 18 states (by law) registered vital records before 1900:

- Vermont (1779)
- Massachusetts (1842)
- New Jersey (1843)
- Connecticut (1859),
- Hawaii, Rhode Island Virginia (1853)
- Delaware (1861)
- Florida (1865)
- Michigan (1867)
- Arizona, Iowa, New Hampshire and New York (1880)
- Illinois (1887)
- Maine (1892)
- North Dakota (1893)
- Maryland (1898)

Other states have records before 1900 but they are incomplete. Errors occurred in these records and, since there wasn't a uniform reporting system, some events were never recorded. Early Americans were a religious people, however, and kept good church records. Much of this information can therefore be found in church records. (These records will be covered in a later lesson).



LAND RECORDS

A very important approach to family history is through land records. These records relating to the buying and selling of land yield bits of family and local history. Land records include deeds, mortgages, leases, liens, contracts, powers of attorney, releases, and notices of action, judgments, and decrees.

Much family history can be gleaned through a careful search of deeds. This is especially true in the case of an estate of a person who died without leaving a will. When real estate is involved it becomes necessary to "quiet the title." Such a file will give the names and residences of living children, as well as any children who may be deceased and the chil-

dren of the deceased children.

A deed often mentions relationships between the grantee and the grantor. It can also give you a clue as to where the seller moved if he wasn't able to sell the land before he had to move or if he bought it before he moved to the area.

There is a great deal that can be learned from land records—much more than just the legal description of the land. An informative article relating to land records is "Retracing the Trails of Your Ancestors Using Deed Records", *GENEALOGY BULLETIN*, no. 25, Jan-Feb 1995.

TAX RECORDS

If a person owned real or personal property, they had to pay taxes! Even if your ancestor wasn't a landowner, he still had to pay a personal property tax. These records often are not indexed and are hard to search but they can give you valuable information about your ancestor's financial and personal status. If a man is shown, as a taxpayer in 1815 but his wife is the payer in 1816, you have a clue as to when to look for a probate file.

PROBATE RECORDS

These are my personal favorite! Ask for a probate file, not just a will, because the complete file has so much more to offer. There is probably no source material more important in family history than probate files. They consist largely of wills and administrations and other documents relating to the settlement of the estate of the deceased or incompetent person. In a man's will he named his wife and children, or, if he did not leave a will, the court determined his heirs and distributed his estate to his widow and children. In either case, the family group was determined by sound legal evidence. A will is primary material and is presented in the first person, as though the testator was speaking directly to you and bonding generations past and present.

To properly evaluate the information found in a probate, it is neces-

sary to become familiar with the social conventions of the time. This is a lengthy study and too much to include here. Your Public Library will have books that explain such social conventions and there is a short but informative section on the subject in *KNOW YOUR ANCESTORS* by Ethel W. Williams, Ph.D. (Rutland, VT: Charles E. Tuttle Co., 1960).

NATURALIZATION RECORDS

There was no regulation of naturalization until 1906, when Congress established the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization.

Before 1906 naturalization was a matter for the courts.

The process of naturalization is quite cumbersome and the records have suffered because of it. The laws concerning naturalization changed many times so the records that are available depend on the era your ancestor immigrated.

Before 1906 naturalization was a court matter and records will be found on the court records. After 1906 many records can be found in the National Archives Branches or in the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

An excellent book on the subject is *LOCATING YOUR IMMIGRANT ANCESTOR* by James C. and Lila Lee Neagles (Logan, UT: Everton Publishers, Inc., 1975).

COURT RECORDS

These are very important records but are seldom used. Court records are divided into two categories—criminal and civil. Civil actions deal with the protection of individual rights and, generally speaking, every civil action has two parties: plaintiff and defendant.

Both civil and criminal court files are indexed. The United States court system is too lengthy to be discussed here but your public library will have helpful books.

DIVORCE RECORDS

A divorce is a matter for the courts. Information on the children

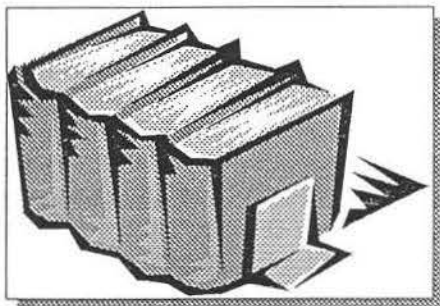

and their ages and personal data on the divorcing couple can be found in the file. In recent years many clerk of court offices have established a separate index for divorce records but earlier ones will be found in the civil court files.

MISCELLANEOUS RECORDS

- a. Register of voters
- b. Coroner's files
- c. Minutes of Board of Supervisors/Commissioners meetings.
 - These can be helpful to find someone who was buried "by the county" in the early years and doesn't have a death certificate or grave marker and for information on people who lived at the Poor Farm.
- d. Miscellaneous records pertaining to land.
 - These will sometimes give relationships.
- e. Military records
 - Discharge certificates
 - DD-214 (separation papers). Filing these records was up to the individual veteran so the records aren't complete.



WORDS AND TERMS USED IN PUBLIC RECORDS

- ABSTRACT** - A summary of the important points in a book or manuscript.
- ABTRACTOR** - A person who prepares an abstract.
- ABSTRACT OF TITLE** - An epitome of the successive conveyances and other facts upon which a person's title to a piece of land rests.
- ADMINISTRATION** - The management and disposal under the local

authority for an, estate of an intestate, or of a testator having no competent executor, under the local authority.

ADMINISTRATOR - A person to whom letters of administration, that has authority to administer the estate of a deceased person, have been granted by the proper court. He / She differs from an executor in that he is appointed by the court, while the executor is appointed by the deceased.

ADMINISTRATION W/ WILL ANNEXED - Administration granted where the testator has appointed no executor, or where his/her appointment of an executor, for any cause, has failed, as by death, incompetence or refusal to act.

ANTENUPTIAL CONTRACT - A contract made before marriage, between a man and woman in respect to their property rights.

APPLICATION, LAND - A formal request for rights in or eventual title to public lands.

ATTEST - To witness the execution of a written instrument, at the request of one who makes it, and subscribe to the same as a witness.

BEQUEST - A gift by will; a legacy.

BOUNTY LAND - Land given by the government, as a bounty, usually in compensation for military service.

BOUNTY LAND WARRANTS - A right granted for military service, involving a specific number of acres of unallocated public land.

CADASTRAL SURVEY, MAP OR PLAT - A public land survey for the purpose of registering the quantity, value, and ownership of real estate, used in apportioning taxes; usually made on a scale of 25" to the mile, or a square inch to the acre.

CODICIL - An instrument made subsequently to a will, and modifying it in some respects. It must be executed in the same manner as the will itself, and forms a part of it.

DEED - A sealed instrument in writing, duly executed, and delivered, by which one person conveys land, tenements, or here detements to another.

DEVISEE - A person to whom lands or other real property are devised or given by will.

DIVISOR - A giver of lands of real estate by will, a testator.

DISTRICT LAND OFFICE PLAT BOOKS - Books of maps which show the location of the land of the patentee.

DISTRICT LAND OFFICE TRACT BOOKS - Books that list individual entries by range and township.

DONATION APPLICATION - An application for frontier land in Florida, New

Mexico, Oregon or Washington, which was given to a settler and fulfilled certain conditions.

ETAL; ET ALIBI; ET ALII - And others, on a land deed, is a clue to look for "the others".

EXECUTOR - A person appointed by a testator to carry out the directions and requests of his/her will, and to dispose of the property according to his/her testamentary provisions, that are to be carried out after his/her death. An EXECUTRIX is a female executor.

GRANT - To give or bestow, as a land grant.

GRANTEE - A person to whom a grant is made.

GRANTOR - A person by whom a grant is made.

HOLOGRAPHIC WILL - A will made in the handwriting of the testator.

INTESTATE - Not having made a will; not disposed of by will.

INVENTORY - A list of the assets in the estate of a deceased person, filed by executor, or administrator of an estate, in probate court.

LAND ENTRY PAPERS - Papers filed in connection with the acquisition of public lands, and including

bounty land warrants, donation, preemption and homestead applications, private land claims, land scrip and purchase by cash or in installments. They include the name of the person who acquired the land, his place of residence, dates when application and land were entered, and date of patent.

LEGACY - A bequest left by last will and testament.

LEGAL DESCRIPTION - The description and identification, and location for a particular parcel of land, according to the official plat of survey.

LIBER - A book in which deeds, mortgages, will's and other public records are kept.

NUNCUPATIVE WILL - An unwritten will, having been declared or dictated by the testator in his/her last sickness, before a sufficient number of witnesses, and afterwards reduced to writing.

PATENT - A document that transfers legal title to public lands.

PATENTEE - A person who receives a patent.

PRE-EMPTION APPLICATION - An application by a person who had already settled on UN appropriated land.

PRIVATE LAND CLAIM - A claim to land granted to individuals from foreign countries prior to the cession of that land to the United States. These claims were in:

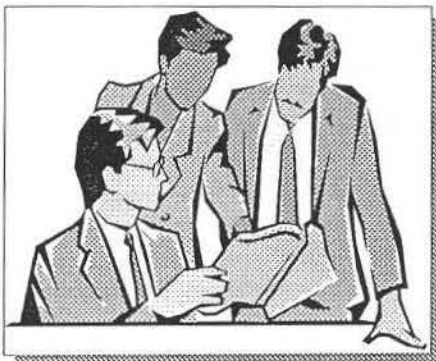
TESTATE ESTATE - An estate which is disposed of by a will.

TESTATOR - A deceased person who died leaving a will.

TRACT BOOK - A narrative, journal-like record which is an index to and digest of all essential actions and transactions which effect public lands. District Land Office Tract Books list entries by range and township.

