Towns of Jefferson County Series History of the Town of Orleans

RLEANS was formed from Brownville, 3 Apr 1821. A part of Pamelia was taken off 1 Apr 1829, and a part of Clayton in 1833. The boundary was between Orleans and Alexandria has twice been changed. It lies on the North border of the county, and embraces the West part of Wells and several smaller islands in the St. Lawrence River. The surface is level, or slightly rolling. The principal streams are Perch River, Catfish and Mullet Creeks. Perch Lake lies upon the South boundary. The soil is clay and loam.

LaFargeville,¹ (p.v.,) on Chaumont River, near the center of the town, is the seat of Orleans Academy. Pop. 295.

Omar,² (p.o.,) on Mullet Creek and **Stone Mills**,³ (p.o.,) are small villages.

Orleans 4 Corners, (p.o.,) Port Orleans and Collins Landing are hamlets.

Penets Square, which embraced most of this town, was settled by squatters.⁴ The first settlements commenced about 1806.⁵ In 1824, John de LaFarge, a large owner in these lands, came into town to assert his claim. After a great deal of difficulty and some resistance, he succeeded in establishing his title.

In 1838, Bishop Dubois purchased the mansion and farm of de LaFarge, 1 mile South of the village, as the site for a Catholic Seminary. This institution, named "St. Vincent de Paul," combined a theological seminary and classical boarding school, was soon open; but in two or three years it was removed to Fordham, Westchester County, and was afterward incorporated as St. John's College.

The British steamer Sir Robert Peel was plundered and burned on the night of May 29, 1838, while taking in wood at Wells Island, in this town, by a party of 22 self-styled patriots; led by Bill Johnston.⁶

Rock Island Lighthouse was built in 1853. And the census reports there were 8 churches.⁷

Penet Square is an integral part of the history of the Town of Orleans. In 1788 an Oneida Indian treaty ceded a tract ten miles square to Peter Penet "for services rendered." Penet gave his name to the land, but soon sold it. It passed through many purchasers before it came into the hands of John de LaFarge sometime between 1817 and 1823. Litigation clouded settlers' titles to their farms until 1830. Penet Square, as it is called, lay wholly within the original Town of Orleans, but when the Town of Clayton was formed, the new town included two fifths of Penet Square.

Settlement began, despite the legal squabbles, around 1806 by squatters, who took the land and developed their farms, knowing they had no real

title but hoping for the best. John LaFarge had little sympathy with the squatters, some of whom disputed his ownership. The first of the farmers was Roderick Frazier, who built his log cabin in 1806 about two miles north of what is now Stone Mills. Peter Pratt followed in 1807, making his clearing south of Stone Mills. Word of this "free land" spread in the Mohawk Valley, drawing many penniless settlers from that area. No record has been kept of them and when LaFarge demanded payment they left the area.

Dr. Reuben Andrus and Benjamin Page, both Vermonters, settled in 1816, heading a flood of legal settlers. On 3 Apr 1821, the Towns of Brownville and LeRay gave birth to the Towns of Alexandria, Philadelphia and Orleans. Orleans was the only one to be created wholly from Brownville. Thus researchers find that people recorded in Brownville in the census of 1820 are found in Orleans in the census of 1825, without ever having moved.

Orleans is located in the northernmost range of towns, with a neck of land giving it access to the St. Lawrence River, and cuts Wellesley Island in two pieces.

The Town of Clayton is its western boundary; Brownville and Pamelia are on the south, while LeRay, Theresa and Alexandria make up the eastern boundary.

The St. Lawrence River and the Town of Alexandria lie to the north, giving Orleans a Canadian border, made more important by the International Thousand Islands Bridge.

The principal village of the Town of Orleans is **LaFargeville**, named for the early proprietor of the town. Originally called Log Mills, it is the site of a once impressive stone mansion, now in ruins, built by Mr. de LaFarge.

Stone Mills, originally Collins' Mills, was probably the first settlement in the town. Today, the Northern New York Agricultural Museum in Stone Mills houses extensive exhibits of early farming and housekeeping in the area, as well as a restored church, school and cheese

factory.

Orleans Four Corners, formerly Shantyville, is a crossroads in the eastern part of the town, today reduced to a church and a cluster of houses.

More populous and developed are the later settlements on **Wellesley Island**, originally Wells, one of the larger of the Thousand Islands.

In the 1870s, a Methodist camp meeting association laid out lots on the upper end of the Island, today known as **Thousand Island Park**, a summer resort also having a year round population. **Grand View Park** and **Fine View** are other communities on the island, which also holds a large state park.

Other places on the mainland are Fisher's Landing, de LaFarge Corners, Port Orleans and Collins Landing.

Collins Landing is now occupied by the approaches to the **Thousand** Islands Bridge.

1—Named from John de LaFarge, the proprietor; formerly known as *"Log Mills."*

2—Named from a character in one of Johnson's allegories, found in the English Reader: formerly called "Mudges Mills." P. Newto

3—Formerly called "Collins Mills," from John B. Collins, owner.

4—The improvident waste of timber and the slovenly clearings made by this lawless set promised little in the way of civilization. Their appearance as they emerged from the swamps with an ox harnessed to a piece of crotched wood. laden with a trough full of black salts. Or, as they returned in like manner, with a sack of meal and a jug of whiskey, was little calculated to inspire hope of a speedy improvement. They had a kind of law among themselves in relation to land, and were accustomed to run "possession lines" by lopping down bushes. "Claims" were often sold and secured by quick claim deeds. 3


5—Among the first settlers were Roderic C. Frazier, Peter Pratt, Dr. Reuben Andrus, Samuel, Daniel Ellis and others. Alvah Goodman kept the first inn; Lemuel George, the first store; Collins & Pratt erected the first grist mill and Dr. Andrus, the first sawmill in 1819.

6—After driving the passengers ashore and plundering the boat, the brigands cast her off from the shore and set her on fire. Large rewards were offered for their apprehension, and several persons were arrested, but none convicted. In 1852, Johnston was appointed keeper of the Rock Island Light, which shines on the spot where the Peel was burned.

7—There were two Evangelical Lutheran churches, a Baptist, Congregational, Methodist Episcopal, R.C., Weslian Methodist, and Union churches.

Thomas H. Anthony was born in the Town of LeRay. In 1837 he located with his father in Pamelia. In 1873 married Alice H. Brady, born about Nov 1851. Alice was the daughter of George Brady of Canada. Thomas and Alice had two children: Anna M. and Thomas G.

Mr. Anthony suffered reverses in business and moved out West. Mrs. Anthony remained alone in the North Country. She attended the Eclectic College of Physicians, in New York City, where she studied medicine. She was a practicing physician in the town of Orleans. Dr. Alice Anthony died on 24 Jun 1890.

George Baltz was born in Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany 28 Apr 1802. He immigrated to this country about 1840 locating in the town of Orleans. His first wife was Mary Hawes; they had six children: George; Andrew born 1840, died 1906; Maria; Margaret; Louisa and Elizabeth. His second wife was ?? Keeffer. They had one son, Luther. His third wife was Agnes Happ, of LeRay born 20 Oct 1825, died 17 Mar 1892. Children of George and Agnes were: George F., Fred W. Barbara, Laura, Henry and John B.

1st Laura Baltz born 28 Feb 1851, died 4 Jan 1943. Laura married William A. Joles born 1836, died 1915.

1st **Henry Baltz** born 7 Mar 1854, died 10 Mar 1940, he married Alveretta Garlock born 1858, died 1933. Children of Henry & Alveretta: George Levi, William F. and John B.

2nd **George Levi** born 1833 died Jan 1945 married Nellie Kring born Nov 1888 died Aug 1936.

2nd William F. born Jul 1882, died Jun 1957.

1st John B. Baltz born 11 Mar 1858, died 2 May 1945. John B. attended school until he was 16 years of age. He worked at farming, learned the carpenters' trade and sailed on the lakes. At the age of 22 married Ida E. Sargent, born 1858, died May 1945. Ida was the daughter of William Sargent, from Orleans Four Corners. Children of John B & Ida: George W., Fred C. and Elmer J.

2nd George W., born 1885.

2nd Fred C. Baltz born Jul 1888, died 19 May 1953, married Ruby Garlock born Jul 1896, died May 1971. 2nd Elmer J. born Mar 1880, died 12 October 1953.

1" Fred W. Baltz born 1847 died 1917 attended the

public schools until he was 12 years old. At the age of 15 he enlisted in the Union army and served until the close of the war. For 16 years he was a sailor on the lakes. In 1870 he married Esther Spalsbury born 1849, died 1940. Esther was the daughter of James Spalsbury, from Alexandria. Children of Fred W. and Esther: George H. and Nellie A.

2nd George H.,

2nd Nellie A. Blatz born 1882, died 1957, married John C. Ferguson, Mar 1884, he died 1943.

Philip Baltz immigrated in 1832 with his family from Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany. They located in the town of Orleans. He married Elizabeth, the daughter of Valentine Dorr, of Clayton, Philip and Elizabeth had six children: Andrew P., Elizabeth, George F., August F. and Mary born 1849, died 1869 and another child died in infancy. George F. born 1842, died 1916, attended schools and worked on the farm until he was 18 years old. 30 Mar 1871, at the age of 28 years, he married Mary Haas of Clayton and they had three children: Ida E. Baltz, Albert G. Baltz born 1843, died 1907 and Chester A. Baltz.

James Barton was born in County Fermanaugh, Ireland, where he married Mary Ann Coventry. In 1855 he immigrated to this country and located in the town of Alexandria, his wife and children following in 1860. His children were: Alexander, John, William, Edward, Thomas and Mary.

1st Edward Barton enlisted in the Union Army 21 Aug 1862 serving with the 10th Heavy Artillery. Edward's date and place of birth are listed as 1846 in Ireland. He mustered out on 23 Jun 1865 with his Regiment. Returning to farming in his home of Alexandria. In 1865 he married Martha E., daughter of William Caris, of Alexandria, and they have had five children, viz.: William E. Barton born 1867 died 1888, Charles R., James C., Freddie W. and Blanch M.

1st **Thomas Barton** enlisted with the Union Army 186th Inf. He mustered out with his Regiment on 2 Jun 1865.

He fought at the Battle of Petersburg on 2 Apr 1865, with his Regiment. His place of birth on enlistment was Ireland. He returned to farming in the Town of Orleans.

1st William Barton born 18 Apr 1841 in Ireland. He enlisted in the Union Army on 4 Jul 1865, serving with 26th Calvary. He mustered out with his company, returning to farming in the Town of Orleans.

John N. Beardsley was born 18 Sep 1807, in Litchfield County Kent, Conn. He was youngest son of E. P. Beardsley. When he was four years of age his parents moved to Winfield, Herkimer County, where the family remained about 10 years. In June 1822, they moved to where the present village of Omar now is. On their 7

way to their new home they stopped one night at LaFargeville, at the log hotel then owned by Dr. Andrews. The present Getman House at LaFargeville occupies the site of the old log hostelry. Dr. Andrews also owned a gristmill of primitive style. John N. Beardsley helped to build the first sawmill and dam on Mullet Creek, about two miles from Fisher's Landing. He remained with his father eight years, after which he lived successively at Little Falls and Frankfort, Herkimer County, Rossie, St. Lawrence County, and Philadelphia, in Jefferson County. 17 May 1842, he set up a hardware business in LaFargeville. For seven seasons he sold lightning rods for H. H. Babcock & Company of Watertown. He was also agent for the Agrcultural Insurance Company of Watertown for 13 years. He married Lucy Bucklin born 12 Nov 1805 of Little Falls. Lucy died on 8 Jan 1888. John N. lived with his son Andrew B. until his death on 2 Feb 1889. Lucy and John have had seven children.

1st Martha (Mrs. W. W. Tucker), of Watertown.

1st Sarah, wife of: H. W. Bennett, was a dental surgeon, of Nantes, France.

1st Sophia J., wife of Dr. C. M. Wilkie, of Paris, France.

1st Mary E. Beardsley born about 1833, died 18 Sep 1878.

1st David W. Beardsley born about 1839, died 11 May 1883

1st Homer W. Beardsley born about 1847, died 1883.

1st Andrew B. Beardsley born 4 Aug 1842, died 2 Jul 1923. He married Grace Richard, of Chicago, formerly of Richfield Springs, Otsego County. Andrew became a prosperous merchant in LaFargeville.

Alfred Beckwith was born in Dec 1811 near New London, Conn. He married Armina Wood, born in Feb 1815, from St. Lawrence County, Gouvernur NY, she died 30 Dec 1894. Alfred and Armina had seven children: Ann, Hiram, Harriet and Orlo. Remander unkown.

1st **Hiram** received a good common school education and taught school about 10 terms. On 15 Nov 1871 he married Theodora (Dora) L. Buskirk, daughter of Almarin Buskirk, from Clayton. Hiram and Dora had three children: Earl H., Edith M., and 2nd **Grace J.** born 31 May 1887, died in 1976. Hiram owned the D. D. Calvin farm, about one-mile north of LaFargeville.

Hon. Russell B. Biddlecom, was born in Deerfield New York, Oneida County, 19 Mar 1822, the son of Charles and Rhoda Biddlecom. Upon the death of his father, in 1829, he went to live with an elder brother. Sometime around 1835 he immigrated to the town of Orleans, where he resided until his death on 10 May 1894 with the exception of the years 1857-1860, when he held the office of county clerk he resided in Watertown. He received a good common school education, with the addition of three months at Union Academy of Belleville, Belleville, NY. His school days were alternated with work on his brother's farm. Commencing at the age of 18 he taught school for about 12 years. In 1844, in recognition of his qualifications as a teacher, he was elected town Superintendent of Common Schools, which position he filled acceptably for eight years. In 1849 he was elected Justice of the Peace and served until 1857.

He was appointed a Colonel by Governor Morgan, and assisted in organizing artillery companies in Lewis and Jefferson Counties. During his term of service nearly 2,400 men were enlisted and sent to the front comprising 16 companies, which were formed into heavy artillery regiments. He served at the front one year, and was discharged for disability. In 1865 he represented the Third Assembly District in the state legislature, and the Second Assembly District in the same body in 1866. In 1865, he was elected supervisor, and continued in office five years. In politics Mr. Biddlecom was a Whig until 1855, when he became a Republican and assisted in organizing the Republican party in Jefferson County.

In 1870 Mr. Biddlecom became interested in a company for building the Theresa & Clayton Railroad, of which he was elected a director, and was appointed superintendent, secretary and treasurer, positions he held until the road was consolidated with the Utica & Black River Railroad Company. The town of Orleans and Clayton were bonded to build the road, the former for \$80,000 and the latter for \$100,000. Mr. Biddlecom obtained the consent of the taxpayers of the town of Orleans to its bonding, although violently opposed by Cornelius Burt, Albion A. Hughes, William B. Irwin, and many others, who afterwards appeared in the County Court and contested the appointment of railroad commissioners. After a hearing before Judge Sawyer he appointed commissioners to issue the bonds. The case was brought by certiorari to the Supreme Court of the state, in which the judgment of the County Court was sustained. On appeal to the Court of Appeals the judgment of the County Court appointing commissioners was reversed. Interediate the decision of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals. Mr. Biddlecom, as treasurer of the railroad company, sold \$10,000 worth of the bonds of the town of Orleans, which had been issued by the commissioners, and soon after the decision of the Court of Appeals he sold the remainder of the bonds in the amount of \$70,000. Isaac Mitchell, the supervisor for the Town of Orleans, commenced proceedings in the Supreme Court against Mr. Biddlecom, and others to recover damages on account of the sale of the bonds. Mr. Mitchell alleged that he, (Mr. Biddlecom) in bonding the town, building the railroad, and selling the bonds, had conspired with others to defraud the town. In 1884, after many years

of expensive litigation, the suit was finally decided against the town, and Mr. Biddlecom fully exonerated from all charges of fraud and conspiracy. His official acts in behalf of the railroad declared valid. The railroad in its value and usefulness having surpassed the expectations of its most sanguine friends all opposition has ceased. Mr. Biddlecom is now universally acknowledged as one of the towns' benefactors. Russell B. married Martha Ann Richardson, born 1824, died 1911.

Valentine Brightweaser was born Nov 1825, emigrated from Hesse, Germany, about 1832, with his grandparents and mother, his father having died previously. They first located in this town on road 40, remaining here about a year and a half, when they moved to road 54, near Orleans Four Corners. Mr. Brightweaser and his mother owned 83 acres. The opportunities for education in these early days were very limited. Valentine married Catharine Otis, from Hesse, Germany, six weeks after her arrival in this country. They had four children:

1st Christina born 1857 died 14 Oct 1936, married W. B. Fransburg, of LaFargeville.

1st Mary A. born 16 Oct 1860, died 25 Apr 1935. She married Orrin E. Tallman, born 10 Feb 1859, died 8 Jan 1935, of Philadelphia;

1st George J. Brightweaser born 1861, died 1923.

1st Elizabeth (Libbie) born 1866, died 1923.

Valentine Brightweaser second wife was Catherine Fults widow of Ephriam Timmerman. Catherine Fults was born 18 Aug 1834, died 1917.

William Caris (Carris) born in Yorkshire, England immigrated to this country about 1833. First locating in the city of Syracuse, NY working as a butcher. About 1835 he was married to Harriet Hodaker, of Somersetshire, England. The children of William Caris (Carris) and Harriet Hodaker are:

1st Jane A. born 1835, died 1917 who married a James Hagan.

1st William served with the 94th N. Y. INF. He was killed in the second battle of Bull Run.

1st Martha E. born 1843, died 1907.

1st John W. Caris (Carris) was born near Syracuse, 20 Apr 1839 and was educated in the common schools of Ogden, Monroe County. He died in 1914. He had married Helen A. Coon, born 1843, died 1930.

In Jan 1861, he moved to the Town of Alexandria engaging in farming until the breaking out of the Rebellion. 18 Aug 1861, he enlisted in Company K, 10th N. Y. H. John was mustered out with his company. In 1867 he married Helen A. Coon the daughter of Elias Coon of Orleans. Helen was born 1843, died in 1930. The children of John Carris and Helen Coon's are:

2nd Hattie Mae born 30 Sept 1868, died Aug 1965.

On 20 Jan 1892 Hattie Mae Carris married Lester Garlock. He was born 1869 and died 1923.

2nd Fred E., 2nd Ferd De E. and 2nd Altha V., all of whom survive except Fred E., who died in infancy.

Byron Carter was born (1839-1919), near de LaFarge Corners, one mile south of LaFargeville. He married Clarissa Britton (1834-1907), from Omar village. They had seven children: Charles M. Carter, Minnie B. (1861-1899), Eva M., Effie C. (1867-1935) and Floyd L. (1877-1935).

2nd Charles M. Carter received a common school education, and worked upon the farm until he was 16 years of age, when he became a sailor on the lakes. At the age of 22 he married Rita M. Gurnee, daughter of Ralph Gurnee. They had a son 3rd Fred C. Carter

Ralph Gurnee was born in Watertown, where he married Henrietta Coffeen the daughter of Frederick Coffeen, and granddaughter of Henry Coffeen, one of the first settlers in Watertown.

John Cook was born in Massachusetts in (1794-1877). When 12 years of age he came with his parents to this county, and located in Ellisburg. He married Abigail Littlefield (1794-1870), of Massachusetts. John Cook and Abigail Littlefield had 10 children: Ashbel (1816-1901), Lovira 1819-1903), Willard L., John W., Cyrus L 1827-1846). Horace S., Malcom G. and Mariette.

Their son, Willard L., was born 30 Jul 1823 in Ellisburgh. He attended the common schools until he was 17 years old, subsequently graduating from the commercial college at Syracuse. In the fall of 1861 he enlisted in the Union army and lost his right arm in the second battle of Bull Run. He has been Assistant Door-Keeper in the Assembly at Albany. Willard was married twice. By his first wife, Charlotte Fox, (1831 -1877) of Clayton, they had seven children: three sons and four daughters Oren M., Byron C., E. Clarence and Nettie L. He married. as his second wife. Mrs. Jane Taylor, widow of Benjamin B. Taylor. "Benjamin B. Taylor (1827-1865) served in the Civil War, and was shot by a sharpshooter just before the close of the last battle before Petersburg, Va." Willard and Jane resided at Fisher's Landing.

George Coon (1788-1872) came from Otsego County to Jefferson County with his family and settled on road 17, in the town of Orleans.

1st Elias Coon (b.1817-d.1894) married Mary Ann Hawn (b.1824-d.1887), daughter of George Hawn. They had five children, one of whom died in infancy. with four surviving to adulthood viz.: Ellen A., Edgar A. (1847-1921) married Almira Larabee, Nantie A. (1866-1951) and Alton E. Coon (1861-1939).

2nd Alton E. at the age of 21 years, graduated from Hungerford Collegiate Institute, Adams, NY. He was a cadet at West Point Military Academy for one year.

Alton was well fitted for his chosen profession of teaching.

Hiram Dunn was born about 1814 near Rossie, in St. Lawrence County. He was a carpenter by trade, and received a common school education. He married Huldah Bishop (1800-1877), of Antwerp, NY. They had eight children, as follows: Michael, Zophia, Alonson, William H., Buell, Hiram, Adelia and Charles.

2nd **Michael Dunn** (1858-1916), attended the common schools, and did pioneer work until the age of 18. He worked at farming for about nine years, when he enlisted in the late war and served three years, until its close. Soon after his return he married Mary Higgins (1853-1931), by whom he had one child, 3rd **Voluta M. Dunn.**

Henry Eager was born 1799 in Brattleboro, VT. Henry located to Governor, NY at the age of 27. In 1828 he married Melissa Ayers, daughter of John Ayers, of Johnstown, Fulton County. They had five sons and three daughters, born as follows, viz.: Zina, in 1829; Dianthia, in 1830; Sophronia, in 1832; Mary A., in 1838; George, March 13, 1839; James H., in 1841; William H., in 1848; and Emerson, in 1847. Dianthia and Sophronia are deceased.

1st **George** worked on the farm and attended the common schools and Governor Academy until he was 22 years old. In 1863, at the age of 25 years, he married Hattie Van Ness, daughter of Jeremiah Van Ness, of Spragueville, St. Lawrence County. They had five children, viz.: Clinton G. (died in 1884), Sophronia M., Emory F., Guy L., and Don W. Eager. George Eager was a farmer and living on Wells Island, near Thousand Island Park.

J. George Eckert born in 1826 immigrated from Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany. Locating in New York City before moving to the town of Orleans, where in 1851 he married, Eunice Goodrich born 1813 died 1902.

Their son Elwyn G. Eckert born 1858 died 1917, was educated in the common schools, and attended the Adams Collegiate Institute. At the age of 32 years Elywin married Martha Schollenburg (1863-1939). They had three children, George B. Eckert, E. Harold Eckert, and a daughter.

Samuel J. Ellis was born in Washington County, where he married Miss Durkee, by whom he had five children, only two of whom are living now Halsey and Harriet. In 1825 at the age of seven Halsey traveled with his father to the town of Orleans living in La Fargeville. He attended school winters and worked at the carpenters' trade summers, until he was 18 years old. At the age of 22 years he married Sylvia Graves the daughter of David Graves, of Orleans. They had nine children, eight of whom survive, viz.: Helen F., James M., Alphonzo D., Edwin A. Byron H., Herbert F., Harriet S., and Charles H.

1st Harriet S. Ellis married Brayton E. Avery, and resides at Stones Mills, in the town of Orleans.

Peter Emmett, grandfather of Gordon Emmett, participated in the battle near Rouse's Point, on Lake Champlain. Richard Lombard, the maternal grandfather of Gordon Emmett, served in the War of 1812, and was in Portland, ME during the engagement of the American Brig Enterprise with the English Brig Boxer, in which both captains were killed, and the British vessel surrendered to the American.

In 1844 Peter Emmett married Catharine Lombard, and they had five children, two of who died in infancy, and three survived, Arriett E., Gordon, and Henry.

1st **Gordon** attended the common schools until 16 years of age. He enlisted in the Union army. En route with his regiment from Norfolk, Virginia, Newburn, to North Caroline he was wounded in the wrist. He was captured, and sent to Columbia State Prison, from which place he was moved to Florence, *SC*. When Sherman was in the vicinity on his famous march to the sea Gordon was paroled. On 8 Aug 1867, when 19, he married Helen, daughter of Chester Morrey, of Euphrata, Fulton County, and they had five children, four of whom survived, namely: Reita, Willie, Claude, and Carl.

2nd **Reita** married John Nunn, of Wells Island, and resided at Great Bend.

Lawrence Fetterly, a farmer, was born in Herkimer County. He was of Dutch descent, and his ancestors were well represented in the Revolutionary War and War of 1812. He married Margaret Fox, of Herkimer County, and they had 12 children, eight of whom survived, two of whom, Franklin and Martin V., resided in the town of Orleans, where they were engaged in farming.

2nd Franklin was born in Clayton, and was educated in the common schools. At the age of 26 he married Mary, daughter of John Cook, of this town, on February 9, 1875, and they had three sons and one daughter, viz.: Frank H., Ralph E., Gracie I., and Glen C. Martin V. Fetterly was also born in Clayton. 1 Jan 1887, when 26 years of age, he married Emma, daughter of James Clyde, of Alexandria. Mr. Clyde served in the War of 1812. F. & M. V. Fetterly was in company on a farm on road 11, near Fisher's Landing.

John Ford, (1788-1864) at an early day, came from Connecticut and located in Eaton, Madison County, NY. He married Lucy Rich (1787-1850) and they had seven children—five sons and two daughters. One son, Rev. Lewis T. Ford, (1809 –1877) was born in Eaton, Madison County, where he was educated at Madison

University. He married, in 1835, Arminda Steton the daughter of Deacon and Jesse Stetson, of Cooperstown. They had six children, two of whom died in infancy, and four survived, viz.: Wayland F., Marie E., William G. and Charles H.

Marie E. Ford married Byron J. Strough, of La Fargeville. Wayland F. Ford (June 26 1838-1918) was born in LaFargeville. He was educated at Orleans Academy and Madison University. In the fall of 1859 he began the study of the law with E. R. Keene, of Theresa. April 1861 he was admitted to the bar, and began practice at LaFargeville, New York. In October 1861 he enlisted in Co. B, 94th N. Y. Vol. INF. On March 1863, his regiment was consolidated with the 105th N. Y. Inf. March 16, 1862; he was promoted to second lieutenant, Co. E, of the former regiment, and was discharged by reason of consolidation. I May 1863, he re-enlisted in Co. M, 20th N. Y. Cav., was promoted to first lieutenant, Company D, Sep 1863; captain, Company D, 13 Oct 1863; discharged with the regiment, 31 Jul 1865, having served three years and nine months. After the close of the war he resumed practice of the law at LaFargeville. In 1866 he married Maria Cline daughter of Leonard Cline from Three Mile Bay. John and Maria had three children, viz.: Edith C., Lewis H., and W. Frederick. Mr. Ford, by working assiduously for the interests of his clients, built up an extensive and remunerative law practice in this vicinity.

