## **Genealogical Resources in NYS Archives**

#### Introduction

Records in the New York State Archives document functions and activities of State government; none of the records were created for the purpose of genealogical research. However, the Archives does hold records containing information on individuals. Among these records are indexes to birth, marriage, and death certificates filed with the New York State Health Department; summary records of war service (Revolutionary War through World War I); land records (mostly transactions involving the Colony or State of New York); court records (including colonial wills and early nineteenth century civil cases); and case records of some of the many New York State correctional and custodial institutions.

This leaflet provides introductory, summary information on the record series in the New York State Archives that are most useful for genealogical research. (A "record series" is a group of files or documents maintained together because they relate to the same function or activity.) In some series information about individuals is accessible through a name index or alphabetical arrangement. However, most series lack indexes, making searches difficult. In this leaflet record series titles and numbers are indicated in **bold face type**. Titles are sometimes abbreviated.

This leaflet also refers the researcher to published guides and indexes to records in the Archives, and mentions some sources of genealogical data at other levels of government. Persons planning to use the State Archives for genealogical research are encouraged to become familiar with the techniques and sources of family history and with basic facts of New York State history, government, and geography. See the selective bibliography at the end of this leaflet.

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#### The New York State Archives

The State Archives acquires, preserves, and makes accessible State government records that have continuing historical or legal value. The Archives also acquires microfilm copies of some archival records of local governments. The Archives contains over 70,000 cubic feet of records, dating from the seventeenth century to the present and taking a variety of formats, including parchment, paper, and photographic and magnetic media. #### Access to Records in the New York State Archives

Records in the New York State Archives are available for use in the Archives' research room, Cultural Education Center (11th floor), Madison Avenue, Albany, Monday-Friday 9 a.m.-5 p.m. (except state holidays). Starting October 2000 the Archives' research room will move to the 3rd floor of the CEC, where it will remain until sometime in 2002. During this period the Archives facility on the 11th floor will be renovated. Contact the Archives for further information (contact information on page 1).

Records are not available for use while they are being microfilmed or processed, or if they are so fragile that handling would damage them. If records are available on microfilm, use of the original documents is restricted. While most records in the Archives are available under New York's Freedom of Information Law, some records contain information that is restricted by the Personal Privacy Protection Law or other During the renovation period. statutes. retrieval of records not available on microfilm will be subject to delay. Researchers should contact the Archives several days in advance to arrange for retrieval of the records they wish to use.

Archives Publications. Record series in the Archives are listed in *Guide to Records in the New York State Archives* (1993). Various Archives publications describe records of particular agencies, institutions, and topical areas. (A publications list and order form are available on request.) Unpublished finding aids to record series may be used at the Archives. Some records are available on microfilm; most of the film may be purchased, or borrowed through inter-library loan.

**On-Line Information.** The State Archives maintains an online catalog of descriptive information about its records. The catalog, the *Guide to Records* (updated), and other publications can be accessed online through the Archives' web site <www.sara.nysed.gov>.

#### Vital Records

New York began statewide registration of births, marriages, and deaths in 1880-81. (New York City and a few cities upstate have some vital records pre-dating 1880.) For general information on vital records in New York State and City, see *Archives Information Leaflet #2 Vital Records*. The leaflet is available in paper format from the Archives, and at the Archives' web site.

Vital Records Indexes. The State Archives makes available for on-site use copies of State Department of Health microfiche indexes to birth, marriage, and death certificates filed in that Department. The indexes start in 1880-81 and cover the entire state outside New York City. Index entries give only name, date, place of event, and certificate number, indexes for births become available for public use after 75 years, for marriages and deaths after 50 years. Two sets of the indexes are available for public use: 1) New York State Archives, Albany (see above for hours); and 2) National Archives Northeast Region, 201 Varick Street, New York, NY 10014 (for information on location and hours telephone 212-337-1300).

Birth, Marriage, and Death Certificates. To obtain copies or abstracts of birth, marriage, or death certificates for events in New York State outside New York City, contact New York State Department of Health, Vital Records Section, Corning Tower Building, Albany, NY 12237 <www.health.state.ny.us>; telephone 518-474-3077. Older New York City vital records and indexes are in the New York City Municipal Archives, 31 Chambers Street, New York, NY 10007 <www.ci.nyc.ny.us/html/serdir/html/ xdoris01.html>; telephone 212-788-8580.

#### **Records of Military Service**

The New York State Archives holds many records that document the military service of

individuals. The records usually take the form of one-page abstracts or cards, or financial claims. Information on the military and naval service records available at the State Archives for various conflicts is provided below. The National Archives holds service, pension, or bounty land warrant case files for persons who served in the U.S. armed forces. For searches of records of Federal military service prior to the early 20th century, contact National Archives, Reference Services Branch (NNIR), Washington, DC 20408 <www.nara.gov>; telephone 202-501-For more recent records, contact the 5400. National Personnel Records Center (MPR), 9700 Page Blvd., St. Louis, MO 63132 <www.nara.gov/regional/mpr.html>. (Most of the World War I and II service records were destroyed by fire in 1973.)

War Records Search Service. Archives staff will search selected record series documenting war service in which information on individuals is accessible by name, and will provide copies or abstracts of records on specific individuals. There is a fee for this service. Copies of the search request form and Archives Information Leaflet #4 War Service Records & Searches are available on request. The war service search request form can be printed out from a file on the Archives' web site <www.sara.nysed.gov>.

Colonial Wars. Most muster rolls for the colonial militia were destroyed by fire in 1911. The rolls were published in Annual Report of the State Historian, 1895-96 (Albany: 1896-97; repr. Baltimore: 2000). Other rolls were published in Collections of the New-York Historical Society for the Year 1891 (New York: 1892). Grants of land to British officers who fought in the Seven Years' War (1756-1763) are recorded in Military Patents, 1764-1797 (A0447). The applications for those grants are found in Applications for Land Grants (A0272) (see references to microfilm and published calendar, below).

Revolutionary War. The Archives holds two series of records relating to bounty land grants in

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the Military Tract of central New York: Military Patents, 1764-1797 (A0447) and Applications for Land Grants (A0272). Series A0272 is available on microfilm, and is abstracted and indexed in Calendar of N.Y. Colonial Manuscripts Indorsed Land Papers, 1643-1803 (Albany: 1864; repr. 1987). Data on military land grants to Revolutionary War veterans is available in The Balloting Book, and Other Documents Relating to Military Bounty Lands in the State of New-York (Albany: 1825; repr. 1983). Most other New York records relating to Revolutionary War service were destroyed or damaged by fire in 1911. The surviving Revolutionary War Accounts and Claims ("Revolutionary Manuscripts") (A0200) have been microfilmed, but no name index is available. Documents in series A0200 were abstracted and indexed in New York in the Revolution as Colony and State, 2d ed., 2 vols. (Albany: 1904). The often fragmentary series of Revolutionary War-era records in the Archives are described in Guide to Records Relating to the Revolutionary War Held in the New York State Archives (1994).

The fullest published collections of Revolutionary War documents from New York are Berthold Fernow, ed., New York in the Revolution (Albany: 1887; repr. 1972); "Muster Rolls and Pay Rolls of the War of the Revolution 1775-1783," Collections of the New-York Historical Society, 48 (1915), pp. 338-511; and Calendar of Historical Manuscripts, Relating to the War of the Revolution, in the Office of the Secretary of State, 2 vols. (Albany: 1868).

War of 1812. Data on payments to militia men who were mustered into Federal service during the war is available in Abstracts of Payrolls for New York State Militia (B0810). Veterans' claims for reimbursement for clothing, arms, and equipment furnished at their own expense are found in two series (A0020, A3352); the claims are indexed in *Index of Awards on Claims of the* Soldiers of the War of 1812 (Albany: 1860; repr. 1969, 1994).

Civil War. During the late nineteenth century the N.Y. Adjutant General's Office abstracted data from muster rolls of men who served in New York units during the Civil War. The one-page abstracts of Civil War service are found in Muster Roll Abstracts of New York State Volunteers, U.S. Sharpshooters, and U.S. Colored Troops (13775) and similar abstracts for the U.S. Navy and Marines, and the N.Y. National Guard. The Archives also holds Registers of Officers and Enlisted Men Mustered into Federal Military or Naval Service during the Civil War (A0389), which are organized by county, then by town or city, but are not indexed. Also in the Archives are Town and City Registers of Men Who Served in the Civil War (13774), which are organized by town or city ward (registers for New York City, Brooklyn, Albany, Troy, Utica, Rochester, and some towns are lacking). Series A0389 and 13774 and part of 13775 (Regiments 1-85) are available on microfilm.

Published lists of officers and soldiers are found in Record of the Commissioned Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates of the Regiments Which Were Organized in the State of New York . . . ("N.Y. Muster Rolls"), 8 vols. (Albany: 1864-68), and Annual Report of the Adjutant-General of the State of New York; Registers of New York Regiments in the War of the Rebellion, 43 vols. (Albany: 1894-1906). Summary historical data on New York regiments and on commissioned officers is available in Frederick Phisterer, comp., New York in the War of the Rebellion, 3d ed., 6 vols. (Albany: 1912). Full descriptions of Civil War records in the State Archives are published in The Union Preserved: A Guide to Civil War Records in the New York State Archives (New York: 1999).

Spanish-American War. Summary data on New York men who served in the U.S. Army, Navy, and Marine Corps is available in card form in Abstracts of Spanish-American War Military and Naval Service Records (B0809). Additional information on National Guard and Naval Militia members is found in Abstracts of Muster Rolls for National Guard Units Mustered into Federal Service (B0801). Series B0801 is abstracted and indexed in New York in the Spanish-American War, 4 vols. (Albany: 1900-14).

Mexican Border Conflict. Data on National Guard members is found in Abstracts of Muster Rolls for National Guard Units Mustered into Federal Service during the 1916 Mexican Punitive Campaign (B0802).

World War I. Summary data on New York men who served in the U.S. Army, Navy, and Marine Corps and on women who were Army or Navy nurses is found in Abstracts of World War I Military Service (B0808). These summary cards were prepared in the 1920s from Federal personnel records that were destroyed by fire in St. Louis in 1973.

Additional data on National Guard members mustered into Federal service is found in Abstracts of National Guard Service in World War I (13721). Descriptions of these and other records relating to "home front" activities are found in A Spirit of Sacrifice: . . A Guide to Records Relating to World War I Held in the New York State Archives (1993). For searches of World War I draft registration cards, contact National Archives Southeast Region, 1557 St. Joseph Ave., East Point, GA 30344.

World War II and Later Conflicts. The State Archives holds no military service records relating to these conflicts. Administrative records relating to "home front" activities during World War II are described in *They Also Served: A Guide to Records of the New York State War Council* (1993).

Other Military Service Records. The Archives holds two series of registers of N.Y. Militia and National Guard commissioned officers (1800-1909) (series 13728, 13729) and National Guard Muster Rolls (1878-1954) (13726).