WARRANT - guaranteeing to a purchaser or other grantee, the title to, or quality or quantity of, the thing sold or granted, as a warranty deed.

WILL - Any legally executed instrument in which a person makes disposition of his/her property to take effect after his/her death.



LESSON 4

Federal, State and Territorial Records

The Federal, State, and Territorial records are a mixture of primary and secondary resources. Some records have been indexed and are easy to use -- others will have to be read page by page to find what you want. Some are in good, usable condition and are filed in boxes and/or micro-filmed others are fragile, dusty and not filed in an orderly fashion. Whichever applies to the records you use, you are guaranteed an interesting journey!

TERRITORIAL RECORDS

State, county and other local records accumulated during the territorial period and preserved in county courthouses and state archives are NOT included in these records, except, if for some reason, the documents were forwarded to Washington and then became a part of the Federal Archives.

These territorial records include petitions and memorials sent, year after year, by the inhabitants of the territories for redress of grievances or change of government. Attached to these petitions are long lists of names of subscribers, reproduced from the originals in the files of the Senate, the House, and National Archives. These names are almost like a census, although not complete.

Ten states have published their Territorial Papers:

- Alabama - 1 volume
- Arkansas - 3 volumes
- Florida - 1 volume
- Illinois - 2 volumes
- Louisiana - 1 volume (under title of Orleans Territory)
- Michigan - 3 volumes
- Mississippi - 2 volumes
- Missouri - 3 volumes
- Ohio - 2 volumes
- Tennessee - 1 volume (under title of Southwest Territory)

Wisconsin - 1 volume
Northwest Territory - 2 volumes

I searched the on-line catalog of the University of Minnesota and found several of these books listed, so, if you are interested, your state university is a good place to start. Other possibilities would be local colleges and the state historical library.

STATE RECORDS

State Archives begin with the date of admission of the state to the Union. Some states have published guides to their state archives and historical library that can be very helpful.

County boundary changes will be found here because they involved legislative action. Other useful records that might be found here are land grants, early marriage records, newspapers, militia muster and pay rolls, pensions, immigration and naturalization records, tax lists, biographical materials, and, of course, census returns. Some states have programs of gathering county records into the state archives.

Some state archives have material available on states other than their own. (The Minnesota Historical Center in St. Paul has a good collection on the eastern states because that is where the residents of Minnesota lived before they moved west). Check with the state historical society of your state of interest to learn what records they have available for researchers.

Some states took a census in the years between the Federal census.

These were often taken during the years ending in 5 -- other states chose other years. These census returns vary from a statistical count of people (no names, just numbers) to returns that are very helpful and contain information not found in Federal returns. These returns can be helpful in tracking a family between the Federal census years. Some states have returns that extend into the 1920s. Information on State census returns can

be found in *THE SOURCE* (edited by Arlene Eakle and Johni Cerny; Salt Lake City, UT: Ancestry Publishing Co., 1984 -- a 1997 edition is now available) and in other genealogical how-to-do-it books.

(In this section I have used the terms "state archives" and "state historical society/library" interchangeably because they are most often found in the same building.)



FEDERAL RECORDS

The National Archives in Washington, DC is the "great public record office" of the United States! There you will find records from 1775. Earlier/Colonial records will be found in the individual states. Genealogical records in the National Archives comprise only 1% of all their records but these are used by 95% of all researchers.

CENSUS RECORDS

The first Federal census was taken in 1790 and one has been taken every ten years since then. The latest return open for public use is 1920. Information from later years can be obtained for a fee to determine age for Social Security, etc.

Many of the census returns have been indexed. 1880, 1900 and 1920 have a Soundex, a numerical index compiled by "sound" of the name, no how it is "spelled." The 1880 Soundex lists only families with children age ten or younger. Several states have made an index to the 1880 census that includes everyone, however. Only a few of the 1910 states have a Soundex.

Returns from 1790 through 1840 are a "head of household" enumeration. Only the name of the head of the household is listed and sex and age count other family members. 1850 is the first year that every household member was named. Each successive year gives more information about the people. The 1890 census burned but the veterans' schedules survived. This is helpful if

you had someone who served in the Civil War.

In several years specialized schedules were made:

1885—A law was passed stating that states could take a census in this year and be partially reimbursed by the Federal government. Some frontier states, Colorado, Florida, Nebraska, and the territories of Dakota and New Mexico (including Arizona) did this.

1850-85—*Mortality Schedules*. These schedules list deaths that occurred 12 months prior to the census (i.e. 1 June 1849 through 31 May 1850). These schedules are helpful because vital records were not yet being kept in most counties.

1840, 1890—*Veterans' Schedules*. The 1840 schedule records veterans of the Revolutionary War and War of 1812 (this one has been published) and the 1890 schedule lists the Civil War veterans and an occasional 1812 veteran.

1850-60—*Slave Schedules*. In these two years slaves were list separately by name. In the years before 1850 they were recorded as a statistic.

1840-1910—*Agriculture Schedules*. These give you an insight into the property owned crops and livestock produced by your ancestor.

1810-20, 1850-70—*Industry Schedules*. These schedules gave the type of company, number of employees, annual production, etc.

1880-80—*Social Statistics*. These schedules list: 1) cemetery information, 2) trade societies, lodges, clubs and other groups, and 3) churches.

1880, 1885-1940, 1898-1906 (a card index), 1910-1939 (Indian School census)—*Native Americans*—Information in these schedules varies but are a good source if you have Native American ancestry.

Many of these special schedules have been indexed, some have been published. Microfilmed copies are available from the National Archives, Family History Libraries, and, often, from the state historical society.

There is much more to be found on a census return than just the

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names, ages and birthplaces of your ancestors. Other things you should look for are persons with the same surname living in the county or just over the county or state line, persons with a different surname living in the same household as your ancestor, data on your ancestor's neighbors. You need to study the census for migration patterns and neighborhood patterns. Take time to *STUDY* a census return.



Archives are for Washington, DC, 1802-1926. records.

MILITARY RECORDS

The National Archives has military service records from 1775-1912 that include the American Revolution, War of 1812, Indian Wars after 1817, Mexican War, Civil War (Union side and captured Confederate records), and Spanish-American War. Later military records are available from the National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis, MO. There has been a fire at

the NPRC, however, and not all records survived.

When ordering a military file from the National Archives, first order a pension or bounty land file. These will give you the most personal information. Secondly, you can order a military file. This will tell you about battle's engaged in, wounds, AWOL, etc. A pension, bounty land or military file will cost \$10.00/each.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES RECORDS

There are so many things available from this "great public record office" That it impossible to list them all here. Some things have been microfilmed and are available on inter-library loan. For other records you will have to search them in person or hire a researcher in the Washington, DC area.

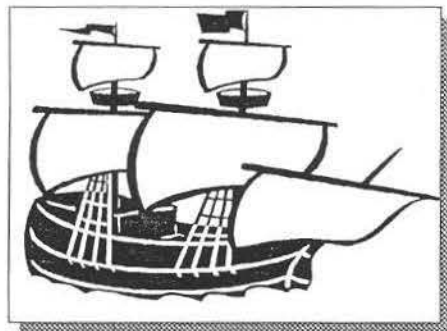
There is a good book on the National Archives, although in some respects it is out-dated: National Archives Trust Fund Board, **GUIDE TO GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES** (Washington, DC: National Archives and Research Service, 1982). Your public library should have a copy.

There is also a free booklet, **AIDS FOR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH**, available from: National Archives Trust Fund Board, Publication Services (NEPS), Room 1W1, Washington, DC 20408. There are also several catalogues available that give the order numbers of the microfilmed

SHIPS PASSAGE LIST

To search these records you *MUST* have a date. There were hundreds of ships coming to American ports every year with thousands of persons immigrating on those ships. You don't realize how many names you have to plow through until you start a search! Not everyone immigrated through *Castle Garden* or *Ellis Island*. Many other east and southern coast cities also had immigrants coming through their ports and others immigrated through Canada.

Until recent years these records were not indexed, but now there are several projects working on indexing. Microfilmed records are available at the National Archives and Family History Libraries.

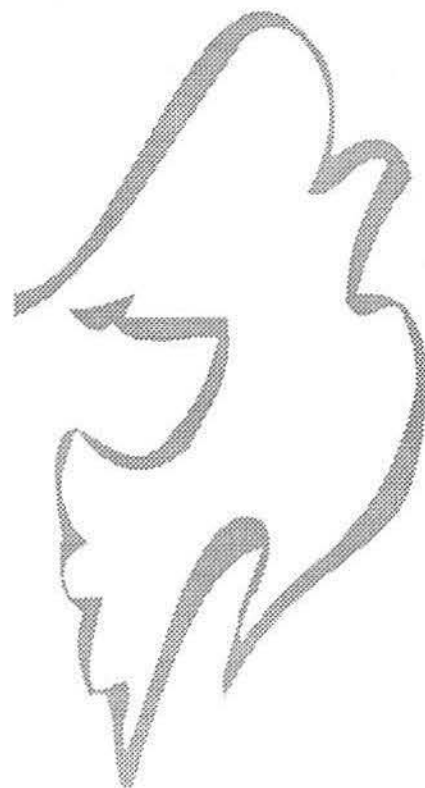


NATURALIZATION RECORDS

Before 1906 these records are in the individual counties—after 1906 they are in the county where the oath of allegiance was taken or in the *Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, DC*. The only naturalization records at the Nation

The Birth of Carthage

In 1786 the office of land commissioners was created and given the power to sell unappropriated lands of New York State. This brought about the land speculators to seek out land. In a treaty between the Oneidas and the US at Fort Stanwix, Oneida County, NY—October 22, 1784. The Oneidas, a branch of the Iroquois, were hunters of the Black River basin, from the southern Adirondacks to Lake Ontario.