Samuel W. Gates was born in the town of Champion in 1816. In 1828 he removed with his father to Pamelia, where he attended the common schools and worked upon his father's farm until he attained his majority. In 1838 he removed to this town. He married Lavina, daughter of Jacob Zoller, and they have two sons and one daughter, viz.: Jacob S., Roswell W., and Ella E. Mrs. Gates was born in 1817.

2nd **Roswell W. Gates** attended the district schools until he attained the age of 16 years. He then entered the Brownville High School, remaining two terms, and afterwards the Hungerford Collegiate Institute, Adams, also remaining here two terms, when he returned to the farm on road 51, in this town. In 1868 he married Eliza A., daughter of David Zerau, of Orleans, and they had four daughters and one son, namely: Carrie E., Bertha L., Editha L., Samuel J., and Ella F.

Bailey Goodrich was born in Weathersfield, Conn., whence his parents removed with him to Sandisfield, Mass., when he was quite young. He was educated in the common schools, and at the age of 22 years married Eunice Smith, of Sandisfield, by whom he had four sons and four daughters, viz.: Theodotia, Ruel, Columbus, Lydia, Clarence, Eunice, Polly, and Nelson. He removed from Massachusetts, first, to Turin, Lewis County, then to Denmark, in the same county, and in

1819 located in Orleans.

1st Nelson Goodrich was born in Denmark in 1816. He was educated in the common schools, with three terms in High schools in different places. In 1838, at the age of 22 years, he married Catharine Snell, of Theresa, and they have six sons and two daughters, viz.: Orville, George, Elizabeth, Cass, Worth, Lorenzo and Alonzo (twins), and Mary. Mr. and Mrs. Goodrich had completed nearly 50 years of wedded life together.

John Gray, born in Herkimer County, in 1807, married, first, Jemima Clock, by whom he had three sons, viz.: Nelson, Adam, and Chauncey.

For his second wife he married Margaret Jeffers, and they had four children, one who died in infancy, and three survive, viz.: George, Mary E., and Julia.

2nd Adam Gray, mentioned above, was educated at the common schools, and worked upon his father's farm until he attained his majority. He married Sally, daughter of Jacob Fults, of Theresa, and they had two children, viz.: Alice, who died at the age of 16 years, and Justin.

Justin, a farmer, married Carrie, daughter of George H. Timmerman, of this town, in 1886, and occupied the old homestead farm, part of which had been in possession of the family for 65 years.

George L. Gurnee was born in the town of Watertown. In 1853 he married Lydia Bartholomew, of Brownville, and they have had six sons and one daughter, namely: Warren B., Herbert W., George A., Charles K., Frank D., Ida C., and 2nd Eugene R. Gurnee married Ada Fox. George A. died at the age of 23 years.

2nd Frank D. Gurnee attended High school in Watertown until the age of 16 years. He then attended select school for two winters, after which he did farm work. 4 Feb 1886, he married Minnie L. Nellis (1856-1934), daughter of Marcus W. Nellis, of Orleans, and they resided in this town on road 64.

Milton Harman was born in Pawlet, Rutland County, Vermont, in 1798, whence he moved, in 1816, to Oswego. In politics he was a Whig, and the Episcopal Church represented his religious principles. He held a commission from Governor Clinton in the War of 1812. He died 16 Feb 1885, aged 87 years. When about 20 years old he married Lucretia Wales, and they had four sons and four daughters, three sons of whom survived, namely: Herbert M., George W. and Henry A.

Henry A. received a good practical education. In 1862, at the age of 18 years, he enlisted in the Army serving in Co. A, 12th N. Y. Cav. Henry was captured at Plymouth, NC on 20 Apr 1864, and sent to Andersonville prison, thence to Millen, Savannah, Blackshire, and Thomasville, in Georgia. Later being sent to "INFORMER"





Charleston, S. C., Selma, Ala., and Meridan, Miss., before being paroled near Big Black River, near Vicksburg on 31 Mar 1865. After the war closed he lived in Michigan for four years. In 1867 he married Elizabeth W. Rottiers, of LaFargeville, only daughter of John Rottiers, and they have two children, John N. and Eugene P. Harman.

Archibald Hasner, by occupation a farmer, was born in the town of Alexandria. At the age of 28 years he married Minerva Sweet, of Alexandria, and they had two sons and two daughters, viz.: Mary, George, Dolly, and Edward C.

Edward C. was educated in the common schools, and worked on his father's farm until he attained his majority. He married May Dillon, of Gananoque, Canada, and they resided on road 50, in this town.

Henry Heyl was born 1806 near Frankfort-on-the-Main, Germany. At the age of 26 years he immigrated to America and located near LeRaysville, in Jefferson County. Henry moved to LaFargeville, where he married Kate M. Heldt, born 1804, a native of Germany. Henry died in 1878 and Catherine (Kate) Heldt died 1880. They had seven children, viz.: Philip, George, Kate M., Henry (1841-1913), Wendel J., Maria R. died at the age of 15 years (1847-1863).

1st George Heyl worked on the farm summers and attended school winters until he was 18 years of age. He then removed to Clayton and resided there six years. In 1864, at the age of 26 years, he married Ruah H. Snell, daughter of John A. Snell, of LaFargeville. They had two sons, 2nd William H. Heyl and 2nd Frank A. Heyl, and resided on the homestead of John A. Snell.

Dr. John Hill came from England to the United States about 1833. He studied medicine and finished his course in New York City. He came to Jefferson County about 1835 or '36, residing for a time in Antwerp, and subsequently in Watertown. He then located in La-Fargeville, where he was in practice 12 years, and was well known as a physician of high standing. He died in 1856. He married Sally, daughter of Joel Mix, of Champion. His widow survived and became Mrs. Sally Cutler. She then resided in the town of Champion.

Samuel Holloway was born near Plattsburgh, NY in 1786. He served in the War of 1812. Samuel married Lucy Baker, born July 17, 1793. They had 15 children, 14 of whom survived, namely: Marinda, William, Chloe, Nathan, Fanny, Phebe, Samuel, Lucy, Caroline, Lyda, Martha and Mary (twins), Daniel, and Stephen.

1st Nathan Holloway was born in Hounsfield (Sackets Harbor) 20 Dec 1817. He attended common schools and worked on his father's farm until he at-

tained his majority. He married Cynthia Lee the daughter of Angell Lee, of Adams. Nathan and Cynthia his first wife had one daughter, Malissa who married Alphonzo D. Case.

His second wife was Hannah Gifford daughter of Gideon Gifford from Adams. Nathan and Hannah had a son, Hermon M., who married Martha Reed, from Orleans by whom he had two children, Glen C. and Grace H. Hannah Gifford Holloway drowned in the St. Lawrence River.

For his third wife he married Mrs. (Steemburg) Spaulding, of Theresa, with whom he lived on the homestead, where he resided since 1860.

Alby P. Houghton was born in Vermont in 1809, and came to this county, locating in Alexandria, when he was a young man. He married Fidelia Arnold, of Lyme, by whom he has had five children, one son and one daughter who are deceased, and a son and two daughters survived, viz.: Caroline, Rosell, and Malinda.

Rosell attended the public schools until he was 16 years of age, after which he worked at the carpenters' trade. In 1865 he married Eliza, daughter of Joseph Russell, of Alexandria, and they have had four children, viz.: Fidelia, George A., Fredie N., and Edson J. Fidelia died at the age of eight years. Mr. Houghton served three years in the late war and was honorably discharged. He resided with his family in this town on road 12, near the village of Omar.

- Albion A. Hughes was born 1826 in Oneida County. When seven years of age his parents moved to this town (Orleans) and located on road 64, where his descendants of the third and fourth generation now reside. He attended school winters and worked on the farm summers, until he was 18 years old. He worked for his father by the month until he attained the age of 25. On 26 Jan 1851 Albion A. Hughes (1826-1885) married Pamelia A. Moody (1830-1887) of Stone Mills. Their children: Estella I. Hughes, who married Irvin W. Swift from Herkimer County, Adelene who married. Frank D. Marshall, from Dawes County, Neb.; Albion A. Hughes, and John D. Hughes who in 1884 married Carrie A. Dickinson the daughter of Adolphus Dickinson from LaFargeville and they had one son, Fred A. Hughes a justice of the peace.
- Samuel R. Hunter married Jane Bradshaw, of Thurlow, Canada West and resided in the town of Henderson, Jefferson County. The fruit of this union was five sons, viz.: Arthur, Henry, Dwight, Noah, and George A.

1st George A. Hunter received a common school education in his youth. In 1878 he came to the town of Orleans locating at Fisher's Landing. Mr. Hunter was a reliable guide and oarsman, and camp cook. He married, Celia A. Murphy, 29 Jan 1879. They had two

known children one died in infancy the other **Hartley A. Hunter**. Mrs. Celia Hunter died in 1884. George married Lydia A. Robbins in 1885 of Fisher's Landing, with whom he had a son named **Orvis H. Hunter**. Lydia A. Robbins was daughter of Capt. Edmund M. Robbins.

Thomas Joles moved from Herkimer County to Point Peninsula, in the town of Lyme, and subsequently to Blind Bay, on the St. Lawrence. He married Livonia Collins, and they have had 13 children, five of whom survive, namely: Alvah, Julius, Marion, William A. and Levi.

1st William A. was educated in the common schools. He worked at farming and lumbering until he attained the age of 26, when he enlisted in the Union Army and served nearly three years. In 1868 he married Laura, daughter of George Baltz, of this town, and they had one son and four daughters, viz.: Anges M. (Mrs. James W. Sargent), Lauraett, Leela M., Lennie N., and Clarence W. The family resided at Stone Mills.

- William Kernehan was born in Belfast, Ireland, in 1833. He immigrated to the United States, where he remained four years, subsequently moving to Canada. At the age of 20 he married Eliza Rainy, of Prescott, Canada, and they had four sons and six daughters, of whom John J., at the age of 17, located in the village of LaFargeville. When 22 he married Ella C., daughter of Oliver Bergen, and they have two sons, William G. and Charles O. and resided on road 47.
- William Kickley was born in Portland, Canada, where he married Clara Simons, by whom he had three sons and two daughters, viz.: Henry, Shirley, Joseph, Sophia, and Clara.
 - Upon the death of his first wife he married Jane Ralph, by whom he had no children.

Shirley Kickley enlisted in Co. B, 6th N. Y. Cavalry, December 30, 1864, and served until the close of the war. In 1870 he married Josephine Fultz, of this town, and they had two children, Maud E. and Melvin S. Mr. Kickley was a farmer on road 45, in this town.

Jacob A. Klock, a native of Herkimer County, removed to this town in 1846 and located near Orleans Four Corners. He reared a family of ten children, viz.: Levi, Katie, Samuel, Adam, George, Harvey, Martha A., Elizabeth, Elijah, and Nancy.

Adam worked on his father's farm until he attained his majority. He married Martha A. Clock, of Theresa, and they have two sons, viz.: Henry D. and Jacob W.

Henry D. Klock attended the public schools until he was 17 years old. At the age of 21 he married Maggie Hagan, of Alexandria, and they had one son, Elmer Edson. He resided on the homestead farm settled by

his grandfather over 50 years previous.

Daniel Ladd, a native of Caintown, Canada, married Maria, daughter of Lyman Stearns, about 1848, and they had four children, three of whom survived, namely: Almeda, Dudley M., and Lyman D.

Lyman D. was born in Theresa, 15 Sep 1861. When 19 years old he married Mary, daughter of Raphael Shorlett, of Alexandria, by whom he has had four children, two of whom died in infancy, and two, Fred E. and Eva B., survived. They resided in the village of LaFargeville until their move to Theresa in 1889.

Henry Laflur, at the age of seven years, removed with his father from Canada to this county, and located in the town of Clayton, in 1840. In 1856 he married Diana Robbins, of Clayton, and they had two sons and two daughters, one of whom, Lucy, died at the age of 18, and three survived, viz.: Henry W., Mary E., and Charles.

Henry W. married Esther Coleman, of Lowville, Lewis County, and they had two children, one of whom died in infancy. Mr. Laflur was a steamboat engineer, which business he followed for nearly 10 years. Henry Laflur, Sr., Henry W., and Charles had their homes on Wells Island, below Thousand Island Park.

Dennis LaGraves was born near Paris, France, August 15, 1807. When about 15 years of age he immigrated with his father to Canada, locating near Montreal, where he remained but a short time, finally locating in this town. When 35 years of age he married Rachel, daughter of Killip Arnold. They had six children equally divided as to sex, namely: Mary J., Sarah A., George W., Charles J., Caroline D. and Moses D. LaGraves.

1st George W. LaGraves attended the common schools until he arrived at the age of 16 years, when he enlisted in the Union army and served three years, until the close of the war. In 1870 he married Catherine Murphy, of this town, and they have had five children, viz.: Judson C., deceased, Carrie A., George W., May, and Grace M. Mr. La Graves resided in this town on road 51.

George Lamson married Lucinda, daughter of Ephraim Potter, who served seven years in the Revolutionary War.

1st Luther Lamson, son of George, was born in 1810. His father died when he was quite young, and as a consequence his early advantages were limited. He was educated in the common schools with a short time at the Union Academy of Belleville, in Belleville, NY.

In 1832 he married Sally Bushnell, who was born in 1807. They had four children, viz.: Zerviah A., Mary M., Sarah, and George L.

Mrs. Lucinda Potter Lamson died in 1887.

Luther Lamson spent most of his life in the mercantile business in Lorraine and LaFargeville. He located in the latter place in 1849, and was in active business here for 26 years.

He was supervisor of the town of Orleans for three years, in 1856, '57 and '58, and faithfully discharged his official duties. He died August 4, 1875, loved and respected by all that knew him. His children, Mary and George, and grandchildren, Sarah A. and May A., were his only surviving descendants.

2nd George L. Lamson married Alice A. Snyder in 1868. They had two daughters, Sarah A., and May A.

William R. Larabee was born in Virgil, Cortland County, 24 Feb 1812 and when 12 moved with his parents to this town and located in the village of La Fargeville, where he attended the public schools for a time. His father was a stone mason, which trade the son also learned early in life, and assisted in the building of the LaFarge mansion and the stone house opposite and also the Biddlecom residence in the village. When Mr. Larabee was 18, his father died and the family was dependent upon the young man for support. In 1839 he married Caroline, daughter of Stephen Priest, and they had 10 children, two of whom died in infancy, and eight survived, namely: Celestia A., Washington W., Sarah E., Lansing T., Daniel R., Almira C., Arvilla E. and Adda L.

Mr. Larabee resided on road 25 and in that vicinity for 56 years. He died in 1889.

2nd Sarah E. married John Schultz, of Plessis.

2nd Washington W., married Dolly Gillette, of Alexandria.

J. Michael Lehr immigrated from Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany, to the United States, in 1832, and located in the town of Orleans, where he married Catharine Warner, by whom he had six children, viz.: George, Henry, Jacob, Nicholas, John and Mary.

1st Jacob Lehr was born near Stone Mills, in this town, in 1856. At the age of 24 years he married Catharine Petrie the daughter of William Petrie, from the town of Orleans. Jacob Lehr and Catharine had two children, Alice and John.

John Lehr married Nettie Beadell, of Watertown, and they had one son, Allen J. Lehr.

Arthur McNickle, of Scotch descent, immigrated to Canada in 1830. In 1845 he married Catharine Langstaff, and they had 11 children, seven of whom survived, viz.: Anne, Mary, Catharine, Arthur, William, Minnie and George.

1st George McNickly came to the United States in April 1880, and in that month he married Dell Bort (1858-1928) the daughter of Cornelius Bort of Watertown, and they had four sons, viz.: 2nd **Cornelius B. McNickly** (1881-1963) married Ethel Dean.

2nd Ernest McNickly (1883-1952)

2nd George A McNickly (1886-1919)

2nd LeRoy E. McNickly (1887-1945).

George Meyers (Moyers) was born 23 Apr 1838 in Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany. His parents where George Meyer and Mary Dorr. In 1859, he immigrated to this country and located in town of Orleans. On 31 Dec 1861 he enlisted at Sackets Harbor serving with Co. B, 94th N. Y. Vols., in the rank of Chief. George was principal musician for his regiment. He reenlisted at Michells Station in 1864, George mustered out with his unit. In 1860 he married Isabel Hagen, of this town, and they had five children, viz.: Mary Jane, Belle, Loui (sic), Ebar M., and William H. Meyers.

John Moore was born in Lower Canada, near Elizabethtown. He was twice married, first, to Mary Trickey, who bore him one son, Hiram P., and second, to Angeline Tumery, by whom he had 14 children.

In 1837 1st **Hiram P. Moore** came to this town with his grandmother, and located on Wells Island. He assisted in clearing 1,000 acres of land, before he was 19 years of age. Hiram P. Moore married Esther Eddy, daughter of Ebenezer Eddy, one of the early settlers in the town of Orleans. They had 15 children, three of whom died in infancy, and 12 lived to be adults: Horace W., Thomas T., William W., Hiram N., Charles M., Sylvester T., Marian M., Willard R., Clarence W., Elizabeth L., Minnie E. and Mertie. "Mr. Moore resided upon Wells Island longer than any other person then living there at the time (1890)." Hiram P. Moore born Oct 1822 and died in 1895. Esther (Eddy) Moore was born in 1822 and died Jan 1898.

Martin Nugent and his wife, Mary (Hinds) Nugent, immigrated to the United States in 1851 or 1855. They had three sons and three daughters, viz.: Kate, Andrew, Maria, and John, Nora and Edmund.

Andrew Nugent 1840-1912 wife Estella ?

Nora Nugent 1836-1911 married Charles Bates,

Edmund Nugent 1835-1914 born in Cahar, County Clare, Ireland, in 1835. He enlisted on 7 Oct 1861, Co. H, 1st Light Artitary N.Y. Vols., and was promoted from the ranks to sergeant. He participated in the following battles: Williamsburg, Bottom Bridge, Savage Station, Fair Oaks, White Oak Swamp, Malvern Hill, Mine Run, Laurel Hill, South Anna River, Spottsylvania Court House, Jericho Ford, Bethsada Church, Petersburg, Weldon Railroad, Poplar Grove Church and Peeble's Farm. He suffered severely from exhaustion at the battle of Peeble's Farm, and near Alexandria, VA, was severely hurt about the back and shoulders by his horse falling upon him. He was discharged near Petersburg, VA, 16

Oct 1864.

In the fall of 1883 he became a charter member of the Grand Army of the Republic, George W. Flower Post, No. 306 of Theresa.

In 1867 he married Eleanor, daughter of the late John S. Graham, of Orleans Four Corners. In 1877 Mr. Nugent bought the Graham homestead, and in 1884 built a fine residence thereon.

William Nunn was born abt 1821 in Norfolk, England. William immigrated to Canada at the age of 16. He married Minerva McDonald around 1842. They came to the United States on 25 Jan 1856 settling on Wells Island. They had six sons and three daughters, five of whom survive, namely: Charles T., William U., Henry T., Joshua M., and Sarah A.

1st Henry T. Nunn 1849-1932 wife Frances 1846-1932.

1st William U. Nunn born 1844 received a common school education and worked on the farm until he was 20 years of age. In 1864 he married Martha J.Tyler. Martha was born in 1845, the daughter of John Tyler. William U. and Martha J had four children: a daughter Mattie born 1873, died in infancy, H. Tracy, Orlie G., and Mary A.

2nd Orlie G. Nunn 1868-1940 married Laura Jarvis 1873-1961.

3rd Beulah Nunn 1905-1980

2nd Mary Ann Nunn born 1870 died 1938.

2nd Henry Tracy Nunn 1863-1937, married Lucy A. Calkins 1870-1954. They had two children, viz.: Leslie O., who died in infancy, and Nellie 1886-1972.

1st Charles T. Nunn, at the age of 22 years, married Mary C Tyler, daughter of John Tyler, and they have a son and a daughter, namely: John W., and Cora I. The latter married Leonard Kling, and they have one daughter, Ethel.

2nd John W. Nunn 1856-1929, married Reita Emmett, of Wells Island.

2nd Cora I

William Nunn died in 1915 and Martha J Tyler died 18 August 1894.

Peter Pratt 1st was born in 1772, son of Peter and Hester (Wright) Pratt, at Saybrook, CT. Immigrating to Jefferson County, along with John B. Collins, he had a mill at Stone Mills in the Town of Orleans. Peter died 6 Oct 1852 at Stone Mills, Town of Orleans, Jefferson County and is buried in the Stone Mills Cemetery there. He married in 1805 at Perch River, Town of Brownville, Jefferson County, to Lucy Socvil, daughter of Stephen and Elizabeth (Eggleston) Scovil. Lucy was born 19 Aug 1781 at Middletown, Middlesex County, CT. She died 23 Jun 1857 at Stone Mills, Town of Orleans, Jefferson County and is buried in the Stone Mills Cemetery. Their children were:

Nathaniel R. Reed born about 1790 in the town of Salem, Mass. He married Elitha Sperry, of New Haven, Conn. Nathaniel and Elitha had 13 children, nine of whom grew to adult age. Nathaniel R. Reed died in 1851.

His son, 1st Lewis E. 1828-1916, remained at home with his father until he attained his majority, after which he was apprenticed to the trade of carpenter and joiner, in the village of LaFargeville. After five years' residence here he married Alzina L Sheldon, 1833-1905, daughter of Benjamin B. Sheldon 1829-1879. They have had five children, one of whom died in infancy, and four survive, viz.: Myra M. 1865-1930, Fred S., Julia E., and Sarah R.

Mrs. Charry Sheldon 1830-1905, mother of Alizina resided with her daughter until her death at age 86. Miss C. A. Sheldon, sister of Alizina also resided here.

Eli T. Sargent was born in Hounsfield in 1831 and died in 1902 in Orleans. He attended the common schools until he was 16 years of age, and received a practical education. In 1850 at the age of 21 he married Maria L. Casler of Orleans, the daughter of Peter I. and Elizabeth Casler. They resided at Orleans Four Corners. There children were:

2nd Benjamin F. was not married, and resided on road 31, corner 35

2nd William Sargent married Elizabeth Walts, and they had seven children, viz.: 3rd Clark W., 3rd Mary M., 3rd Simeon W., 3rd Catharine M., 3rd John W., 3rd Viola N. and 3rd Ida E.

2nd Edmund Sargent, at the age of 21 years, in 1842, married Louisa Young, daughter of David Young of Pamelia. They had six children: William H., George L., Byron A., Eleanor T. and Orville.

3rd William H. married Emogene Marble and resided in Michigan.

3rd George L. married Cornelia Smith, Orleans.

3rd Byron A. married Eveline L. Tanner, also Orleans.

3rd Eleanor F. married Benjamin Petrie, Alexandria.

William Sargent was born about 1779 in Newfield, Sussex County, England, died 12 May 1860. In 1821 he immigrated to the United States and located in the town of Hounsfield, Jefferson County. He married Mary Foster (b. 1796-d. 1879). They moved to the



William Knight Sr. witness (signed) the Will of his neighbor Samuel Brown of Jan 1748 ...from Minutes of Nottingham Monthly Meeting 1730-1778 film M-661 Maryland Archives, Annapolis, Md.

Sarah Brown (Knight) wife of John Knight (the son of William Knight and Elizabeth Rogers)—Sarah being the daughter of Jacob Brown Sr. ...from Baltimore Monthly Meeting, Certificate's of Removal 1796-1819, film M577a page 59 Maryland Archives.

The Baltimore Sun newspaper, dated 20 Sep 1813, mentions that following the death of Jacob Brown, John Knight and Sarah were to share in the sale of North Chippingham, a farm located on the MD and PA state line.



Knight House Located on the **Brownville & Perch River Road** Jefferson County, New York

This is an upright house made from native limestone located on the Brownville-Perch River road a few miles outside of the village of Brownville, NY. It's been stated that George I. Knight built the house about 1834. However it may have been constructed earlier. An earlier deed, dated 9 Jan 1809, stated there was slightly more than 268 acres, of which this farm was a part, including this house, purchased by Israel Knight from James Donation Le Ray de Chaumont for \$1,670.

Israel Knight was one of the early settlers in the Town of Brownville, a native of Bucks County, PA, whence had come General Jacob Brown, founder and promoter of Brownville, NY. Knight had known Brown in Pennsylvania and when the latter purchased a part of the Chassanis Tract he undoubtedly induced Knight to invest in some of the land.

Isaac Knight, an heir of Israel Knight, acquired title of 200 acres and this house as recorded by a deed dated 18 Mar 1836.

George I. (J) Knight died on 2

Sep 1872. He had became a man of wealth, for in his will executed on 16 Sep 1869 he bequeathed, among other things, \$3,000 in government bonds to his widow Mrs. Esther (Morris/Donaldson) Knight. To his son, Jacob B. Knight, was left a gold repeater watch. George I. had bought this watch from his Uncle Tyson back in 1810.

This conveyance later was transferred from Isaac and Juliana Maria Knight of Baltimore, MD to George I. Knight, in the Town of Brownville. George I. had been residing on the property previous to the transfer.

On 5 Mar 1866 the house and 135.86 acres where sold to William C. and Martha Closson for \$8,830.00.

After Mr. Closson died Mrs. Closson sold the farm to Myron Buckmin-

ster of Brownville for \$5,706.12 on 3 Oct 1891.

Mr. Buckminster also belonged to one of the Town of Brownville's earliest families, his father, Richard Buckminster, a native of Plattsburgh, where he was born in 1800, having come to Watertown in 1816, settling in Brownville three years later. Richard Buckminster, after settling in Brownville, married Mary Avery, whose father, Frederick Avery, had located in that township in 1802.

Besides Myron, Frederick Avery Buckminster was one of the six children of Richard and Mary Avery Buckminster. Frederick Avery Buckminster served in Company I, 10th New York Heavy Artillery, in the Civil War and died 13 Jul 1870, at the age of 29. Richard Buckminster, father of the former, died 29 May 1883. That this was a man of prominence in the town is indicated by the fact that in 1840 he was master of Brownville Lodge, No. 378, F. & A. M.

The Buckminster ownership in this property goes back a period of nearly 57 years, for after Myron Buckminster's possession of it—Frederick R. and Lottie A. Buckminster acquired title to it and on 19 Feb 1912 conveyed it to Lewis J. Buckminster, the present owner (this was at the time of this orginal publication). At the time of that conveyance Mr. and Mrs. Fred Buckminster were residents of Watertown.

There are six rooms in the stone portion of the old house, to which has been added a large modern wing and long verandah of frame construction. There has been much other alteration which has changed the original appearance of the house, one of several homes of native limestone built along that road.