These record series are organized by unit or date; they contain military service data only and are not indexed. Commissioned officers appointed between 1783 and 1821 are listed in the Military Minutes of the Council of Appointment, comp. Hugh Hastings, 4 vols. (Albany: 1901-02). N.Y. National Guard personnel files (1920-current) are held by the N.Y. Division of Military & Naval Affairs, 330 Old Niskayuna Road, Latham, NY 12110.

#### **Census Records**

The Archives holds the original schedules of the New York State population census for 1915 and 1925 (series A0275, A0276). The schedules are not indexed, and Archives staff will not search them except to provide legal proof of age. The schedules are fragile, and therefore use is restricted. Microfilm copies of the 1915 and 1925 census schedules and key maps for New York City and a few other cities are available in the State Library. Manuscript schedules of the State census taken periodically between 1801 and 1905 were destroyed by fire in 1911. Some county clerks' offices hold duplicate copies of the State censuses between 1825 and 1925. For further information on these census records, see New York State Census Records, 1790-1925 (N.Y. State Library Bibliography Bulletin 88, 1981). That publication also contains information on Federal censuses of population for New York.)

#### Indian Records

The Archives holds a Population Census of Indian Reservations, 1845 (A1832), which is available on microfilm. The 1915 and 1925 population censuses include Indian reservations. The Archives also holds Indian Census and Annuity Rolls, 1881-1950 (A0742) (rolls dating after 1925 are restricted).

#### Real Property Transfer Records

Land conveyances (deeds and mortgages) are recorded in the county clerks' offices or in the New York City Register's Office. Recording of deeds became mandatory statewide in 1830.

Before that time many deeds were not recorded. The State Archives holds records of land grants ("patents") by the Colony and State of New York. Applications for grants and related documents are found in Applications for Land Grants ("Land Papers") (A0272), available on microfilm. The applications are abstracted and indexed in Calendar of N.Y. Colonial Manuscripts Indorsed Land Papers, 1643-1803 (Albany: 1864; repr. 1987). The actual grants are recorded in Letters Patent (12943) and Military Patents (A0447). Some private conveyances of real property, mostly in the New York City area in the later 17th and early 18th centuries, were recorded by the Secretary's Office in Deeds ("Miscellaneous Records") (A0453).

#### Real Property Tax Records

The chief fiscal officer for each county has custody of real property tax assessment rolls; most counties have these records commencing about 1850. The State Archives has available on microfilm Tax Assessment Rolls of Real and Personal Estates, 1799-1804 (B0950) for the whole state except New York County (Manhattan). The Archives also holds scattered tax assessment rolls and lists for some towns and districts in the Hudson and Mohawk valleys in the 1770s and '80s (series A1201, A3210, A3206); these records are not available on microfilm. Many colonial tax rolls are published in *Lists of Inhabitants of Colonial New York* (Baltimore: 1979).

#### Court Records

The Archives holds many records of New York's higher trial and appeals courts prior to 1847, and of appeals courts from 1847 to the present. Of special interest to genealogists are records of the Court of Chancery (1704-1847) and the Court of Probates (1778-1823) and its colonial predecessor, the Prerogative Court (1686-1783).

**Probate Records.** The Surrogate's Court, established in each county in 1787, has custody of almost all probate records created since that-

date. The State Archives holds the records and filed documents of the Court of Probates, the predecessor of the Surrogate's Courts. Holdings include Probated Wills (J0038), Inventories and Accounts (J0301), and Administration Papers (J0033). The wills relate to estates in all parts of New York; the inventories and administration papers relate mostly to estates in the Hudson and Mohawk valleys. Most of the documents in these series pre-date 1787; all predate 1823. The Archives has microfilmed part of series J0038 and all of J0301 and J0033. The published indexes to these records were not filmed. The Archives also holds recorded wills for New York County (Manhattan) through 1879 (series J1043). Archives staff will search probate records only if name of decedent and date of death are provided. For further information on probate records and indexes to them, see Archives Information Leaflet #3 Probate Records.

Chancery Records. Chancery jurisdiction included guardianship for the property of widows and orphans; mortgage foreclosure; real property partition; and divorce (1787-1847 only). All surviving Chancery Decrees and Papers Before 1800 (J0065) are available on microfilm. Many pre-1800 Chancery case documents were not preserved; and the existing indexes to pre-1800 cases are very incomplete. Various series of Chancery Minutes covering the period 1781-1847 (series J0048, J0050, J0059, J0081) are available on microfilm, as are the Enrolled Decrees After 1800 (J0063) and accompanying index to complainants. Files of Chancery cases that did not result in a final decree, and files of cases handled in the seven upstate Chancery circuits between 1823 and 1847, are not on microfilm. Access to Chancery records can be difficult. Archives staff will search the records only if a case citation (names of parties and date of case) is provided. Other Chancery records, mostly relating to downstate New York, are at the New York County Clerk's Office, 31 Chambers Street, New York, NY 10007; telephone 212-374-4376 Some data from Chancery records is abstracted in Kenneth Scott,

Records of the Chancery Court, Province and State of New York, Guardianships, 1691-1815 (New York: n.d.).

Naturalization and Related Records Naturalization records are created by the Federal and State courts. State court naturalization records remain in custody of the county clerks. The older Federal naturalization records have been transferred to the National Archives. Photocopies of naturalization documents and indexes for New York City for 1792-1906 (both Federal and State courts) are held by the National Archives Northeast Region, 201 Varick Street, New York, NY 10014. Information on naturalization records held by county clerks is found in Naturalization Records in New York State (Syracuse: 1996). See also Archives Information Leaflet #6 Naturalization Records. The State Archives holds Alien Depositions of Intent to Become U.S. Citizens, 1825-1913 (A1869) and abstracts thereof (A1870). The depositions typically provide very limited information: name of alien, country of origin, and date and place of making deposition. Because there is no unified index to the depositions, Archives staff will not search them. The records and the multiple indexes to them are available for use at the Archives. The earlier alien depositions, which contain a little more personal information than the later ones, are fully abstracted in New York Alien Residents, 1825-1848, comp. Kenneth Scott and Rosanne Conway (Baltimore: 1978).

#### Marriage Bonds

Prior to 1784 couples intending to marry were required to obtain licenses from and file bonds with the provincial secretary, if the impending marriage was not announced in a church. These **Marriage Bonds (A1893)** were mostly destroyed in the 1911 Capitol fire. The charred remants are fragile and use is restricted. Published abstracts are available in Names of Persons for Whom Marriage Licenses Were Issued by the Secretary of the Province of New York, Previous to 1784 (Albany: 1860; repr. with supplements 1984); and in *New York Marriage Bonds*, 1753-1783, comp. Kenneth Scott (New York: 1972).

#### Prison and Reformatory Records

The State Archives holds numerous inmate registers, cards, and case files from several State correctional facilities. (Most of the record series are incomplete and date from before 1957. Only a small sample of post-1956 case files is being preserved.) Certain information on inmates (e.g. adult convictions and incarcerations) is available without restriction. However, probation, parole, medical, and juvenile conviction data is restricted by statute and by Department of Correctional Services regulations.

Access to prison and reformatory records is difficult because there are few indexes to the records. Archives staff will search for an inmate record only if enough information is provided (such as place and dates of incarceration and/or institutional identification number) to locate the record. Prison and reformatory records are described in *Guide to Records of the Department* of Correctional Services in the New York State Archives (Albany: 1992).

#### State Hospital and State School Records

The Archives holds pre-1900 patient records of the Buffalo, Kingsboro (Brooklyn), Utica, and Willard Psychiatric Centers (formerly called State Hospitals or Asylums) and older patient records of the Craig Developmental Center (formerly an epileptic colony) and the Staten Island Developmental Center (formerly called State Schools). All patient records are restricted. regardless of date. Information about patients is disclosed only with the permission of the Office of Mental Health or the Office of Mental Retardation & Developmental Disabilities. The Archives also holds microfilm copies of nineteenth century student lists from the State School for the Deaf at Rome, and the former Thomas Indian School on the Cattaraugus

Reservation. These records are not indexed but may be inspected at the State Archives.

#### **Poorhouse Censuses**

The Archives holds a Census of Inmates in Almshouses and Poorhouses, 1875-1921 (A1978). This series contains some personal data on residents of county and city poorhouses. It is arranged by county and institution, then by admission date. The series is *not* indexed. Archives staff will search the censuses only if name of resident and place and dates of residence are provided. The censuses are available on microfilm.

#### Cartographic Records

The State Archives holds about 80,000 maps in various formats, dating from the 17th century to the present. Among the maps are surveys of lands granted by the Colony and State of New York, but these maps never show occupants of lands. The principal index to early manuscript maps created or filed by State agencies is David E.E. Mix, Catalogue of Maps and Surveys, in the Offices of the Secretary of State, State Engineer and Surveyor, and Comptroller (Albany: 1859; repr. 1981). Most of the maps listed in this catalog have been transferred to the State Archives. If a map is fragile, use and copying will be restricted. During the renovation of the New York State Archives, fall 2000-2003, access to maps not available on microfilm will be restricted. Contact the Archives for further information.

#### Local Records on Microfilm

The State Archives holds microfilm copies of many local government records, some of them dating back to the colonial period. The records include county, city, town, village, and school district administrative records. Few of the records include genealogical data. of addresses: Web page addresses, (more properly called URL's) and E-mail addresses (for sending E-mail) which almost always contain an @. Attachment-A computer file electronically "paper clipped" to an E-mail message and sent along with it. Bookmarks-A list of files or Web pages you plan to use frequently. Netscape's Navigator lets you maintain a list of your favorite items to make it easy to return to them again. (Called Favorites when using Microsoft Internet Explorer).

Browser-A software program that is used to look at various kinds of Internet resources. The two most common browsers are Microsoft's Internet Explorer and Netscape's Navigator.

Byte-A group of eight bits, enough to represent a character. Computer memory is usually measured in bytes. ( A bit is the smallest unit of measurement for computer data).

Cache-The space your browser uses to store pages. The more space you tell your browser to use for its cache, the faster pages appear the second time you look Neuromancer. at them.

Chat-A system by which two internet users can "talk" with each other via typing words. You see the other

Address-Internet users encounter two important types person's message almost instantly and vice versa.(This is unlike E-mail, in which you send your words, and wait for the recipient to receive read and then respond) **Com**-When these letters appear as the last part of a Web address, it indicates that the host computer is run by a commercial organization, probably in the U.S.A. Most of the Web addresses listed in the directory portion of this article end with "com".

Cookie-The most common meaning of "cookie" on the Internet refers to a piece of information sent by a Web Server to a Web Browser that the Browser software is expected to save and to send back to the Server whenever the browser makes additional requests from that server. When a server receives a request from a Browser that includes a Cookie, the server is able to use the information stored in the cookie and customize a response based on information from a previous connection.