Some of the first to scuff up this fertile land was Alexander Macomb, a fur trader who formed a land company Daniel McCormick and William Constable. He purchased the tract which today would include all of Jefferson (except Tibbets Point and Penet's Square), Lewis, St. Lawrence and parts of Oswego and Franklin Counties. William Constable conveyed 210,000 acres to Peter Chassanis, a French aristocrat of Paris, on March 25, 1793. This Castorland tract consisted of the Black River basin between High Falls, now known as Lyons Falls in Lewis County, northerly to Jefferson County.

They established a hamlet on the east bank of Black River at Long Falls, now Carthage. James LeRay de Chaumont, a brother-in-law of Chassanis and an agent for the French Company, eventually got control of a large portion of this purchase.

Two of the earliest French emi-

grants to settle in Long Falls were Henry Boutin and Jean Baptiste Bossout in 1789. Henry had purchased 1,000 acres on the east shore at the head of Long Falls. He began clearing this land, but two years later was swept to death in this mighty Black River. His land was passed to Vincent LeRay, the son of James. Jean Baptiste Bossout, then the sole inhabitant of Long Falls, operated a Ferry and Inn for travelers. Washington Irving, the creator of

Rip Van Winkle, and Judge William Cooper, father of James Fennimore Cooper were early guests of this Inn.

Following the French were the New Englanders, the true pioneers, not having the prosperity, yet prepared to

face the rigorous elements of pioneering. They brought agriculture and craft ingenuity's along with their friendly social habits. As more settlers came, necessity of roads for land travel in this rapidly expanding section.

The town of Champion was established in 1800 with the ham-

let of West Carthage soon to follow. In 1802 William Hadsall and John Eggleston started the first saw mill in the town of Champion. A grist mill was built in West Carthage by David Coffeen in 1806.

On November 20, 1804 a meeting of delegates from each surrounding town would meet at the house of Freedom Wright in the town of Denmark. Two new counties were chopped away from Oneida, being Lewis and Jefferson.

In 1804 Daniel Gould became the first mail carrier from Utica to Brownville. Later Barambas Dickinson of Denmark started a carriage coach along this route. Industry started to boom in this area as saw mills, grist mills, leaching tubs and pot ash ovens began to sprout up.



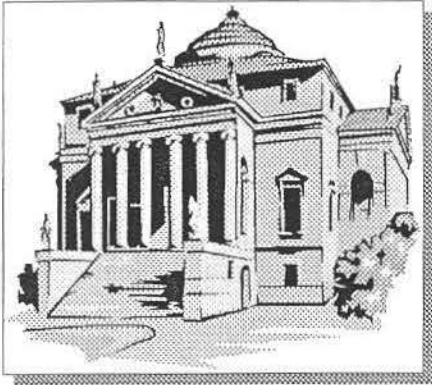
The hard working New Englanders needed money to barter with, to pay taxes, buy tools, livestock etc. This was done through selling their produce and timber in exchange for money. The Embargo of 1807 aimed at the British Empire, hurt the hard working settlers as they lost their only means of getting money to pay taxes etc. They desperately attempted to break this embargo. A trail from Brownville to Fisher's Landing came to be known as the Embargo Road because the traffic on it was mostly embargo breakers. This Embargo was one of the



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chain of events that led to the War of 1812. In 1816 the growing season was cut short due cold weather. Many settlers were forced to leave this area as they were unable to meet their payments so their mortgages were foreclosed.



In 1818 the first Library was opened in Carthage and the following year the St. James Church was founded. Also, circa 1819, the tanning mills would start to blossom and bog iron was discovered. In 1823 Madam la Barrone de Ferret, who arrived in this area from France seven years prior, erected a home, "The Hermitage", on the bank of the Black River in DeFeriet. This mansion would host Joseph Bonaparte, who purchased a large tract of land in the town of Wilna and Diana. He stayed in Natural Bridge for two summers.

By the mid 1820's it was foreseen the need to expand the forty plus miles of navigable waterway of the Black River to connect with the Erie canal systems. In 1825 Governor DeWitt Clinton proposed the project. In 1828, the first Black River Canal Company was incorporated but folded within three years. In 1830 a second company incorporated and it failed also. The first steamboat would be traveling the Black River in 1832. Under an act in 1836 work commenced on the Black River Canal System connecting it to the Erie Canal. It was

opened in 1850 but not completed until 1855. Portions of these locks can be seen yet along Route 12 south toward Utica.

In 1830, Tannery Island gained its name as Walter Nimocks and Allen Peck started a tannery there. This island is one of the many in the Black River's Long Falls waterway at Carthage. By 1831, James P. Hodgkins and Calvin Auburn had built a small foundry on State Street, later moving it to Tannery Island. A nail works and grist mill was added to the saw mill on Guyot Island, another small island in Carthage. A iron smelting furnace that was built by LeRay was turned over to Joseph C. Budd and William Bones.

The community's first newspaper, "The Carthaginian", a Whig bi-weekly began print in 1839. Hiram McCollom made an agreement with James Hodgkins erecting a foundry on Furnace Island to supply castings for his rolling mill and nail works. McCollom also erected a cotton factory in 1849 and in 1852 opened the first bank.



This prospering hamlet would have its first catastrophe July 15, 1861 when fire broke out at J. T. Walsh's store on State St. between Brown's Hotel and the Baptist Church. The village was nearly destroyed.

The birth of the steel tracks would put this village back in the running in the industry circle. Pulp and Paper plants would start

popping up like the Great Bend Company, which began manufacturing straw board in 1868. The First National Bank was opened for business January 1, 1880.

On October 20, 1884 the second great fire swept the village. Unlike the first fire, this one would start on the west side of the river with ash flying to the east shore igniting buildings there. The entire village was destroyed. Like the calm after the storm the next decade would take gigantic industrial strides.

Pulp and Paper mills like The West Carthage Works, founded by Defendorf in 1888, followed by Spicer and Son's in 1889 and West End Pulp and Casket Company, formed by a Dr. Robinson. In 1875, the Ball brothers, Wooster Orlin and William Drullard bought the Union Pulp Company's plant, renaming it the Black River Wood Pulp Company. In 1896 the Island Paper Company was established on Tannery Island by Peter Yousey and Augustus Maxwell. The following year, the Carthage Tissue Paper Company was formed by the Balls and James Outterson. In 1898, Outterson, Mark Wilder, John R. Coburn and Frank P. Wilder established the Sulphite Pulp Company.

The 1900's would see the arrival of the National Paper Products Company, a division of Crown Zellerbach in 1915. They bought the Carthage Tissue Mill from the Ball brothers in 1917 and later expanded its operation, purchasing the West End Casket Pulp and Casket Factory on the present day site of the James River Paper Company on West End Ave. James River bought this plant from Crown Zellerbach in the 1980's.

The Year 1856

The year just commenced, is the latter part of the 80th and beginning of the 81st year of the Independence of the United States; the 6569th year of the Julian period; the latter part of the 5616th and beginning of the 5617th year since the creation of the world according to the Jews; the 2609th year since the foundation of Rome according to Varro; the 2632nd year of the Olympiads; the later part of the 1272d, and beginning of the 1273d year of the twelve lunations since the Hegira or flight of Mahamet, which took place 16th July, A. D. 622.

The Alphonsine tables make this year the 7089th from the creation; the Greek church the 6362d, and some Eastern churches date it sixteen years later than the Greek church. The Chinese adopt the Sexagenary cycle, of which 60 cycles have now elapsed, their era commencing 2700 B. C., so they now deem themselves in the year 4555. The Talmud make this year 7200, the Septuagint 7757 and the Samaritan Pentateuch 6565.

Amid all the abstruse and painful calculations which have been made relative to the chronological progress of the world, the Christian era is

undoubtedly the most correct and authentic. According to that the world was created 5859 years ago; the deluge swept the earth 3511 years ago; and 2348 years before Christ, and we are now living in the year 1856, dating from the Christian era.—*Argus.*