Note: I must have read this caption for this house four times before I, Bonita Hawbaker Shafer, Corresponding Secretary of the JCGS, picked up on the "from his native home in Bucks County PA". My hus-

band and I are from Hagerstown Maryland with roots in both PA, MD and VA. Until now I had not even thought of checking for any ancestral connection here in New York States North County, Jefferson County.

That night I started checking though my own Knight family data (my grandfather being James Franklin Knight). I found that I had a John Knight born 1781 (this is date based of his death notice) who was married to a Sarah Brown daughter of Jacob Brown. Could this be a connection?

Then I found the name Brown and Knight popping up often on my grandfather's side. The earliest is Elizabeth Brown, married to Thomas Knight in 1686, in Burlington County, New Jersey.

They had two sons (Thomas 1687-1746) and (William ca. 1690 still alive in 1747, date and place of death unknown) ...taken from a manuscript published in 1973, by William Beckett Brown III, titled, "Thomas Knight of Pennsylvania and some of his descendants."

Thomas had a son named Abel Knight 1719-1810. William had two sons, Thomas was alive in 1755 and William Jr. 1718-1783. William was born in the Ablington area, Buck County near Philadelphia, PA ...extracted from PA Vital Records Vol. 1, Register of Baptisms 1701-1746, First Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia.

William is my Knight direct line. William Knight married Elizabeth Rogers, they had three sons and five daughters: William, John, Thomas, Elizabeth, Judith, Sarah, Ann and Mary.

Their daughter Elizabeth married William Brown, a Quaker Minister, Elizabeth Knight and William Brown had 11 children: William, Susanna Elizabeth i, Judith, Abigail, Deborah, Elizabeth ii, Elijah, Phebe, Elizabeth iii and Daniel.

There is a will of Feb 1794 for William Brown, recorded in Cheater County Will Book I, Vol. 9, pg. 243. William Brown had died at his home in East Nottinghan, Township of Chester County, PA, 13 Mar. 1794. at the age of 61. He is buried in the Brick Meeting House graveyard. The Nottingham Monthly Meeting approved a Memorial for him. Elizabeth died 3 Jan 1812. ...from Alice L. Beards—"Nottingham Quakers 1680-1889 Family Line Publications".

The community of NOTTING-HAM LOTTS is located in southern Chester County, PA and parts of northern Cecil County, MD. Two brothers, James and William Brown settled Nottingham in 1701.

They where members of the Friends Meeting at New Castle, Delaware ..."from Johnston a History of Cecil County 1880."

In November 1701, twenty families applied to Pennsylvania Commissioners to purchase between 15,000 and 20,000 acres at a price of eight pounds per hundred acres. The Brown brothers helped organize the East Nottingham Friends meeting in 1704. The Meeting House was built in 1709 from chestnut and poplar logs. It was replaced after a fire with a brick and stone structure. The "Brick Meeting House" still stands in the village of Calvert, Md at the junction of MD and Rt. 272 and Rt. 273. I have a copy of the reproduction survey for the property of Samuel Brown completed by J. C. John Churchman in 1743. This survey map indicated that Samuel Brown's neighbors were Thomas Brown, Jno Allin (Allen), James Johnson, William Knight, Mary Elgar, Thomas Rogers, William Kirk and Jacob Haines.

In a will, dated 1772, for Thomas Roger the witnesses were William Knight, Jacob Brown and Timothy Kirk.

Henry Knight witnessed the marriage of Nathan Brown and Mary Elgar on 11 Jun 1743 ...from Minutes of Nottingham Monthly Meeting 1730-1778 film M-661 Maryland





town of Orleans abt 1833. William and Mary Foster had 14 children: William (1813-1889), Edmund (1820-1900), Eli T. (1831-1902), Mary, Sarah, Dr. Edward L. (1833-1907), and Benjamin F. (1837-1906), Orvil (1836-1852).

Ludwig Schaber was born 1799 in Langen, Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany. In 1847 he immigrated to the United States and settled in the village of Redwood, the town of Alexandria, and one year later located in this town and purchased the home where he resided. He married Anna M. Fink born 1807, in Hesse-Darmstadt. They had seven children, five of whom are living, viz.: Margaret E., Valentine, Philip and George H. Schaber.

1st Margaret E. married William Spies, Jr., of Redwood.

1st George H. attended the common schools, and worked on his father's farm until he attained his majority, and then worked by the month for his father for about 14 years. He married Celia A., adopted daughter of Lot Miller, of Theresa. They had four children, viz.: Katie A. and Gertrude [sic] L., who died in infancy, and Anna Maria Laura and Ernest L., who survive. Mr. Schaber was a farmer. Lugwig Schaber died on 14 Sep 1896 and Anna-Maria Fink Schaber died 19 Oct 1886.

Philip Sourwine was born 1802 in Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany. In 1830 immigrated to this country and located in New York City, where he married Mary Baldtuff, who bore him five children, three of whom survive, viz.: Mary E., George H., and Philip 1840-1915.

After the death of Philip Sourwine his widow moved with her children to the Town of Clayton.

1st George H. Sourwine, when about nine years of age, went to live with his uncle, with whom he remained until he was 18. He worked at farming for seven years thereafter, and at the age of 25 married Mary Baltz 1837-1931, daughter of Andrew Baltz, of Orleans. They had six children, one of whom died in infancy:

2nd Clara R. 1862-1870.

2nd Anna M., who resides in Chicago, III.

2nd Stella L.

2nd Charles A. 1871-1941, married Lucelia Grooms

2nd Eva M. The family resides on road 61, in this town.

Henry F. Timmerman, of German descent. was born 8 Mar 1811 in Manheim, Herkimer County NY. He moved to town of Orleans in 1834 and married Elizabeth Miller 1811-1867, the daughter of Peter Miller Henry F. and Elizabeth Miller. They had 10 children: Charlotte b. 1834, Fidelia born 1836, Mary M. b. 1838, Anson and Byanse (twins) b. 1840, George H. 1843-1876., Grandison C., Cornelius and Cornelia (twins) b. 1849 Cornelius d. 1871 and Cornelia who died in infancy.

1st Grandison C. received a common school education, and worked on the farm until he attained his majority. He also engaged in cheesemaking for about two years. In 1869 he married Maria A. Hilliker, b. Aug 1848, daughter of William Hilliker, from the villiage of Dexter in Brownville. William Hilliker came to this country from Wiltshire, England, in 1837. On 10 Nov 1885, Mr. Timmerman was appointed postmaster of Orleans Four Corners.

John Tyler father of Mrs. W. U. Nunn, was born in Connecticut in 1812. His parents removed to this town when he was in his infancy and located at Stone Mills. In 1842 he married Martha Cobb, of Collins Landing. He died December 3, 1881.

Charles T. Nunn, at the age of 22 years, married **Mary C.**, daughter of John Tyler. They have a son and a daughter, namely: John W. and Cora I.

Cora I. married Leonard Kling, and they have one daughter, Ethel.

John W. married Reita Emmett, of Wells Island.

"All you can raise on Pine" Plains is hell, huckleberries and children," people joked; yet from the start, Theresa seemed the most ideally suited for a military camp.

The idea first came from General Philip Read in 1906 (formerly a Colonel at Madison Barracks) when the War Department was looking for land for National Guard Camps.

The Watertown's Chamber of Commerce did a survey and came up with a price tag of \$400,000 for 20,000 acres—but this was too rich for the War department's budget.¹ So the Chamber of Commerce, together with land agents of the New York Central Railroad, secured options on fewer acres at a lower price.

Cemeteries on Fort Drum

he cemeteries on Fort Drum. familiar enough to those who work and live on the military reservation, are off-limits to civilians 362 day a year. Only on Memorial Day, 4th of July and Labor Day are the mortars and howitzers silenced and the orange road gates lifted from 12 to 5 p.m. During these five hours, instead of the usual military vehicles, Fords and Chevys, pick-up trucks and minivans roam the roads as people visit the graves of family and friends. Most visitors are local, but some come from as far away as Florida or Arizona. searching for a dimly remembered relative or a missing leaf in their genealogical tree. On Memorial Day. men and women from the Veterans of Foreign Wars arrive with miniature American flags to honor the gravestones of veterans.

But where did they come from, these forlorn markers of a vanished past? Sheepfold, Slocum-Child, Cooper, St. Mary's, Gates, Derby-Hubbard, Pierce, Alexandria Road, Woods Mills, St. Patrick's: although now all within the military reservation, these cemeteries existed long before Fort Drum, before Camp Drum, even before Pine Camp and Pine Plains. Their stories go back to the little villages of LeRaysville, Sterlingville, North Wilna, Woods Mill and Lewisburg, all of which were taken over in the 1941 expansion of the post.

THE TOWNSHIP OF LERAY

The aristocrat James D. LeRay de Chaumont, whose family had befriended Benjamin Franklin in Paris. owned much of the land in and around Jefferson County. It was Benjamin Brown, a brother of General Jacob Brown of Brownville, that built the first sawmill and dam on the Pleasant Creek in 1801, near the present Remington Pond, on land purchased from LeRay. That community was called Brown's Mill. Four years later, a Dr. Baudry, sent by LeRay, came to select a location for his employer's "grand manor house."1 When the mansion was completed, the village name was changed to LeRaysville. Later, a larger, more imposing house furnished in stone was completed. With its gardens and parks and artificial lake, it was described as "the most splendid establishment west of the Hudson"² a "miniature Versailles" where LeRay held court and once entertained President James Monroe and Napoleon's brother, Joseph Bonaparte.

In this little hamlet, LeRay opened a land office and a store. Because it was located on the crossroads of routes connecting the villages of Evans Mills to Great Bend and Black River to Philadelphia that Antwerp and LeRaysville became a tiny transporta-

I want to thank you for the article on the "Knight House" which appeared in the January issue of the INFORMER. I sincerely hope you can solve the mysteries you have and connect the families which you are researching.

There was a certain irony connected to the appearance of a picture of that particular house in that particular issue done at that particular time. When my cousin, Richard Buckminster, died in January, I rued the ending of a once-noted Brownville family line. Being into genealogy, of course, we think of such things. But the circumstances under which the loss of Richard's occurred made for more than usual sadness.

During the same ice storm which delayed the publication of the Informer, he lost (8 Jan 1998) his wife, Laura, as she was endeavoring to make do, as you all did, during that horrible storm. He had been sleeping and when he awoke, he found her dead out in the kitchen. Richard, being of poor health, was not able to withstand the shock of this, so he was taken to a nursing home immediately, only to pass on himself within two weeks (29 Jan 1998). They were buried at the same time, Laura's interment being delayed because of the storm.

To see that house in the IN-FORMER, served as further closure for the well-respected family who owned the house for so many years. I feel guite certain that the re-publication of picture's was a matter of coincidence. But the picture provided me one last glimpse of a place I visited often as a child—as I look at the picture I can almost hear, "King," the 1940's family dog, as he viciously prowled the back woodshed in his endeavor to protect the family within. He was a terror. I can almost feel the fall weather coming and myself stooping to pick up the "drops" from the pear trees which graced the front lawn, amidst the most fertile myrtle (vine) that I've ever seen in one place. Never did I realize that the house was so old, but I do know that there was a dark and dreary aura in there-not a very cheerful place for a kid.

Thanks again. My Uncle Lew, with his few words and grunting manner, would show a rare smile of appreciation, also.

The Government eventually paid about \$6.00 an acre for 10,893 acres.² It was Congressman Charles L. Knapp of Lowville who introduced the appropriations bill that passed in 1909, making Pine Camp a permanent summer training facility, earning him the name of "Father of Pine Plains."³

The first camp was held from June 15 to July 15 in 1908, with 2,000 regular army troops and 6,000 guardsmen, under the command of Major General Fredrick D. Grant, son of Ulysses S. Grant. Among the first to arrive was a battalion of infantrymen who marched all the way from Buffalo, NY with their ambulances and mule-drawn water wagons.⁴ And a few days later, 69 Guardsman reached Watertown after a 4-day walk from Syracuse.⁵

The military thought the Pine Plains ideal—high and dry, long level stretches, woods for camping and a supply of wholesome water. Early postcards showed young men digging ditches with the caption "Wanted: Healthy Young Men Not Afraid of Work." The soldiers, however, may have had other thoughts, coming into an area with no real roads, no buildings, sleeping in what was called "Tent City," and living on a "steady diet of liverwurst."⁶

Nevertheless, the camp was successful and was repeated over the subsequent years, eventually moving from Great Bend to across the Black River. Tents were put up on concrete slabs, cement buildings added and additional parcels of land acquired. Pine Camp was on its way!

Throughout the 1920's and '30's, regular army and national guard troops trained at Pine Camp, a grounds which "easily could be developed into one of the most practical army training grounds in the country," according to a report of the time.

But it was the threat of World War II and the general concern for the country's military readiness that

spurred the great expansion of 1940-41. Plans were to establish a home for a new division, the 4th Armored Division which later won fame in Europe.

About 1,000 acres of land over six townships began to be acquired by the Land Acquisition Board, located in the old Electric Building in Watertown. This required tracing deeds, surveying and appraising land, securing options and making purchases.⁷

An 84,000-acre track had to be vacated by September 1, 1941. Two thousand people would relocate from 525 area families. Three thousand buildings would be removed, including 24 schools, 6 churches and one post office. Ernest Cook commented that "armored cars will rumble over the acres where the peaceloving Quakers had their church." When the dust cleared, only the LeRay mansion would remain standing.

Eliminated were the villages of LeRaysville, Sterlingville, Lewisburg, North Wilna and Woods Mills, as well as the smaller settlements of Slocumville, Reedville, Nauvoo, Spragueville, East Antwerp and Alpina. Antwerp lost one-third of its property taxes. LeRay lost a quarter of its areas, Philadelphia a third and part of Diana disappeared.

Pictures⁸ show piles of household goods in yards and caravans of trucks carting away everything from couches to cattle. People moved to Adams, Ellisburg, Mexico, Pulaski, Oswego and Lewis County, even into the Mohawk Valley. For those who stayed locally, the enlarged reservation functioned like a 107,000 acre "lake" to get around, causing major changes in their economic and social life.

Although some people welcomed the expansion and other didn't, no one could doubt the reality of the economic impact—the North Country had landed a 20 million-dollar construction project. Eight hundred buildings, including 240 barracks, 84 mess halls, 86 day rooms, 86 company store houses, 99 recreation buildings, 27 officer quarters, a 41 station hospital and miles and miles of new highways—the materials alone could have filled a 2,889 car train. In ten months \$6,403,030 was paid out in salaries to laborers.⁹

Pine Camp was gearing up for World War II—cemeteries was not a priority. Everyone had a job to do, but there was no job description that included cemeteries. Even if there had been a person in charge of gathering information, it would have been extremely difficult for him or her to do so.

No records of the villages were transferred to the camp at the time of the expansion. None of the village was incorporated—none had village clerks or librarians or historians. What information there was to gather was gathered informally by families, like the Pierces, or individuals like Mrs. Ray Petersen, who was born in Sterlingville. Mrs. Peterson has accumulated over 12 scrapbooks of clippings over the last 40 years.

In 1966 the "National Preservation History Act" was passed and all branches of the military service had to interpret how to comply with it. Fort Drums meant compliance by establishing a Historical Preservation Plan. Now there was a plan for the management of cultural resources and includes its historical sites.¹⁰

One aspect of this plan was to hire the cultural resource firm of Louis Berger and Associates, out of New Jersey. (This was prior to the 1985 expansion.) Their research was to provide the "background information necessary for the nomination of these properties to the National Register of Historic Places. And also to locate data for their continued protection under the evolving Historic Preservation Plan," according to Task Order #18 called the Village Mapping Program. To date there are 10 to 12 such completed studies.

Since researching the cemeteries was not part of the mission of Fort Drum, as these cemeteries are not

Federal cemeteries, they were not included in this project. In today's policy the cemeteries fall under the jurisdiction of the Environmental Division but still not a priority. The Division's first priority is to identify new archeological sites."

In 1993 Schadock was able to obtain some grant money from a Federal program called Legacy to hire a contractor to develop a database containing the names of the cemeteries, plot numbers, first and last names on gravestones, dates, epitaphs (if any) and the condition of the stones. She uses this information to help people who call with questions about where their family members are buried.

In 1941 then Brigadier-General Irving J. Phillipson stood before a

packed gymnasium in the Philadelphia High School answering questions about the proposed Pine Camp expansion.

Question-"What will happen to our cemeteries?" called one resident from the back.

Answer-"The cemeteries on the military reservation will remain unmolested," the Brigadier-General promised.

Summary-They have. Even though the expansion of Camp Drum meant the end Pine Plains (one of the North Country's outstanding landmarks and of 130 years of settlement in the area) the cemeteries have remained carefully fenced off and almost unchanged, except for the stresses of weather, for the last 57 years since the last expansion.

Perhaps now we should and can look to cemetery preservation as well. This is where you all can help!

tion hub and mini administrative center. A tavern opened in 1810 and a post office in 1818. By 1821 the village had a gristmill, 20 houses and a school. By 1860 it peaked with a population of 120 and about a dozen stores and businesses: then it slowly declined.³

Sheepfold Cemetery or Pine Plains Graveyard

Three cemeteries are located in and around what used to be Le-Raysville, which is now the heart of the Fort Drum cantonment or main camp. The most accessible, which can be visited at any time, is right off route 26 going toward Great Bend. It's called the Pine Plains Graveyard,4 three acres on the LeRay estate at the edge of Pine Plains, much larger than the area seen today. Locally known as the Sheepfold Cemetery, a 1942⁵ article suggest that it may have begun as a private burial place for the LeRay family, but no LeRay's are buried there. After LeRay's bankruptcy and the disposal of his family property, it became the general cemetery for the village, although the land itself was never deeded to the village.

After LeRay death the Payens bought the estate including the cemetery land and are buried there. The large family monument in the front row is topped by a stone urn. It also includes Jules Rene Payen, a native of France and Knight of the Legion of Honor, his wife Annette, daughter Julia and her husband, William Phelps.

More interesting, perhaps is the broken, crumbling headstone far in the back, almost in the woods. It is a plain marble slab, once five feet high, erected by LeRay's three children, Vincent, Alexandra and Theresa for their nurse Rachel, who died in 1834.⁶ Unreadable now, it used to say, "Rachel is a good and faithful nurse." Although the children called her "Aunt Rachel," she was an African American and served in the LeRay household along with

other "colored co-servitors."7

In early colonial times, New York State did a brisk business in slaves. The 1810 Federal Census records 22 slaves in Jefferson County: in the 1814 census, there were 30 slaves, 4 listed in the Town of LeRay. According to an article written by Jefferson County Historian, Laura Scharer, based on original Federal Census records, LeRay himself owned 3. Even though New York State outlawed slavery in 1827, blacks were still legally considered property. The 1857 Dred Scott decision of the Supreme Court ruled that because Scott was "property," he could be transported from state to state.

Although Rachel, who died free,⁸ may have had the only marked stone. It is possible that other slaves could have been buried in unmarked graves just outside the main part of the old cemetery.

Quaker Hill Cemetery

In addition to the French in LeRay, there was also a strong Quaker influence. Hidden from view, at the top of a hill along Fourth Street, lies the cemetery called "Slocum-Child."9 Today the visitor drives in from the road, along a dirt road. Originally there used to be a narrow lane that led over the crest of the hill to the stone wall which marked the boundary of the cemetery. Because of the early Quakers who settled here, this became know as Quaker Hill.

The first Friends Meeting House was a log cabin near Pleasant Creek. When it burned down, a stone house was built in 1816. This was near the intersection of Route 26 and Bedlam Road, or Wards Corners. The Old Stone Church became a local landmark. Quaker families from distant farms arrived in heavy wagons hitched to teams of horses. Men sat on the high wooden benches on the right and black bonneted women on the left. No words were spoken, until someone was moved by the spirit to speak, according to a 1935 letter¹⁰ by Minnie Ward Kellogg, who grew up nearby. She recalls that "in the woods behind the meeting house, many of the old Quakers were buried." But no trace of that graveyard has been found, perhaps because, as she continues, "The graves were later removed to the LeRaysville Cemetery."

Slocum-Child Graveyard

This second cemetery was the result of a dispute amongst the Quakers over whether or not to use music and pastors in the service. The conservatives left and built another church, a simple wooden structure, close to the village and bought land from Stephan Robertsⁿ where they established the Slocum-Child graveyard.

These early settlers, though in keeping with the Quaker custom of avoiding signs of worldly wealth, had no headstones. But Thomas Hart, a grandson of the founding Quaker Joseph Child, had come from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to settle on the Hill.12 His grandson relates, "I have seen my grandfather ... painstakingly go after the people of a departed to mark the grave with some field stone he had picked up on the way to the cemetery." Some time afterwards, Child would tell a few individuals in the congregation about the shape or kind of stone he put on the grave, so those family members knew where their loved ones were buried.

In 1931 the LeRay Superintendent of Highways ordered the restoration of this cemetery and Ernest Cook, who wrote many articles on local history for the *Watertown Daily Times*, visited it with Mr. Hart. Cook noted that after the fieldstones, the first row of graves belonged to the Child family: Samuel, who died in 1862, and then Moses, Nancy, son Amos, age 11 and daughter Lydia, also 11. As Cook walked through the cemetery, he recorded the names of two Civil War veterans, Caleb Slocum and James H. THE

Palmer. Also buried here is Samuel G. Slocum, the man for whom Slocumville, a tiny village north of LeRaysville known for its powder factory and woolen mill, was named. There are families of Gardners, Robert and Burdicks. The gravestone of one young Burdick, Mercy Jane, who died at 18, reads:

"God made thee as a bud too fair, To Bloom on this earth;

And chose for thee a brighter place Among flowers of heavenly birth."

Today, the stone wall is crumbling and overgrown with chokecherries. There are few fieldstones. But Samuel's grave (along with his families) is just as Cook described it. The Civil War veterans are easily found and Mercy Jane's stone, her inscription almost unreadable, still stands beside those of her mother and father.

Cooper Cemetery

The third cemetery in the Town of LeRay is located near the western border of the cantonment, tucked away behind the Post's new Health Center. This is the very small, family cemetery, not discovered until a 1986 survey for the construction of a road. Research by the Louis Berger Firm revealed that it belonged to William Cooper, or Guillaume Coupart, also known as the "French" Cooper, whom left his homeland to avoid conscription in the Napoleonic Wars.

Originally, the farmstead was located about a quarter of a mile northeast of the Bedlam and Conway Roads intersection. Now the approach is, once again, from the south by way of a dead end dirt lane and off on the ridge of a low hill surrounded by maples. Enclosed by a low limestone retaining wall are the 5 graves: William, who died in 1851 is buried next to his wife Margaret, their son William Junior who died in 1871, his wife Elvira, and their daughter Margaret who died at 21. Approximately six feet behind the gravestones are the footstones, small stones that mark the

end of the grave so that the burial site will not be disturbed when others are added.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PHILADELPHIA

Leaving LeRaysville, we travel north towards Philadelphia, turn onto the old Reedville Road just before Strickland Corners, cross a small plank bridge over Black Creek and arrive at what used to be the village of Sterlingville. Here, in the heart of the Pine Plains, we discover two more cemeteries.

St. Mary's Cemetery or Catholic Cemetery (Mil-Savage & Varley Cemetery)

St. Mary's, sun-drenched in front, shaded by old oaks in the back, is called the "Catholic Cemetery" by folks who lived in the area. Originally, the church stood here, but in the winter of 1885 it was moved across the frozen ice of the creek and into the village. The family names of Savage and Varley dominate and Savage-Varley is the name given to it by the Graveyard Platoon.

Town Burying Ground (Military-Gates Cemetery)

A mile or so further is the "Protestant Cemetery," referred to as the "Town Burying Ground"13 and listed as the Gates Cemetery by Fort Drum because it was thought to come from farm land owned by the Gates family. Rectangular in shape, it is much larger than St. Mary's, having served a variety of denominations. Around some of the larger tombstones are wrought iron railings or simple thick iron posts, standing alone at intervals like solitary sentinels. Names like Hatch and Backus, Myers and Caster, Ritter, and Essington (the family who built an iron forge and saw mill in the village) appear on the stones, most which date back to the last three decades of the 1800's.

James Sterling, the founder of the village, built the first blast furnace to work the ore from the mines at Antwerp in 1825. Forming the Sterling Iron Company, he was famous for his "cold blast charcoal pig iron," which was known as Sterling Iron.¹⁴ Sterling also gave his name to two other shorter-lived villages in the area, Sterlingburg and Sterlingbush.

A large man, Sterling weighed 396 pounds, and folklore has it that he put a four pound weight in his pocket to make it an even 400. In the lobby of Watertown's Hotel Woodruff, he had a specially manufactured chair. In 1865, this furnace under Sterling's sons produced 1,000 tons of iron for use in the Civil War and consumed 160,000 bushels of charcoal.¹⁵ By the late 1860's there were over two dozen businesses in the village, including 4 mills, 2 doctors, a carriage maker and a music teacher. But by the 1890's, the village was declining and becoming more of a farming community.

THE TOWNSHIP OF WILNA

Woods Mills Cemetery

Leaving Sterlingville along the Reedville Road, we head east toward the Indian River and what used to be the little village of Wood's Mills. A trail, not much wider than a car, winds down to where the water rushes under a wooden bridge. Woods Mills is inside the Main Impact Area and a sign warns us that there are unexploded shells, or duds, in the ground. Although not likely, any one of these could be set off by geologic or weather changes, perhaps even by the weight of a vehicle inching along the road. Across the bridge, and along the right bank are the ruins of a long abandoned grist mill; about a half a mile up the road to the left is the cemetery.

Here, another sign reads "Families who have had headstones damaged by shelling should call the post." Most of the badly damaged stones

came from an incident back in 1988 when mortar shells fell short of their target, according to Cait Shaduck, Cultural Resources Program Manager at Fort Drum. The cemetery itself dates back to 1820 and has about 50 graves.16 Among the families buried there are the Randalls, Canfield, Kelley, King, Swind, Mack, Hull and Tooley, as well as 2 soldiers from the War of 1812.17 A family member (that's all?) may still be buried here, according to Mrs. Shad and there was one burial two years ago. Town records, however, must be checked to make sure that no existing grave is disturbed, since some graves have no markers.

First called Woods or Woods Settlement, the village on the Indian River grew up around the saw and grist mills that Jonathan Wood built when he and his wife Betsey came from the Oneida Section in 1833. William Wood, a preacher at Natural Bridge, introduced Methodism to the area. The first church, a "Methodist Episcopalian," was built in 1849 for \$500.18 There was farms, a school, a blacksmith and the Carter and Randall's Butter Tub Factory that produced over 10,000 tubs of butter a year, according to historian Child. Wood's Mills was a typical rural village. Mrs. Ester White, a descendant of Jonathan Wood and whose father owned a dairy farm, recalls19 a daily life revolving around school and church, ice cream socials, the spring sugaring season, winters of hauling ice from the river on horse drawn sleights.