Cyberspace-The "area" in which computer users travel when "Navigating " around on a network. The term originated by author William Gibson in his novel,

## **Computer Corner**

#### Tips and Tricks for Windows Users

Every now and then I like to jot down my favorite little tricks in Windows. Here's my latest list.

RENAME USING F2: Rename a file or folder by highlighting it, pressing F2 and typing the new name. The usual method of clicking on the item and holding the mouse button down until the rename function activates itself is awkward.

MAKE YOUR OWN LAUNCH KEYS: right click on any shortcut icon and choose "Properties." Click the "Shortcut" tab. Click once on the "Shortcut key", line and press a letter or number key. Windows will assign modifier keys. take note of what they are, then click OK. Press those keys (all at once) to run the program or open the folder that the shortcut represents.

STOP THE MINDLESS CD HUNT: Windows checks the CD drive for the presence of a CD every second or so, wasting your computer's energy. Stop this automatic checking by right clicking "My Computer" and choosing "Properties," then clicking the "Device Manager" tab. Double click the CD-ROM icon, then double-click the icon under it named for your CD-ROM drive. Click "Properties" at the bottom of the window and click the "Settings" tab. Uncheck "Auto insert notification." Note: Once you do this, you'll have to manually run programs that are supposed to startup automatically when you insert a CD. You'll also have to play audio CDs manually.

GET TOOLED: File and folder windows show up in Explorer without toolbar buttons unless you turn on the toolbar. I could never figure why Microsoft made such a wonderful feature optional. Open an Explorer window (double-click "My Computer" if you're not sure how to do that) and click the "View" menu, then click "Toolbar." You'll see many helpful buttons. Try them all.

SEE THE DETAILS: if you think my comments on the hidden Explorer toolbar were unkind, you ain't heard nothing yet. How about the way Microsoft keeps most Windows users from realizing how great the quick-sort buttons are? They're invisible unless you turn them on. Do this: open an Explorer window, click "View" and then "Details." You'll now see the column headers, starting with "Name." Click any column header to force Windows to sort the contents by that column. Click again to reverse the sort order.

CAPTURE THE SCREEN: want to save an image of what you see on the screen? Run WordPad and leave the document window blank. Minimize WordPad to get it out of the way, then arrange the screen display the way you want it. Press the Print Screen key, then click

inside the WordPad document window and press Ctrl-V to paste the screen image into the document window. (You can also use the "Edit" menu to do this.) Save the WordPad document. You can also print it.

INFORMER

CAPTURE PART OF THE SCREEN: Do everything described in the previous entry EXCEPT this: Press alt-Print Screen instead of Print Screen. This makes an image out of the foreground window.

SAVE YOUR WRIST: This works only under Windows 98, Windows 2000 and Windows ME. Click the Taskbar entry of any program to restore it to the main desktop. Click the Taskbar entry again to bring the program back down to a minimized status on the Taskbar.

MAKE SURE WINDOWS IS IN SYNC: After making any changes to window positions or toolbar settings, click on a blank area of the desktop and press F5. This forces Windows to record the current state of things.

SOUNDS EASY: Double click on the yellow speaker icon in the system tray (near the clock) to open a window with various audio controls.

SHOULDER THE LOAD: If you are dragging an icon from one window to another, you don't need to drop the icon inside the window. Dropping it on the shoulder of the window (the area just below the title bar) will do fine.

SHIFT THE BURDEN: Windows does not always do what you think it's supposed to be doing when you drag items from one place to another. Instead of moving something, Windows might be copying it. Or it might be creating a shortcut - a costly error if you are making backups before wiping out files. Cure this oddity this way: Hold down the Shift key while you drag an item to make sure Windows moves it. hold down the Ctrl key while you drag an item to make sure Windows copies it. (Remember: "Ctrl" starts with "C" and that means "Copy.") When in doubt, click and drag with the right mouse button and choose from the list that appears when you drop the item.

DOCUMENTARY: The Documents" item in the Start Menu is actually a list of shortcuts to recent documents Windows knows about. clear the list this way: Click "Start," then "Run." type "recent" (without quotes) and press Enter. Press Ctrl-A and then press the Delete key. I have more tips, but they'll have to wait for another opportunity.

## **Resource Committee**

The purpose of the resource committee is to inform the membership of the location and contents of genealogical and historical materials available in our Jefferson County. To accomplish this we visit town and village libraries, historians, clerks, and museums and do an inventory of their holdings. The information that we find is compiled and put into a notebook made accessible at Flower Memorial Library and brought to monthly meetings of the society. Be sure to "check it out".

This summer a visit to the Antwerp Town Historian's Office revealed a wealth of information. She has files on churches, cemeteries, school records, Ft. Drum-Pine Camp, original WWII clippings and histories of villages and businesses in the Town of Antwerp. There are many family files and some genealogies. Numerous scrapbooks (some of which are indexed in a separate notebook) contain clippings from the 1850's to the 1980's. Among them are local news items: war items: birth. marriage and obituary notices; Seaway development items and Ives Seminary clippings. A collection of maps includes a unique birds eye view of the village of Antwerp in 1888 and an 1887 Town of Antwerp map with residents names. Books and pamphlets include account books dated 1947-1952; area deeds; a 1939 farm register; histories of villages; and a good local history compiled by rural teachers. Envelopes contain burial permits; death records; a selection of photos; and old programs of the Saturby Bonnie Borrello

Their hours and staff vary constantly.

#### The Soundex Coding System


The Soundex is a coded surname (last name) index based on the way a surname sounds rather than the way it is spelled. Surnames that sound the same, but are spelled differently, like SMITH and SMYTH, have the same code and are filed together. The Soundex coding system was developed so that you can find a surname even though it may have been recorded under various spellings.

To search for a particular surname, you must first work out its code. Every Soundex code consists of a letter and three numbers, such as W252 (see chart below). The letter is always the first letter of the surname. The numbers are assigned to the remaining letters of the surname according to the Soundex guide on page 3.

- Line 1 Write the surname that you are coding, placing one letter in each box. Not counting the first letter, mark through all the vowels and the letters H, W, and Y.
- Line 2 Bring down the first letter and the first three consonants from line 1.
- Line 3 Bring down the first letter, then substitute the appropriate numbers from the Soundex Coding chart for the remaining letters on line 2.
- Line 4 Bring down the first letter and the numbers from line 3. Add zeroes to any empty boxes.



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

## **Book Review**

#### by Nan Dixon

Oakes, R.A. Genealogical and Family History of the County of Jefferson. 2 volumes, 1349 pages. Lewis Publishing Co., Chicago, 1905. Portraits. Index.

The sub title, "A Record of the Achievements of her People and the Phenomenal Growth of her Agricultural and Mechanical Industries" implies that one would find some history as well, but the book is a compendium of the genealogy of Jefferson County men of affairs and their families in 1905. You will find no horse thieves here, and if your family was poor, obscure, or without political influence, you may not find them. Rensselaer Allston Oakes was in an excellent position to make an exhaustive genealogical study of Jefferson County. He was the custodian (curator?) of the Jefferson County Historical Society. He died before the work was published, and his ideas were carried out by those who had worked with him.

The compilers gave credit to newspapers, editors and others for making photographs available. Unlike the county histories, which depended solely on the contributions of the people written about, this book made an attempt to do some independent research. The compilers boasted that, to the surprise and delight of their Jefferson County descendants,

some of the families had been carried back to New England. "Nothing has been printed that was not submitted to some one interested for correction and revision, and as far as finite limitations will permit, accuracy has been preserved," the introduction claimed.

One should take this collection with a grain of salt. Many fallacies, found in print in 1905 but since disproved, are perpetuated here. With all its drawbacks, however, it is still a fount of information unequaled before or since. Within the two volumes are described some 800 families, with the intermarriages laid out in generations. The Collins family, for instance, is supplemented with pages on the collateral Brown and Rouse families, taking each family back to the 1700s or earlier.

More than one facility in Jefferson County has a copy, and it probably can be found in the larger genealogical collections. The one I consulted is in Flower Library, in reasonably good condition. As with any secondary source, use this with caution. For some of us, though, Oakes provides a running start with some information that might be hard to find a century later, and with his help we are able to find primary sources to prove or disprove his statements.

## What's New On The Web <u>http://www.rootsweb.com/~nyjeffer</u>

People have asked what our URL is, so we're displaying it prominently. A URL, for those who are unfamiliar with internetese, is simply an address, and if you write that address into your search engine, you should arrive at Jefferson County's GenWebSite. And while we're on the subject of the internet, please, folks, don't write emails using all capital letters. IT'S BAD MANNERS, LIKE SHOUTING TO SOME-ONE STANDING DIRECTLY IN FRONT OF YOU!

Another acronym that puzzled me the first few months I was exploring the internet is the FAQ. That stands for Frequently Asked Questions, and one of them is: Where can I find a death certificate for someone who died in 1820 in Jefferson County? or 1830, or 1840, or right on up to 1880. The disappointing answer is, you cannot. Official birth, death, and marriage records, those that can be certified by certificate, did not exist until the 1880s, and then were sporadic until about 1900. We have been extremely fortunate, thanks to JCNYGS's first president and website beneficiary, Gus Rogers, to obtain a copy of the death and marriage records for the Town of Clayton, from 1883 to 1913 for the death, and 1907 for the marriage.

There is a brief exception to the lack of vital records, a window lasting from 1847 to 1849. These records are all on the website, and are being reproduced in this newsletter, town by town. Otherwise, Jefferson County has none till the 1880s. If you really need that date, as for an application into a patriotic society, you must find substitutes. Sometimes you can estimate the date from census records. If you are extremely fortunate, you can discover a church or a Bible record. If you are searching on the website, put the name you are looking for into the search engine on the front page. If it is anywhere on the site, it will come up in the search engine's window.

We are trying to supply records when we find them. Donna Dutton, the city clerk of Watertown has supplied us with a group of marriages performed by Laban Ainsworth, a justice of the peace. The first group is of Cape Vincent, 1846-1858 and the second group in the city of Watertown, 1858-1887. We are always looking for such records to post, and if you know of any, please let us know.

One of our look ups recieved a complaint that the records on the genweb site are not early enough. This appears to be a persistent problem, especially from those new to research, or those from states who have kept vital records from the beginning. We cannot, and do not intend to invent records, and as I have just explained, for Jefferson County, they simply didn't exist before the 1880s.

Please don't ask our lookups to search in Canada or St Lawrence County, or anywhere except Jefferson County. Our lookups list the books they are willing to search, and if your question doesn't logically fall into the context of their libraries, they can't help you. As for searching in Canada, our lookups don't necessarily live in Jefferson County. We have volunteers residing from Ohio to Alabama, and they can't just hop into the car and run over to Canada. The internet is deceptive. One can correspond two or three times a day with Hawaii or Australia. Please use reason and restraint in asking favors of our lookups. We don't want them to become discouraged and leave off looking up!