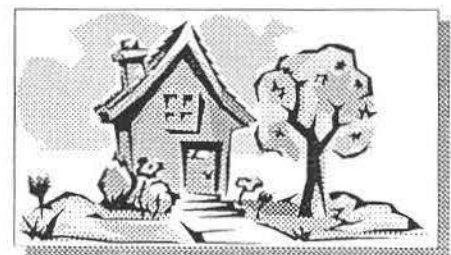

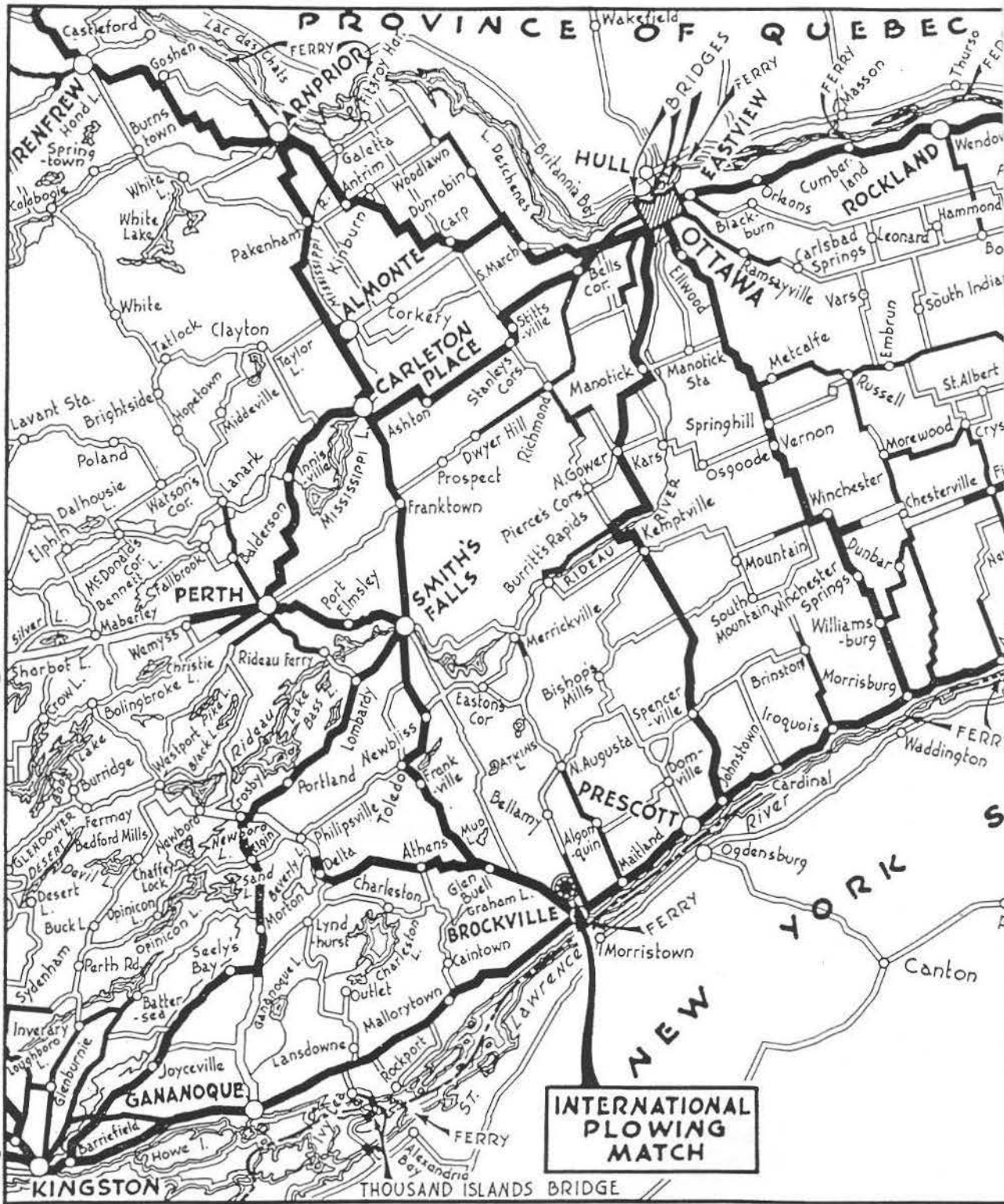

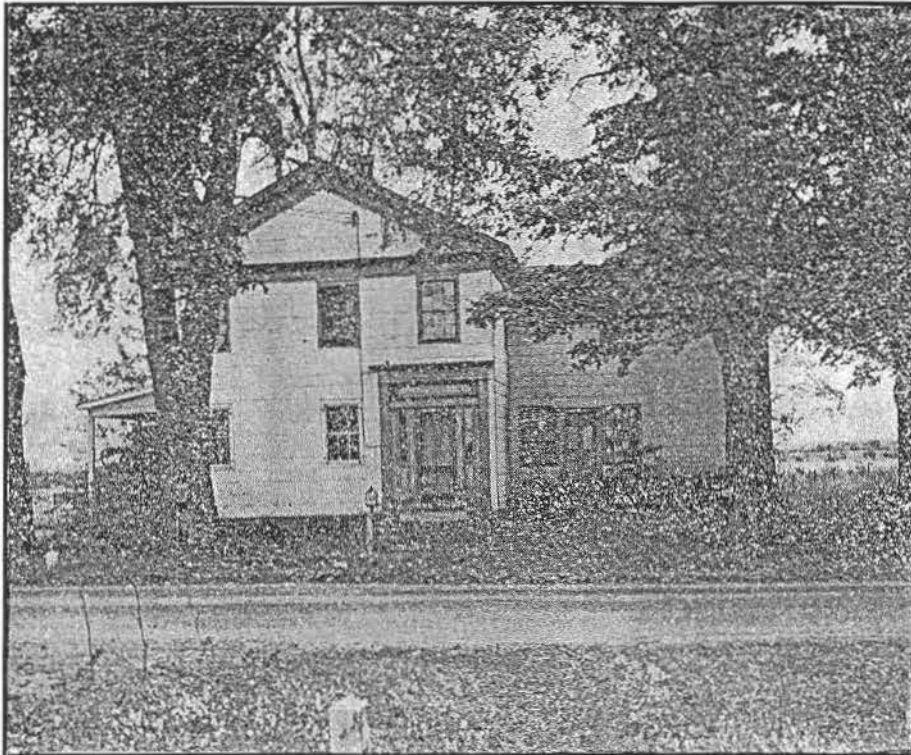

Alfred Kilborn House at Gunn's Corners #710

In spite of the fact that Gunn's Corners is now only a crossroads name on the map, where the Limerick-LaFargeville road intersects the Watertown-Clayton state highway, it has figured frequently in the news during the last century and a half. At one time there was a tavern, a store or two and a small cluster of houses at the corners. There the towns of Clayton, Brownsville, and Orleans came together, and just over the boundary in the southeast corner of the town of Clayton lies the house of Alfred Kilborn. Which is upwards of a century old.

Gunn's Corners got its name from John N Gunn, a veteran of the War of 1812 who settled in the town of Pamela sometime before 1819 and operated a store in Pamela Four Corners. On September 01, 1836 he bought 10.34 acres in the town of Clayton in the vicinity of the corner named for him and operated a store. Then on April 11 1842, he bought another plot of 16.4 acres nearby. His wife was the former Orra Moffitt. Their daughter, Jane, was married to Altheus J. Kilborn, who became a veteran of the Civil War serving in the 10th New York Heavy Artillery.

John N Gunn died at his home in the town of Clayton December 17 1850, at the age of 71.

Joel Kilborn, native of Plainfield, NJ, was the son of Jacob and Catharine Knapp Kilborn as were Alfred and Alpheus (twins) and Chauncey, Hannah and Lydia Kilborn.

Jacob Kilborn was a Revolutionary war veteran and was born at Litchfield, Conn., son of John Kilborn. Jacob Kilborn was one of the earliest settlers of the town of Brownville, having established himself there in 1805. Later he settled in the town of Clayton, where he died May 17, 1851, at the age of 81. In 1796 he married Catharine Knapp of Adams, Mass. She died in 1864.

Their son, Alfred Kilborn, was born at Adams Mass., on Sept 23 1798. He was young when his parents moved to the town of Brownville. In February 1838, Alfred married Eliza E Cobb, the daughter of Samuel and Esther Hildreth Cobb of Town of Orleans.

Just when Alfred Kilborn bought this house and its 141 1/2 acres of farmland at Gunn's Corners is not

known. Nor does it immediately appear from whom he purchased it, but on August 24, 1865 he sold it for \$3,000 to his nephew, John H. Kilborn, who resided there and operated the farm until his death on June 21 1878. Under the provision of his Will executed three days before his death, his widow, Helen Isabelle Kilborn, was to have all of his personal property including the avails of his Pamela Four Corners property, and life use of the Gunn's Corner house and farm. After her death it was to go to members of the Kilborn family, if she died without children.

Accordingly on Feb 18 1886, John H. Kilborn's aunt, Mrs. Asaph (Lydia) Green of Chilton, WI. quit-claimed her interest in the old house and farm to William P Smith of Brownville. On March 12 1887, Alpheus J. and Jane E Kilborn and Frances E. (Kilborn) Steele also quick-claimed their interest to Mr. Smith.

William P Smith, native of the town of Brownville, was tied in with the Kilborn family through marriage. He first married Clara Lounsbury of Niagara Country, and had one son who died in 1878. He then married Mrs. Belle Kilborn of the town of Clayton; daughter of Lewis and Helen Cramer Lawton Mr. Smith was a successful Perch River area farmer. Mr. Smith was a Civil War veteran and Mrs. (Belle Lawton Kilborn) Smith's grandfather Hezekiah Lawton, fought in the War of 1812 Battle of Sackets Harbor.

On October 15, 1924, William P Smith and His wife Belle disposed of this old house and farm of 141 1/2 acres to Leslie Landon of the Town of Orleans. Mr. Landon resided there until his death at the age of 78, on December 27, 1952, his wife having died there April 15 1950.

Mr. Leslie Landon was born September 19 1874, on Wells Island, son of Augustus and Harriet Duclon Landon. On April 6 1895, he married Mary Ann Constantine a native on London, England. They resided on Wells Island until they bought the Kilborn farm. The farm went to their children, Norman H Landon of Gunn's Corners and Mrs. Hanley (Bertha) Cuppernell of Fisher's Landing. The house was credit as being one of the fines old Georgian houses of the county.

The June meeting of the Jefferson County Genealogy Society was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by President Helen McDonald at the Dillenback room of Flower Memorial Library with 42 members and guests present. President welcomed the many new visitors. Minutes of the May meeting were read and approved. 30 members and guest were present at the May meeting.

The Treasurer's report: Funds as of tonight \$1,710.19, and a 323 count for current membership.

Several members have been working on the newsletter. More material is still needed so that enough for future issues is at hand. If members have material from churches, fraternal organizations, lighthouses, anything found in historical societies, museums and family Bible records, please communicate with the newsletter committee.

Work on the 1850 census continues. Betty Farr took Town of Rutland to correct.

Website: feature for the month of June is "Where to find things in Jefferson County" and "How to use the Website."

Julie Gosier: Reported that Ben Cobb, working at the Jefferson County Clerk's office as records custodian, is planning an open house program for next summer to show the public what records the County Clerk's office has, and how to use them.