Lake School Road Cemetery (Mil-Derby-Hubbard)

We find the Lake School-Gormley Road Cemetery on transportation routes that people used in their everyday life here before Camp Drum expanded: now they are called historic roads. The cemetery on this road is a private cemetery, like the Quaker Slocum-Child, St. Mary's, Woods Mills and Pierce. Meaning that the property is still owned by the towns. Even though Fort Drum

mows all the cemeteries, both government and private, there is no written agreement to do so with the towns, explains Mrs. Schadock.

The Lake School Road, or Derby-Hubbard, cemetery is dappled in sun and shade. Swarms of black flies circle above the gravestones, many of which face away from the road. Here are buried one Revolutionary War soldier, four from the War of 1812 and one from the Civil War (William Covey, a private from the 29th Regiment of the New York Calvary, who died in 1922). The names on the gravestones include Biggs, Flint, Marrieta, Ford, Ambrose, Pennington, as well as Hubbards and Derbys, many of whom were born in the mid 1800's and died in the early 1900's.

Cooper Cemetery

The cemetery on Alexandria Road is one of the most difficult to find. The road is often under water from branches of the Black Creek, which crisscrosses it. On another day trying to reach it, we must leave our truck, cross a bridge that is closed to traffic and walk the three-quarters of a mile. Goldenrod, Black-eyed Susans and Red Prints bloom along the gravel road, not much wider than the original one in the early 1800's.

The cemetery is a small parcel of land nestled against a sand dune. There are at least seven stones: Goodrich, Owens, Myers, Read, Maynard, Hinds and Cooper. In the Jefferson County Genealogical Room of the Flower Memorial Library, a binder on the Wilna Cemeteries lists this as the Cooper Cemetery, Pine Plains and records 8 names, Lucy Maynard being listed twice, once alone and once as the wife of Samuel.

What looks like a willow tree is engraved on many of the stones. The one for William E. Cooper bears the inscriptions "My soul is filled with love," and "Meet me in Heaven." He was 13. Except for the two Myers, husband and wife, no one in this cemetery seems related. Were they interrelated? Neighbors? Is this simply the surviving part of a much larger cemetery? There are no crossroads nearby, nothing but woods and dunes. Where did these people live? The closest settlement on the old maps was Reedsville. What happened here that no one was interred after 1866? Isolated, with crumbling headstones, these people have no recoverable history.

Pierce Cemetery

As easy to find as the Alexandria, was difficult, the Pierce Cemetery is right off the US Military Highway north of Fargo, in the Town of Wilna. This well cared for cemetery, in which people can still be buried, is administered by the Pierce Cemetery Association. Originally, the Pierces came from Vermont, as part of the general movement of people West-They became farmers and ward. one of the early settlers gave the land for the cemetery, thought to be part of an Indian burial ground. Besides the Pierces, there are Crowners, Fishers, Averys (one of whom was a Civil War veteran), Graves, Ashcrafts, Grahams and Gibbs.

LEWIS COUNTY

Parish Cemetery (Military-Doyle-Mulvaney)

About a half a mile south of Lewisburg on a gravel road lies a cemetery surrounded by dense pine. Called Doyle-Mulvaney by the military, originally this was the Parish Cemetery of St. Patrick's Church, built in 1888, in Lewisburg.20 Thomas and Lucy Nolan donated the land for this cemetery. They came from County Meath in Ireland. Parishioners from St. Henry's in Natural Bridge also used this burial ground.21 A few stones are covered with dates as early as 1818, but most are from the middle to late 1800's.

St. Patrick's Cemetery

Lewisburg, like the other Fort Drum villages, began with a sawmill in 1825 and was a stagecoach stop on the Russell Turnpike. Later. when two Frenchmen built an Iron Furnace, the village was called Louisburg (original spelling), after Louis Fannel a French Capitalist. In 1852 the entire iron works and community was bought by "Big Jim" Sterling for \$10,000 and the name of the village was changed to Sterling-"Big Jim" had big ideas, to bush. drain the swamps and build roads, he hired Irish laborers, many of whom had fled Ireland because of the Potato famine. For this reason, the names in the St. Patrick's cemetery are predominately Irish: O'Rourke, Taggart, Jarvis, Cain, Weeks, McDonald, Dundon, McTaggart. When the village was sold to the Jefferson Iron Company in 1869, the village name returned to Lewisburg.

Beaman-Aldrich Cemetery (Military-Hillside)

At least two cemeteries in Lewis County remain elusive. Everts and Holcomb state that "On Sterlingville Road {now the Antwerp Road} is a short two miles from Antwerp near the residence of J. M. Beaman. The land was donated by Ira whose remains are buried there as are many members of the Beaman-Aldrich." On early military maps, it is named Hillside, but this is an error; its historic name is Beaman-Aldrich. Soldiers on maneuvers have occasionally come across this cemetery. Mrs. Nancy Raymon, Antwerp Town Historian, says that her son-in-law last saw the cemetery about seven years ago. At that time, there were about a dozen stones and remnants of the Another metal fence still stood. friend, also a soldier, passed by the cemetery this past March, but he and Mrs. Raymon were not able to locate it on Memorial Day.

Bacon Cemetery (Military-Freeman)

Far north along Fuller Road, between Antwerp and Sprague's Corners and inside the Main Impact area, lies another gravevard. A forester working on Fort Drum discovered it in 1969. Although there had been no town or hamlet, in the area, there was a little settlement there, above Sterlingbush with a school.

The 12 stones are from the families of Bacon, Fuller, Pomeroy and Paxton and date from 1846-1870. The cemetery's name is Bacon, not Freeman, as the military labeled it. Relatives used to visit the site, but now many are too old. However, the last time one of the "old-timers" went out there, he found a beaver dam had flooded the area.

How is it that the villages to which these cemeteries belonged were signaled out for extinction when Fort Drum expanded? Where did the people go? The answers to these questions lie in the family genealogies, geography and geology of one the North Country's significant landmarks, the sandy stretches of Pine










Rasselus married Cora Hall of Philadelphia this county, on October 9, 1881, and they had a daughter, Bernice, and resided in the Town of Wilna.

Morton T. Bacon served in the late Civil War, and resided on Washington Street, in the village of Antwerp.

Levi Baldwin was born in Goshen, Conn., March 10, 1819. His father, Silas, died in 1824. Levi was twice married. His first wife was Eliza Pooler, of Goshen, Conn., whom he married February 27, 1847. They had two children. In 1863 he married Frances A., second daughter of E. C. Church, of Antwerp, and they had six children, five of whom survivd, namely: John L., William C., Lyman H., Orvis C. and Francis E. Mr. Baldwin was a cattle dealer and farmer.

His son, William C., was also a farmer, and resided in this town on Road 6. Mrs. Baldwin's father, E. C. Church, formerly resided in Berkshire County, Mass. Her brother was a county official, and resided in Canandaigua, Ontario County.

Samuel Barr was born in Salem, Mass., March 1, 1791, and when 12 years of age came with his parents to Champion, in this county. He was reared upon a farm, and attended the common schools until he attained the age of 15 years. In 1821 he married Polly Cleghorn, of Gouverneur, NY and four of their children were, namely: Dexter M., Olivia, Diantha and William Z.

The latter was born in the town of Champion, July 31, 1827, and received an academic education. In 1851 he married Lydia C., second

daughter of Dean Burt, formerly of Windsor, VT and they had four children, namely: Selecta J., Mary A., Benjamin F. and William Z. Jr.

In 1888 William Z. Jr., married Nettie M., fourth daughter of Edward Westwood, of Antwerp, and they had a son, William Z. 3rd, who was born March 16, 1889.

William Burtis, son of Samuel, was born in Pamelia, November 17, 1825, and attended the public schools of that town until he attained the age of 13 years. He married, first, Julia Murphy, of Philadelphia, NY by whom he had a son, James E. Mrs. Burtis died in May, 1851. In 1857 he married Harriet L. Allen, of Antwerp, by whom he had two sons and a daughter, namely: Carrie A., William S. and Charles T.

Ansel Clark, Jr., was born in Rutland, January 14, 1822, and when six weeks old came with his father to Antwerp. September 5, 1842, he married Hannah Otis, of Antwerp, and they had five children, two of whom were: Linda A. and Jerome 2nd.

The latter married Cora L., daughter of Amos Fuller, of Onondaga County, and they had two children, Lindon Logan and Edith May.

Jacob W. Cole was born in Otsego County, September 17, 1809. September 11, 1833, he married Catherine McFee, of Cherry Valley, and they had four sons and four daughters, namely: Elizabeth, Ezra, Margaret, David, Jacob S., Judson, Catherine and Frances.

Jacob S. Cole was born in this county, where he attended the common schools until he attained the age of 15 years. He married, in 1875, Ellen F., daughter of Peter A. Nellis, of Otsego County, and they had a son, Fred S.

In 1862 Mr. Cole enlisted in the Union army and served to the close of the war. His great-grandfather, Henry Lyon (or Lines), was a Revolutionary soldier.

Andrew McFee, father of Mrs. Jacob W. Cole, was captured by the Indians and taken to Canada, was adopted by a chief of the tribe and remained two years.

Abraham Cooper—born June 14, 1781. Abraham is the son of John

John F. Cornwell was born in Theresa, February 22, 1837. He was educated in the common schools and an academy, and later engaged in farming and horse breeding. In 1863 he married Lois A., only daughter of Clark Willard, and they had a daughter, Mary E., who married Frank O. Eddy, of Theresa, by whom she had a daughter, Marion Ellis.

James Dickson was born in Roxburghshire, Scotland, August 22, 1809. In 1831 he located in Brockville, Canada, where he worked at the carpenters' trade for a short time, when he moved to Rossie, St. Lawrence County. March 5, 1836, he married Betsey Laidlow, of St. Lawrence County, and they had seven children, namely: Euphania M., John 2nd, Alexander L., Robert, 2nd, James C., Jennie and Betsey Helena.

Robert, 2nd, was a farmer by occupation. November 6, 1867, he married Adelia E., daughter of James C. Lynde, and they had three children, James R., Anna E. and Milton L.

John Dickson, 2nd, was also a farmer, and lived on Road 32, in this town. March 4, 1879, he married Lucy A., third daughter of George Ormiston, of Ox Bow village, and they had two children, John C. and Helen E.

Robert Dickson came to this country from Scotland in 1835. He married Ann Wilson, of Roxboroughshire, Scotland, and they had two sons and two daughters, namely: Alexander W., Nellie, Jennett and John S.

The latter was educated in the public schools and lves Seminary, Antwerp. He married Sophia Lewis, of Wilna, and they have three children, viz.: Sylvenus R., Ora F. and Walter E. Mrs. Dickson's maternal ancestors were French. Mr. Dickson resided on Road 68.

Asa L. Eggleston was born in Champion, September 7, 1823, and at the age of three years moved with his parents to Antwerp. On December 26, 1844, he married Grace, second daughter of John Robinson, of this town, and they had six children, two of whom, Albert E. and Eva G., survived.

Asa L. Eggleston, Jr., served in the Civil War and died at Warrington Junction, VA. The family resided in this town near Ox Bow.

Augustus Fairbanks was born in Maine in 1803.

Ezra, his only surviving son, was born in Deerfield, NY where he attended the common schools until he attained the age of 16 years. On January 1, 1857, he married Emily M. Bacon, of Antwerp, and they had four children—three sons and a daughter—of whom the sons survived namely: Silas A., Arthur B. and Earl.

Arthur B. Fairbanks married Minnie, daughter of John P. Cranker, of OxBow village, where he resided. His father also resided here.

Marcus M. Gillett was born in Halifax, Vt., in 1816, and in 1820 he moved with his parents to this town and located near the Ox Bow. He married, first, Eliza Colony, of Ox-Bow village, by whom he had two children, Frank W. and Maria. His second wife, Olive, a sister of his first wife, bore him one daughter, Nettie.

Frank W. Gillett, the subject of this sketch, was born May 13, 1845. He attended the public schools until he attained the age of 17 years, when he enlisted in the Civil War. On January 20, 1868, he married Sarah E., youngest daughter of Samuel Ridsdale. They had three children namely: William M., Sarah E. and Ida C. Mr. Gillett's father was a Justice of the Peace 28 years. His grandfather, Lucius, served in the War of 1812.

Roswell Gleason was born in Antwerp in 1831. He married, first Berthena Lewis, of this town, and they had four children, of whom Wallace E. and Charles W. survived. His second wife, Sarah Fleming, of St. Lawrence County, bore him five children.

Charles W. Gleason was born in Theresa, April 5, 1863. On November 9, 1887, he married Nettie, daughter of the late Marcus M. Gillett by his second wife, and they had a son, Claude, and resided on Park Street, in OxBow village.

Erwin R. married Lydia A., daughter of Sylvus Peeler, of Antwerp, and they had three children, Effie F., Joseph F. and Eugene.

Joseph F. Graves, first named in this sketch, was the architect of his own fortune, and wished to be known as a Jackson Democrat.

Alexander Hall was born in the Mohawk valley in 1810, and when young moved with his parents to Lewis County. In 1835 he married Jane Murphy, of Lowville, by whom he had nine children, seven of whom survived namely: Elisha B., Stephen L., Lewis F., Walton E., Mary E., Florine A. and Theodocia.

Stephen L. was born in Lowville, June 30, 1839. April 26, 1864, he married Louise Kappler, of Buffalo, and they had six children namely: Walton L., Jennie, George H., Alfred S., Kattie L. and Charles A.

Daniel R. Hall was born in Antwerp in 1846. In 1865 he married Mrs. Miles, of LeRay, and they had three children, George W., Clara L., and Erwin G.

The latter was born October 15, 1866. On February 3, 1886, he mar-

ried Rose V., daughter of Joseph L. Frost, of Philadelphia, and they had a son, Egbert R.

William Hall was born in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1815, and when 19 years of age came with his parents to the United States and located in the town of Antwerp. On December 27, 1858, he married Elizabeth, eldest daughter of John Dickson, of this town. Their son, Frederick D., was a farmer on Road 68.

Samuel H. Harris was born in Exeter, NH—March 2, 1839, and in 1856 located in Northern New York. He was educated in the common schools, and August 9, 1862, enlisted in the Union Army. He married, first, in October, 1866, Sylvia M. Benson, of Alexandria, and they had two children, May L. and Jay S. She died in February, 1871. On May 29, 1873, he married Jennie Webster, of Antwerp. He was a farmer.

Ezra Hicks was born in Saratoga County, NY in 1814, and when a youth came with his father to Jefferson County. He married, first, Clarissa Parks, of Evans Mills, who bore him five children, and second, Mrs. Canfield, widow of Warner. He has been chiefly engaged in the manufacture of lumber.

William Hicks was the second child of Ezra by his first marriage. He was educated in the common schools, and when 26 years of age married Hester Goodenough, of Wilna, on June 12, 1866. They had five children, viz.: Clarissa M., Clarence E., Dennis F., Lucy A. and Fred W.

Both Ezra and William Hicks served in the Civil War. William was wounded in the battle of South Mountain, September 14, 1862.

Joseph and Isaac Hinsdale, brothers, came from England to America as early as 1724. Ira Hinsdale, a descendant of one of the brothers, and grandfather of Ira C., was born in Pompey, NY.

George, son of Ira, and father of Ira C., was born in Antwerp, November 11, 1819. He married Harriet A. Hamlin, of OxBow village,

Clark, of Ox Bow village.

Richard Hoching was born in Cornwall, England. December 4, 1848, he married Mary, daughter of Samuel Tuckfield, and in 1867 they immigrated to the United States. They had two children, Richard and Mary Ann.

Richard, Jr., married Catherine Goldsworthy, of Cornwall, England, and they resided in Park City, Utah.

Mary Ann married Charles Pregema, also of Cornwall.

Giles Hogan was born in Cumberland County, NJ in 1804. In 1824 he married Elizabeth Remer, also of Cumberland County, and they had six sons, namely: Thomas P., Harmon, John F., David H., William R., and Abraham R. Thomas P. Hogan was born December 13, 1823. March 10, 1850, he married Eveline L. Kinsman and they had eight children, namely: Elizabeth, Josephine, Annice, Randolph, William H., George C., Theodore and Hattie M. Mr. Hogan resided on Main Street, in Antwerp village.

John T. Hopper, son of Samuel, was born in Antwerp, February 27, 1841 and attended the common schools and an academy until he attained the age of 22 years. In 1866 he married Emeline, only daughter of William Whitfield and they have had six children, two of whom survived, namely: Jean Paul and Bea-

trice. Mr. Hopper resided in the village of Antwerp, on Mechanic Street.

Samuel B. Hopper was a soldier in the Revolutionary War. Alonzo B., his son, was born in Watertown, August 13, 1822. He was married twice, first to Sally, daughter of Peter C. Miller, of Herkimer County, who bore him three children, namely: Edgar A., Eugene L. and Cornelia A.

Eugene L. Hopper was born January 30, 1854. He was educated in the common schools and lves Seminary. September 18, 1879, he married Letta, second daughter of Edward Westwood, of Wegatchie, and they had three children—two sons and a daughter—namely: Perley A., Harley E. and Adell.

Elijah Houghton Sr., father of William and grandfather of William A., was born in the town of Harvard, Mass., June 12, 1800, whence he moved with his parents to the town of LeRay when eight years of age. He married Harriet Dopking, of Oneida County, and they had 10 children, of whom William, who resided with his father on the homestead, married Harriet C., daughter of Rodney Simmons, of Theresa, and they had eight children.

William A., son of William, was born on the homestead November 12, 1863. He received a common school and academic education, and graduated from Eastman's Commercial College, at Poughkeepsie. He taught school several terms, and was a book-keeper and clerk for Ira C. Hinsdale, of Antwerp village. In 1888 he married Alice, eldest daughter of Samuel E. Wicks, of this town, and they had a son, Charles W., who was born April, 2, 1889. Mr. Houghton resided on Mechanic Street, in Antwerp village.

Richmond Howland was born in the Town of Rutland, September 10, 1803. In 1847 he married Harriet M. Eggleston, of Hebron, NY and they resided in the village of Antwerp, on Washington Street. Alice Gordon, who resided with Mr. and Mrs. Howland, was born in Jackson, Mich.

James Hunt was born in Salisbury, Herkimer County, June 16, 1802, and when 14 years of age came to Jefferson County with his father. He was reared upon a farm and attended the common schools. He married, first, Asa Congdin, and they had three children, two of whom, Emeline and Charles, survived. He married, second, Phama C. Blair, of Chenango County, by whom he had two children, namely: Helen A. and James, Jr. The latter was born March 28, 1832.

Charles Hunt was born in the town of Antwerp, February 1, 1855. He married Clarissa, youngest daughter of Solomon Pool, of Theresa, and they had five children, namely: James C., Elbert C., Jennie Z., Burton T. and Harvey. Mr. Hunt served in the Civil War.

COUNTY John Johnson, born in Moffatt, Dumfrieshire, Scotland, was twice NY married. His first wife, Joanna Tate, *GENEALOGICAL* resided near Edinburgh, Scotland, where Mr. Johnson located after his marriage, and they had four children, three of whom survived, namely: Ann, Edward, and William. Mr. Johnson came to this country in SOCIETJ 1834 and located in Antwerp. He married, second, Janett (Johnson) Tate, and they had one daughter, Mary E.

Edward Johnson was born in Scotland and was seven years of age when his father moved to this country. March 13, 1851, he married Betsey Johnson, also a native of Scotland, and they have had nine children, namely: Nettie, Joanna, Nellie, John and Eddie, who are dead and James W., Charles C., Julia A., and Clark E, who survive. The family occupy the old homestead on road 50, where they have resided 34 years.

Reuben Kelsey was born in Saybrook, Conn., September 7, 1787.



Samuel Cronkhite House - Town of LeRay



Old House Series #215 Watertown Daily Times Published in 1946

A large stone in the gables of this native limestone house bears the date 1820, indicating that the Samuel Cronkhite house was built around 175 years ago. It stands about a mile above Pamelia Four corners on the road that leads to West Theresa and onto Ogdensburg. Practically nothing is known of Samuel Cronkhite and his wife Sarah, the original owners, except that they purchased the 150.3 acres of farmland, upon which he built the house and barns, from Moss Kent on June 1, 1815 for the sum of \$1,001.89. On February 27, 1837 Samuel and Sarah sold the properly to Daniel Zimmerman of St. Johnsville, Montgomery County, NY for the sum of \$4,200.

The chain of deed titles to this farm trace back as early as January 2, 1800 to the Antwerp Company and Gouverneur Morris, the first American agent for the company with the purchase of 220,000 acres of North County land. On June 15, 1809, Morris sold 326 lots representing 143,000 acres of his original tract to Moss Kent for the nominal sum of \$1.00. Kent became agent of the Antwerp Company and was agent for James de LeRay de Chaumont who had purchased another 220,000 acre tract of land on January 3, 1800.

One of the 326 lots, which Kent bought, contained the 150.3 acre farm he sold to the Cronkhite in 1815.

Daniel Zimmerman was the brother of Jacob Zimmerman of Brownville. Daniel Zimmerman established on their farm a family burial ground of 26 feet square, which was reserved in all conveyances from the time he sold the place. (Question is this burial ground in use today?)


In January 1848, Daniel and his wife Lavinia disposed of the farm to John Stewart 2nd. John Stewart was born July 2, 1814, in Pamelia died in 1863. He was the son of John Stewart Sr. who was born about 1784, died March 25, 1850 and Olive Barnes born about 1783, died March 1867. John 2nd married Sophia Potter born August 23, 1816, died March 26, 1875 the daughter of Elisha Potter born about 1787, died March 16, 1865 and Polly Steel born about 1796, died June 9, 1875.

Mr. Stewart sold the farm to Curtis Goulding 2nd the son of Curtis Goulding Sr. (Mr. Goulding Sr.'s born in Holliston Mass. on August 10, 1776, died July 11, 1857 and his wife Rachel born about 1784, died March 21, 1871.)

Curtis 2nd and his wife Mary sold the property to Moses Hoover (1810–1865) and his wife Asenath (1812–1880) on March 1, 1854. On March 1859 Hoover disposed of it to John Cable. For the next 57 years in remained in the possession of the Cable family.

John Cable, of Redwood at the time, then conveyed it to his son John Cable Jr., on August 28, 1899, for the sum of \$1.00. In March of 1916 it was again sold to an Adam Flath of Alexandria. In 1919 he sold it to Harold C. O'Donnell an automobile mechanic from Detroit.







About 1813 he married Rebecca Bushnall, also of Saybrook, and they had 12 children, 11 of whom attained maturity, namely: Azubah, Daniel B., Frederick W., Louisa E., Samuel S., Merritt, Rhoda M., Alida A., Sally, Harriet A., and Charles. They located in Fairfield, N. Y. about 1814.

Merritt, the fourth son, was born in Fairfield, April 14, 1823, and in 1835 came to Antwerp, where he married March 12, 1856, Mary Weston, by whom he had four children, two of whom, Delaney M. and Jeremy W., survived.

Peter Kitts, a native of Herkimer County, located in Lowville, Lewis County, in 1839. He married, first, a Miss Barnes, of Lowville, by whom he had one son and three daughters, namely: Catharine, Polly Ann, Aaron and Alice. He married, second, Susan Ward, by whom he has had seven children, four of whom survived namely: Harriet, Sarah, Fanny, and Benjamin F.

The latter was born in Lowville. October 16, 1860, he married Lucinda Van Hussen, of Champion, and they had four children, namely: George, Eugene, Hattie A., Merton A. and Earl M.

Nathan Lamb was born in Massachusetts, January 18, 1816, and when 12 years of age came with his parents to Antwerp. He was married three times, first to Patty Ann Cleghorn, of St. Lawrence County, by whom he had five children, viz.: Jarvis G., Celia, Aveline, Lionel and Gilbert. His second wife was Eliza, widow of Thomas Rattigan, and his third wife was Abigail Jones, of Gouverneur.

Jarvis G. Lamb was born February 5, 1857, and was educated in the public schools. February 15, 1882, he married Mary Davis, of Fowler, St. Lawrence County, and they have a son, Morrison L., and resided in this town near the village of Spragueville.

Joseph P. Lawton was born in Antwerp, May 22, 1833. He received a liberal education and taught school several years. October 29, 1856, he married Jane, eldest daughter of James Wilson, of Philadelphia, and they had 11 children.

Jay P. Lawton, the eldest son of Joseph P., was born in the town of Philadelphia, October 17, 1860, and attended the common schools until he was 16 years old. June 4, 1882, he married Sarah E., second daughter of Simeon P. Chapman, of Theresa, and they have had two children, Addi E. and Perley W. F.

Elliott Lynde grandfather of Arthur L., was born October 28, 1772. Lin-

coln D., son of Elliott, was born in Antwerp, July 14, 1819. He married, first, in 1864, Lydia Marsh, of this town, and they had two sons and two daughters, namely: Alice, Ella E. and Eugene A. (twins), and Arthur L. For his second wife he married, in 1876, Esther T., widow of Thomas Arlow. He died June 20, 1887. Arthur L. Lynde was born April 14. 1863. He received a liberal education and was a student in the agricultural department of Cornell University for two years and a half. April 13, 1885, he married Ardell E., eldest daughter of Abram G. Schermerhorn, of West Union, Iowa, and they had two sons, Harold Adolphus and Harry E. D. The former was born June 14, 1887, and died September 30, 1888. Harry E. D. was born February 4, 1889.

Samuel Markwick, born in Sussex, England, in 1809, married Mary Shadwell, also of Sussex, March 25, 1827, and in 1836 they came to this country and located in Rossie, St. Lawrence County. They had nine children, eight of whom survive, viz.: Stephen, Matilda, John, William Benjamin, Mary, Sarah J. and Henry. October 23, 1879, Sarah J. married Darius J. H. Lee. Mrs. Markwick died Mary 15, 1882. Mr. Markwick had resided in Antwerp since 1838.



The Friends comprising the original organization of the Indian River and Pleasant Creek Preparative Meetings of Friends were mostly from the vicinity of the city of Philadelphia, PA. A Company of them bought a large tract of land February 16, 1804 consisting of 7040 acres at \$3 per acre in the Town of Philadelphia which was then part of the Town of LeRay. The previous year Joseph Child and Moses Comfort had purchased land in LeRay near LeRaysville. The names are Abraham Stockton of NJ, Charles Ellis, Mordecai Taylor, John and Thomas Townsend, then living in Dutchus County, Robert and Moses Comfort, Cadwallader

Child, Israel Knight, Benjamin Rowland, David Evans, John Jones and Jason Merrick. They are members of the Falls & Burlington Monthly Meetings of Bucks & Chester Counties, Pennsylvania.

QUAKER CUSTOMS & BELIEFS

From Jerry Richmond, Fidonet Genealogy Conference, 1995

Quakers were required to marry within the Society of Friends.

Quakers were required to be married after the Quaker fashion. This came to be a very significant discipline after passage of the Uniform Marriage Act of 1753 which specifically exempted only Jews & Quakers from the requirement that "nonconformist" marriages be solemnized by a Church of England official to be legally recognized.