In answer to many requests for people to do research in Jefferson County for a fee, we have a short list on the website, and it will shortly appear in this newsletter. We are not recommending these people, and will not be responsible for their work. This is merely a service to our viewers.



## The Resource Committee

This fall Resource Committee members Betty Farr, Nan, and Bill Dixon received a warm reception at the <u>Carthage Free Library</u>. They found and recorded for our society the many wonderful genealogical and historical materials available there. This information has been added to our notebook which is made accessible at Flower Memorial Library and brought to monthly meetings of the society.

A sampling of their findings are:

MICROFILM- to be viewed with their reader:

Carthage Republican Tribune, 1860-1996. (index cards of obits available), the Federal Census of Jefferson Co.: 1810-1920 and Oneida Co.: 1790 & 1800.

BOOKS: in addition to the basic Jefferson County histories and books of history and genealogy in New England they have: Carthage village directories, Highway Assessment and Poll tax, Town of Wilna, 1875-78; Road Tax: lists Town of Wilna 1848-74; and county and farm directories.

FILES: there are many family files and some genealogies. SCRAPBOOKS include The Great Carthage Fire of 1884, Volunteer Fire Departments, David Lane's Old Houses of the North Country (pictures from the Watertown Daily Times series), Ernest Cook's Old Champion (Watertown Daily Times clippings), North Country Chronicles (Watertown Daily Times clippings), Tales of Long Falls (clippings), and Articles of local interest.

NOTEBOOKS of cemeteries: Diana in Lewis County; Pierce on Fort Drum; Old State St., Monument Park and Fairview in Carthage; and Jeff. Co. cemeteries in the Town of Wilna. Church records for St. James Catholic Church, Carthage; St. Lawrence Church, Jerden Falls; and St. Anthony Padua; Indian River. Records of Edwin Lester, Undertaker, Pierrepont Manor, 1863-1885. Also notebooks of various wars, United Empire Loyalists and pension records.

The Carthage Free Library is located at 412 Budd St., Carthage, NY 13619. It is absolutely necessary for you to call or write ahead if going to this facility or any other. Their hours and staff vary constantly.

## The Traveling Salesman

Notes on W. J. Allen: Father may have come from British Army, (or defected) thru Canada or Mass. A cousin in Albany, Charles Allen, was Pres. of Iron Hdwe Co. He was a salesman for the N & J Co. which traced its origins to the year 1863. The Company also had an extensive cigar manufacturing factory that employed about 50 men.

The Watertown city directory lists the N & J Co. as mfg. of fine cigars, and dealers in tobacco, a model bakery, bottlers, and William J. Allen ,commercial agent. The city directories continue:

1876—Peddler BDS

- 1880-1881-Clerk, beds 4 Sherman Street
- 1885—Commercial Agent– home 37 Keyes Ave.
- 1889—Commercial Agent and harness (Moffet and Allen ) 7 Winthrop
- 1891—Allen and Kepler
- 1896—Boots and shoes-7 Winthrop also Allen & Reeves 10 Washington
- 1900— ( Carrie A ) Allen and Reeves home 1 Gotham Allen & MacCumber (St Regis ) ?
- The Allen Farm owned by Dick Ross (89 years old) now Frank Ross, Town Supervisor.

He was a bartender at a hotel in Brownville. He was supposed to have served a drink to Ulysses S. Grant when he came through there. The family knew his telegrapher.

## **OLD TIME TIN PEDDLER A PICTURESQUE FIGURE**

Theresa, April 17, 1929 (p5): The Children of the modern farm home, with its telephone, its victrola, its electric lights, its radio, and its auto that brings the farm within stone's throw of almost anywhere, have much to be thankful for, but they will never have the real thrill that came to the youngsters of 60 or more years ago when the big, glittering red, tin-peddler's cart came into the yard and the talkative driver began to show his wares. Probably those were the golden days of farming for the thrifty farm home was a center all its own, raising nearly all that the family used, having flocks, herds and poultry sufficient to care for many meals and plenty of company.

The tin-peddler, making his regular rounds of four or six weeks took the place of the newspaper, the radio, the telephone and the movie. When he lifted up the big red door of his cart and you peered inside you saw many, many costly things. If, he, perchance, opened the more closely guarded small door that went into the compartment under the driver's seat, you would see glass ware and maybe a few pieces of silver and other higher priced merchandise.

Usually there was quite a period of time one could look into the cart for the housewife must take time to decided as to how she could make her small income from rags, beeswax, old iron, "deacon-skins" and other means of barter, go the farthest. And if the tin peddler remained to dinner, the joy was still greater. But twice lucky was the household where the man of the road remained for his all-night stop. For after supper there would gather about the stove the entire household and news from the whole countryside would be brought by the traveler and told in a most interesting manner. And the over-Sunday stops were of even greater importance. Likewise there was the income for the housewife for she had the keep of the peddler and his horses.

But the tin peddler of the North Country has gone. In fact the generation of men who drove the rigs have come to their last stopping place. Few remain and of the very old timers probably only one is alive and that is Goodrich W. Henry of Theresa. Sixth-two years ago he started driving his first cart and was successful. He has an interesting story to tell of those early days.

Born on a farm in the town of Clayton, one of eleven children, six boys and five girls, he early got acquainted with hard work. When a mere youngster his father died and he began the hard, up-hill climb of supporting himself and others. At twelve years of age he was working out on a farm for \$8 a month and board. He continued in various occupations, until as a young man a constant coughing brought about the decision of neighbors and friends that young Henry was not long for this world, but had contracted what so many seemed to have at that time - consumption.

Dr. Spencer was consulted and advised Mr. Henry to seek outdoor employment for a year or two; maybe not too heavy work. He was advised that the place to go was right on a tin-cart where he could be in the open air day in and day out and the time to start was at once. He traded the light weight horse he owned for a heavy horse and was ready for the job. When he started in, the firm name on the carts was Goodenough, Holden and Tilden. He covered all, or parts of six counties. Considering the roads of that time, it was some job. Besides Jefferson and St. Lawrence counties. he had portions of Oneida, Oswego, Lewis and Franklin counties. For rags he paid three cents per pound. Mostly tin-ware was sold in exchange. As he got acquainted he established his over-night places and his trade increased. After a time out of Watertown there went 52 carts.

# **History of Funeral Service**

History of Funeral Service Watertown, New York 1840-Present by Donald L. Calarco Licensed since 1961

The information that follows has been collected from the watertown city directories from 1840 – present. Some information included has been observations, assumptions and speculations by the writer. Hopefully the information, photos, and even a story or two will help us understand funeral service a little better.

#### Funeral Director

A term thought to be of recent times, but it is not so, It appeared in the directories back into the mid to late 1800's. We had always thought the term undertaker or mortician was the earliest terms used.

#### Embalming

The process of embalming that we know and use today began during the Civil War. It allowed the men and boys killed in the war to be prepared for transfer back to their homes for proper burial.

During the Civil War embalmers would set up their tents for embalming—only to have other embalmers burn the tents down at night.

Thus entered General Hooker to inspect the camps. Following the General from camp to camp were prostitutes-thus the term 'hookers' were formed.

#### Licensing

The Civil War Era was the advent of 'licensing' the embalmers (1860's). At this time there was a license for embalmers and one for undertakers. For many years one would remain one or the other, but as time went on and requirements were changed the license evolved into one License as Funeral Director. This is the case today.

#### Pick Up Truck

The pick up truck was invented for the funeral director. In the age of home funerals the funeral director needed to transport all of the necessary equipment to the home for home funerals. Eventually the station wagon took the place of the pick up truck. The hearse was originally horse drawn and today motorized.

#### Rotary Phone

Around 1900-1910 the rotary phone was invented by a funeral director. This Funeral director thought the operators were forwarding his death calls to other funeral directors.



## **Book Review**

Jefferson County in the World War, compiled by George W. Reeves, published by Hungerford-Holbrook, 1920. Hard cover, 208 pp. Illustrations, diagrams and tables.

This has long been out of print, but at least here in the county, copies are available in nearly every library. Written just after the close of the war, "This book is intended as a permanent record of Jefferson County's part in the World War." Topics covered include the Jefferson County Preparedness and Efficiency League and Home Defense Council with pages of participating Jefferson County organizations, the War Chest detailing monies raised for the war effort, and descriptions of the various activities concerning the war.

The meat of the book, for family historians, is in the chapters entitled The Army and the Navy, List of Men in Service by Towns, Photographs of Men who Died in Service, Women in Service, and Men in Semi-Military service. Of the 208 pages, these sections take up some 120 pages. Over half the book consists of lists of names, addresses, and the branch each person served in. Names making up the draft board booklet found on the Jefferson County GenWebSite are repeated here in this book.

There is no comprehensive index, so that those looking up a name without knowing the person's residence at the time the book was written, or at the time the person enlisted in the service, must search through each of the twenty two towns and the City of Watertown. The names in each list are alphabetized. The photos of men killed in the war appear to be in no particular order. Eighty pictures are presented, which represent slightly more than half of that list.

The compiler makes no secret that though this is his best effort, some names undoubtedly slipped through the cracks. The goal was to give every name of every service man who served from Jefferson County in World War I. As always with a secondary source, one should check the facts as given here with some primary source. Since the war was less than a hundred years ago, it will not be as useful as something of the kind on the Spanish American War, the Civil War or older conflicts, but for those up against a brick wall with names from the first part of this century, this might prove yet another building stone.

## What's New on the Web

New on the web site since the last issue of the Informer is the beginning of a World War I page. We have copied the names from a booklet put out by the draft board of southern Jefferson County. We hope shortly to add to those names.

Our large project for this year is the publishing of the Town Clerks' Civil War lists. We have been amazed at the amount of genealogical or family history information these lists contain. Of course the amount of information varies from name to name. The golden nugget to our eyes, hidden in at least half of the entries, is the birth place and date, exact date, of the service man. Less frequent, but often enough to be important, is the mother's full name, including her maiden name, that elusive target for so many of us.

If you, like some of us, take the time to read down the entire list, you may have some surprises in store. There's the Town of Adams soldier who was last heard from "in the hands of the civil authorities of Fredericksburg, MD." Surely there's a story there!

There are the number of Jefferson County men as commissioned officers in "USC" or the United States Colored troops, since mainly white men were commissioned officers. Many of these "Colored Troops" were recruited by "Agents in the Southern States", a piece of history with which we were unfamiliar. These men rarely have any personal information given, no place of birth, no residence, very little under remarks.

Notice also the bounties paid for some men's enlistments,

anywhere from \$50 to \$1000.

Someone made a remark recently that a lot of barns or houses were built in Jefferson County at the close of the Civil War, as a result of those bounties. And yet, the bounties themselves sometimes tell a pitiful story. They appear to be larger toward the close of the war, when recruiting was harder, as the armless and legless men began to appear back home, and the grisly numbers of those who would never return became apparent. A man might receive his \$1000 bounty and be dead before the year was out. Others suffered the same fate without bounties.