Betty Farr now has Evangelical Protestant (Lutheran) Church Register of the members of the German, French and American Congregation of New Wirtemberg, Leraysville, Evans Mills, German Settlement, Pamelaia, and La-Fargeville in Jefferson County and Colosse in Oswego County, from 1831 to 1867. Charles Denninger was pastor in 1831. Judy Pierce obtained permission to copy the church records from the Lutheran Church in Redwood.

Clancy Hopkins has been asked

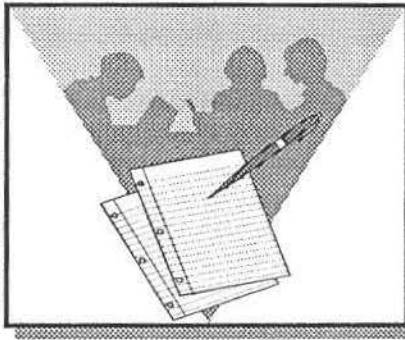

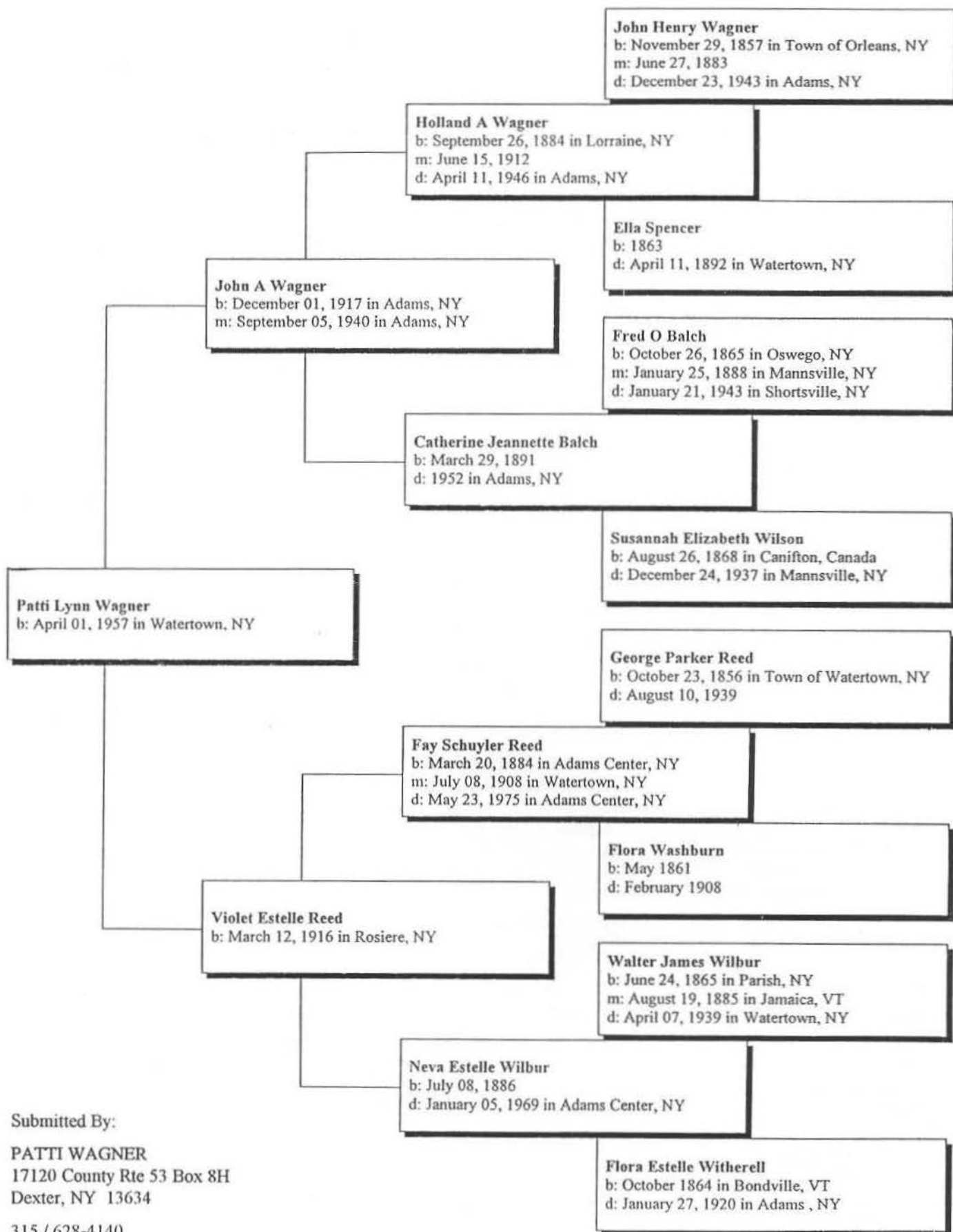

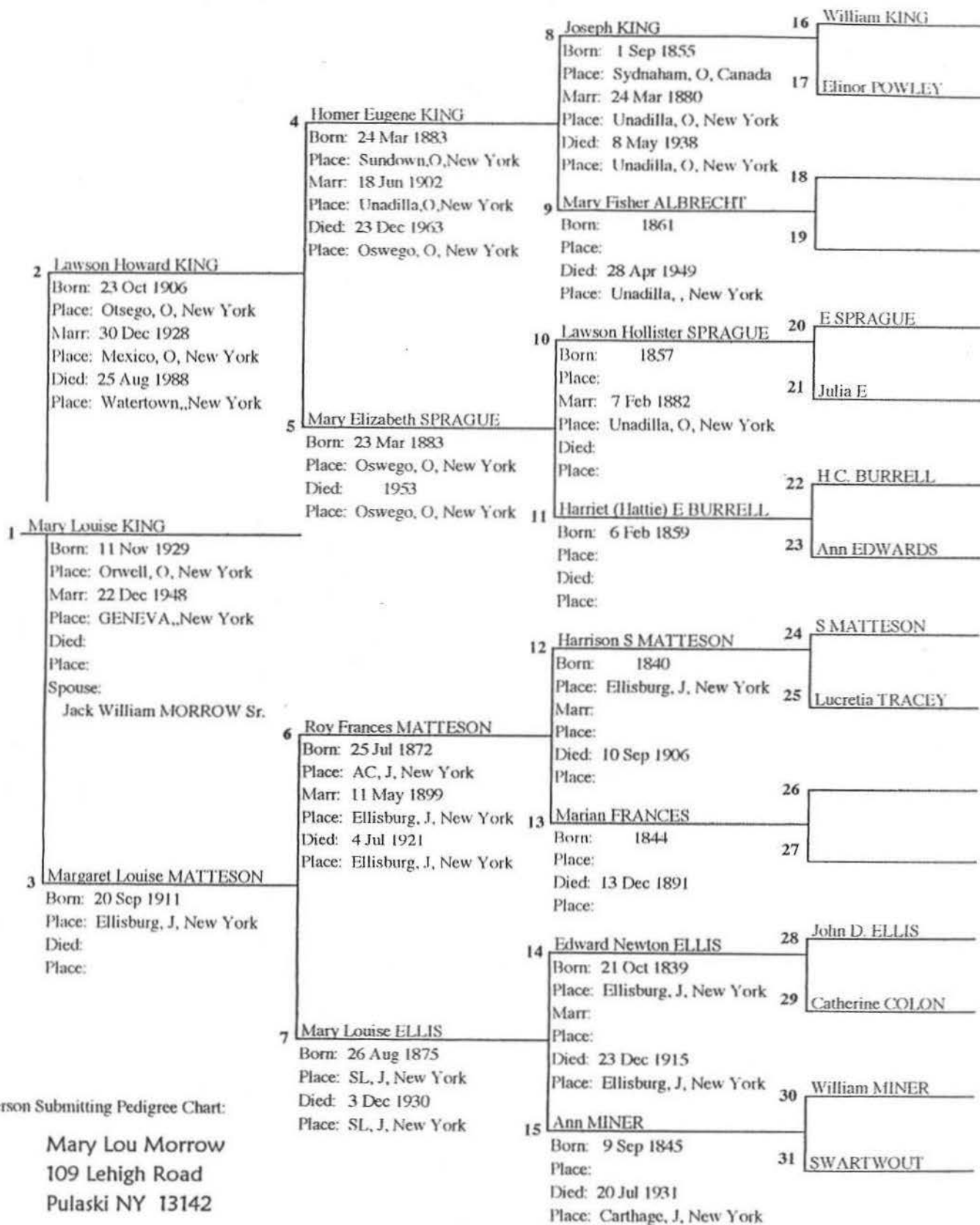

to administer the Society's business.

LESSON 5

CHURCH CEMETERIES AND SCHOOL RECORDS

Church Records

Church records are some of the best genealogical records since they can pre-date vital records by as much as 200 years. They are among the most under-used records, however, because it is often difficult to determine in which denominational records to search. There are hundreds of denominations in America, plus the fact that the religion now practiced by your family may not be the one practiced by your ancestors.



It is helpful to know some of the historical background of your ancestor's church to help you to determine what type of records might be available for research. There were two types of churches in Europe: the state church and free or "gathered" churches:

State Churches were the established church and considered every Christian in the state or kingdom a member.

Free or Gathered Churches rejected this inclusive view of belonging from birth and only those who were "born again" were considered members. These were the Anabaptists (baptized again) which included Mennonites, Hutterites, and many smaller groups associated with the Pennsylvania Dutch, and Baptists.

Because Anabaptists saw the most important event in a person's life as their rebirth/rebaptism, their records reflect this view and don't

show any information on a member until the rebirth/rebaptism as an adult. In contrast, those denominations that descend from the State church (Lutheran, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Congregational, Reformed, and Roman Catholic) record an infant's birth and baptism. In the state church the pastor/priest was a quasi-public official who was the recorder of births, marriages, and deaths. Before the American Revolution these estab-

FORGOTTEN POSTOFFICES

Monday, 11 June 1934 — p. 15, col. 4, 5

"XIII. On June 15, 1832 a post route was established by the United States to start from Watertown and go to Brownville and thence through the country to reach LaFargeville, Cornelia at the mouth of French Creek, Depauville and back to Brownville, Cornelia, at the mouth of French creek, is now Clayton.