Quakers were committed to pacifism in both public & private affairs. Occasionally, as cause for disownment, there is cited "threatening to strike a fellow creature". Quakers were not permitted to bear arms, appear "arrayed in a warlike manner", join the militia, or pay war taxes.

Quakers were NOT forbidden to drink alcoholic beverages which were commonly accepted in the 1600's when the Society was founded. They were however forbidden to drink to excess. A number of early Quakers are known to have owned Inns in which the sale of alcoholic beverages along with meals & rooms was a normal part of business. Quakers did however seem to be forbidden to engage in the manufacture of alcoholic beverages. A few instances are known in which members were disowned for operating stills. It was also considered contrary to discipline to offer alcohol as an inducement to others to perform some act. One case is known in which a Friend was cited for offering alcoholic beverages to his field hands, presumably to get more than a fair day's labor for a day's pay.

Quakers were committed to democratic concepts & equality. As a result many Quakers were heavily involved with the emancipation movement. Quakers organized the "Underground Railroad" to aid runaway slaves find freedom. Excessive commitment to the Anti-Slavery

movement caused one of the splits in the Society. Equality is also exemplified by the equal treatment accorded women, truly remarkable compared to the rest of society particularly in the 1600's & 1700's. The equality did have the flavor of "separate but equal" familiar to students of racial segregation. Until the 1870's or 1880's (varying at individual meetings), the Men's Meeting & the Women's Meeting were separate. Each had its own officers, kept its own minutes, & issued its own certificates of removal. Starting about 1840-1850 the certificates of removal were consolidated (again varying by meeting); after this time only one certificate was issued for an entire family group.

The Quakers were anti-clerical. Many threads of activity & belief are traceable to the concept of the "Inner Light". In its simplest form this concept says that every man & every woman has an inner capacity to understand the Word of God & to offer an opinion on spiritual matters without the necessity for the interpositioning of Priests or Ministers. However, since the earliest times the Ouakers have had recorded but not ordained Ministers to act as spiritual leaders. Quakers held that certain people were born with the talent to minister. They watched for this talent to appear in an individual & when it was shown, recorded a person as a Minister as a self-evident fact.

Although not a matter of discipline in particular, the Quakers were strong believers in action by committee. Committees were appointed for EVERYTHING imaginable, including committees to attend weddings and funerals. [In many instances in Indiana meetings HEISS will cite a person's first appointment on a committee to indicate that a particular family were Charter Members of a newly established Monthly

Meeting.]

Quakers were strongly committed to plainness in dress, word, & deed, Reference was made earlier to the discipline of plainness in regard to dates. In reading about a young man being disciplined for "disregard of plainness", one oftentimes wonders what lies behind the figure of speech. Did he buy a brightly colored vest or did he go to the Saturday night barn dance? Or maybe he wore the vest to the dance! One of the commonest perceptions of Quakers is in respect to their use of "thee" & "thou", which to them was a matter of plainness in speech. This practice goes back to the social situation in the 1650's when the Society was founded & requires a small measure of linguistic insight. At that time, as is paralleled in the German language even today, there were different forms for the singular & plural second person pronoun. The plural form was "you" and the singular form was "thee" or "thou". Again as in German, the "you" was also the proper & correct singular form to show respect & formality. In German which closely parallels English in a number of ways, the "du" is singular, the "sie" is plural or singular & formal. In German one only addresses children or intimate acquaintances with "du" otherwise "sie" is appropriate. I suspect a comparable usage was in place in England in 1650. The Quakers held that the use of "you" as a formal pronoun was a contravention of plainness and that no one spoken to was that deserving of respect. As a result, until a very late date, Quaker discipline required the usage of "thee" & "thou" in addressing other individuals, "you" being reserved for the second person plural. Failure to do so was a minor disownable offense referred to with the figure of speech "use of plural language" or "use of plural language to a singular person".

'Quaker' Dates

"OUR QUAKER ANCESTORS Finding Them in Quaker Records"

by Ellen Thomas Berry & David Allen Berry

From Chapter VII "Quaker Records and Some Possible Problems" page 67 and 68:

"Another pitfall for the purist can be the unique way the Quakers dated events. They did not use names for days of the week or months of the year since most of these names were derived from the names of pagan gods. A date such as August 19, 1748 will never be found. Rather it would be written as "19th da 6th mo 1748." Sometimes this will be written as 6mo 19da 1748. Why 6th month since August is the 8th month? The Quakers, along with everyone else in the American Colonies and England, did not begin using the Gregorian calendar until 1752. Under the Julian calendar the year began on March 25th; March was the first month and February was the twelfth month. This is something of a problem when an event occurred in the months of January, February or up to March 25th, for then the date is given as 1748/1749. Such a dating practice satisfied everyone, including civil authorities, if for instance an inheritance was being established.

You may find that some legal documents will read "the 8th mo 5th day 1748 in the month called October." It is disconcerting when a date such as 30th da 11th mo 1722/1723 is found. The double year indicates that the old calendar was in use. Even though the Gregorian Calendar was adopted in 1582, as mentioned above it was 1752 before the change was universally accepted. We are emphasizing this point here so that if exact days, months, and years are wanted, the old Quaker records must be used with great caution. Remember that until 1752 "1st mo" is March.

We would like to point out also that you may find secondary material (genealogies are a case in point) in which the compiler transcribed dates incorrectly - for instance. "30th da 11th mo 1738/1739" rewritten as "Nov. 30, 1738/39" when the date in question is actually "30th January 1738/1739. The dual year must be used until you are quite certain the locale in guestion has adopted the Gregorian calendar (or until the Quaker records no longer have the dual form or the year is after 1752). Dual dating is applicable ONLY for the first three months (to 25 March) of the present calendar and NOT for the other nine months. The first date given is the Julian year, the second the Gregorian year."

Another way of finding whether the old Quaker method of dating is being used in any given set of records is to search back and forth until a month such as the "2nd mo" is found and the see if entries were made on either the 29th or 30th days, If this was done, then you will know the old system was being used and the month would be the present month of April rather than February. Other months can be used. For instance, if it is the "7th mo" and you find the "31st," you would know the new system is being used and the month is our present month of July rather than the Quaker September."

In other words, **before** 1752, 11th month was January: 12th month was February; 1st month was March; 2nd month was April and so on. 1752 and after, 1st month was January, 2nd month was February, 3rd month was March...just as we number the months today.

When recording dates found in Quaker records, it is preferred practice to copy them as they are found and to record the source. Too often, dates have been transformed incorrectly in secondary sources and these dates should always be verified by the original monthly meeting records.

If you are using a commercial data base which does not permit entry of dates which reflect the manner in which they are found in the original records, I recommend putting only the year in the date field. In the next field where you would ordinarily enter the name of a city or township, enter the date again but as it was found. This can be followed by the name of the Monthly Meeting where the date was recorded, followed by the State.

When you print a family group sheet or other chart your output may look like this:

This may seem redundant, but to the recipient of your chart, it will be abundantly clear that your source came from an original church record and was not copied from the IGI or Ancestral File which are notorious for incorrectly recording this type of date.

Newsletter Committee

Report of May 11, 1998

The March 1998 issue of the INFORMER was mailed out on Monday, May 11, 1998 to the membership. There were a total of 396 issues distributed as of this date. We have produced about 40-plus issues available for future requests.

To give you a report on the work that goes into producing the newsletter, the INFORMER, in the format that we now publish—here are some startling facts: Approximately 40 to 60 hours of time goes into researching, keyboarding and assembling the final draft for each publication.

Approximately 40 to 45 hours of time goes into printing, folding, stapling, labeling, packaging and the paper work in preparation for the Post Office and trip to the Post Office—to finally mail out the finished product.

Taking in account that we published 450 copies for this March Issue—some simple math says that it also represent a total production cost of about \$650 for this extremely well received newsletter.

The newsletter is the vehicle that draws in our growing membership. In the past ten months the membership has grown by about a 100 members—not counting the members that we have lost along the way. Consider this—we now have almost 400 active members. To the newsletter committee this shows that we have a product that people like. We give the membership a wide range of information. Some of it might have been very hard for people to find.

Considering 1995 when the Newsletter Staff ran 65 issues for a production run and a year later we had grown what we thought, enormously and we were producing about 150 to 200. Remember now—this was only about twelve pages. Then Newsletter writers, John and Ellen Bartlett, were to increase the size to 24 pages published six times a year. This past year we increased printing from 375 to 450 copies for the last three issues.

We need more volunteers to key in data that can be either sent by e-mail or by disk and can be imported when the time comes for formatting and assembling the newsletter.

We need more volunteers to help staple and fold during that ever-so-pressing due date to get it in the Post Office. It's almost impossible to predict that on any given date that we would be ready to do this because there are many variables that enter in the picture. We can let you know when it's ready to be assembled—but with a very short notice.

We enjoy what we do—but sometime it's hard holding to a production schedule. Again, many factors enter into to this production challenge in producing a quality newsletter.


One very important factor that should be considered we need to be addressing another increase in the membership fees and this shouldn't be too far down the road!

Yes-we are growing-but not without some pains.



William Phelps Mansion - LeRaysville, NY



Old Houses of the North Country From the Watertown Daily

The United States Government has owned this house since September 24, 1941 along with LeRaysville, when it was acquired from Mr. and Mrs. William V. Delancey as part of Pine Camp Military reservation expansion. Government Acquisitions also included the LeRay Mansion. The Sheepfold Cemetery is near by.

The history of this once beautiful limestone starts when William Phelps, a will known cabinetmaker from Connecticut, purchased two lots each four rods wide and 15 rods deep facing the front of LeRaysville main street. The first lot he bought from James D. LeRay de Chaumont on December 9, 1817. Then on March 28, 1823 he purchased the adjoining lot from Alfred and Margaret Lathrop. It is believed that the Wm. Phelps Mansion was built shortly after the last purchase. Near the main Phelps house was a stone cabinet shop and is said to have done a considerable business.

William Phelps come to LeRaysville from Connecticut in 1814. He was one of the early postmasters appointed on June 4, 1840. His wife Eliza Jane Brown was the daughter of Cyrus Brown. In 1856 their son William S. Phelps built a sawmill in

the same location where Benjamin Brown constructed a sawmill in 1801.

**William Phelps died January 2, 1868 at the age of 76. On March 5, 1886 his wife Eliza Brown died at the age of 91 years and 6 months and 7 days. Both are buried in the Sheepfold Cemetery now on Fort Drum.

Their son William S. Phelps was appointed postmaster Feb-

ruary 4, 1875. He was a storekeeper, lawyer and had lumber business in LeRaysville and served with the 194th New York Volunteer Regiment during the Civil War. A Justice of the Peace, and LeRay supervisor from 1856-1858.

William S. Phelps, born February 1, 1882 – died December 30, 1899, married Julia Payen, born June 20, 1828 – died July 4, 1912, the daughter of Jules Rene of Paris France.

Both are buried in the Phelps lot at Sheepfold Cemetery. (see** William)

The chain of title for this limestone mansion runs through many owners.

On September 2, 1834 William and Eliza sold it to Zelotes Phelps of Hartford County Connecticut. In

1836 Zelotes and Sarah deeded it back to William and Eliza. Later is passed to William S. and Julia Payen Phelps. It was conveyed to Jane Phelps on August 25, 1859. On June 1, 1868 Jane Phelps of Philadelphia Pennsylvania sold it to Lydia B Child. On September 21, 1875 Lydia B Child of Vineland, New Jersey sold it to Leonard Mosher. On November 6, 1886 the Mosher estate was conveyed to Frederick Appenzeller a Native of Switzerland. Frederick Apperzeller was postmaster. merchant and hay buyer at LeRaysville and served as supervisor. One of his daughters married DeWitt Nichols of LeRaysville.

On October 29, 1912 Frederick Appenzeller disposed of the house to Frank Bowman (1897-1969) and his wife Maude (1893-1963) of LeRay and on May 2, 1918, both were buried at Hillside Cemetery Antwerp. Frank Bowman conveyed it to William H. and Nellie Rendel Peters. On February 23, 1930 Wm. H. died and full title of the house passed to his widow Nellie. His widow (now Mrs. Ellis) and she sold the house to William V. and Marion T. Delancy on August 5, 1935. William and


Marion lived in the Phelps Mansion for six years. The United States government through declaration of taking acquired it for Pine Camp military reservation.

***Note: James Le Ray De Chaumont returned to France in 1836 where he died on December 31, 1840 at the age of 80 years. Jules Rene Payen purchased his estate including the LeRay Mansion at LeRaysville in 1840. The Payen Monument has the Insignia of "A Knight of

the Legion of Honor". (Chevalier of the French Legion of Honor). He died on July 27, 1862. Payen was a distinguished French engineer and chemist. His daughter Julia Phelps inherited his estate (LeRay Mansion) and property.

Having just read my latest issue on all the cemeteries on Fort Drum, I am wondering about one particular cemetery that I visited a couple of years ago. Tombstones in that cemetery had several Gardner's (Edwin & Matilda Wood Gardner, being my great grand parents through Blanche C. Gardner Taylor, my great grand mother, & my great grand father John D. Gardner.) also several Child families which are distant relatives through the Child line of Buck County, PA in the late 1780's. My wondering is this cemetery covered in your list?

Our route to get to the Cemetery is this. Entering the base from the Route 3 access, just West of/or below Felts Mills, we went about 1/2 to 3/4 mile to a light. I believe turned right at the 2nd or 3rd street, the going left and then continuing a short distance again to a dirt road on right, then only a few feet-100 to 200-on dirt road. Then left up a very steep but short hill. The stones are directly ahead. Ron Gardner, a distant relative said a meeting house would have been on the right lot when facing the headstones. It would look like this in the LeRaysville cemetery, but appears by your description to be Quaker Hill cemetery. According to my father and Carl Taylor of Evans Mills, my Uncle: John D. Gardner & Dell Cheiver (from Montreal b. 1852) are buried in Sheepfold Cemetery without engraved stones but marker stones in the east side near the back.

My father, Ralph W. Taylor of Black River, now deceased, was born in LeRaysville in what is marked on 1864 map as C.C. Phelps or Wm Phelps house in 1909. When young they moved to Great Bend where a motel now stands.

Perhaps this maybe helpful infor-

mation to Joanne Johnson. Sincerely.





Word has it that they are to be moved off by the fall of 1940.

He has been left home with his brothers and sister while his folks are spending most of their free moments during the summers of 1940-41 traveling, around the county and other locals. Mom has told him that they are searching for a new home, with land adequate, to support their chosen profession—farming.

When school started for the 1939-40-school term he walked with his sister to the one-room country schoolhouse. This was but one mile towards the river and is on the corner of the Town Line Road between Antwerp and Philadelphia. Going to his first year of school, it was so interesting there, along with other pupils through the eighth grade, each having their individual class lessons during the day. We all had an idea of what we were to learn in these eight grades.

But when the month of June came they said that the school was closing—they said it was forever.

In September of 1941 all of the pupils from this one-room country school went into the Antwerp School, what I believe was called the Ives Seminary at the time. This was very different because the classes were larger than the whole school attendance was back there in that one-room school and now all new faces to get acquainted with. My memory now fails me in what new I might have learned there. I only attended school in Antwerp for three or four months.

In late December of 1941, early one Saturday morning, we awoke to have everything in a strange hubhub around the house and barn. Numerous trucks with large racks on the back were coming in the yard and everything in the house was being packed and made ready to move. Must be mom and dad had found where we're going to movethis must be moving day. There were five or more trucks loaded with the 50+ milking cows from barn. At the house one truck was being loaded with all of our earthly goods.

It is now early afternoon and the caravan of vehicles heads south in Jefferson County. Of the traveling along perhaps the one thing that I remember most of the journey was when we turned right on one extremely sharp curve south of Watertown. Years later I find that was at the intersection of US Route 11 and the Cross Road (now Spring Valley Drive), Burrville Road (now Brookside Drive) and the entrance of Brookside Cemetery.

The day was long and it was getting dark when we pulled into a strange place—my home. The trucks were unloaded immediately and there drivers left to go their ways.

The one truck was hurriedly unloaded at the house and he left too. Now you can imagine that there was two very tired small boys, myself and my five year old younger brother. A set of bed spring was laid out on the dining room floor and we went to bed. But-we could not go to sleep because there was a loud roaring noise. "What's that noise," we ask, and the reply was, "that's the flow of water in the creek." we'd never heard such a noise and being very tired-we registered our frustrations. As youngsters do. It seems that we'd had a rainy spell and the old creek was making more noise than usual. But it didn't take to many day before we didn't hear it anymore.

We were scheduled to go to school after the Christmas holiday but this boy that never made it back until after the Easter brake. Why—he had picked up an infectious disease of the scalp and no one had found it, due to moving preparations.

Well—that's one account of one of many young boys that was displaced from the Pine Camp area. Who is that boy—I'll never tell but if you turn to page 23 there maybe a clue.

PAMELIA-

Named for the wife of General Jacob Brown. Her maiden name was Pamelia Williams. It was formed from part of Brownville, April 12, 1819. In 1824 its name was changed to 'Leander;' but soon after the former name was restored. A portion of Orleans was annexed April 1, 1824.

The surface is level, or gently undulating, and the soil is clay and sand.

Near the cascade opposite Watertown we find several caves in the limestone rock. These caverns have been traced nearly 500 feet. Just below and partly under the village of Juhelville, the open mouths of several caves appear on the riverbank, opening at both ends on the cliff. The passages are lined with calcareous deposits, in the form of agar mineral, stalactites, and tufa. Currents of water flowing through the natural seams in the rock gradually wearing away the soluble and yielding limestone evidently have formed these caves. In the rear of the principal cavern a large area has sunk to a considerable depth, as though a portion

had fallen in. In the vicinity of Perch Lake have been found several barrows, or sepulchral mounds.

Pamelia Village & Juhelville-

Named after Madame Juhel. She was a relative of the LeRay family. Pamelia Village was opposite the lower part and Juhelville was the upper part of Watertown Village a places of considerable manufacturers. These manufacturers consist of lumber, spirits, leather, cotton yarn, and portable steam engines, and have each 200 to 300 inhabitants.

Pamelia Four Corners-

(p.v.) contains about 30 houses. The first settlement began in 1799. The first settlers were Wm. Cooper and Wm. Watkins. Anson Sigourney taught the first school; Samuel Mack kept the first

David Augsbury (Osgbury) of emigrant ancestry, from Palatine German descendents, came to this Country in the early 1750 settling in the Mohawk Valley. David with his family settled in the northwest part of Pamelia in 1811. His father John Augsbury with his three youngest sons Benjamin, Nicholas and Daniel (11 years old) followed in 1812. Two other sons John and Abraham already men with families came to the area after the War of 1812.

*David, born February 9, 1788, came from Minden, Montgomery County in 1811. He fought in the Battle of Sackets Harbor, May 29, 1813. In 1840 John (father) and David along with two other brothers John and Abraham built the Augsbury Mansion (blue limestone) (still standing old houses WDT #43).

*Daniel (1801-?) received a good practical education in the public schools, and upon the death of his father became owner of the farm. When at age 20 he married Mary Shimmel (1801-?), daughter of Conrad Shimmel, they had three sons and four daughters, viz.: Angeline, John B. L., Susan, Mary Ann, Frances, Edmond K., and Irene E. O.

*Irene in 1863 married James K. Miller. They located in Gouverneur, St. Lawrence County, and shortly afterwards removed to Kansas, where they remained seven years, when Mrs. Miller returned with her children to the Town of Pamelia. She had two sons and four daughters, viz.: Addela, Alice, Mary, Almira, James, and Royal.

Richard Bellinger was born in Montgomery County in 1810. At the age of seven years he went to live with Christopher Bellinger, and here remained until he attained his majority. He was apprenticed to Lewis Averill to learn the trade of Tanner and Currier, and served five years. Mr. Averill then employed him by the year, but on account of continued ill health was obliged to abandon his chosen profession and engage in farming. At the age of 25 years he married Catherine Fink, daughter of Joseph Fink, by whom he had four sons and six daughters, namely: Catherine, Orinda, Elizabeth, Joseph, William, Dempster, Nancy, Mary, Martha, and Frederick F. After the two eldest children were born, Mr. Bellinger removed to Pamelia.

*Frederick F., at the age of 16 years, left the paternal roof, and worked by the month until he attained his majority. He then married Fanny A., daughter of Caleb Arnold, of Watertown, and they have one daughter. In July 1862, he enlisted in the 10th N.Y.H.A., and served till the close of the war.

Israel Brown came with his family from Vermont about 1819. Luther, the second son of Israel, received a good common school education, and soon after attaining his majority married Sophronia, daughter of Daniel Sortwell. He subsequently purchased a tract of land in the town of Clayton. This he sold, and soon after purchased a farm on Horse Creek, where he built a house. Israel and Sophronia had two sons and three daughters, viz.: Amanda, Melinda, Luther S., Harriet, and Brayton.

*Brayton remained at home until he attained his majority. He married Laura E., daughter of William Kimball of Pamelia, and soon after enlisted in Union Army Co. A 14th N.Y. H.A. serving three years. He took an active part in 18 general engagements without being wounded. Soon after his return from the war he purchased a farm in Clayton after eight years he bought a farm in Pamelia. His children are a son and a daughter, William B. and Meda S.

(Benjamin)? Walter Cole was born in the town of Minden, Herkimer County, and when 16 years old came to the Black River country, and taught the first school in the then village of Watertown. At the age of 19 he married Charlotte, daughter of John M. Gunn, of Brownsville, and they had seven children, viz.: John N., Andrew J., Walter, Harrison, Zeruah, Abigail, and Harrison.

The first Harrison died in infancy. (B.?)

*Walter Cole served in the War of 1812, and participated in the Battle of Sackets Harbor. He served as a member of the state legislature two terms. His son, Harrison Cole, at the age of 22 years, married Mary, daughter of Hon. Fleury Keith, of Brownville they lived on a farm near Perch River. In 1872 he moved to Wells Island, where he remained 14 years. His grandson, Harrison R. Cole, married Emma Gould, in 1875.

and they have one son, Aswell B.

David Cornwell was born in Vermont, and in 1806 settled in LeRay. He married Betsey Farr, by whom he had 12 children, -- eight sons and four daughters, -- all of whom grew to adult age except two daughters, who died in infancy.

*Adolphus Cornwell married Sarah Ann Van Ness, and for a short time resided in LeRay. He subsequently removed to Pamelia, and later to Watertown, where Mrs. Cornwell died. He married, second, Jane Jackson, of St. Lawrence County, by whom he had two daughters, Jennie B. and Gertie May. Upon the death of his second wife, he married, in 1877, Mrs. Oaks, widow of Simeon Oaks, and daughter of Jeremiah Crosby, of Martinsburg, Lewis County. He resided in this town on Road 52.

Henry (Contryman) Countryman was born March 7, 1797 (Mohawk Valley) in the town of Danube, Herkimer County, and was the third child and first son of George and Rohana (Spraker) Countryman. (Rahana Spraker was the sister of Hon. Robert Spraker past president of the New York Central Railroad.)

*Henry remained at home, contributing largely to the support of the family which consisted of 12 siblings until 1823. With Elizabeth Walrath whom he married on October 19, 1819 and their son Alexander born July 9, 1820, he moved his family to Pamelia Four Corners in 1823 when it was still a wildness. He succeeded in accumulating a large fortune. He was one of the first wagon and carriage makers in the county. He owned over 600 acres of land at the time of his death on June 16, 1875. Henry and Elizabeth had nine children, five sons and four daughters.

*Alexander married Catherine Smith daughter of Selah and Catherine of Pamela. He was associated with his brother George in the carriage making business.

*George H. born January 1, 1826,

married Louisa Mills daughter of Ansel and Betsey Mills. Louisa died in 1858 and he married 2nd Olive Eddy.

*Wilson H. Countryman born August 15, 1840. In 1862 he married Betsey Ann, daughter of Enoch Eddy, they had three children, viz.: Belle D., Charles O., and Ora E. Belle D. died in 1880, aged 15 years.

*Louisa born November 13 1829 married Abram Zuller a prominent farmer from St. Lawrence County.

*Ludentia born September 22 1831.

*Lucy E. born August 21 1831 Married Joseph Baum a prominent merchant from Potsdam, NY

*Amos B. born April 3 1838 in business with his brother-in-law

*Catherine born March 22 1823 married Samuel Zuller of Pamelia

*Oscar born September 7 1843

Bruce Dempster was born in Scotland in 1794, and in 1812 immigrated to Sackets Harbor. He married Mrs. Betsey Cleveland, widow of James Greene, who bore him five children, -- four sons and one daughter, -- viz.: Andrew J., Adelbert B., Eugene M., Jane, and Wallace W. Mr. Dempster died in 1870. *Wallace W., soon after he attained his majority, married Ida, daughter of Martin V. Shaw, by whom he has three children, -- two daughters and a son, -- namely: Cora J., Lulu L., and Earl A.

Enoch Eddy came from Rutland, Vt., in 1799, with George White, and located on a farm on Rutland Hill, in the town of Rutland, Jefferson County. He married Amy King. In 1831 he removed to the town of Pamelia. Enoch Sr. died in 1850 his wife Amy died in 1848. Enoch and Amy reared a family of 10 children, all of whom grew to maturity, viz.: Enoch and James (twins), Hannah, Rhoda, Phebe, Betsey, Renew, Louisa, Horatio N., and Willard L

*Willard L. Eddy married Mary Sheldon, they had at least one son named Pitt A. Eddy (ref from Daily Times—Old Houses #466)

*James Eddy married Cynthia Philbrooks.

*Enoch D. Eddy, at the age of 23 years, married Huldah Aldrich, daughter of Jonathan Aldrich, they had three sons and four daughters, viz:, Enoch, Gratia, Cynthia, Hannah, Seth, Betsey A., and DeWitt Clinton.

*DeWitt Clinton Eddy was born on the farm he owned. When 26 years of age (abt1853) he married Caroline, daughter of Joel A. & Melinda Otis, from Rutland. They had a daughter named Cora M. who married Edwin J. Colligan on September 21, 1887. Cora and Edwin lived in Rutland. Clinton De Witt Eddy died February 9, 1894. Huldah Eddy died July 1 1924 at the age of 91. Cora M. Colligan died on February 8, 1946.

Wesley Ellsworth was born in Orleans County, and at the age of nine years came with his brother to the Black River country. He married Susan, daughter of Conrod Waltz, of Pamelia, by whom he had three sons and three daughters, namely: Cortland, Nelson, Margaret, Isabel, Lucinda, and William (ref pg. 259, 1850 census).

*William, at the age of 22 years, married Clarissa, daughter of Thomas Liscomb, of Brownville. They had two sons and one daughter, viz.: Frank, Fred, and Susan.