In order to help our viewers search in one place, we have begun to link to the biographies on the American Local History Network. You will find those listed under What's New. Putting those names in the search engine on the front page of the site will take you directly to the biography. We have been selective in our choices, unwilling to waste your time looking at a site with no information. For those of you still waiting to see your pioneer published, and you must number in the hundreds by now, we are trying. He-who-posts insists on doing the easy things first, and he claims this linking to names is the easiest for him!

A last remark on the feverish activity on the JEFFER-L mailing list concerning Jefferson County Histories. We have most of them, in various states of disrepair, right here in the house. Nearly everything of genealogical value from Hamilton Child's volume is on the GenWebSite.

## **Computer Corner**

#### More tricks you can do with Windows

Windows holds a lot of secrets. Some of them are truly hidden away completely and some are just obscure. Few users know about them no matter which kind they are. Most of us don't spend much time learning how Windows works. It could be a lifelong pursuit if you gave it a chance, so we're all probably better off with little delights like the ones here. They can make your windows computing more interesting or easier and maybe even more fun. Here are 10 of my favorite things you can do with Windows.

1. Hold down the Shift key when the PC is booting up to keep programs from starting up with Windows. Programs in the Startup folder will be ignored when you hold down the Shift key during bootup. This is a great way of booting up more quickly, of booting up without a pesky program that is causing you trouble or of getting Windows going without some of the baggage of extra programs. Windows will love you for it. Keep in mind that this Shift key trick won't bypass programs that start up in other ways -- those that don't use the Startup folder, in other words.

2. Find out what Windows is doing when it starts up. Windows would be happy to write down every step it takes when it boots up. All you have to do is ask politely. Do that by turning on the log function hidden away in the startup menu. That startup menu is itself hidden away. Get it to show up by pressing the F8 key as soon as you see "Starting Windows ...," Reboot and try again if you're pressing the key too late -- and then choose the option that creates a boot log. The boot log is stored in the main directory of the C: drive, not in any folders. To view it, click the Start button, choose "Run," then type "c:\bootlog.txt" and press the Enter key.

3. Find out what Windows is doing when it crashes. Fed up with crashes? How often have you felt like complaining, "Why can't Windows figure out what's going wrong"? If you have Windows 98. Windows already can do just that. But you wouldn't know it from the look of things. The program that helps Windows figure things out is hidden away. It's called Dr. Watson. (Yes, it's named after the character in the Sherlock Holmes stories.) You might be familiar with the Dr. Watson program if you're an old-time Windows user, because it was an essential tool in the version of Windows that was popular in the old days, Windows 3.1. Microsoft left it out of Windows 95, but snuck it back into Windows 98 without making a point of it. That was dumb, because the current version of Dr. Watson is outstanding. It will tell you all kinds of things about what was running and what was acting up each time your PC crashes or acts up. Just click Start, then Run. Type "drwatson" and press Enter. Look at the menus and choose the kind of reporting you want. Dr. Watson will pop up whenever things go wrong. You can then look at the report to see the details.

4. Have a file you can't figure out? Here's a way to get around that pesky "Open as" window that always seems to come up when you try to view or open a strange file. "Open as" is one of the dumbest things in Windows. If Windows doesn't know how to deal with a file, it throws up its hands and tells you to figure it out. How would you know? You paid

good money for a computer, and it's supposed to be able to figure these things out. So when it can't -- when it shows you the old I-give-up "Open as" dialog box -- you have good evidence of two wonderful things. First, you know right away that the computer is dumber than sheep dip. Second, you know a quick way of dealing with that file -- you just drop it on your browser. Open your Web browser and position it so it doesn't take up the entire screen. (In other words, leave some space on one side or the other.) Find the file you want to open -- use the Find function in the Start menu if necessary -- and click on it with the left mouse button and hold the button down. Drag the file over to the browser window and let go of the button. If the browser is able to do anything with the file, it will. If it's a picture or image of any kind that browsers can figure out, it will show it. If it's a text, chances are you'll see it just fine. If the browser can't figure it out, nothing else probably will either. Remember that out of all the different files on your computer, only some of them are supposed to be viewable or openable. Most files are just made to be used by Windows or Windows programs in their own way. If you try to view them or open them you'll just waste your time.

5. Make your own launcher inside your document. You can't launch a program from inside a document, right? No. wrong. So wrong it will make you dizzy. Windows has been able to launch programs from inside documents for years, but Microsoft has been afraid to tell you about it. Maybe the company that made Windows didn't want to confuse you. Come to think of it, if Microsoft didn't want to confuse you it wouldn't have made Windows in the first place. I know it sounds loony, but it's not. You can launch programs from any modern Windows document, and that means if you always run the calculator or Excel or your browser while working on a certain document, all you need to do is embed a shortcut to the program you want to launch right in that document. I'll tell you how. First, you need to understand something. You can't do this with just any old document. It has to be what Microsoft calls an "OLE" document. No, that's not a Spanish bullfight manifesto; it stands for Object Linking and Embedding. With an OLE document in an OLE program, you can put pointers to other items inside a document. A quick digression. If you're paying close attention you should be jumping up and waving your hand. "Teacher, teacher! I know what an OLE document is! It's a Web page! It has items in it that point to other items!" But Web pages are not OLE documents. Web pages are hypertext documents.

I trace my family history so I will know who to blame. Friends come and go, but relatives tend to accumulate. Genealogists never die, they just lose their roots. Searching for lost relatives ? Win the Lottery! Can a first cousin, once removed, return ? It's hard to be humble with ancestors like mine! Genealogy: it's all relative in the end anyway. Every family tree has some sap in it. Floor (n) The place for storing your priceless records.





#### GENEALOGY OF THE TOWNS OF JEFFERSON COUNTY IN 1836

The following genealogy of the towns of Jefferson County is abstracted from Spoffards 1836 Gazetteer of the State of New York. If, for example, you have an ancestor in Alexandria in 1830, at the time of his birth Alexandria might have been Town of Brownville, or Town of LeRay. Following the name of the towns listed below are the villages, or hamlets that were part of that town in 1836. (See the INFORMER March 2001 for the genealogy of the counties.)

ADAMS--was erected from Mexico 1802. Adams Village

ALEXANDRIA - was erected from Brownville and Le Ray, 1821, Alexandria Bay, Theresa Village, Thousand Islands

ANTWERP - was erected from Le Ray, 1810 Antwerp Village, Oxbow

BROWNVILLE - was erected from Leyden, [Oneida cty] 1802 Brownville Village

CHAMPION - was erected from Mexico, 1800. Champion Village, Long Falls Village

ELLISBURGH - was erected from Mexico [Oneida cty] 1803.

HENDERSON - was erected from Ellisburgh, [Oneida cty] 1806. Naples Village [is this Henderson harbor?]

HOUNSFIELD-was erected from Watertown, 1806. Sackets Harbor.

LERAY - was erected from Brownville 1806 Le Raysville, Evans's Mills

LORRAINE - was erected from Mexico 1804.

LYME - Was erected from Brownville,1818. Cape Vincent, Chaumont, Carleton Island.

ORLEANS - was erected from Brownville, in 1821. Penent's Square, Thousand Islands Pamelia, Williamsville, Kanady's Grotto

**PAMELIA** - was erected from Brownville 1819. Williamsville, Kanady's Grove

PHILADELPHIA - was erected from Le Ray, in 1821. Friends Meeting

RODMAN - was erected from Adams, 1804, Ancient Indian Works


RUTLAND - was erected from Watertown, 1802. South Rutland, Indian Camp

WATERTOWN - was erected from Mexico, 1800. Watertown B.

In our study of the migrations we produced the above partial table depicting the birthplace of residents of a few towns in Jefferson County from the 1850 census.

Some observations: In all the towns except Cape Vincent & Alexandria the largest number of people born outside New York State were born in the New England states.

And among the New England states it was Vermont who sent the largest number across her border into Jefferson County, with the Massachusetts and Connecticut contributions not far behind.

Another expected movement was from Canada to Jefferson County, but of the European counties, it was Ireland who contributed the Antwerp most to the 1850 Theresa (Canada) (Ireland) population of hiladelphia Jefferson County. LeRag Cape Vincent is the Vilna exception to the above with its French influence outweighing Butla that of Canada or New

> And, in the Town of Hounsfield, the Irish nearly outweighed all of the immigrants from all the New England states.

### MIGRATIONS

According to the *History of Berrien County, Michigan*, in 1844 eighteen families came there from the **Town of Clayton**, Jefferson **County, NY** including Bishops, Spinks, the Harris families, the Boyers, Vincents, Spencers, and others.

Asa Bishop and his three married sons: A. Sprague Bishop, Appleton Bishop, and Norris Bishop brought their families, purchased land, and settled on farms adjoining each other in **Bainbridge, Michigan.** Asa Bishop was originally from **New Hampshire.** His wife was Polly Sprague Bishop. His son Anthony was born in Henderson, NY, in 1812. The family of eleven children moved to Clayton, NY and from **Clayton** to **Bainbridge** in 1846.

In April, 1844, Joseph and Albert Vincent with their families and a younger brother, Henry Vincent, landed in **Bainbridge** with a pair of horses, a lumber-wagon, and their household effects. They had come from **Clayton**, **NY** for the purpose of locating in **Michigan**, but undecided as to any particular point until they reached the **State of Michigan**. At that time there was no traveled road in the vicinity of his farm and in 1849 narrow paths through the woods were the best thoroughfares available.

Other settlers were Horace and John Vincent. Also Orsemus and John Spink visited the area. John purchased land and Orsemus returned to New York State to sell property there. He later returned with his family and settled in Bainbridge, Berrien County, with his brothers.

Other persons who originated in **Jefferson County, NY** were John K. Bishop and his sisters, Mrs. Orsemus Spink and Mrs. John Lewis. Sarah Romelia Bishop and her parents, Jabez and Olive Knapp also migrated.

### ANOTHER MIGRATING FAMILY

Concerning Curtis Dixon, Revolutionary War Vet, his wife Lydia, and their children:

Curtis was born 1752 in Rhode Island, moved to

**Massachusetts** where he married Lydia Wight, b 1754 in **Connecticut**. Daughter *Nancy* had already married Joseph Olney. They are next in the Town of Palatine in the Mohawk Valley of !

York State in 1803 where *Robert* married Sany Hooper.

The next lap of their journey found them in the Town of Denmark, Lewis County, from 1804-1820 where *Jeremiah* married Eliza Sylvester and *Susan* married William Bordeau. *Esther* married Elihu Hyde and moved to Ohio in 1817.

In 1820 Curtis and Lydia were in Jefferson County. Jeremiah left for St. Lawrence County. Susan remarried Daniel Hayes and Sally married Samuel Percy, and both settled in the Town of Clayton, while Polly married George Mitchell from New Jersey and followed her husband to Michigan in 1829.