The government decided to use the name of Perch River, the post office was designated at Moffattville, now a forgotten name.

Isaac and Melvin Moffatt came to the rich land along Perch River at an early date and made a settlement. Isaac Moffatt opened a tavern and a little later his son, also named Isaac, opened a store. There was quite a settlement there at the time of the War of 1812. A fort, built for protection in 1812 was used as a store house for grains. In the year 1837 the building was torn down. One gets an idea of the very early date in which settles located in and near Perch River when they recall that just two miles out of the village in what was for years known as the Baptist church neighborhood, the settlers had formed a church society on 7 Sep 1806, which was the first church society formed in the town of Brownville. It is stated that Oliver Bartholomew was one of the charter members and it was he who helped to found the Baptist church in Watertown. The church building, of stone, was erected in 1827.

Among the leading business men of Perch River were Smith and Spicer, who conducted a store and also carried on a very extensive potash business in the early days. Men were sent out with teams to buy up the ashes from the surrounding country and bring it into Perch River. The ashes were converted into potash. Silas Spicer, father of Henry Spicer, was skilled in the tanning of leather and making shoes, so he opened a tannery at Perch River and also a shoe shop. The church at Perch River was erected in 1851. It being a Union church in which the Methodist, Universalist and Lutheran denominations were the leading promoters."

lish churches functioned as a state church in America. It was the writers of the Constitution who saw fit to separate church and state.

TYPES OF CHURCH RECORDS

Baptism/Christening—These records will, at least, give the name of the individual and date of baptism, but may include the date of birth or age, parents' names, residence and birthplace, and sponsors'/witnesses' names.

Marriage—These records can include the marriage date, names and ages of the couple, their birthplaces, current residences, parents' names and birthplaces, witnesses' names, where the wedding took place, and the pastor's name and residence.

Confirmation—These records are often overlooked as just a list of names but they can include the confirmation date, person's age, baptism date and place, parents' names, and interesting insights into your ancestor's study habits and learning abilities.

Funeral—Again, this record can be just a name, death and/or funeral date and place of burial, but can also include age, place of birth and parents' or spouses' name.

Membership List — If these records are kept up-to-date, they are a good source for finding when a family moved into and out of a community.

Communicant List — These records would be similar to the Membership List, but it might be easier to track an individual on this list. If one member of a couple suddenly ceases to commune, does that mean a death has

occurred.

Finding the church records can be a challenge! There were often church mergers or splits and where the records went may not be easy to determine. Circuit riding pastors took the records with them so they can end up in quite unexpected places!

If you find the records in a church, you may be able to go there to search them. You should call ahead to set an appointment with the pastor or parish secretary. This is especially important in a small country church because the pastor may not keep regular office

hours.

A lot of church records are being published in various periodicals or books or are being collected into the denomination's archives and microfilmed. You may be able to borrow these microfilms for a fee. Some will allow you into the archives to view the films and other resources. *(This would be comparable to researching in a library/archives as was discussed in Lesson 2. It is especially important to call ahead to determine hours, and availability of records, since these archives don't always maintain regular hours, and have limited room and equipment for researchers.)*

There is a listing of denominational archives in **THE SOURCE**, edited by Arlene Eakle and Johni Cerny (Salt Lake City, Utah: An-

cestry Publishing, 1984 or the new just-out edition). If you don't have access to THE SOURCE, I can send you the address of the archives you need.

CEMETERY RECORDS

Grave Markers or cemetery records are sometimes the only records available on an individual, especially a child. There are four types of cemeteries:

Church Burial Yard—Most churches until World War II were constructed on a lot large enough to accommodate a cemetery, both country and city church. Then the need for land became more pressing and burial grounds moved to the suburbs. Sometimes the graves were moved and sometimes not.

Public / Municipal Cemeteries—These are maintained by a city, county, village, town or township.

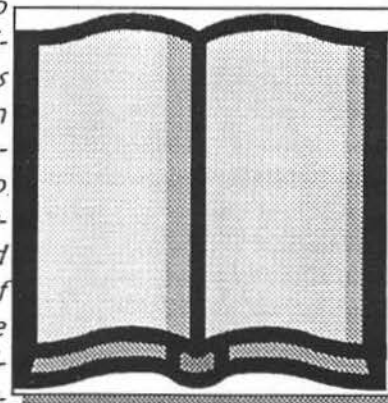
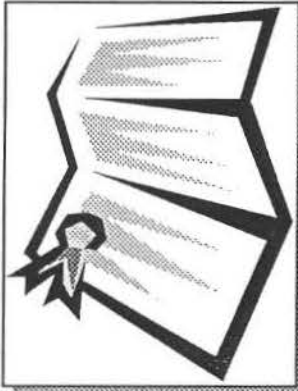
Family Burial Plots—These were common in the 19th century and earlier but has disappeared in the 20th century. Many are unknown and are hidden on property formerly owned by the family. If such a plot can be found, it can be a wonderful source of information.

Commercial Memorial Parks—These commercial, non-sectarian burial grounds have become popular since the mid-1940s.

TYPES CEMETERY RECORDS

Church Burial Registers—Churches, which have affiliated burial grounds usually, maintain records of interments. These records were mentioned in the

section on Church Records. Today, however, the church and cemetery may be separate entities with the cemetery keeping record of the burial and the church keeping record of the funeral.

Sexton/Superintendent Records—No matter what type of cemetery; there is most likely a board of officers, including a sexton/superintendent. This officer maintains a register of burials and plots available for sale.

Cemetery Deeds & Plats—These are legal documents describing the cemetery as a whole and each plot as it is sold. In the early days graves weren't dug in any order. Later, plats were drawn and attempts were made to record the location of these burials.

Burial Permits—Since the 1920s health departments have regulated burials. A licensed mortician must do burials.

Grave Opening Orders—Most cemeteries keep a record of all grave openings.

Family Bible—The family Bible can be a primary source (*sometimes the only source*) for a home burial. A Bible might still be in the hands of a family member or it may have been transferred to a museum or archives.

Monuments and Memorials—These can tell a story of the buried person if you study the placing of the stone, the ornaments and words engraved on it, and the condition of the stone. Several books have

been published about burial customs and the artwork on grave markers.

Funeral Home Records—These records are hard to find for early years and now they are often available only to relatives. The information used in a newspaper obituary and on the death the mortician usually submits certificate so that can be found in these records. Burial plot information can also be found here.

If you go to a cemetery to search for a specific burial, be systematic about your search so that you don't miss any markers. Rubbings can be made of the inscription on a marker to better read it. You should learn how to do a rubbing before going to the cemetery, however. Some things can be bad for the marker and the environment.

Be wary of an old date on a new stone. This can mean that the stone has recently been placed on the grave, so both the death date and birth date becomes secondary resources.

Tombstone data has been transcribed by many historical and genealogical societies. This data may have been published or is available for searching at the local historical or genealogical society library, public library, or, in some cases, at the court-

house.

SCHOOL RECORDS

The records for the one-room, rural school is hard to find. As

these schools were closed, the records were deposited with county and/or state repositories that may or may not have kept them.

A local historical society could be a good source of information on the location of school records.

Yearbooks, School Newspapers, Alumni Registers, Directories and Who's Who Volumes are good sources for College, University and Private School Research.

For any research in school records, you may encounter unavailability because of privacy laws.

LESSON 6

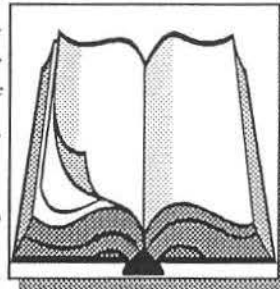
BITS AND PIECES

Finding your place in History

This part of doing your family history is often referred to as putting meat on the bare bones of statistics. It's making those names and dates come alive and become people.

What impact did your family have upon history and how were their lives affected by the history of the times in which they lived? You must revert your thinking to the era in which they lived, i.e. horse and buggy transportation, no telephones, television, radio, computers (!), and many other "conveniences" that we enjoy today. You must also become familiar with the national and regional history of the times in which they lived. Social customs were much different from what they are now. You might find it helpful to make a timeline of historical events and then insert your ancestors' births and deaths into the dates. (These

forms can be purchased from genealogical publishing houses).

Don't forget to write your own history! This is a very important item to be able to pass on to your children and grandchildren.

Here are some things for you to consider:

- 1) House/Place where I was born.
- 2) Circumstances that surround my birth.
- 3) Tell about my parents, brothers and sisters (include stories about them).
- 4) Childhood health conditions diseases, falls, and accidents).
- 5) Playmates and Amusements.
- 6) Religious practices.
- 7) Economic conditions. (Times when food and money were scarce).
- 8) Schools, Teachers, Studies.
- 9) My chores at home.
- 10) Sports that I took part in.
- 11) Courtship and Marriage.
- 12) My husband/wife. (How we met, why I love him/her).
- 13) Our children (what are the differences, traits, habits, character, talents, hobbies).
- 14) Our home(s). (Places where we lived, why we lived there).
- 15) Political Activity.
- 16) Good books that I have read and why I consider them good.
- 17) Recreation. (Singing, dancing, sports, etc.).
- 18) In my lifetime how many time have I moved and why.

- 19) Travel ad vacations.
- 20) Children.
- 21) What are my hopes for the future?