Christopher Fox came with his family from St. Johnsville, NY, in 1826, and purchased a farm near Three-Mile Bay, in the Town of Lyme. He married Nancy Snell, and they had four sons and three daughter's viz.: Christopher, Jacob, Mary Ann, Elizabeth, Laura, John, and Simeon. When Simeon attained his majority he married Ruth, daughter of James Cole, and located near Three-Mile Bay. Simeon and Ruth had one son and two daughters, viz.: Isabel, Emmelia, and Christopher S. *When Christopher was nine years old he moved to Perch River village, in Brownville, and there remained until he was 21, he attended public schools. Soon after attaining his majority he married Belle, daughter of Franklin Mitchell,

they had one daughter, Ruthann.

Amos Gillette came with his five brothers from Vermont about 1800, his brothers locating in the town of Lorraine and Amos in Clayton, where he purchased a farm of 300 acres, upon which he built a residence. He served in the War of 1812, in the Battle of Sackets Harbor, and was commissioned Captain. He married a Miss Arnold, by whom he had three sons and three daughters, namely: Sophronia, Alonzo P., Eli, Deliah, Phoebe, and Solon.

*Solon was for many years a commercial traveler for Stephen Kelburn, of Adams, and sold wooden chairs in the United States and Canada. In 1839 he married Rebecca, daughter of Stephen Kelburn, and afterwards located in Clayton. His father gave him a farm of 40 acres, upon which he erected a fine residence. Solon and Rebecca had three children, namely: Mary E., Levi K., and Stephen L.

**Stephen L. Gillette was educated in the local school, and High School in New London, Ohio. He returned home and engaged in farming. He subsequently became a sailor on the lakes, serving three years and attaining the position of Second Mate. At the age of 26 years, he married Libbie M., daughter of Henry Brant, of Brownville, and they have two sons, Ernest S. and Solon H.

John Goutermont emigrated from Germany to this country in 1792, and located in Lowville, Lewis County, where he bought a farm. He married a Miss Frederick, of Montgomery County. They had nine children, namely: Jacob, Peggy, Catherine, John, William, Caroline, Martin, Lawrence, and Nicholas.

*Nicholas was educated in the common schools, and at the age of 21 years married, first, Sally Wemple, they had three sons and one daughter, viz.: Dolly, Archibald, John, and William. He married, second, Sally Clock, by whom he had 15 children.

**Archibald Goutermont, at the

age of 21 years, removed to Illinois, and they remained 10 years. He then, for two years, traveled in several states and territories in the West, finally returning to Illinois, where he enlisted in the 3rd III. Calvary, serving more than three years under General Carr and others in the Department of the Gulf. He married Elizabeth, daughter of Abraham Bradt. They had four sons and two daughters, viz.: Jennie L., Carl W., Legget H., Dollie A., George H., and Charles A. After his marriage he bought a farm in Martinsburg, and there remained 10 years, when he removed to a farm on Perch Lake, in the Town of Pamelia. He subsequently moved back to Lewis County.

Richard Haven emigrated from England to Massachusetts in 1617, and located in Lynn. He had a son, Nathaniel, and since then every generation has furnished a son bearing his name.

*Nathaniel Haven, grandfather of Dexter W., Pamelia, was born in 1779, and in 1800 married Mary Coolidge. They had five sons and four daughters, namely: Dexter, Hepsibah, Mahala, Newel, Isaac E., Mary, Asenath, Charles W., and Nathaniel.

**Nathaniel resided with his parents until he was 21 years old. In 1831 he bought 45 acres adjoining his father's farm. In 1832 he married Elizabeth, daughter of Nathan Wightman, of Rodman. They had two children, Charles G, and Dexter W.

*** **Dexter W.** Haven remained at home until he attained his majority. In 1854 he first married, Jane Wait, of Rodman, they had two children, Lansing W. and Coolidge D. His wife died in 1860, aged 28 years. He married again in 1862 to Harriet A. Wait sister of his first wife. Together they had three children, namely viz.: Libbie O. who died on July 16, 1886, Clifton E who died in 1877, at the age of 13 years, and John N.T. For many years Dexter W. Haven held various positions of trust in the town. He was assessor three years and supervisor seven years.

John Johnson came from Middlesex, NY, with his family of 10 sons and nine daughters, all of whom attained mature years and were married.

His son, John, married Eveline Herring, of Mohawk, and located in the Town of Clayton. They had 10 children, seven of whom attained mature years, viz.: Catherine, Francis, Jacob, John, Elijah, Silas, and James


*James, at the age of 15 years, left home and went to work by the month for a lumber business in St. Lawrence County for several years. In 1871 he married Lydia, daughter of Lyman Bowker, of Potsdam, St. Lawrence County. They had three sons and two daughters, viz.: James H., Silas L., Berton L., Dora B., and Vina A. They lived on road 57 in Pamelia.

Thomas Makepeace was born in Massachusetts in 1779. At the age of (21/24?) he moved with his father's family to Bridgewater, Oneida County. The following year he located in Pamelia. He married Anna Plumb, a native of Connecticut. On March 25, 1837 he purchased 58 acres of land, later purchased 55 acres on which he built a stone house near Pamelia Four Corners. Thomas and Anna had nine children, viz.: Emily, Maria, Anna, Amy, Betsey, Lucy, Thomas, Julia, and Ellicot.

*In 1848 Ellicott married Angeline Plumb, by whom he had two children, viz.: Merville D. and Charles E.

Ellicot Makepeace was a popular school teacher for many years. He served townsmen in positions of trust and honor, among which was that of supervisor in 1874 – 1875. Ellicot was second president of the Watertown Grange. (The world's largest Grange at that time). In 1878 he was President of the Jefferson County Agricultural Society. Ellicot Makepeace died June 30, 1882.



**His son, Merville (Mervale?) D. served as a civil engineer and surveyor.

****Charles** Ellicott was supervisor for the Town of Pamelia in 1887-88 and in 1889 served the Cities Fourth Ward. He was a teacher of high standard. He married Mate Hoover who died on October 9, 1934, Charles Ellicot died January 30, 1931 at the age of 76.

William McGinnis born 1786 in Marbletown, Ulster County, NY. He married Rachel Harper born 1787. They had six sons and five daughters, viz.: Alexander, Henry, James, Robert, Catherine, Maria, William Jr. (1823), Eliza, Ann, Phebe (b 1836), Sarah Jane, and Isaac (b 1825).

*Isaac at 18 years began teaching school and continued in this profession for 20 years. At the age of 25 he married Lasira B, daughter of Lyman White, of Pamelia, engaging in farming. They had two children, Ida M. and Ella M.

**Ella M. married George A. Fenner, and Ida M married George M. Haven.

*William McGinnis Jr. was elected in 1850 superintendent of public schools. From 1852 to 1857 he served as supervisor, and general traveling agent for the Agricultural Insurance Company, of Watertown. He appointed agents in 16 states and also Canada. He resigned the position in 1882. He served as Justice of the Peace.

William McGinnis Sr. died in 1880 his wife Rachel died in 1868.

Ansel Mills, a native of Connecticut, came to Watertown in 1806. Then about 1824 purchased a tract of land in Pamelia on Road 21. In 1816 he married Betsey Ripley. They had six children, viz.: Amanda, Hiram, Mary Ann, Louisa, David, and William.

Hiram owned and farmed the family homestead. He married Malinda Seeber, of Brownville and they had 13 children, viz.: eight sons and five daughters.

*Milton P., married Jennie Fikes,

of Le Ray, and they have one son, Roy E. William Mills

*Roy E. Wm. Mills married Catharine Nellis. They had three children, viz.: Ansel, Dexter, and Walter B.

*Walter B. worked on the farm, which his father had occupied for many years. He married Ella Gray. They had seven children, one of who died in infancy, and four sons and two daughters survive, viz.: Ethel, William, Frank, Clark, Daisy, and Roy.

Richard Phillips was born in England, June 1, 1775 (1850 census has him listed age 67 yrs). He served an apprenticeship of seven years at the carpenter's trade. Was a Captain in the War of 1812, he become a citizen of the United States before the War. In 1817 he married Mercy Harris (1850 census age 49), daughter of Captain William Harris. Richard and Mercy settled in Watertown. Richard Phillips built and owned the first house where the Crowner House stood. They had 13 children, 10 of whom survived. Richard and Mercy are buried in North Watertown Cemetery, Richard died 28 Jan 1859 age 74y/8m, and Mercy died 27 April 1868 age 67.

Martin Reese born July 20, 1813 in Herkimer County, NY attended common schools and worked on his fathers farm until he turned 22. He married Amy S. Paul, of Wilmurt, Herkimer, and in 1839 they moved to LeRay. Martin and Amy had 13 children, three of whom died in infancy, and six sons and three daughters survived, viz.: Wellington W., William H., Emogene, Lucius E. (1848 -1916), Martha E., Martin H. (1852-1843), John A. Elva E., Evlyn (or) Evelin P., Hilton C. (1854-1856), Ezra G.(1837-1859) and James E. Reese.

*Emogene married Henry Cable.

*Martha E. married Taylor Carpenter.

*Elva E. married Webster Murphy of Philadelphia NY.

*John A. (1856-1934) married Emma McCrea (1860-1947). *William H. married Maria daughter of Lawrence L. Timmerman, sister of Jane A. In 1888 at the age of 45 William H. owned 540 acres of land. William and Maria had one daughter Eva M born May 14, 1866. Eva attended school at the lves Seminary in Antwerp.

*James E. fought during the Civil War, was wounded in front of Petersburg, and died on the battlefield at 22.

*Evelyn P. Reese, (1841-1916) served three years with the Union Army. Two years after returning home he married Jane A., (1846-1922) daughter of L. L. Timerman, of LeRay. He subsequently bought the Timerman farm. They had four sons and two daughters, viz,: Milton P. (1869-1930), William E. (1874-??), Herman L., Edna M. (d 5 Mar 1893 age 14y), Ina M. (d 17 Feb 1893 age 12y), and Arthur D (d 23 Feb 1893 age 5y).

Martin died 21 Oct 1859 age 46y/ 3m/9d and Amy Harris Reese, died 27 Mar 1879 age 62y/9m/18d. Martin and Amy are buried in Evans Mills Old Cemetery. **Note:* Found the above Reese families buried in both New and Old sections of the Evans Mill Cemetery.

John C. Relyea (1840-1915) enlisted with the 10th N.Y.H.A. He was first assigned to Garrison Duty in New York City; they transferred to Washington, and subsequently went to the front. He received a promotion to sergeant for brave and meritorious conduct. He participated in numerous battles, and was mustered out on June 23, 1865. He married Margaret J. ___. They had least two children who died young Robert M. and Albert.

*His brother, Levi T., enlisted with Co. A, 94th N.Y.Vol. Inf., on October 25, 1861. He was wounded in a charge in front of Petersburg on June 18, 1864, died July 2, 1864. Levi T. Relyea is buried in the National Cemetery at Arlington, VA. *Note: John C. (M) 10 and Levi T. (M) 14 are listed on the 1850 Census with Thomas age 49 –a Farmer as head of household. Catharine (F)

50-Olive (F) 19-Henry (M) 16-George (M) 8 for the Town of Pamela. Sally 1ª wife of Thomas (1799-1836) Catherine 2nd wife of Thomas (1800-1885), Thomas (1800-1895). Children of Thomas and Catherine listed in cemetery records are: Levi T. (1836-1864), George W. (1842-1857) John C. (1840-1915). Hannah a daughter of Thomas died young in 1837. * Note: Found above families buried at North Watertown Cemetery, Watertown, NY. Except for Levi T., Henry, and Olive. Henry (1834-1876)-wife Elizabeth Thompson (1841-1904) & dau Jessie (1877-1883) are buried in Brownville Cemetery, Brownville NY.

Leroy S. Rogers, (1819-1905) at the age of (10/12?) years came from Vermont with his father in 1831. They settled in the town of Antwerp. Leroy S. purchased a small farm adding to it until he accumulated 300 acres.

Then on 29 Sep 1846 he married Pamelia/Permelia M. (1824-1896), daughter of Darius Burtch. (Darius Burtch was one of the first settlers in Antwerp). They had three sons and two daughters, viz.: *Jennie (Emogene P. b 1847), William, George P., Mariette (d 31 Aug 1865 age 15y7m), and Allen L.

*Allen L. at the age of 20 years, married Mattie L., daughter of Giles Bannister, and they have one daughter, Bertha. In 1883 Mr. Rogers purchased a farm in Pamelia, a few miles distant from the city of Watertown. *Note Listed in 1850 Census for Town of Antwrep, Leroy L. (M) 30 Farmer, Pamelia M. (F) 35, Emogene P. (F) 3 and Marietta L (F) 1.

Smith Scovill removed to this town from Connecticut when he was 20 years old. He married Hannah Foltz, by whom he had 11 children, namely: Wells, Ezra, Smith, Jr., George, Franklin, Albert, Margaret, Mary, Hannah, Fanny, and John. The latter married Harriet Gale, of Brownville, who bore him two children, Seldon L. and Sarah Jane. She latter married George Briggs, of Canada. Mr. Scovill died in 1879, aged

68 years. Seldon L. resided on the homestead with his aged mother.

He remained at home and attended school winters, working upon the farm summers, until he attained his majority. He then married Anna, daughter of Hiram Ballard, and after working farms on shares for several years finally purchased a farm at the head of Perch Lake, on Road 1, and there resided until his death, in 1870. He had born to him three sons and one daughter, viz .: Hiram, John E., Celestia J., and Wilson. The latter, at the age of 21 years, enlisted in Co. M, 10th N.Y.H. A., and served three years, until the close of the war, when he returned home and married Arabella, daughter of Elijah Gove, of LeRay. Soon after this he purchased the John C. Timerman farm, where he resided with his aged mother.

John C. Timerman came from Herkimer County in 1832 and married Gertrude Timerman. They reared a family of six sons and three daughters, viz.: David, Elijah, Margaret, Jane, Joel, John, Jessie, Mary M., and Reuben. Mr. Timerman located at the head of Perch Lake, where he purchased a farm. He served in the War of 1812, and participated in the battle of Sackets Harbor. He died October 15, 1846. His son, Reuben, in 1857, married Anna E., daughter of Warner Nellis, of Pamelia. They had four children, viz.: Simeon E., George W., Frank B., and Willie J. Their first born died at the age of one year and eight months. Mrs. Timerman died in 1874. For his second wife he married Mrs. Philena Babcock, widow of Anson. George W. Timerman, second son of Reuben, married Jessie M., daughter of Joseph Tallman, of Orleans, and they have one son, Raymond who lived on the Shimmel farm, on Road 1.

John Tingue came from Gilderland, Albany County, NY, where he married a daughter of George S. Scrafford. In early life he followed the occupation of a Hatter, and subsequently engaged in farming. He

reared a family of three sons and three daughters, viz.: Eliza, Margaret, Rasy, James, Alexander, and George.

*George born in the town of Palatine Church, Montgomery County, in 1812. Soon after his birth his parents removed to Stark, Herkimer County. George remained at home until 21 years of age. He then married Margaret, daughter of Michael Waltz, who bore him two children. Alexander and Margaret Anna. After the death of his first wife Mr. Tingue married the widow of H. N. Goss, a daughter of Jacob Acker, by whom he had two children, Henry N. and Henrietta. Mr. Tingue died November 25, 1889. His widow is a direct descendant of JEFFERSON General Herkimer.

Capt. Ebenezer Williams was a descendant of those early emigrated who came to this country from Wales in 1607. He married Sarah Stedman, and they had five children, viz.: Jonathan, Susan, Merrill, Ebenezer S., and Oloff H. Captain Williams distinguished himself in the Indian border wars. On one occasion he was selected as one of the 11 prisoners to be killed in retaliation of the death of a like number of Indians killed in regular warfare. The Captain gave the Masonic sign to Brant, the Indian chief, who saved his life and gave him the talismanic belt of wampum to protect him from other tribes.

*Ebenezer S. born abt 1794 in Mass. He came from Manlius, Onondaga County to Pamiela at the age of 32 years where he purchased a homestead. In 1817 he married Jane Osterhout born abt 1796, by whom he had two sons and two daughters, namely: Sarah A., Ebnezer, Peter O., Jane A.,

*Ebenezer born abt 1823, married Catherine Lawton daughter of Fabius and Catherine Lawton, of Watertown, by whom he had four children, viz.: Ebenezer F., who died at the age of six years; Stedman E. born Dec 11 1862, George O. born April 5 1867, and Hattie C. May 16 1857.

Series of New Resources for Family History Work

R eflective of the "new harvest time" that Elder Russell M. Nelson heralded in his recent general conference address, the Church Family History Department is on the verge of releasing a series of new resources to help in researching and redeeming the dead.

Already announced at the general conference were three new products, available through Church distribution centers:

- Family History Source Guide, the first automated Windows product of its kind for the Church, compiling information from more than 150 research guides available at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City and Family History Centers throughout the world. Available for \$20, it is described as being "like having your very own reference librarian in the convenience of your own home."
- 1851 British Census (for the counties of Norfolk, Devon and Warwick), containing about 1.5 million records on one compact disc. Cost is \$5.
- Australian Vital Records Index, containing 4.8 million entries; birth, death and marriage records covering the states of New south Wales (1788-88), Tasmania (1803-99), Victoria (1837-88) and Western Australia (1841-1905). Cost is \$20.

In addition, the following products will be available in the future:

- Vital Record Indexes containing 25 million records on compact disc. These are extractions for christening and marriages records from many regions of the world. The records will be produced and sold by regions. The British Isles (about 5 million records) and the U.S./Canada discs (about 5 million records will be available later this year.
- 1881 British Census, containing

about 29 million records, including England, Wales and Scotland. It will cover succession regions, with the first region available late this year.

• 1880 U.S. Census, containing about 50 million records. It will be produced and distributed by regions late this year.

- ANCESTOR A person from whom you are descended; a forefather.
- ANTE Latin prefix meaning before, such as in ante-bellum South, "The South before the war"
- APPRENTICE One who is bound by indentures or by legal agreement or by any means to serve another person for a certain time, with a view of learning an art or trade.
- APPURTENANCE That which belongs to something else such as a building, orchard, right of way, etc.
- ARCHIVES Where records are stored of a Government, Organization, and Institution.
- ATTEST To affirm to certify by signature or oath.
- **BANDS** Public announcement of intended marriage.
- **BENEFICIARY** Benefits received by someone from a trust or property.
- **BEQUEATH** To give personal property to a person in a will. (noun --bequest.)
- **BOND** Written, signed, witnessed agreement requiring payment of a specified amount of money on



Abraham Ripley—of Adams, who were his parents? How does he tie into the Abraham Ripley who landed in Hingham, MA in the early 1600's from Hingham, England?

Abraham had resided somewhere in the Mohawk Valley a few years after leaving his home state of Mass. before removing to the wilderness of the Town of Adams, Jefferson County, NY before 1800. That Abraham had a son, one of many, named Abraham—another of his sons had a son named Abraham—so I need help in finding out where my line ties in!

(A note in my grandfather's handwriting says that Abraham bought the land, here in Adams, in 1797. (It was probably purchased off a salesman's map.)

My Abraham settled two miles west of Adams, on what is now Liberty Street, with his wife _____ Fox and six children. The oldest, Joseph married ____ Webb in 1806 and the second son, Benjamin, married _____ Webb.

Are there any Ripley descendents that might have any answers to my query?

Verneelia Elizabeth Wells grew up on what is now the George Rudd farm in the town of Boylston. Her mother, Althea (Gordon) Wells, went home to her mother in Martinsburg, NY for the birth of Verneelia. The Wells family settled in Boylston in 1814 as the 2nd family there after the ____ Wart family. A past druggist in Sandy Creek was a descendent of this Wart settler.

According to her daughter, Caroline was born on Grenadier Island, Jefferson County in 1878.

We found the records for Alonzo S. Daily's enlistment at Cape Vincent of 30 Aug 1864 for service in Company E, 186 Regiment, NY Infantry for a year.

According to his army record he was born in Jefferson County and he listed his occupation as "farmer." We assume Alonzo Dailey to have been a hired hand or maybe tenant farmer on Grenadier Island at the time of Caroline's birth.

The family later moved to Canada, north of Kingston, Ontario. She had siblings, Vincena, born 1860; Lovica, born 1873 and Menard, born in either 1872 or 1875.

Vincena left home and went west?

In 1878, Lovica and Menard died in 1882 and 1883 respectively in Canada.

Can anyone suggest which church or churches were attended by Grenadier Island residents in or about 1878? Where might the church records be found today? Is there any other source for a record of a birth at that time?





Minnie A. Conklin was born Minnie Adelia Gladwyn at Sackets Harbor, Jefferson County, New York on November 27, 1867 daughter of William and Priscilla Wallace Gladwyn. Her father was a carpenter-woodworker who worked in Lewis and Jefferson counties, specifically Lowville, Sackets Harbor, Dexter, and Brownville.

Mrs. Conklin attended school at Dexter. At age 16 she taught in a oneroom schoolhouse on Pillar Point near Dexter, NY. Her frail health permitted only a brief teaching career. Minnie attended Lowville Academy where she studied music at the Conservatory.

As the diarist's first entry reveals, Minnie married Herbert C. Conklin, son of Theodore and Laurentine Wallace Conklin of the Town of Hounsfield, Jefferson County, New York. The couple lived on the Conk-

Town of Hounsfield History

Source-

History of Jefferson County, NY 1793-1894

Compiled from— State, County & Town Records by John A. Haddock Released for print in 1894 Prepared By Helen McDonald

he Town of Hounsfield was formed from Watertown, February 17, 1806. It embraces No. 1 of the "Eleven Towns," and was named in honar of Ezra Hounsfield, who, with Peter Kemble, purchased the south part of town (15,913 acres) from the proprietors March 10, 1801. Situated on Black River Bay, on the west border of the county with 27,700 acres, it's bounded on the north by Black River and the bay of the same name, which separates it from Brownville, east by Watertown, south by Henderson and Adams, and west by Henderson Bay and Black River Bay. Galloo, Stony and Calf islands, which lie in Lake Ontario, also belong to the town of Hounsfield. The surface of the town is somewhat diversified, though in the main it is level, and the soil is a clay and sandy loam. Through nearly the center of the town flow Mill Creek, which rises in the town of Watertown and discharges into Black River Bay. A branch of this stream from the north rises in a long strip of low land, originally a swamp, filled with tamarack, black ash, cedar and elm, and other varieties of timber peculiar to such a locality, and running almost to Watertown. Much of this land has been reclaimed and cleared, and the stream, during the summer, becomes nearly dry.

The waters of Black River Bay were early regarded as an eligible place for a commercial port, and in a work published in Paris in 1801, the following description of it is given under the name Niahoure:

At the bottom of this gulf Black River emptied, forming a harbor sheltered from the wind and surges of the lake, which during the prevalence of the southwest winds, roll like those of the ocean. The land on the right or south side of this bay is extremely fertile.

Much discussion has obtained regarding the location of La Famine, or Hungry Bay. and the question of its exact location has never been definitely settled to the satisfaction of all. On Charles C. Broadhead" map of Macomb" purchase, made about 1791, and published in Documentary History of New York, Vol. III., the name of Hungary Bay is given to the waters comprised within Six-Town Point, in the town of Henderson and Point Peninsula, in the town of Lyme. Guy Johnson's map of the country of the Six Nations, including part of the adjacent colonies, made in 1771, and published in Documentary History of New York, Vol. IV. gave the name Niourne Bay to the above waters, and located Famine Bay near the mouth of Sandy Creek, in the present town of Ellisburgh. Famine Bay probably received its name from the want of previous sickness, which decimated De LaBarre's expedition. De Meneles, in a letter to the minister, says that the camp at La Famine was made "In places never inhabited, entirely surrounded by swamps." Ellisburgh is the only town in this county having a lakeshore that can furnish such marshes. They exist at the mouth of Big Sandy Creek.

This town is a part of the original Boyleston Tract, and in common with 10 other towns in Jefferson and Lewis counties, comprising an area of nearly 300,000 acres, became the property of Nicholas Low, William Henderson, Richard Harrison and Josiah Ogden Hoffman, July 15, 1795. These eleven towns form what is known as the Black River Tract. On the division of this tract Hoursfield fell to the share of Hoffman and Harrison, who, on

According to her dau/Caroline was born on Grenadier Island, JC in 1878. We found the records for Alonzo S. Daily's enlistment at Cape Vincent 30 Aug 1864 for service in Company E., 186 Reg. NY Inf. for one year. According to his Army record, he was born in JC and listed his occupation as "farmer." We assume Alonzo to have been a hired hand or maybe tenant farmer on Grenadier Island at the time of Caroline's birth. The family later moved to Canada, north of Kingston, Ontario. She had siblings, Vincena b. 1860, Lovica b. 1873, and Menard b. in 1872 or 1875. Vincena left home and went west? In 1878, Lovica and Menard died in 1882 & 1883 in Canada. Can anyone suggest which church or churches were attended by Grenadier Is. residents in or about 1878 and where the church records might be found today? Or any other source for records of a birth at that time. The landowners of Grenadier Is. listed on an 1878 map were J. & W. Fitzgerald, & A. Humphrey (Humphries.)

July 14, 1797, conveyed to Champion and Storrs 11,134 acres in the southern part of this town, with the town of Champion (15,708 acres), for \$58,333.33. On the 14th day of November 1798, Champion and Storrs sold a portion of the above to Loomis and Tillinghast. They received two notes for \$6,00 each, which, with a mortgage upon the premises not being paid. The tract was sold by a decree of chancery, at the Toutine Coffee House in New York, June 20, 1801, and bid off by Augustus Sacket, of that city, who received a conveyance from Champion and the assignees of Loomis and Tillinghast. Mr. Sacket, hearing of the location, while the sale was pending, and inclining to purchase, made a journey in 1801 to the place, and was so struck with the great natural advantages for a port which the place presented that he hastened back, and having secured the purchase, returned with a few men to commence improvements. In the second and third years he erected as ample and convenient dwelling, and the little colony received the accessions of mechanics and others.

At the first town meeting convened at the house of Ambrose Pease, and from thence adjourned to the house of Joseph Landon, March 4, 1806. August Sacket was chosen supervisor; William Warring, clerk; Amasa Fox, William Barker, Samuel Bates, Jr., Theron Bates, assessors; Ambrose Pease, Robert Robbins, commissioners of highway; Jotham Wilder, John Patrick, overseers of the poor; Jeremiah Goodrich, collector; J. Goodrich, William Galloway and John Root, constables.

The meeting also appointed Theron Hinman, Augustus Sacket and Amasa Fox, delegates to a general meeting of the county to nominate a suitable candidate for the legislature at their own expense. Amasa Fox, Esq, warned the first meeting.

Supervisors serving from 1806 to 1853 were Augustus Sacket, Elisha Camp, Hiram Steele, Daniel Hall, Jr., William Baker, Seth P. Newell, Benjamin Maxon, Augustus Ford, Jesse C. Dann, and Edgar B. Camp.