The dispersal from Jefferson County commenced in earnest with the grandchildren of Curtis and Lydia. Grandson Hannibal died in Jefferson County soon after his marriage to Lois Greenleaf Cummings. Huffman married Harriet Johnson and went to Sharon, Wisconsin. Richard Harrison married Adeline Oliver and wer Indiana, later to Michigan. Robert B. Jr. married Nancy Smith and only went as far as Wolfe Island, Ontario. Curtis and his wife, Elizabeth Estes settled in Michigan.

Sylvester married Dimmis Greenleaf, and in their old age they went to **Wisconsin** to live with their son. Theodotia married James Wright and lived in **St. Lawrence Co**. Mary Leonard Dixon married Henry Sloat, and ended up in **Michigan**. Ambrose married Ann Parch, and they too migrated to **Michigan**.

Of the Olneys, John went to Michigan, the others stayed in St. Lawrence Co.

#### DIARY OF A PIONEER FROM SCOTLAND to AMERICA

#### (from Volume 4 "Ernest Cook" available through the Lyme Heritage Center)

Ernest Cook, that prolific writer and preserver of early stories, came into possession of a diary written by William Smith who emigrated in 1830 at the age of 68 years from <u>Scotland</u> to <u>Hammond</u>.

"Dec. 10, 1829.--Received a letter from William [son] of date Aug. 30, inviting all the family over and stating he has 150 ackers of land, 6 miles from Grenvill [Canada] village and also 2 ackers in the village with some houses therein, which he promises to compliment me with upon my arrival there.

"Jan. 18, 1830--All the family in the place assembled in my house at which a consultation about going to America, as invited by William in his letter of Sept. 30, 1829.

"The concultation ended in the affirmative. I propose to sell all my property and to offer what sum any of the family could not raise. To which proposal they all consented and to claim only the lowest sum that could do.

"Accordingly, upon my 68 birthday, the house and shop furniture sold and I left my long and comfortable home to sink unseen, and unheeded among strangers in a foreign land. All this is a sacrifice in hopes of being a benefit to my progeny after I am numbered with the dead.

"I left <u>Methvan</u> with one hundred twentythree pounds, two shillings and 6 pence in my pocket and proceeded to <u>Dundee</u> and went on board the *Sprightly* which sailed 4th of April.

"The passengers were all cooped up in a low room 22 feet square. Some suffered much from seasickness. Mary [his wife] and Margaret [daughter] were more than a month in bed.

"The passage was bad and long, 11 weeks and a day before we reached Quebec. Our provisions were very short. We felt no want but spent much money. We arrived at <u>Quebec</u> 6th of June all in good health and in good spirits.

"The ship, by mismanagement of the owners was detained, 10 days at Quebec, which was another heavy charge upon my purse. We landed at <u>Montreal</u> upon the 21 of June in a cold rainy evening. William, willing to participate in the pleasure of the interview, mounted the ship's side with a swing and took his mother in his arms.

"We landed in Montreal 21 of June and prepared to follow William as our guide to his home for which we now stood in need from the use of the French language. He is our interpreter and agent.

"Upon the 24 we proceeded to <u>Lachine</u> and arrived at <u>Carrilla</u> upon the 25 in the evening. We there hired 7 Canadian carts at 7 shillings and proceeded in the cart over a bad road.

"We arrived at <u>Grenvil</u> in the morning of the 28th and compared the place with the picture we had formed our minds of the town and village. In the place of the soil improved, it degenerated into a naked rock, covered with large stones. It was only a collection of miserable hovels, studded all around with the ruins of deserted shanties.

"The Canadian carts were very sharp for their hire and the amount was settled in currency which required much calculation. The family set out on the 2d of May to <u>Corilla</u>, to the <u>Cassads</u>, then to <u>Cotadalack</u>. Upon the 4th to <u>Cornwall</u>, 42 miles in wagons. We went then in a <u>steamboat</u>. She stopped all night in <u>Lancaster</u> where I left my watch under the pillow in Mr. McPherson's tavern.

"Upon the 5th set out for <u>Prescott</u>, 52 miles in two wagons. Then crossed the river, 3 miles, to <u>Ogdensburgh</u>. Put up our lugag in Mr. Parish store and our cash was gone. D. More started on foot to Hammond upon the 8th and returned on the 10th with money and 2 wagons which took us to <u>Hammond</u> upon the 12th where we were complimented and kindly welcomed by our friends.

"We felt the journey very disagreeable. Bad roads and much jolting and sleeping upon floors. Thus our object in leaving Scotland is so far obtained that the families are now propriters of a portion of the soil, but there is much to do before much ease or comfort can be enjoyed. Animal labor and seed to provide, houses have to be built and sterling is a heavy sum in a country where cash is scarce, besides, maintaining the families, and furnishing the instruments.

"Yet if these difficulties are overcome they will be more independent than living by the wages of labor as they did in Scotland."

## **JEFFERSON COUNTY IN 1836**

This map is a sketch of the original, which is shown on the front cover of this newletter. It is an attempt to make the old map easier to read. The original was taken from the Jefferson County article in an 1836 Gazetteer of New York State. It shows the Jefferson County that many of our early settlers found.

Some of the older names are italics. Carthage was first Long Falls. The High Falls of the Indian River, now Theresa, is marked "Falls 8 ft." Godse Bay in the St. Lawrence, a few miles below Alexandria Bay, has an undecipherable name that looks like "Gunddle Bay."

Notice that the village of Theresa, as well as the Towns of Cape Vincent and Worth had not yet been formed. The Town of Orleans retains the outlines of Penet Square. Later boundaries gave Orleans a corridor to the St. Lawrence River.

Perhaps you can make out the location of the Navy Yard at "Sackett's Har." Ships were built here to wage the War of 1812 on the Great Lakes. The largest war ship of its day was created at the navy Yard at Sackets Harbor.

Spelling, too, had not reached modern regimentation. Brownsville, Houndsfield, Lorrain, Plesis, and Le Fargeville have all been changed. A curious note is the existence of Cornelia and Clayton, both hamlets on the St. Lawrence River. Histories inform us that Cornelia was the original name of the village of Clayton, but here are the two side by side. UPPER CANADA

Grand Island on the Canadian side of the border is now Wolfe Island. and Upper Canada is now the Province of Ontario. The border itself cuts through Grindstone Island in the Town of Clayton, providing an explanation of the many Grindstone Islanders who were born in Canada. They never left the Island.

One turnpike enters the county in the Town of Ellisburg, and angles its way north east to the central part of the county.

Watertown is still a village, dwarfed by some of the mill towns on the Black River near it. Watertown and Brownville, (Brownsville here) were in a rivalry for the county seat.

In guestion is the name of a hamlet close to the southern border of the county in the Town of Ellisburg. Is it Alansville, or Mansville?





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

## The Resource Committee

#### by Bonnie Borrello

The Historical Association of South Jefferson is a wonderful repository of genealogical and historical materials concentrating mainly on the towns of Adams, Ellisburg, Henderson, Lorraine, Rodman, and Worth but also covering the whole of Jefferson County. Members of the Resource Committee visited this gem several months ago and recorded most of the holdings. Another visit is needed but I decided not to wait any longer before sharing what materials we did find. This information is available in our notebook which is made accessible at Flower Memorial Library and brought to monthly meetings of the society.

A sampling of their findings are:

Database & Microfilm- Jefferson County Journal, a newspaper that has a long history and at one time was the principal newspaper for the county. Dates are from 1864-1994. For those who like to use the computer they have the following CD's: Ancestry Reference Library, Family Quest Census 1800-1920 Jefferson Co. (1800, Oneida Co.), US Census Bundle, 1607-1880 and World Family Tree.

Newspaper Files- besides the Jefferson County Journal they have the Jefferson County News, 1855-59, 1865, 1869, the Northern Temperance Journal, 18691870 and The Visitor, 1866-69.

**Books**- in addition to the basic Jefferson County history books they have the Jefferson Co. Directory & Gazetteer for 1866-67, William Pierrepont's Journals and histories of the counties of Lewis, Oswego, St. Lawrence & Franklin. Other books deal with schools and our county's service in the wars. There are a number of bound genealogies.

Files- there are many family and military files. Scrapbooks- we counted 88 scrapbooks that are indexed in a notebook and on the computer. Notebooks- include many cemeteries in the six towns; Absent Sons and Daughters, Heads of Families, VT; Civil War Veterans, 1890 census; Civil War Veterans, Sixtown; Ellisburg vital records, pictures and clippings; Lorraine vital records; Revolutionary War Veterans: marriages, deaths (Jeff. Co.); and War of 1812 Veterans.

The Historical Association of South Jefferson is an old house museum with several buildings located at 9 East Church St., Adams, NY 13606. Debbie Quick will help you with your search. It is necessary for you to call or write ahead if going to this facility or any other since their hours and staff vary.

## **Book Review**

#### By Nan Dixon

Roster of Jefferson County's Absent Sons and Daughters from the Watertown Daily Times, 122 pages. Published by Lyme Heritage Center, and still available at \$10.00 plus \$3.00 shipping and handling.

The May 2001 Informer, on page 20, listed this little book with the rest of Lyme Heritage's offerings. No index is needed, since the entire content of some 4000 names is presented in alphabetical order. This

wonderful listing of Jefferson County people who had moved out of the county was found in a packet of old newspapers donated to the Lyme Heritage Center.

Subtitled "The Times' Directory of Natives and Former Residents", it represents a year's collection of data in response to a call for names, prompted by the then approaching centennial of the county. The preface

goes on to say that every arriving mail brings proof that this list is not complete. "The call for these names is still being responded to in every state and territory, and even beyond the nation's borders.

Necessity compels the closing of these pages now, but a supplemental list will be published at a later date." This reviewer has never seen the supplemental list, if it was indeed published.

The form is simple. Five columns appear on each page, labeled "Last name;" "First name;" "Moved from;" "Moved to;" and "Comments." Sample entries are: "Judd, Mrs. Agnes Boyd; Watertown (State Street); 2048 Hurnum Ave., Honolulu, Hawaii. Many years resident Honolulu where she has raised a large family of sons and daughters." Another is "Miner, Capt. George; Ellisburg; Mason, Mich.; Captain of one of the

largest passenger steamers between Buffalo & Duluth."

The accuracy level should be high on most entries, since many appear to have been submitted by the persons in question. Some were undoubtedly sent in by proud parents of relatives still living in the county. The

main value of the work is that the information is contemporary; not supplied years later. Naturally, you will find no horse thieves in a work of this sort, and the people will be presented in the most

attractive light. On the other hand, names which may have dropped out of sight from the records of the county might turn up here, such as Oren Pomeroy who went to New Mexico "for health." A move to a dryer climate was about the only relief a doctor could give a consumptive, one suffering from TB.