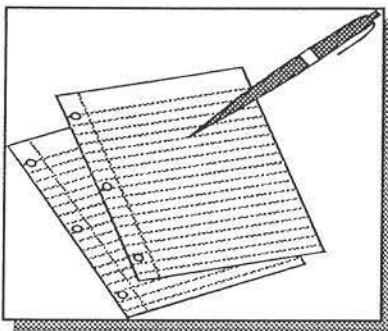
Write simply and to the point, like you are talking to someone.

Add pictures and remember to include dates.

How to Write YOUR History

The following is an exercise to help in writing your personal histories:

For 10 minutes write as fast as possible on



- 1) Yourself
- 2) List 25 things about yourself
- 3) What were you doing the day John Kennedy was shot, 2 Nov 1963?
- 4) What was your bedroom like as a

child?

You can write short things about yourself when you have a spare moment, over lunch, at the doctor's office, while waiting for service somewhere. Write as things come to you. Then, as you have more time, you can put it all together into your story.

HERALDRY

This is a very involved study and one for which there isn't time or space to pursue.

Each of the symbols and colors on a coat of arms has a meaning. Heraldry is very old and may date back to Biblical times as symbols for those who couldn't read.

Perhaps the most important

thing that can be said here about heraldry is that just because you find a coat of arms with your surname on it, it doesn't mean that you have the right to use it. Coats of arms were given to specific families and, unless you can prove your direct descent from that family, you shouldn't use the symbol. Using it without the right is the same as theft. In America there are no laws governing coats of arms but in foreign countries there are.

The mail-order places that offer you "Your Coat of Arms" are bogus too. My uncle sent for one several years ago. At the bottom of the sheet is this disclaimer: "This report does not represent individual lineage of the ___ family tree and no genealogical representation is intended or implied." My uncle thought it was ugly because it has snakes on it -- and I agree!

HEREDITARY SOCIETIES

Perhaps the best known of these is the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). Actually, there are quite a number of these types of organization and they fall into several categories: "War" Societies, Early Settler, Ship Societies, Colonial Societies, Nationality (Ethnic) Societies, Religious Societies, and Royal and Baronial Societies.

THE SOURCE edited by Arlene

Eakle and Johni Cerny (Salt Lake City, Utah: Ancestry Publishing, 1982) has a chapter that has a lengthy list. The National Society, First Families of Minnesota, *(a society with members whose an-*

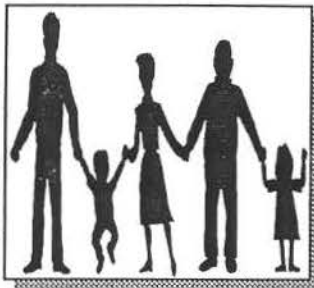

cestors were in Minnesota prior to statehood in 1858).

If you believe that you qualify for membership in a hereditary society, you must do your research very carefully and document each generation. Membership in a few is "by invitation only." Some people consider these societies "snobbish." Each of us has to consider why we do genealogy, and what membership in a hereditary society means to us.

FAMILY ASSOCIATIONS

Thousands of these have sprung up in the last 20 years! An association can start with someone publishing a genealogy of the family and then organizing a family reunion and then things just keep growing! Others have been organized for many years. Some associations publish a newsletter and/or a bulletin, but there is always the big yearly family reunion, some lasting two or three or more days. Several bibliographies of family associations have been published.



PUBLISHING

How are you going to share your research? This question would perhaps been better asked at the beginning of the classes because it should determine how you do your research and how much you are going to do. It is advisable to say to yourself that when I reach such-and-such a point, I will publish the material. If you wait until you are "done", you will never publish! Naming a certain point in your research as a goal is better than naming a certain date to be completed. Date deadlines are hard to meet in

genealogy! It is also advisable to take orders (and a deposit) before you publish. That way you won't be stuck with a lot of unsold books. Publishing can be done many ways:

- 1) Running off a few copies on a copy machine and putting the pages into an inexpensive binder of some sort. I don't really advise this method because paper that goes through a copier usually isn't good quality and won't withstand the years.
- 2) Have copies made in a print shop and have them professionally softbound or hardbound. Many print shops

now have high quality equipment that will give your finished product a very professional look. This could be expensive, however.

- 3) Find a print shop that specializes in short-runs of genealogy books. This is usually the most economical way to go.

It is important that acid-free paper is used so that your work will last. Some people use a three-ring binder for their book. Adding pages is easy using this method but make certain it is a good quality binder.

Many publishing companies advertise in the genealogical periodicals. Contact several of them for their prices and methods. Talk to your local printers and ask if they can meet the other companies' prices because it's always better to patronize a hometown business.

(I have printed two family genealogies using a print shop that specializes in short-run genealogy printing. All contacts have been via mail and telephone. I have never set foot in the place and I have been very pleased with their work.)

FOREIGN RESEARCH

It is *VERY* important that you do all your research in America before you try foreign research. Every foreign country has different. Records that are not well indexed (although they're getting better) and you must have an exact location before you "cross the water." If you don't know that exact location, careful research here can often find it for you or at least give you some very good clues.

It may not be necessary for you to travel to that foreign country. The Family History Library has a great deal of foreign records and there are several ethnic libraries that offer good research sources. There are books that have been published detailing research methods

and materials in foreign countries that can be helpful realize, too, that foreign research is more expensive but it's worth the cost when you make that connection!

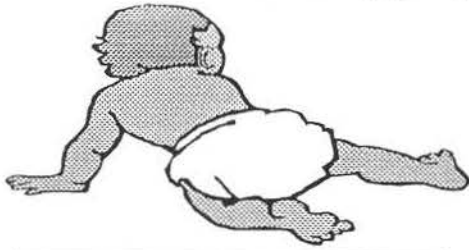

The policy will probably result in the complete disorganization of our fire company, and although our village has escaped the ravages of fire in a most remarkable manner, it now behooves our citizens to look well to this matter, and provide themselves with buckets, ladders, &c., to be kept expressly and exclusively for use in event of fires. Attention and care should also be given to the security of stove pipes and the disposal of ashes.

An appropriation of \$20 was made for firehooks and ladders. Cannot this amount be increased by voluntary contribution, and an efficient Hook & Ladder Company be at once organized? Something of this kind should certainly be done at once.

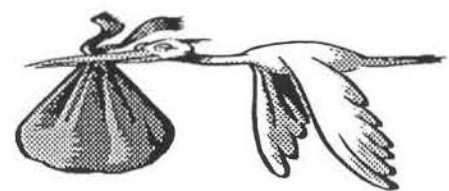

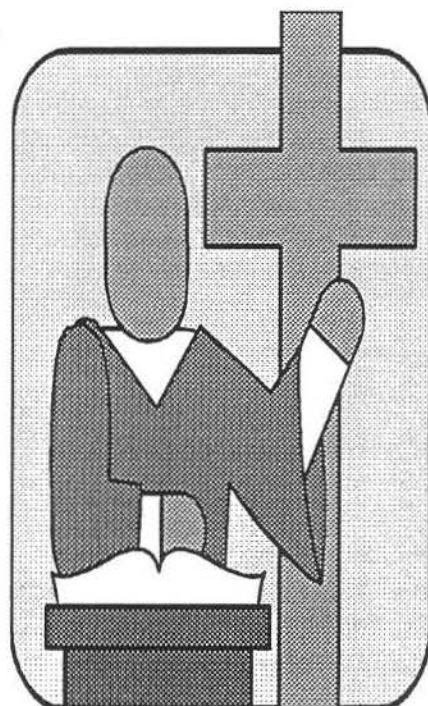

ABSTRACT—Summary of important points of a given text, especially deeds and wills.

ACRE—See measurements.

ADMINISTRATION (of estate)—The collection, management and distribution of an estate by proper legal process.

ADMINISTRATOR (of estate)—Person appointed to manage or divide the estate of a deceased person.

ADMINISTRATRIX—A female administrator.

AFFIDAVIT—A statement in writing, sworn to before proper authority.

ALIEN—Foreigner.

AMERICAN REVOLUTION—U.S. war for independence from Great Britain 1775-1783.

ANCESTOR—A person from whom you are descended; a forefather.

ANT—Latin prefix meaning before, such as in ante-bellum South, "The South before the war"

APPRENTICE—One who is bound by indentures or by legal agreement or by any means to serve another person for a certain time, with a view of learning an art or trade.

APPURTENANCE—That which belongs to something else such as a building, orchard, right of way, etc.

ARCHIVES—Where records are stored of a Government, Organization, and Institution.

ATTEST—To affirm to certify by signature or oath.

BANNS—Public announcement of intended marriage.

BENEFICIARY—Someone who receives benefit from a trust or property.

BEQUEATH—o give personal property to a person in a will. (noun—bequest.)

BOND—Written, signed, witnessed agreement requiring payment of a specified amount of money on or before a given date.

BOUNTY LAND WARRANT—A right to obtain land, specific number of acres of unallocated public land, granted for military service.

CENSUS—Official enumeration, list-

ing or counting of citizens.

CERTIFIED COPY—A copy made and attested to by officers having charge of the original and authorized to give copies.

CHAIN—See measurements.

CHATTEL—Personal property which can include animate as well as inanimate properties.

CHRISTEN—To receive or initiate into the visible church by baptism; to name at baptism; to give a name to.

CIRCA—About, near, or approximate—usually referring to a date.

CIVIL WAR—War between the States; war between North and South, 1861-65.

CODICIL—Addition to a will.

COLLATERAL ANCESTOR—Belong to the same ancestral stock but not in direct line of descent; opposed to lineal such as aunts, uncles & cousins.

COMMON ANCESTOR—Ancestor shared by any two people.

CONFEDERATE—Pertaining to the Southern states which seceded from the U.S. in 1860-61, their government and their citizens.

CONSANGUINITY—Blood relationship.

CONSORT—Usually, a wife whose husband is living

CONVEYANCE—See deed.