This town derives its name from Ezra Hounsfield, a native of Sheffield, in England, who, about 1800, came to New York as agent for brothers, John and Bartholomew Hounsfield. In 1890 Hounsfield had a population of 2,651. The

town is located in the first school district of Jefferson County, and in 1888 had seven school districts, in which 14 teachers were employed 28 weeks or more. There were 667 scholars attending school, and the aggregate days' attendance during the year was 65,316.

Probably the first settler was Amos Fox, about 1800, who located near the old "Maskolunge burying ground," on Great Lot 36. He is given the credit of having made the first improvements in the town, and his name appears prominently upon its early records. None of his family now live in the neighborhood, and he himself has long since closed his life's labors and laid down to his long rest.

The arrival of settlers was quite rapid as early as September, 1802, a traveler reported about thirty families living in Township Number One. Before the breaking out of the War of 1812-1814 the town had become comparatively filled. As timber was abundant, and ashes commanded a greater price than anything they could raise at that time, the manufacture of pot and pearl-ashes was extensively carried on, nearly every man receiving a share of profits from the traffic in those articles.

Several years previous to the War of 1812, five brothers, Solomon, Robert, Asher, Austin and Joshua Robbins, came from Berkshire County, Massachusetts, and located at what is now known as the Robbins Settlement, in the south west part of the town. These men were the first settlers in that locality, and made the first improvements.

In the southern portion of the town settlements were also made quite early, more especially towards the eastern boundary in the neighborhood of Stoell's Corners. Nathan Baker was among the early comers, locating some time previous to the year 1807, near the south line of the town.

The villages of Brownville and Dexter, on Black River, lie partially in Hounsfield. In addition to these are the hamlets of Stoell's Corners, Field's Settlement, Camp's Mills, Jewettsville, and Robbin's Settlement, which are simply clusters of dwellings around localities where early settlements in the town were made. The Gull, Snake, Great and Little Galloo, and Stony Islands lying in Lake Ontario, west of the town, are considered as belonging to it, although they are nearer the shore of Henderson. Galloo Island marks the outer edge of a group of island and shoals that guard Sackets Harbor. The Galloo lighthouse was established in 1820.

The Maskolunge Burial Ground Association of Hounsfield, was formed March 31, 1849, with Frederick M. Livermore, Samuel Wilder, Thomas W. Warren, Richard Hooper, John Hunt, Chauncey Smith, trustees.

Sackets Harbor village is a port of entry and a military post situated on Black River Bay, and is terminus of the Watertown branch of the U.&B.R. division of the R.W.&O. Railroad, 11 miles from Watertown, 193 from Albany, and 335 from New York. With telegraph, telephone and express offices., a daily stage to Smithville. With four churches-Presbyterian, Methodist Episcopal, Protestant Episcopal and French Roman Catholic, two hotels, a foundry and machine shop, saw and planing-mill, grist mill, two general stores, four groceries, one hardware, two drug stores, a merchant tailor, and about 1,200 inhabitants. The post-office at Sackets Harbor was established just previous to War of 1812, and Ambrose Pease was appointed first postmaster. The village of Sackets Harbor was incorporated April 15, 1814.

Augustus Sacket who began the first settlement at Sackets Harbor village built a sawmill, wherein was sawed the lumber used in the construction of the first permanent house and other buildings put up at that time. The saw-mill was on Mill Creek, where were also erected a gristmill by Samuel Luff, the first one in the neighborhood, and a cotton factory by Solon Stone. In 1804 came Mr. Elisha Camp, a brother-in-law of Mr. Sacket, who settled at the village, and was appointed resident agent, under whom the estate was sold, the last business being closed up about 1848.

In 1805 several English families settled at Sackets Harbor, among whom were Samuel Luff and sons Edward, Samuel,Jr., Joseph and Jesse, David Merritt, William Ashby, John Root, Henry Metcalf and George Slowman. Besides these, John and William Evans, Squire Reed, Amasa Hollibut, Charles Barrie (or Berry), Urlah Roulson (or Rowlson), Azariah P. Sherwin, and others. Dr. William Baker settled in 1803, and was the first physician in the town. Ambrose Pease and Stephen Simmons were early innkeepers, and Loren Buss and Hezekiah Doolittle, merchants.

In March 1809 Cornelius Ray, William Bayard, Michael Hogan, Herman LeRoy, James McEvers, Joshua Waddington, James Lenox, William Maitland, William Ogden, ? McLeod, Benjamin W. Rogers, Duncan P. Campbell, Samuel Boyd, Abraham Ogden, David A. Ogden and Thomas L. Ogden bought 1700 acres in the present village of Sackets Harbor. In 1808 Charles Berrie (or Berry), a Scotchman, opened a small store on the lot adjoining Evelyn House and he was the first merchant in the village. Berrie sold out to Loren Buss, who continued the business. In March 1817, George Camp established a printing office at the village, and became "proprietor, editor and publisher" of the Sackets Harbor Gazette. A copy of the Gazette of October 8, 1818, contains an editorial, which fails to substantiate the report so often heard that, although Liquor was freely used, drunkenness was entirely unknown among pioneers 50 or 75 years ago.

The first regular religious meetings in this village were held by Edmund Luff. an English settler, who at his own expense, erected a house for religious services, and preached here many years without fee or reward. There being no other meetings in the place, these were generally attended by those of different religious faith. Mr. Luff was a Restorationist, approaching somewhat the doctrines of the Universalizes, and was a man very free from any narrow spirit of intolerance. His pulpit was opened to clergymen of other faiths, irrespective of name, and both Catholics and Protestants enjoyed, when occasion demanded, the freedom of his house. During the war the house was given up for public uses.

The first regular physician in Sackets Harbor was Dr, William Baker, who located here in 1803. Other early physicians were Dr. Benjamin Farley, who came in before, and Dr. James Starkweather, who came soon after the War of 1812. The first number of the Sackets Harbor Gazette (1817) contained the advertisement of Dr. R. B. Haves, who avowed the intention of making "medicine and surgery his only pursuit." Dr. Samuel Guthrie, subsequently world renowned, located in Sackets Harbor, on Mill Creek, soon after the War of 1812 and here prosecuted the scientific investigations that resulted in the discovery of chloroform and of the percussion compound for firearms, which superseded

the old flintlocks. Dr. Guthrie died in this village October 19, 1848.

Ambrose Pease built the first hotel at Sackets Harbor, a small story and a half frame building, located on Main Street before 1805. Mr. Kelsey who came here from Cape Vincent purchased the hotel from Pease beginning of the War of 1812. The building was afterward burned. In 1806 a Mr. Lanning commenced the erection of a hotel on the site of the present Eveleigh House, which became the property of Stephen Simmons before it was completed. Mr. Simmons finished it and conducted the hotel a number of years. Ambrose Dodge built the Eveleigh House in 1843-44, it was opened by him in 1844. Judge Elijah Field built the Earl House in 1817, it was opened by him in December of that year. A stone Hotel, which is still standing, although not used for the purpose for which it was built, was commenced by Frederick White in 1817, and opened by him the following year, with the name of "Union Hotel" The Masonic Fraternity occupied a room on the top floor, and subsequently removed to the floor below. It has been said that Morgan who published an expose of Masonry, was brought to this lodge room soon after his mysterious disappearance. Mr. White was at one time President of the Jefferson County Bank, when that institution was located in Adams.

A ferry was established across Black River Bay at an early day, and by an act of March 31, 1821, Charles Colburn and Samuel Folsom were licensed to keep it five years. On January 21, 1826, Ezra C. Folsom was in like manner licensed for five years. In 1816 a steamer known as the Kingston packet, was running three times a week from Kingston to Sackets harbor, charging \$2 per passenger for the trip. The steamer Toronto, J. Sinclair, manager, ran in opposition to the Sir J. Kemp between Prescott and the Carrying Place, and in the Kingston Chronicle, of June 29, 1829, passengers were requested to be on board at the hours advertised, as the boat would leave two minutes after the advertised time. The schooner Woolsey (Capt. Chapman) left Sackets Harbor on New Year's day, 1816, and arrived at Kingston on January 4th .

The first mercantile operations at Sackets Harbor on an extensive scale, were by Samuel F. Hooker, who, in 1868, commenced with a stock of \$20,000

worth of goods, and in 50 days had sold \$17,500 worth. The business that then opened with the brightest prospects, was the sale of potash, to Montreal, where Astor and other heavy capitalists had placed money in the hands of agents for its purchase. The embargo of 1808, which withheld those along the frontier from a career in which they were enjoying high prosperity. This naturally led to a spirit of evasion of the laws, and the difficulty of exporting this great staple of commerce directly from the Atlantic ports to Europe. This led to extensive and systematic measures for forwarding to the lake and river, from the interior and southern counties of the State, and even from New York, large quantities of potash.

East Hounsfield is a small hamlet in the eastern part of the town, near the Watertown line. It contains a church (Christian), cheese factory, schoolhouse and a small number of dwellings. About the beginning of War of 1812, Stephen Blanchard came from Vermont and built a hotel at what became known as Blanchard's corners. In the neighborhood of 1850 a post office was established, the first postmaster being Nelson Jones. At the beginning of Lincoln's administration Marvin B. Scovil was appointed postmaster and upon the election of General Grant to Presidency, William Warren was appointed and for many years held this position. The mail was originally carried over the Watertown & Sackets Harbor plank road, and delivered at East Hounsfield daily. At present it is transported by rail, and delivered at the station three-fourths of a mile south of the office.

Silas Godfrey made the first settlement in Jewettsville, about 1802. About the same time Benjamin Barnes located here, He built the first frame house, which later became a tavern. John McDowell later kept this tavern. There are two facts which render the history of this locality unusually interesting; it was the birth place of Hon. John Petit, and here was made the first chloroform, by Dr. Samuel Guthrie, who was a resident of Jewettsville from 1817 until his death in '48.

Herman Petit and family moved here from Watertown about 1804, first settling on the West Side of Mill creek, near what is known as the Military Road. Mr. Petit was a millwright, and built wharves at Sackets Harbor and a sawmill on Mill creek for Augustus Sacket; also a gristmill

and sawmill near the mouth of the creek for Samuel Luff. The Petits moved over to the Watertown road in 1813, near the present farm residence of John Petit, a grandson of Herman. John was born in Jewettsville, July 24, 1807. In 1831 he moved to Indiana where he held many political positions. The Petits are nearly all related to John Petit Douglas, president of the Standard Publishing Company, of Watertown.

A pioneer family of the town was the Luffs, who came from England and settled near the mouth of Mill Creek In 1805. The family consisted of Samuel Luff and his sons Joseph, Samuel Jr., Jesse and Edmund; and daughters Susan, Sarah, and Mary. Mr. Luff purchased a large tract on each side of Mill Creek, lying upon the shore of Black River Bay. His land extended westward to about the center of the parade ground at Madison Barracks. Soon after he built on of the first gristmills. Across the creek he had a sawmill which furnished much of the lumber in the building up of Sackets Harbor. Vessels also shipped a large amount of the lumber from here, there being docks at the mouth of the creek. Edmund Luff, one of the sons of Samuel, was the Baptist preacher, and built the first place of worship in Sackets Harbor. It was located just south of Hon. Theodore Canfield's residence. He also served as chaplain at Madison Barracks. Mr. Luff built the Dr. Tyler residence. He began the publication of the Sackets Harbor Journal in 1838.

Churches of Hounsfield-

In 1886, Rev. Eugene I. V. Huiginn, organized the Roman Catholic Church at Sackets Harbor, as first pastor with but forty members, erected a house of worship at a cost of \$500 in this same year.

Sackets Harbor Presbyterian Church was organized Feb 12, 1816, and Melanchton T. Woolsey, Samuel Bosworth, Samuel F. Hooker, Elisha Camp and Enoch Ely were the first trustees. Meetings were held in the school-house until their first church edifice was erected, in 1820, at which time the trustees were Joseph Bacon, Amos Catlin, George Camp, L. Dennison, J. V. Bacon, J. G. Parker and S. Johnson. In the great fire of August 23, 1843, their church building was destroyed, and in 1843 the present brick structure was erected by the following trustees: W. R. Stow, R. S. Robbins, Jason Phelps, H. Cook, S. A. Hudson, Walter Kimball and George Camp.

The original cost of this structure was \$6,000. It will comfortably seat 400 persons, and is valued at \$8,000. The chapel adjoining the church was erected, in 1879, by Walter B. Camp, and dedicated on Christmas, at which time the generous builder presented it as a clear gift to the church society. R. R. Webber is the present pastor the present membership of the society is about 90. Since the organization of the Sunday school, in 1817, it had three superintendents-George Camp, Jason Phelps, and Walter B. Camp.

Christ Episcopal Church at Sackets Harbor was organized, August 6, 1821, and the first vestry consisted of Zeno Allen and Elisha Camp, wardens; Robert M. Harrison, Samuel O. Auchmuty, William Kendall, John McCarty, Hiram Steele Thomas J. Angel, Hiram Merrill and Thomas Y. Howe, vestrymen. The first to preach was Bishop Hobart and at the meeting of the vestry, September 14, 1821, it was voted to give Henry Moore Shaw \$600 a year, as the first rector of the church. The first church edifice of this society was started in 1823 but not finished until 1832. It is of stone at a cost of \$5,000 and will comfortably seat 300 persons. In 1894 the present rector was Rev. Burr M. Weeden.

The Methodist Episcopal Church of Sackets Harbor was organized May 9, 1831, with 'Asahel Smith, Alvah Kinney, Hiram Steele, John H. McKee, William Francis, Elijah Field, Daniel Griffin, Samuel Whitty and Samuel C. DeCamp, trustees, with 15 members. In 1835 it was reorganized and in 1841 they erected a church, at a cost of \$3,000. This building, which is located on Main street was repaired in 1881, and is now valued at \$5,000. It comfortably seated 400 persons. The membership of the church was 125 in 1894, and the Sunday school had 200 scholars and 25 teachers. The first pastor of the church was Rev. I. L. Hunt, and 1894 was the Rev. Willis E. Reynolds.

The Christian Church at East Hounsfield was organized in 1844 by Rev. Libbeus Field, the first pastor. Their house of worship, a wooden structure, was built in 1844, and cost \$1,000. It seated 150 persons and the membership was 35.

Father Maahoy, organized the Catholic Church, located in the northeastern part of Hounsfield, in 1870, with 100 members. Their house of worship, which comfortably seated 200 persons, was built in 1780, at a cost of \$500.

The Methodist Episcopal Church located at Sulfur Springs, in Hounsfield was organized in 1877, with a small number of members, and Rev. S. M. Fisk was the first pastor. Their house of worship was built by the Seventh-Day Baptist Society, at a cost of about \$500. It seats 150 persons and had a membership of 30 and the Sunday school had seven teachers and 60 scholars.

Father Hogan built the Church of the Immaculate Conception, in the town of Hounsfield, situated opposite the village of Brownville, in the year 1867. The present priest is Rev. J. A. Hagerty who also officiates at Sackets Harbor and Chaumont, making his home in Brownville. There were about 300 in the parish.

lin Farm, established in 1836 by Daniel Conklin. The house about which she writes on the first page of the diary was/ is a double house. The two-family home was shared between Minnie and Herbert ("Bert") and his brother and wife, William and Carrie Chapman Conklin.

The diary has been transcribed, for the most part, as written. An occasional spelling has been changed. The transcriber, granddaughter of Mrs. Conklin, has typed several later diaries written by her grandmother; those were so impeccably written that the few misspellings in this diary seemed out of character, so I corrected them.

The Index contains only names of relatives, friends, and acquaintances. The inclusion of names of clergy, lecturers, and national figures would have made

the index rather cumbersome. When only first names were used in the text, I have tried to index those names with a cross-referenced sumame. In many instances, I felt sufficiently knowledgeable of the person's sumame and thought the additional information should be shared with the reader.

The reader will notice the name Gladwin appears with two spellings. This is not a mistake. The Gladwyn spelling was the diarist's maiden name. The Gladwin spelling is that used by two very distant relatives with whom Mrs. Conklin corresponded throughout the years. Curiously, there was a Minnie in that family, also.

The Michigan trip involved visits with many relatives, usually identified by given names only. Again, I have attempted to include those surnames in the Index. Credit must surely be given to Robert Hunter, Ph.D., of Davis, California, for all his valuable research on the Wallace family (Minnie's maternal grandmother's maiden name). Years ago, Dr. Hunter sent me copies of the Wallace family tree; these contributed in making the transcription of this diary a wonderfully interesting project.

Mrs. Conklin lived to be 86 years, 6 months 9 days of age. She passed on at the Conklin Farm June 5th of 1954 after a life of great dedication to her faith, church, family and friends. She left behind a large collection of poems, some music, many diaries, and other writings. To date (August of 1998), many of have been electronically reproduced and are available from me on both hard copy and floppy disks.

Transcriber-her granddaughter:

June 2nd, 1897 Herbert and I were married this evening at the M. E. Parsonage, Brownville, by Rev. F. Y. Severance. Will and Carrie were present. Wedding outfit was white—came at once to H's home. H has the quinzy badly. Took tea at Fred and Etta Knapps. Rather cold evening. The Brownville Iron Bridge not being completed were obliged to drive through Glen Park. Arrived at my new home about 10 P.M. Will and Carrie, who preceded us had a bright, fire burning. H and I began reading the Bible through beginning at Genesis, to read one chapter a day.

July 5th, 1897 Had hay pressers in June and the hay is drawn away. Sold about seventeen tons at \$10 per ton.

Canned strawberries today and pineapples also. Went to Dexter in the evening to stay for a few days. A year ago today we were at Uncle Alson's—the Fourth of July coming on Sunday this year the fifth is celebrated. Will remember it as my first canning.

July 29th, 1897 Have a man working for us. Mr. Van Alystyne. Today Mr. Eigabroadt moved the house we are now living in a short distance from its present site and Will and Bert will begin work at once enlarging the cellar and making the necessary preparations for building a new, double house on the site of the old one. The coursing stone they will draw from Luther Hill. Messrs. Reed, Maldoon and Lovelin (sic) will do the mason work and Charles Gamble will have charge of the building.

October 20th, 1897 After a hard summer's work for us all our new home is near completion. Carrie has been sick and Jennie Conklin has been helping us. Herbert and I went to Utica last Friday evening to attend the Northern New York Epworth Convention and visit Mrs. Gladwin and family-returning today. (Monday) Had a very pleasant time. Listened to fine speakers and fine music. The singing was conducted by Prof. John R. Sweeney. Saturday evening we listened to a lecture, "Great Deeds of Great Men," by Bishop Fowler. On Sunday morning heard an excellent sermon by Chancellor Day, President of Syracuse University-subject: The things we do not know. Text and Sunday Evening a companion sermon-"The things we know," by Bishop Fowler. Sunday afternoon an excellent address was given by Mrs. Margaret Bottonce to ladies only. This morning Minnie, Herbert and I viewed as much of the city as possible in so short a space of time. Saw the house where Cousin O. A. Rounds lived and the church where he practiced. Also the public buildings as far as possible, the home of Roscoe Conklin(g) and went through the Catholic and First Presbyterian churches and city library. Had an enjoyable trip home.

November 27th, 1897 Our new home Is completed and we are living in it having moved about ten days ago. Have named it Sunshine Cottage and hope it will prove as bright as its name. Purchased a new bedroom suit (sic), dining chairs rockers and carpets. Papa and Mamma are here spending Thanksgiving and my birthday. Weather is quite un-

pleasant. Will and Carrie ate Thanksgiving dinner with us.

December 25th, 1897 Will and Carrie are at Theresa. Herbert and I spent the day at Dexter. Jennie Conklin coming home with us at night and staying all night. Received from Herbert a new jacket and parlor lamp, from Papa a pair of kid mittens, from Mamma, a cake plate and half dozen fruit plates. From Carrie, half dozen napkins and from Will Thompson half dozen silver spoons.

Jan. 12th, 1898 For the past year the inhabitants of India have suffered from the effects of a famine, thousands having died of starvation. The Christian Armenians have been persecuted and massacred by the Mohammedon Turks and relief has been sent to both India and Armenia from the United States. For the past two years the people of Cuba have been fighting to free themselves from the rule of Spain. The oppression has become so great that thousands are dying of starvation. A relief committee has been appointed by our government consisting of Stephen E. Barton, Chairman of the American Red Cross Society, Chas. E. Schurner (unclear), sec. & treas., New York Chamber of Commerce and Dr. Louis Klopsch (unclear). Supplies and money are solicited from the people of the U.S., an appeal having been made by the secretary of state, John Sherman. Dec. 24th, the committee held its first session in the Bible House, New York. Jan. 3rd, 1898, Miss Clara Barton who went to Armenia to distribute supplies will go to Cuba for the same purpose.

Feb. 20th, 1898 At 9:40 P.M., the 15th of Feb. an American vessel named the Maine anchored in Havana Harbor was destroyed by an explosion. Two hundred and sixty lives were lost. Capt. Sigsbee and a few others were saved. The place of anchorage was designated by a Spanish official and as the feeling of Spain toward the U. S. is rather an unfriendly one on account of our sympathy for Cuba, foul play is suspected and an investigation will be made.

March 20th, 1898 Carrie met with an accident by falling through the register opening while cleaning it. She was very sick after it but is better at present. Her sister, Lou, was here at the time and remained for some time. Will Thompson, who has been with us several months, went this week to Mr. Potter's.

March 31st, 1898 The court of inquiry

in regard to the *Maine* disaster has decided after thorough investigation with the aid of expert divers that the vessel was blown up by a mine placed there by the Spanianrds. Both countries are purchasing war vessels and making active preparations for war. Congress has appropriated (\$50,000,000) fifty millions for that purpose. The Atlantic seaboard is being well protected. Congress excited—want to act.

April 13th, 1898 Miss Effie Thompson came today from Canada to help Carrie for awhile. Ships were last week sent to Cuba, to convey Counsel General Lee to this country and he, together with Miss Clara Barton and many other Americans, have arrived safely. A decree has been issued by Gen. Franco, Spanish general in Cuba, allowing the reconcentradoes who have been confined in Spanish pens to return peacefully to their homes. A message has been sent by President McKinley to Congress urging immediate measures to stop the war in Cuba and demanding Spain to withdraw her troops from the Island. James Baker and Ruth Leonard were married a short time ago.

April 27th, 1898 Miss Lou Chapman and Wm. Reeves were married today by Rev. Mr. Ball. Congress has authorized the President to act. The President's ultimatum has been sent to Spain and been refused. Minister Woodford (U. S. Minister to Spain) has received his passports and war was formally declared April 25th. Congress was very composed during the final action. Bill declaring war passed unanimously without excitement in one minute forty-one seconds. A call has been issued for volunteers. April 19th five hundred soldiers from Sackets Harbor left for Tampa, Florida to await further orders.

May 9th, 1898 A few Spanish vessels had been captured by American vessels but no engagement had been had until May 1st when the American fleet in Chinese waters under Commodore Dewey attacked the Spanish fleet at the Philippine Islands completely destroying it. either sinking or capturing every vessel and silencing the forts at Manilla without the loss of an American vessel. Another fleet of eleven Spanish vessels was sent to drive out fleet of eight vessels from Manilla and again the whole Spanish fleet was captured or destroyed with large loss of life on their side and five or six wounded on our side. Great praise is given to Commodore Dewey and President McKinley has raised him to an Admiral. He telegraphs that he is having the Spanish wounded prisoners well cared for. Memorial services are being held in the various churches for Miss Frances Willard, President of the National W. C. T. U., who died early in February in New York. Memorial services were also held May 8th by request of the national committee on the death of the sailors of the Maine, the collection going to a fund to erect a monument to their memory. Are having an early and beautiful spring.

May 20th, 1898 Wrote a paper for the Epworth League anniversary celebration at Brownville last Sunday evening but had a cold and could not go. Sent the paper, however, for Maud Severance to read. Herbert also who was to have led the League meeting had a cold and as I would not go, he did not. The reading course is over for this season as have little literary work to do. Elias Wallace who was married last February to Miss Maud McKnight was pressing hay at Mr. Livermore's last week and came and stayed all night with us. Last evening's Daily contained the news of the death of Hon. Wm. E. Gladstone at Hawarden Castle, England. He was eighty-eight years of age the twenty ninth of Dec. last. The war continues. Admiral Sampson's fleet attacked Mora (sic) Castle and silenced the guns but did not take Havana. An occasional vessel is taken but nothing decisive accomplished yet. Will probably be an engagement at Cuba soon. Cubans starving. Eggs there sold at 10 cents apiece-other provisions accordingly. Eighty-two thousand men in U.S. volunteered. Government seemingly slow.

June 2nd, 1898 One year has passed away-the present finds us in happy and prosperous circumstances. Blessings have attended us throughout the year. With the exception of Papa and Carrie all have usually good health. Papa has not been well since he was taken sick the night of the twenty-fourth of February. The stomach and heart are both troublesome-one acting upon the other but do not know which is the seat of the disease. He has worked a little in the shop recently-seems to be slowly improving. Carrie has not been well since her fall through the register Feb. 26th. Fred Campbell passed away May 30th at his home in Brownville. As it was a rainy day none of us attended. "Decoration." Herbert and Will decorated the graves at

Time Line History of Sackets Harbor

Dexter in the morning. Mamma and Mrs. Yerdon were here last week. Our anniversary day has passed quietly. Will, Carrie and Effie were here to dinner. Weather delightful.

Saturday, June 25th, 1898 Last Saturday evening Herbert and I went to Libbie's at Watertown after Aunt Lottie. She remained with us until Monday where (sis) I went with her to Dexter. She was to stay until Wednesday. I came home Tuesday morning. Canned strawberries (nine cans) and pineapple (two cans) in the afternoon. In the evening H and I went to Mr. Gamble's at Sackets Harbor. Mr. Lawton's people have been here this week. Carrie went home with them to remain a couple of weeks. Have just finished a paper on "The reading course" for the district convention at Watertown, State Street, June 28th. Papa is working - is some what better. Dr. Gates is tending him. Says he must leave the shop in order to be better. The War continues. Supplies are being sent to the suffering Cubans. The first possible since the war began. Troops have been sent to aid Admiral Dewey and hold the Philippine Islands. The Spanish fleet under Cervera is locked in Santiago Harbor.