Bits of history linger in the comments: Head of Tom Sweeney Hardware; one of the early stage drivers of the far west; or Artist in Paris, France. Not all stayed away. Dant and Katie (Augsbury) Dixon, who were living in Piercefield NY where Dant worked in a paper mill with his brothers and brother-in-law, for instance, returned to the Augsbury farm in the Town of Pamelia where they spent the remainder of their long lives.

It's concise, useful and interesting. We can't ask for much more of a genealogical tool.

## Nhat's New on the Web

This issue, we'll explore another type of website which may be helpful to genealogy. Besides the USGenWeb, of which our Jefferson County GenWebSite is a part, the American Local History Network has sprung up, http://www.usgennet.org/usa/ny/county/jefferson/ county.html. Like the GenWeb, the ALHN is a network of local websites covering most of the United States. The New York State Coordinator is an enthusiastic promoter of ALHN, Debbie Axtman.

ALHN differs in that its basic unit is the township, rather than the county. The coordinator of the Jefferson County ALHN is Mark Wentling, also a member of this society. He has a Jefferson County site, but his aim here is to make it a central location for links to the various existing Jefferson County sites. Unlike the GenWebSite, not all towns are yet represented here, but those which are represented may be covered more in depth. Each town is the work of its coordinator, and the coordinators are given a loose rein as to what they wish to include, and the way the information is presented.

The newest town to be adopted is the Town of Alexandria. Based on the premise that the American Local History Network emphasizes local history, rather than genealogy or family history, the Town of Alexandria site develops topics such as business, churches, communities, history, & organizations like the Masonic fraternity, schools, sports, and the like." The Folks Who Lived Here" are represented at this time mainly by links back to the Jefferson County GenWebSite. The names of the folks in Bartlett's Cemetery Inscriptions are included, tongue in cheek, as also representative of

the folks who lived here. The aim of this information is to give you some background on the way your family lived, what they did, what the communities looked like, and what was there in the township.

It is next to impossible to separate family history from social history, economic history, political history, and the other histories, so there is no clear cut division here. People searching in vain for family names in the orthodox places, such as census, or church records, or civil records, have found proof of their existence in "The Gossip Page," taken from the gossip columns of contemporary newspapers around the turn of the last century or earlier.

In order to set this site apart from the Jeff Co Web site, emphasis is placed on photographs (be patient; we're still trying to get the hang of this aspect) and social history. What was important to the farmers who made up the majority of the residents? What were the schools like? We're trying to play down the rich and famous who enlarged the summer population of the township from early on, but they were important, and can't be ignored completely.

Each community in the township, from the three dominant centers, Alexandria Bay, Plessis and Redwood, down to the neighborhoods such as Browns Corners and Barnes Settlement will get their place in the sun, given enough resources. As with the Jefferson County site, we depend heavily on volunteers, and Holice Young, out in Oregon, gets a special crown for typing tirelessly so that we can spend time on this end organizing and uploading. ## **Computer Corner**

#### 10 more secrets for Windows users

Every time I write about my favorite tips and tricks for Windows I get letters asking for more. I've even heard from teachers who are using my articles in their computer classes. So here are 10 additional ways to make life with Windows easier and more productive.

1. If you have a "wheel mouse," skip the rolling scrolling stuff and turn the wheel into a useful button. I have mine set up to perform a left double click when I do a single click on the wheel button. I'm not young any more, and double-clicking isn't as easy as it used to be. So clicking that middle button for a left double click is a big plus to me. (Your mouse software should let you change the behavior of the wheel. If it doesn't, get a Microsoft Intellimouse. It has the right software options in addition to being a great mouse.)

2. Give the keyboard a boost. Open the Control Panel (under "Settings" in the Start Menu) and double click on the Keyboard icon. Slide the "Repeat Delay" and "Repeat Rate" controls all the way to the right. This will make the keyboard much faster, and it even speeds up scrolling with the mouse.

3. Click your right mouse button on a file whenever you're not sure what to do with it. You'll see a list of choices. This can save you a lot of fiddling.

4. Switch your folders to "Details" view so you can quickly sort the listing. Choose "Details" from the "View" menu at the top of any Windows folder. (Folders are windows that show you what's in your computer. Double clicking on "My Computer" opens a folder, for example.) Sort the list in a "Details" view by clicking on the heading for that part of the list. Clicking "Modified" sorts the contents by the modification date (latest or oldest first), for example. And clicking again on the same heading reverses the sort.

5. Save your wrist, Part 1. You can do a lot of things easier from the keyboard than by dragging your mouse. Here are three: To put something in the Recycle Bin, select it and press the Delete key; to close a program, press Alt-F4; and to select everything (in a program such as a word processor or in a folder window), press Ctrl-A.

6. Save your wrist, Part 2. Pesky messages that come up on your screen usually can be closed with a single whack of the Esc key. Don't bother clicking your mouse.

7. Reboot early and often. Windows runs out of its disappointingly small "system" memory pool (called resource memory) all too readily, leading to lockups and crashes. Adding memory chips doesn't help. Rebooting is the only way to get that memory back.

8. Enjoy a real-estate boom. Get more windows to fit on your screen. If you have a 17-inch (or larger) PC monitor, drop the two drecky screen resolutions and switch to 1024 by 768. (The two yucky ones are 640 by 480 and 800 by 600.) Right click on the desktop and click "Properties," then "Settings." Slide the control over to 1024 by 768. If you have a really big monitor, see if you can choose an even higher setting for resolution. One of my 21-inch monitors is set for 1200 by 1024 and the other is set for 1600 by 1200. I wouldn't switch back to a lower resolution if you paid me.

9. Toss your cookies. We could argue forever over which rock 'n' roll band is the greatest of all time and which kind of coffee is the best, but nobody could argue about the best way to control Web cookies in Windows. The winner by far is Cookie Pal. Don't leave your home page without it. Get it from http://www.kburra. com/.

10. Down with the load. Make life easier when you download files by making a folder where you can find them. Double click on "My Computer" and then double click on the C: drive. Right click inside the C: drive window and create a new folder with the name "Downloads." The next time you are about to download a file, RIGHT CLICK on the link and tell Windows to put the file in the "Downloads" folder. All subsequent downloads will go there automatically.

For your information, Windows 2000 operating system is nearly crash-proof. You don't have to put up with the frailties of Windows 95, Windows 98, or Windows Me. You'd be crazy not to switch if you're tired of lockups, crashes and memory problems.

It's even better than Microsoft's workhorse server operating system, Windows NT, which Windows 2000 replaces in every way. The advantages are easy to understand:

Stability: Even if a program your PC is running crashes or locks up, Windows 2000 keeps running. Other programs won't be affected. You're much less likely to lose important work.

Intelligence: Unlike the other Windows programs, Windows 2000 Cannot run out of memory, called resources. This means you'd be able to run as many programs as you like without crashes or lockups

Security: Interlopers can be locked out of Windows 2000 very easily.

Familiarity: Windows 2000 looks like Windows 95, 98, and Me. If you are familiar with those versions, you should have no trouble switching.

Integrity: Windows 2000 will not let any program you are installing wreck the files that Windows itself needs.

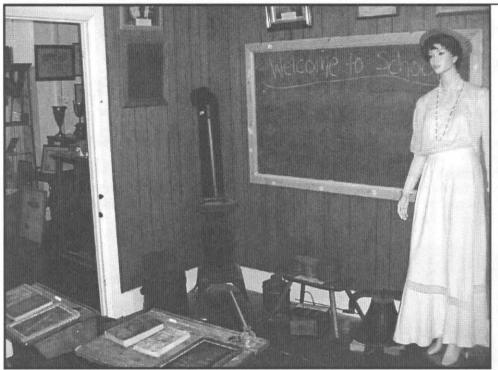
New Business-

David Kendall, from Clayton spoke about and quoted from the 1865 diary of a twenty-two year old Clayton lady.

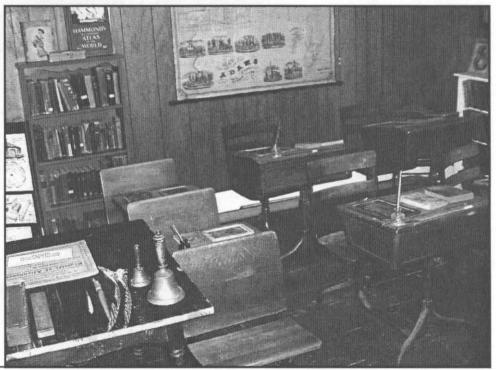

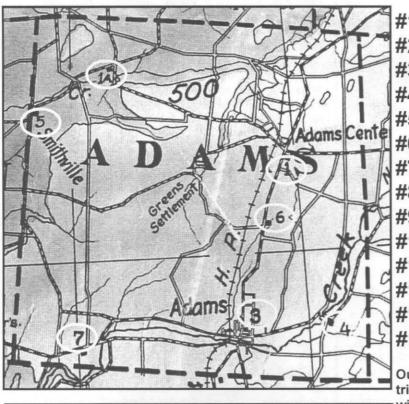
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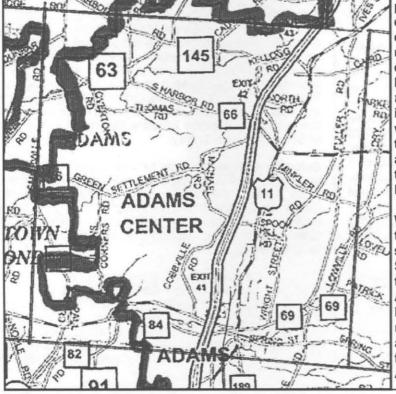

# Town of Adams Early School Districts

Our search for the location of the early district schools becomes quite complicated with the information available to us at this point. The map above is from an undated early schools map that Informer committee chairman Bill Dixon has made available to us. It shows only numbers up to 7 and we can't find number 2 but can see 1A. Also the list of 14 districts from Debbie Quick's History of the Town of Adams has just enough information on some district schools that would not match the numbers on Bill's map that we've only circled the numbers available and mention only that they may not be the same number as referred to in Debbie's list.

We include a map that has been marked for the boundaries of the present South Jefferson School District. We notice that the Sackets Harbor School District takes a portion of the Northwest corner of the Town of Adams and the Belleville-Henderson School District takes a portion of the Southwest corner. The South Jefferson School District also takes a portion of the Town of Hounsfield on the Northern border of the Town of Adams.

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Adams Center District School #1

The first schoolhouse was built in 1823 and a stone schoolhouse built in 1829. The next schoolhouse shown above was built in 1876.