COUSIN—Relative descended from a common ancestor, but not a brother or sister.

DAUGHTER-IN-LAW—Wife of one's son.

DECEASED—Dead.

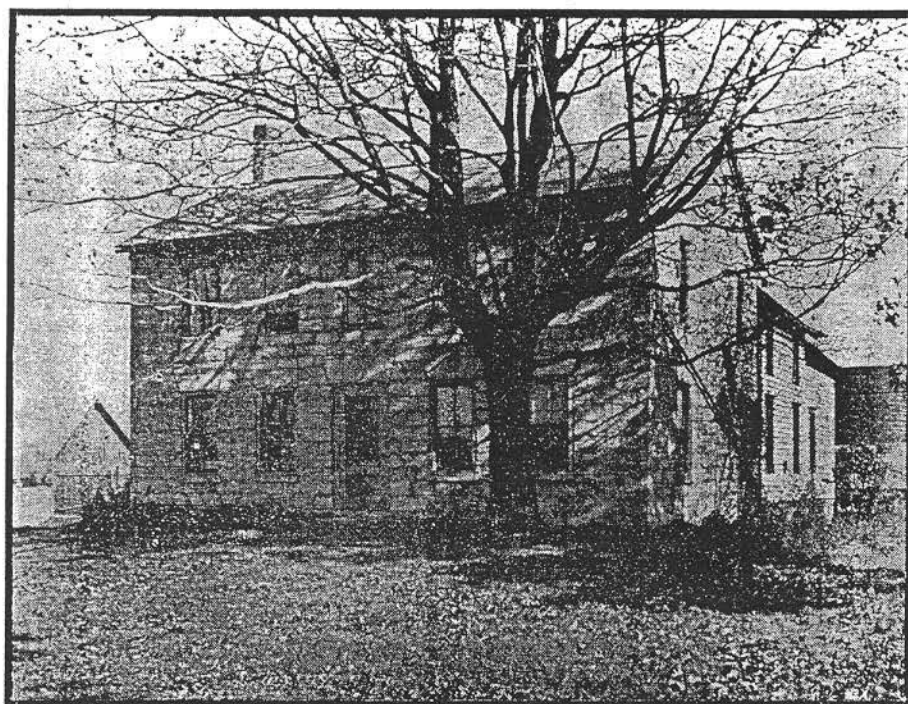
DECEDENT—A deceased person.

DECLARATION OF INTENTION—First paper, sworn to and filed in court, by an alien stating that he wants to be come a citizen.

DEED—A document by which title in real property is transferred from one party to another.

DEPOSITION—A testifying or testimony taken down in writing under oath of affirmation in reply to interrogatories, before a competent officer to replace to oral testimony of a witness.

Possibly the oldest stone house in the town of Pamela is one built by Simeon Woodruff in 1821. Simeon's first home was built of logs which later was replaced with native limestone. The house is located on the south side of the old military highway between Scovil's and Pamela Four Corners off the junction of the Perch Lake road.

Simeon Woodruff was one of Jefferson County's most historic figures.

In 1797 Simeon Woodruff married Rosanna Adams of Simsbury, Connecticut. Then in October 1799, with his brother Benjamin, he came up to explore the Black River country of Jefferson County. On March 5, 1800 he arrived, by oxen, with his family from Litchfield, Conn. where he started the "Woodruff Settlement" on the eastern outskirts of the commu-

nity. Simeon and Rosanna had twelve children. His son Felix Woodruff would become the first male child born in the county. Simeon's sons, Theodore and Jonah, are credited for inventing the sleeping cars and son Charles P. Woodruff owned and operated the brick yard near Huntingtonville, just east of Watertown.

Theodore Tuttle Woodruff's invention of the sleeping car was made by the Central Transportation Company and was later sold to the Pullman Company for a million dollars.

Son Jonah Woodruff was a portrait painter of many of the county's earliest notable residents, he also invented a sleeping car and he later became president of the Palaces Car Company of Philadelphia, PA. Many of Jonah's portraits still hang in the gallery of Jefferson

County Historical Society.

In 1804, Simeon Woodruff held the first Methodist class at his home.

Simeon and his family moved in 1817 to that part of Brownsville, which became the township of Pamela on April 12, 1819.

On March 7, 1820, at the first town meeting, he was given three town offices: assessor, highway commissioner and overseer for the poor.

When the Pamela Farmers Scientific Library was organized in April 1822, Simeon was chosen one of the first trustees.

In 1843 he left the stone mansions to reside in the city of Watertown.

Simeon Woodruff died, in Watertown, on September 5, 1853 at the age of 80. He is buried at Brookside Cemetery, section Q, lot #47. Rosanna died June 15, 1876 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John (Mary) Clark, Vineland, New Jersey and the age of 99 years, 1 month, and six days. She is buried beside Simeon.

The stone mansion became the property of Henry Brown of Brownville and still later to Alexander Brown.

On March 1, 1899 the stone house and 203 acres became the property of Anthony Ganter who on October 1, 1930 passed it on to his son Henry H. Ganter of Watertown.

This residence still is retained by the Ganter family as this publication goes to press.

- DEVISE**—Gift of real property by will.
- DEWISEE**—One to whom real property (land) is given in a will.
- DEVISOR**—One who gives real property in a will.
- DISSENER**—One who did not belong to the established church, especially the Church of England in the American colonies.
- DISTRICT LAND OFFICE PLAT BOOK**—Books or rather maps which show the location of the land patentee.
- DISTRICT LAND OFFICE TRACT BOOK**—Books which list individual entries by range and township.
- DOUBLE DATING**—A system of double dating used in England and America from 1582-1752 because it was not clear as to whether the year commenced January 1 or March 25.
- DOWER**—Legal right or share which a wife acquired by marriage in the real estate of her husband, allotted to her after his death for her lifetime.
- EMIGRANT**—One leaving a country and moving to another.
- ENUMERATION**—Listing or counting, such as a census.
- EPITAPH**—An inscription on or at a tomb or grave in memory of the one buried there.
- ESCHEAT**—The reversion of property to the state when there are no qualified heirs.
- ESTATE**—All property and debts belonging to a person.
- ET AL**—Latin for "and others".
- ET UX**—Latin for "and wife".
- ET UXOR**—And his wife. Sometimes written simply Et Ux.
- EXECUTOR**—One appointed in a will to carry out its provisions. Female—Executrix
- FATHER-IN-LAW**—Father of one's spouse.
- FEE**—An estate of inheritance in land, being either fee simple or fee tail. An estate in land held of a feudal lord on condition of the performing of certain services.
- FEE SIMPLE**—An absolute ownership without restriction.
- FEE TAIL**—An estate of inheritance limited to lineal descendant heirs of a person to whom it was granted.
- FRANKLIN, STATE OF**—An area once known but never officially recognized and was under consideration from 1784-88 from the western part of North Carolina.
- FRATERNITY**—Group of men (or women) sharing a common purpose or interest.
- FREE HOLD**—An estate in fee simple, in fee tail, or for life.
- FRIEND**—Member of the Religious Society of Friends; a Quaker.
- FURLONG**—See measurements.
- GAZETTEER**—A geographical dictionary; a book giving names and descriptions of places usually in alphabetical order.
- GENEALOGY**—Study of family history and descent.
- GENTLEMAN**—A man well born.
- GIVEN NAME**—Name given to a person at birth or baptism, one's first and middle names.
- GLEBE**—Land belonging to a parish church.
- GRANTEE**—One who buys property or receives a grant.
- GRANTOR**—One who sells property or makes a grant.
- GREAT-AUNT**—Sister of one's grandparent.
- GREAT-UNCLE**—Brother of one's grandparent.
- GUARDIAN**—Person appointed to care for and manage property of a minor orphan or an adult incompetent of managing his own affairs.
- HALF BROTHER/HALF SISTER**—Child by another marriage of one's mother or father; the relationship of two people who have only one parent in common.
- HEIRS**—those entitled by law or by the terms of a will to inherit property from another.
- HOLOGRAPHIC WILL**—One written entirely in the testator's own handwriting.
- HOMESTEAD ACT**—Law passed by Congress in 1862 allowing a head of a family to obtain title to 160 acres of public land after clearing and improving it for 5 years.
- HUGUENOT**—A French Protestant in the 16th and 17th centuries. One of the reformed or calvinistic communion who were driven by the thousands into exile in England, Holland, Germany and America.
- ILLEGITIMATE**—Born to a mother who was not married to the child's father.
- IMMIGRANT**—One moving into a country from another.
- INDENTURE**—Today it means a contract in 2 or more copies. Originally made in 2 parts by cutting or tearing a single sheet across the middle in a jagged line so the two parts may later be matched.
- INDENTURED SERVANT**—One who bound himself into service of another person for a specified number of years, often in return for transportation to this country.
- INFANT**—Any person not of full age; a minor.
- INSTANT**—Of or pertaining to the current month. (Abbreviated inst.)
- INTESTATE**—One who dies without a will or dying without a will.
- INVENTORY**—An account, catalog or schedule, made by an executor or administrator of all the goods and chattels and sometimes of the real estate of a deceased person.
- ISSUE**—Offspring; children; lineal descendants of a common ancestor.
- LATE**—Recently deceased.
- LEASE**—An agreement which creates a landlord - tenant situation.
- LEGACY**—Property or money left to someone in a will.
- LEGISLATURE**—Lawmaking branch of state or national government; elected group of lawmakers.
- LIEN**—A claim against property as security for payment of a debt.
- LINEAGE**—Ancestry; direct descent from a specific ancestor.
- LINEAL**—Consisting of or being in a direct line of ancestry or descendants; descended in a direct line.
- LINK**—See measurements.
- LIS PENDENS**—Pending court action; usually applies to land title claims.