A boat named the Merrimac was sunk in the harbor by Liéut. Hobson and a crew of eight men to effectually prevent the Spanish fleet from escaping. Hobson and his men were unable to return to the American vessel awaiting them owing to the heavy firing and gave themselves up to the Spanish who refuse to release or exchange them. Since that time the fortification at Santiago have all been destroved by Sampson's fleet except Morro Castle where it is thought Hobson and his men are confined. A land force of 10,700 men have been sent to Cuba and they in connection with the insurgents will make a joint land attack on Santiago. The Spanish soldiers as well as the Cubans are poorly fed and it is hoped the war will soon be over when relief can be administered. I omitted to say that Mrs. Jennie Lain (nee Jennie Wilson) and Geraldine (aged 5) and John (aged 3) from Bradley, ILL came to visited us on June 17th. I went to Brownville to Mrs. Campbell's for her in the morning and returned with her in the evening. Mamma, Carrie Ackermann and Mrs. Yerdon were also here Monday evening of the same week. Hay presser have come and gone - they were at Will's

1801 Sackets Harbor is founded by Augustus Sacket, a New York City lawyer. The Village of Sackets Harbor, incorporated into the township of Hounsfield, is named for Ezra Hounsfield, who had purchased land nearby.

1803 Augustus Sacket is appointed U.S. Customs Officer for the Sackets Harbor District, which extends from Ogdensburg to Oswego.
1804 Elisha Camp, Augustus Sackets brother-in-

law, moves to Sackets Harbor. 1805 The Ontario Lodge of the Masonic Order organizes in Sackets Harbor.

1807 International tensions between the United States and Great Britain led to the U.S. Embargo Act of 1807 that forbade trade with Great Britain and Canada. This was understandably unpopular with local residents, and resulted in widespread smuggling along the U. S./Canada border. Until this time there had been a very profitable trade in flour and potash. Potash is an alkaline substance used in the manufacture of fertilizer, gunpowder, and explosives. It was produced by burning timber from around Sackets Harbor, and was selling in Canada for \$320 per ton.

1808 Augustus Sacket resigns as U.S. Customs Agent due to unpopularity of the Embargo Act of 1807. Hart Massey replaces him. United States Troops are stationed at Sackets Harbor to enforce Embargo Act of 1807 and stop smuggling.

Typhus Fever breaks out among the troops and spreads through the town.

1810 The brig *Oneida*, built in Oswego, is sent to Sackets Harbor to Patrol Lake Ontario and enforces U.S. Embargo's and stop smuggling activities.

1812 The U.S. declares war on Great Britain. Sackets Harbor becomes headquarters for the U.S. Army and Navy on the northern frontier.

On July 19 the Canadian Provincial Marine Fleet attacks Sackets Harbor, but is repulsed by the guns of the **Oneida** and a long 32-pound cannon mounted on shore.

1813 On May 29 British and Canadian forces attack Sackets Harbor and are repulsed by U.S. troops after a lengthy battle. The British and Canadians retreat, but American supplies are destroyed, delaying American efforts to launch a campaign into Canada.

Several forays into Canada are mounted from Sackets Harbor, including the American attack on York Toronto on April 27. This attack culminated in an American victory, at the price of the life of Brigadier General Zebulon M. Pike. On Nov 11 the American forces were this time. Had about thirty tons - \$7.00 per ton.

July 9th, 1898 Saturday evening, July 2nd, I went to Dexter for Papa and Mamma. They came back with me and stayed until Tuesday evening, July 5th. Passed a quiet Fourth. Mrs. Hamburg and Mrs. Slater were here visiting Thursday July 2nd. A navel attack was made by Sampson on the-Spanish Fleet, at Santiago. The Spanish fleet was destroyed with the exception of the warship, Christold Colon. She tried to escape but was captured. The Maria Theresa had on board Admiral Cervera. The land forces under Gen. Shafer also had an engagement outside the city. One thousand American where killed or wounded. Spanish loss unknown, 1300 Spaniards taken prisoners. Our troops the surrounded the city and demanded its surrender. This, they refused to do. But as the city is surrounded and supplies cut off and more troops have been sent from the U.S. to join the force already there it is only a question of time.

defeated in an attack on Canada at Chrysler's Farm.

1814 Supply boats from New York City, carrying guns, rigging, and supplies for the U.S. frigate the *Superior*, are halted near Sandy Creek Bay by British forces. But American troops trick the British in an ambush up Sandy Creek and succeed in transporting the supplies overland to Sackets Harbor, allowing the *Superior* to be launched.

The U.S. and Great Britain sign a peace treaty in Ghent, Belgium on Christmas Eve. The terms of the treaty call for peace without territorial concessions from either side, and disposal of most of the armaments and ships amassed during the War of 1812.

1815 The U.S. Congress ratifies the peace treaty on February 16, 1815. When word reaches Sackets Harbor, work stops on two unfinished ships under construction, the *New Orleans* and the *Chippewa*.

Sackets Harbor's first library, the Union Library, is organized.

1816 The Presbyterians organize their first Society at Sackets Harbor.

1816 to 1819 First phase of Madison Barracks is constructed by the Second U.S. Infantry. The Second Infantry, under the command of Colonel Hugh Brady, earns the nickname "Brady's Saints" because they march to church in a group on Sundays.

1817 George Camp prints first issue of the Sackets Harbor Gazette on March 18.

President James Monroe visits Sackets Harbor

to view construction of Madison Barracks.

The Steamship **Ontario** is built at Sackets Harbor and makes the first steam-powered voyage on Lake Ontario from the village. She continues to serve Lake Ontario until 1832 when she is scrapped at Oswego.

1818 The Athol Lodge of the Masonic Order is formed at Sackets Harbor and meets in the Union Hotel.

1820 The Jefferson, a War of 1812 brig designed to carry 20 cannon, begins to settle into the mud off Navy Point. The ship's skeleton lies there today and has been the subject of serious underwater archeology study.

1821 An Episcopal congregation is organized in Sackets Harbor.

1827 to 1836 Elisha Camp excavates a canal to divert water from the Black River to supply water power for industries that he expects to be established near the port of Sackets Harbor. Elisha Camp's plan becomes know derisively as "Camp's Ditch" and is abandoned in 1836.

1832 Dr. Samuel Guthrie, conducts experiments, which lead to the first, knew use of chloroform.

1834 Capt. August Pickering of Sackets Harbor is the first entrepreneur to sail a commercial vessel into the frontier town of Chicago.

1834 to 1836 The Sackets Harbor Bank is chartered and it's stone building at the corner of Main and Broad Streets is completed.

1837 The Trenton & Sackets Harbor Railroad Company is chartered. This first attempt to bring a railroad into Sackets Harbor is never realized.

1837 to 1840 The Patriots' War, a rebellion that attempts to expel British rule from Canada, takes place in Canada. The U.S. border with Canada, including the Sackets Harbor Naval Station, is reinforced in response to the rebellion.

1838 President Martin Van Buren visits Madison Barracks. A volley of muskets fired in his honor nearly results in tragedy when a ramrod, left in the musket barrel by one of the soldiers, flies through the air like an arrow and pierces the ground near the President.

1840s The Eighth Regiment leaves Madison Barracks to serve in the war against the Seminoles in Florida.

The population of the Village of Sackets Harbor reaches its peak at 4,146.

A two-story schoolhouse is built on the corner of Broad and Washington Streets at a cost of \$2,000.00.

1843 Cinders from the steamboat *St. Lawrence* start a devastating fire which sweeps from the wharves to destroy forty buildings in Sackets Harbor.

The McKee Iron Foundry begins manufacturing agricultural equipment in Sackets Harbor.

1847 to 1848 The U.S. Navy builds the Commandant's House and the Lieutenant's House near the harbor, on land that is now part of the Sackets Harbor Battlefield State Historic Site.

1848 The New York State Senate proposes to build a railroad from Sackets Harbor through the Adirondack Mountains to Saratoga Springs.

The railroad intended to encourage settlement in the Adirondacks and improve communication between eastern and western New York State, in never built.

1848 to 1849 Lieut. Ulysses S. Grant and his wife, Julia Dent Grant, are stationed at Madison Barracks.

1851 Captain Ulysses S. Grant, accompanied by his wife and son, returns to Madison Barracks for a second tour of duty.

1853 The Sackets Harbor & Ellisburg Railroad Company founded in 1850 begins service. At Sackets Harbor, the railroad connects with the Ontario and St. Lawrence Steamboat Company. At Pierrepont Manor, it connects with the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railway.

1861 to 1865 During the Civil War, Madison Barracks serves as a recruiting and training center under Colonel Walter B. Camp.

1862 The Sackets Harbor & Ellisburg Railroad Company ceases operation.

1870 to 1930 Sackets Harbor enjoys tremendous popularity as a summer resort community. 1875 The Utica and Black River Railroad opens service to Sackets Harbor.

1876 Fire destroys nearly half of the Officers Quarters at Madison Barracks. U.S. President Ulysses S. Grant decides to re-invest in and improve Madison Barracks.

1880 A storm destroys the building that protects the New Orleans, a ship kept in Sackets Harbor by the U.S. Navy since the War of 1812. 1883 The remains of the New Orleans are sold at auction by the U.S. Navy for \$427.50.

1886 Heirs of Elisha Camp donate land for the "Old Battlefield Park," to commemorate those who served in Sackets Harbor during the War of 1812.

1890s The U.S. Army expands Madison Barracks by constructing several new brick buildings and the stone water tower.

1893 The New York Central Railroad absorbs the rail link at Sackets Harbor, incorporating it into one of the world's most extensive rail systems.

1898 to 1901 The Ninth U.S. Infantry, stationed at Sackets Harbor, fights in Cuba and the Philippines during the Spanish American War, and in China during the Boxer Rebellion.

1900 A new passenger railroad station is built at Sackets Harbor to accommodate travelers and tourists.

1908 The U.S. Army establishes Pine Camp eleven miles east of Watertown. The post is later renamed Camp Drum and today Fort Drum.

1913 Franklin D. Roosevelt, Assistant Secretary of the Navy, visits Sackets Harbor to dedicate a monument at the Sackets Harbor Battlefield to those who served in the War of 1812.

1917 to 1918 Madison Barracks trains officers for service in World War I. As many as 2,500 men are stationed here during this period.

1918 to 1919 Madison Barracks is uses as a hospital for shell-shocked veterans and other World War I wounded.

1922 The "Red Legs," the second Battalion of the Seventh Field Artillery, arrive at Madison Barracks. The Red Legs acquired their nickname due to distinctive red piping on the seams of their trousers.

1923 A Citizens Military Training Camp is established at Madison Barracks by the U.S. War Department to bring young men together to "stimulate patriotism and promote military preparedness."

1928 The Sackets Harbor "Civic Improvement League" is formed by the women of Sackets Harbor to help convey the history of the village and foster improvements in the village. The Civic League operates the Pickering-Beach Historical Museum for many years.

1930 Metro-Goldwyn-Meyer, Fox, Paramount and Pathe film the maneuvers of the Seventh Field Artillery and the Twenty – Eighth Infantry on the ice of Lake Ontario.

1933 A camp of the Civilian Conservation Corps, a Depression Era mobilization of young men to carry out environmental projects, is established at Madison Barracks. In 1934, Madison Barracks becomes the headquarters for ten CCC Camps in the region.

Old Battlefield Park is given to the State of New York, under the auspices of the Thousand Islands State Park Commission, by the Jefferson County Historical Society and the Village of Sackets Harbor.

1934 to 1935 The Army's motorization of the Twenty-fifth Field Artillery replaces horses and mules with trucks at Madison Barracks.

1937 The United States sub-chaser, S. C. 431, explodes at anchor off Navy Point, mortally wounding Chief Petty Officer Steven Kafka, who dies three days later.

1941 The Pickering-Beach family donates its home to the Village of Sackets Harbor for use as a museum.

1941 to 1944 Madison Barracks is used by the National Guard, and medical and quartermaster units during World War II.

1945 The U.S. government considers closing both Pine Camp and Madison Barracks. Ultimately, Pine Camp is expanded and Madison Barracks is closed.

1946 Madison Barracks is declared surplus property by the U.S. Government.

1949 The New York Central Railroad abandons its line to Sackets Harbor.

1955 Madison Barracks is sold to a private individual.

1956 The U.S. Government property on Navy Point is declared surplus.

1957 The U.S. Government property on Horse Island is declared surplus.

1967 to 1974 The State of New York purchases the Union Hotel and several parcels of land adjacent to the Old Battlefield Park and implements a program to open the historic site to the public.

1973 The Village of Sackets Harbor adopts a Historic Zoning Law and establishes a Historic Zoning Board.

1974 Madison Barracks is listed on the National Register of Historic Places but remains mostly vacant and continues to deteriorate.

The Sackets Harbor Battlefield is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Pre-First World War Military Records-Except for the South African War, detailed personnel records for the Canadian military were not kept prior to the First World War. Earlier records consist mainly of muster rolls and pay list, which contain little or no personal information. Most are not indexed, the regiment must be known before you can attempt a search. If you know your ancestor's place of residence, you might find references to his service in the militia rolls for that county. Most of these lists are found within the National Archives of Canada Department of Militia and Defense series (RG 9), parts of, which are available on microfilm.



John Alverson – a native of Vermont, settled in Hounsfield, NY abt. April 1829. He died at the age of 44y 4m on June 13, 1829. John married Sarah Frink, of Vermont, in 1806.

Samuel Alverson – (1811-1895) born in Halifax, VT came to Hounsfield NY with his parents in 1829. He married Mary (b 1820 d 1920) daughter of William Wiley. Samuel was a successful farmer in Hounsfield.

Samuel purchased 285 acres in the southeast part of Hounsfield making the first cleaning of land in Hounsfield. After erecting a log house Samuel returned to Massachusetts for his wife Hannah, and five children three sons and two daughters. They return to Hounsfield in December 1802.

Hounsfield First Town Meeting was on March 4th 1806. Samuel Bates Jr., Amasa Fox, William Baker, and Theron Hinman where chosen as the first Town Assessors. Samuel participated in the Battle of Sackets Harbor with Captain Camps Artillery. He would handle the 32-pound gun that helped keep the British Fleet from entering Sackets Harbor. While assisting with the construction of Madison Barrack he became sick he died on Feb 13, 1813.

Merrick M. Bates – eldest son and second child (b July 10, 1801 in Brimfield, Mass) (d June 18, 1882 Hounsfield, NY). Deloss W. Crandall - born in Madison County at 9 years moved with his parents to Hounsfield, NY (d Aug 6 1876 47y). He married **Fanny A.** daughter of **Elias & Almira (Moxson) Frank**, of Cortland County. (Fanny A. Road 46 - widow farmer Sackets Harbor - Child's Business Index).

Children of Deloss W. Crandall & Fanny A Frank: *Chester D., and *Perrin A.

Chester D. Crandall - lived in Kansas City, Mo.

Perrin A. Crandall – (b 1858 – d 1933) married **Carrie E. Graham** (b 1864 – d 1947) daughter of John & Mary (Boulton) Graham of Hounsfield (*Perrin A. farmer for Fanny A. Road 46 – Child's Business Index*).

Son of Perrin A. Crandall & Carrie Graham: * Chester (1885 - 1941).

Daniel De Wolf – born 1782 of Connecticut lived at Sackets Harbor from around 1812 to 1815 as a blacksmith at the Navy yard. He fought during a memorable battle that took place on May 29, 1813. After the war he moved back to Connecticut and returned with his family in 1822. He had a son named: *David

David O. De Wolf – born Feb 26, 1817 lived at Sackets Harbor and served as a member of the Town of Hounsfield Corporation in 1877 and Deputy collector of customs for the port. Daniel De Wolf died in 1829.

Antoine Desmore – came from France to Canada, where he remained until his death. Of his five children,

*Isaac Desmore – was born in Canada, came to Brownville in 1837, where he died in 1877, aged 72 years. He married Martha, daughter of Francis Amel, of Canada.

ter. Town of Brownville, after he married Mary daughter of Morris Fitzgerald.

He received his scholastic education at the Black River Literary and Religious Institute and taught school upon completion of his education. He learned the trade of a carpenter while serving as an apprentice under Egbert Dodge of Field's Settlement. In 1849 Jay Dimick married Sophia, eldest daughter of Benjamin Maxon of the Town of Hounsfield. In 1869 he was elected to the Assembly from first district of Jefferson County and re-elected in 1870. He served as justice of peace and school commissioner several terms. The Dimick's were one of the most successful Apirians (beekeepers) in Northern NY turning out over 2,500 pounds of honey per year. In 1903 he had over 85 swarms of bees but in the latter times had over 200.

James Drake – of Connecticut, located in Redfield, Oswego County, about 1800, where he remained until his death, aged 87 years. He had four children. *Andrew, and *???

Andrew Drake – born in Oswego County, died there at the age of 23 years. He married Eunice Davis, of Redfield.

Children of Andrew Drake & Eunice Davis:

* Andrew J., and *Louisa.

Andrew J. Drake - (b 1838 - d 1922) came to Hounsfield in 1856. In 1860 he married Sarah (b 1838 - d 1918) daughter of John & Sarah (Pilmore) Sarge(a)nt. Mr. Drake served in Company I, 10th N.Y.H.A., three years. He lived on Road 25 - Child's Business Index.

Sanford Earl – a native of Rhode Island, came to Sackets Harbor in 1815, remaining until his death on March 27, 1880 at 94 years. He married Deborah Sheldon (d Dec 24, 1851 45y 7m). (1850 Census – Sanford Earl 52y pob CT. and Deborah Sheldon 43y pob CT)

Children of Sanford Earl & Deborah Sheldon:

Richard Earl – (1829 – 1908) born in Sackets Harbor, married Lucy (b 1837 – d 1901) daughter of Henry & Elizabeth (Jackson) Boulton. Richard Earl served as Captain of a lake vessel, which plied between Oswego and Chicago, for many years. (Proprietor of the Earl House, Livery Stable and Madison Hall, Main Street at Sackets Harbor. Farm on Road 45 – Child's Business Index.)

Children of Richard Earl & Lucy Boulton: *Richard H., and *Charles S., (worked in NYC Adams Express Company – Child's Business Index)

Bernard (Barney) Eveleigh – (b Jan 17, 1813 – d Jan 22, 1894), born in Dorsetshire, England – baptised by Rev. William Buckland, in the parish of White Church. His father was a dairyman of some means for those times. Bernard at the age of 21, sailed for America, landing at Sackets Harbor with only two sovereigns in his pocket. He immediately apprenticed himself to **Hanson Rann** three years to learn the carpenters' trade. This business he pursued for years.

In 1861 owing to ill health, his trade was given up, when he went into the hotel business, but only remaining there four years, whereupon he resumed his old business, adding to it lumber trading with Canada. Through this, his ship building business was started, which he carried to quite an extent, building boats of various dimensions. He owned the Schooner *Monitor*.

Other things were added during the succeeding years, among which were farming, hardware, meat market, coal yard, and filling contracts with Madison Barracks for numerous things. *(Eveleigh House Main St.)*

Sackets Harbor - Childs' Business Index). Though having lost much at different times, by fire and shipwreck, he retained a hotel, store, dwelling house, a 1,000 acres of land, and one boat. In 1840 he married 1st Miss Lydia Ann Champion (b 1800 - d 1880).

Bernard & Lydia had one child: *Elvina

Elvina – (1841 – 1926 Mrs. Amos M. Marsh, of Hounsfield). In 1882 he married 2nd Mrs. Amos Membery, of Adolphustown, Lenox County, Ontario.

Matthew Eveleigh - native of Dorchester, England where he died at the age of 28 years. He married Fanny Roberts, and among their children was a son – *Thomas.

William Eveleigh - native of Dorsetshire, England, son of Thomas & Jane married Elizabeth Grinter.

*Robert, *Thomas, and *John G.

John G. Eveleigh – son of William & Elizabeth came to this town and located in Sackets Harbor in 1874. He married 1st Martha Boyd. see Richard Boyd family history. He married 2st Elizabeth A. Brass (d May 8, 1885 369 5m). He married 3st Ida (d June 21, 1894 29y 1m) daughter of Charles Boulton. See Henry Boulton family history.

Elijah Field – twelfth and youngest child of Bennett & Elizabeth (Spafford) Field born April 20, 1756 in Mansfield, Connecticut. He married Tamson January 26, 1774 daughter of Hezekiah Crane Mansfield, CT. In 1774, they settled in Woodstock, Windsor County, Vt. Elijah served as a drummer in the Revolutionary War. In 1806, he moved his family to Hounsfield (Fields Settlement) where he died October 1828 at 73 years.

He participated in the Battles of Cold Harbor and Petersburg, with Sheridan in the campaign of 1864, and was at the front at the time of Lee's surrender. He married Mrs. Martha (Chapman) Gifford (b 1838 - d 1911) of Three-Mile Bay, daughter of Asa Chapman.

Cornelius W. Inglehart, of German descent born at Oswegatchie, St. Lawrence County (b May 11, 1811 – d July 6, 1882). In 1814 his parents located in Watertown, NY – the year following to Hounsfield, NY. Mr. Inglehart took an early interest in public affairs, and served in many official positions, with credit to himself and his constituents. He was a prominent abolitionist, and his voice was always raised in favor of temperance and all reform measures. He was a delegate to the first Republican convention held in this county, and continued a strong advocate of reform until his death. At the breaking out of the Civil War, he aided materially in procuring volunteers, and contributed liberally financially to encourage enlistment's. He was at one time a director in the National Union Bank, and was one of the organizers of the Agricultural Insurance Company. He was an instructive writer, and a public-spirited citizen whose influence was felt throughout the county. He was married four times, as follows:

Levi G. Potter – a native of Oneida County, where he died at the age of 45 years. He married Roena Rising, of Litchfield, Herkimer County.



Absence of any definitive statement in the county histories as led to the general opinion that Navy Point and the Naval station at Sackets Harbor had been Federal property since before the War of 1812.

Records in the county clerk's office show however that the United States did not acquire Navy Point and the military establishment known as Fort Tompkins until February 18, 1847.

On that date the property extended to the north border of Main Street opposite the Battlefield. It was purchased from James E. De Kay, Charles P. Clinch and Francis R. Tillon executors of the Henry Eckford estate for \$2,500 dollar.

(Note: Henry Eckford built the fleet

of war vessels on Lake Ontario for Commodore Isaac Chauncey.)

It appears that Eckford had purchased the property from Commodore Chauncey. Here the record is slightly confusing as one deed from Chauncey to Eckford transfers half of the property on July 1, 1815 for \$1,596.57 and the other seems to transfer the whole property from Chauncey to Eckford April 25, 1823 in the some of \$3,000 dollars. It contained about three acres.


The property was in private hands all the time it was used as a naval depot during the War of 1812 and during all of the time the fleet was engaged on Lake Ontario.

The Naval station was first set up on the site November 9, 1810 when Lieutenant Melanchton T. Woolsey brought the Brig Oneida there from Oswego.

Commodore Chauncey was given naval command of Great Lakes on September 1, 1812 arriving at Sackets in October. He rented the property for \$200.00 a years.

Not until after the United States Government purchased it in 1847 were the two brick residences constructed on Main Street, the larger one or commandant's quarters having been erected that year and the smaller one shown herewith having been built in 1848. This latter was first used as the residence of the captain of the yard.

U.S. Government declared the Naval Point surplus in 1956 and was disposed of at that time.

(U)rial Ro(a)wlson – a native of Canaan, Connecticut, came to Sackets Harbor abt 1801, one of the first settlers, and built one of the first five homes in the Village. (U)rial Rawlson served during War 1812. He was engaged in the lumber business, and ran the first raft of lumber on the St. Lawrence from Sackets Harbor to Montreal. He married Elizabeth (d Aug 16, 1853 age 76y 3m) daughter of William Lawrence of Canaan Conn.

Children of (U)rial Ro(a)wlson and Elizabeth Lawrence:

Squire Reed, a native of Rhode Island, also came from Connecticut to this county in 1802, first locating in the town of Adams, whence he removed to Sackets Harbor in 1806-07, and became prominently identified with the affairs of that village. He served in the Revolutionary War. After the breaking out of the War of 1812 he removed to Brownville, where he died. His son: **Daniel.*

Daniel Re(a)ed – (born abt 1797 – d Jan 30 1879) native of Connecticut. Daniel came to Sackets Harbor, age three, in 1800. He was part owner of the Ship Ariadne out of Sackets Harbor, NY. The Ariadne is credit as being the first trading vessel to enter the Lakes at Chicago, Illinois from Sackets Harbor, NY. He served on a gunboat during the War of 1812. Daniel Reed married Jane Sterritt (b Oct 1802 in Canada – d May 16, 1882) (Jefferson County NY 1850 Census – Daniel listed as 50 yrs Sailor; Jane as 44 yrs.) Both are buried in Sackets Harbor Cemetery. Children of Daniel & Jane:

*Deantha (d Feb 11, 1831 age 8m), *Charles C., *Susan (14 yrs in – 1850 Census), *Robert Clinton, *George C. (d Aug 20, 1826 age 9m), and *George M. (12 yrs in – 1850 Census / 1839-1919) wife Helen S, (1843-1939)

Robert Clinton Reed – (*1850 Census* 18 yr old Saloon Keeper b 1832 – d 1887, his wife Sarah A. 1836-1893.)

Charles C. Reed – (23 yrs in – 1850 Census and Sailor) (b 1829 – d 1903) married Amanda (b 1847 – d 1911). daughter of James & Catherine (Frazier) Thum, of Sackets Harbor. He was Captain of a sailing vessel in which he had a business for 45 years. He served with Company G., 116th N.Y.Vol for three years. ***John Thum – (1789-1823) Hes*ter ?? (1785-1870.) John Thum served in the War of 1812, and lost all his property by the depreciation of the Continental money.

Children of John Thum and Hester: *James F., *Maria(1813-1865), *Ann(1809-1836), & *Amanda(1815-1871)

Thomas Draper Spicer – (d June 23, 1870 85y 3m 13d) native of Groton, (Stonington?) CT. At 10 years he moved with his parents to Oswego County, NY. The Spicer's where among the earliest settles to that region. In 1805, Thomas married Abagail Button (d Mar 7, 1863 77y 6m 25d) a neighbor. In 1807, Thomas & Abagail traveled nine days by wagon over the Old Rome State Road, which extend from the Mohawk to the St. Lawrence River through pioneer forest to settle in Hounsfield, NY. Thomas D. Spicer participated in the First Battle of Sackets Harbor where he stood with a cheering band of fellow soldiers on the bluff overlooking Black River Bay and sang "Yankee Doodle" as the British Fleet retired from battle in defeat. The story was substantiated by Edward G. Spicer of Adams. NY a great grandson of Thomas D. Spicer from family record and diaries. (Watertown Times August 14, 1945 – "1812 Battle Singer had Colorful Career") He was a Civil War Veteran also with two sons and nine grandson's serving in the War too.

Thomas D. & Abagail had nine children: *Nelson (the eldest son.) Nelson Spicer – (d Aug 11, 1890 83y 5m 13d) wife of Nelson (d Feb 2, 1871 65y 9m.) Children of Nelson: * Ramiro E.

Robert Washburn – son of Dyer born in Hounsfield lived in Adams. He married **Lucy Warren** of Lyme. (1855 Census for Hounsfield Jefferson County NY – Dyer Washburn, 65 pob CT; wife Anna 66y pob CT.; Robert 27y.; and Lucy 21y pob NY.)