# Adams Center District School #1

The first school house was a small plank building erected at the fork in the road in 1823 by Luman and Hiram Arms, R. Warriner and Major Earl. This was used until 1829 when a stone building was erected. The stone school was used until 1857 when a new building was built. This school building was used until 1876 and another building was built. On January 6th, 1876 a union graded school was formed with the board of education consisting of J. Q. Arms, Correl D. Potter. J. C. Heath, Ephraim C. Crosby, A. J. Greene, John A. D. Snell, L. Williams, Asa M. Greene, J. J. Witter and Walter Fuller. The building was remodeled in 1891 with new seats installed, a new ceiling, walls painted, etc. A two story school was built in 1897 for a two year high school course. The regents was first given at the school in March 1897 and the school was registered as the Adams Center Union Free School. The first graduating class of the two year course was in June 1899. In August 1899 the Union Free School contracted to teach the older children in the Honevville and Green Settlement districts. The trustees in 1906 were: Henry Glass, A. M. Sanford, Lewis G. Banister. and Walter G. Bunce. In October 1907 the school was advanced from a middle grade to a senior school. Schools of a senior grade had to maintain an approved three year course of study in their academic departments and approved instruction in pre-academic grades. They were also qualified to receive nonresident academic students at state expense.

The graduates in 1911 were: Mary H. Reed, Wesley W. Trowbridge, Agnes Snell, George Worden, I. Mabelle Onderdonk, Ernest Williams and Mary L. Greene.

The graduates in 1912 were: Will Corey, Virgil Langworthy, Horace Lord, Russell C. Langworthy, Bessie Parker, Eva Witter, Bessie Wilbur, Pauline Haynes, and Mary Parham.

In the spring of 1914 the teachers were: Grace Cagwin, primary; Talcott Parker, 4th, 5th & 6th grades; Mrs. Will Cagwin, 7th & 8th; and E. W. Coons was the principal and Alice Pugh, assistant principal. The school continued to accept the students from Honeyville and Greene Settlement, plus the Maxson District. Grace Cagwin had a class of over 50 pupils. In August 1914 the district hired another teacher and divided the grades (1st & 2nd, 3rd & 4th). They also advanced to a four year high school course and became the Adams Center High School. The courses were: Science, Mathematics, Latin, English, French, History and Civics.

The first commencement of the Adams Center High School was held at Heath's Opera House on June 22, 1915. The graduates were: Leonard Guzewich, Halsey Oatman, Helen Van Waldick, Donald Glass, Earl Ryder, Olga Oatman, Thelma Gardiner, Dorothy D. Parker, Alma Greene, Jennie McIntosh, Lyle Cady, Ralph Greene, and Nellie Smith.

The teachers for the 1921-22 school year were: 1st, 2nd, 3rd grades - Grace Cagwin; 4th, 5th, 6th grades -Alma Crosby; 7th & 8th grades - Florence Harrington; High School - Roswell Peters, Eleanor Hammond and Hazel Davis. The Adams Center High School Alumni Association was organized in June 1922.

Several noted people graduated from the Adams Center District School - Melville Dewey who developed the Dewey Decimal System for Libraries, Dr. Austin Kent Hale, Dr. Eri P. Rice (later of Chicago), and Rev. Arthur Maine - later Dean of the Theological School of Alfred University. Three Hale brothers - Albert & George became respected teachers and William became a lawyer in Rochester. Rev. E. L. Tomlinson, preacher and author, moved to New Jersey. Manford Jenkins and Henry P. Mott became noted teachers in New York City. William Maxson moved to Yonkers and was the originator of self-keyed number work system and Holly Maxson became Supervising Principal of Schools in New Jersey.

Select Schools were taught between summer and winter terms. The first select school was taught in the upper floor of the Dewey Block by Keziah Greene. Cinderella Greene Bates also taught here. Both were daughter of Charles Greene, one of the first settlers in Greene Settlement. During Civil War era, Ellen Lee taught a select school.

### Central Rural School District #1 (Adams Center Central School)

The organization of the Central Rural School at Adams Center began in the fall of 1925 when the state informed the district that unless better facilities were provided New York State would no longer permit high (Continued on Page 7)

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school diplomas. At that time the grammar school and high school were both held in the district schoolhouse. In response Central Rural School District No. 1 of the Towns of Adams and Rodman was officially formed on December 22, 1925. The district was formed by the consolidation of Union Free School District #1 at Adams Center and common school districts #3 (North Hill), #6 (Maxson), (Kellogg Adams), #4 #7 (Honeyville), #8 (Ball), #9 (Lyons Corners) & #10 (Green Settlement) in the town of Adams and districts #1 (Toad Hollow) & #6 (Dillin) in the town of Rodman. The first Board of Education consisted of A. E. Babcock, Dr. Wesley Trowbridge, Nelson W. Smith, Arthur E. Greene and Harry D. Maxson.

In the 1926-27 school year the district didn't run any outside school except in the Dillin District. School opened August 30, 1926 with 1st, 2nd, 7th, 8th, and High School meeting in the old school building and 3rd-6th met at the Edward's house on Maple Avenue. The teachers were: 1st & 2nd - Grace Cagwin, 3rd & 4th - Edith Webber, 5th & 6th - Alma Crosby, 7th & 8th - Vanetta Endsley, High School - L. F. Allen, W. G. Stinson, Adaline Bowers, Ollie Gowey. Four buses were purchased to bring the children from the outside districts. Each bus could carry 25 people. The bus drivers were Mark L. Parker, A. R. Heath, E. C. Reed, and Ross Catlin. The 1927 graduating class consisted of: Ruth Carley, Gladys Wyman, Marian Davis, Ella Bezner, Llovd Hunt, Wilson Davis, Blanche Davis, Gerald Ryder, Kenneth Bird, and Frank Mantle.

In the winter of 1926 a building site was selected on Maple Avenue and included lots purchased from the Edwards, Boynton and Blount properties for \$8,000. Water was provided by a well. The architectural plans of O. D. Green, Jr. were accepted and the contractor was A. M. Sanford. Construction began in August 1926. The school cost \$120,000. The building was located 200 feet from the street. The front of the building was 116 feet wide and the extreme depth was 116 feet. The Gymnasium wing was one story and the main building was two stories high with a 10 foot high basement. The building was constructed of red tapestry brick, backed by hollow scored tile. The window frames and sash were white pine, painted dark brown. Directly over the front entrance was a litholite stone entablature in which was cut 'High School' and at the front entrance was a doorway of litholite stone. At either end of the main corridor were double exit doors and stairways. The auditorium had a seating capacity of 650 and a stage 28'x20'.

The school building was dedicated on November 29, 1927. The District Superintendent was W. J. Linnell. L. F. Allen was the principal and Nelson W. Smith was the president of the Board of Education. In the early years of the school, when buses couldn't get through the snow, arrangements were made to bring the students in on horse drawn sleighs.

The first graduating class (1928) to attend the new district school building consisted of: Helen Reed, Florence Aldrich, Floyd Aldrich, Dorothy Dillin, Dorothy Galloway, John Kellogg, Annis Kellogg, Marion Charnick, and Hazel Caird.

In 1931 O. D. Greene, Jr. built an addition on to the school building to house the agricultural department. The addition was brick, 26'x62' and cost \$3,961. In September 1937 two more districts centralized with Adams Center - Sand Street, between Adams Center and Adams, and the Rodman village district.

By 1938 the district had outgrown the school building which was made to house 300 students. In 1938 the Centralized District contained 17 school districts and received students from eight more on contract. The current number of students was 500. They had to build a two story brick and concrete addition that added nine more classrooms at a cost of \$120,000. Elementary schools were also maintained at Rodman village, Rices district and Dunn district, but the older children attended Adams Center. The addition was completed in February 1940. In October 1940 the district purchased five - half acre building lots from Albert R. Heath for \$450 for use as a playground.

An unsuccessful attempt was made in 1953 to consolidate Adams and Adams Center schools. Adams Center voters turned down the consolidation and instead they voted to build an addition onto the existing building. The addition would house two kindergartens and ten elementary classrooms in a wing divided from the existing building by a new 60'x70' gymnasium and shops so that the facilities for the younger children were separate from the upper grades. The addition was completed in the fall of 1956 and cost \$470,000.

Adams High School again attempted to consolidate with Adams Center in 1958 and 1960, and again the Adams Center voters turned it down. In 1962 the issue was again raised and with the Adams Center school again overcrowded the Adams High School was annexed to the Adams Center Central School on July 1, 1962 and became the Adams Center-Adams Central School.

The water supply of the Adams Center building (from a 20' well) began to dwindle in 1962. Recent changes made in the Rodman highway were believed to be the cause of the well going dry. The Adams Fire Department had to truck in two tank loads of water everyday until the water lines from Adams to Adams Center were completed in 1968.

Maynard P. Wilson (1905-1966) was principal of the Adams Center School from 1949 until his death in 1966. On June 16, 1968 the Adams Center building was dedicated as the Maynard P. Wilson building. (Continued on Page 8)

On June 30, 1968 the Mannsville-Manor Central School merged with Adams Center-Adams Central School and on July 1, 1968 the schools became the South Jefferson Central School District.

Following a five day blizzard in January 1977 that dropped five feet of snow and left drifts as high as 20 feet, the roof over a hallway at the Wilson building caved in. School was delayed while repairs were made, snow was removed from the roof and the building inspected.

On January 25, 1987 a natural gas leak caused an explosion at the Wilson Elementary Building that blew apart the south wing of the school and damaged several homes. Seventeen classrooms were lost, with seven completely destroyed. The school reopened with some classes held in North Junior High in Watertown. In August 1987 the Wilson Building was torn down and in September 1987 twenty temporary classrooms were set up. Nearly three years after the explosion a lawsuit was finally settled with Niagara Mohawk and on June 25, 1990 the ground was broken for a new building. The new Wilson Building was dedicated on January 25, 1992.



Adams Center District School #1 after it was remodeled in 1897.

The district schoolhouse was remodeled in 1897 to make more room and the school became the Adams Center Union High School. The district centralized with 9 other schools (North Adams #3, Kellogg Hill #4, Maxson #6, Honeyville #7, Ball #8, Lyons Corners #9 and Green Settlement #10 in the town of Adams and Toad Hollow #1 & Dillin #6 in the Town of Rodman) and became the Central Rural School District #1 of the Towns of Adams and Rodman. The new Central School Building opened in September 1927 and use of this building as a school was discontinued.

# Thompson District #2

The Thompson District School #2 centralized with Adams Center about 1925.

# The North Adams District School #3

Nothing has been found on the early records of the school. A new schoolhouse was built on the site of the former Congregational Church in the fall of 1885. Some teachers have been: Janie Shaw (1913-1914), Bessie Parker (1915), Mrs. Roy Green (1916), Hazel Langworthy (1917), Irma Wheeler (1920), Mrs. Hugh Bemis (1921).

Some of the trustees were: Carlton Parker (1914), Will Owens (1916). No district school was held in 1922. All the children were taken to Adams Center.

# Kellogg District #4



Kellogg Hill School District #4 Centralized with Adams Center in 1925.

# Smithville District #5

Smithville sits on the town line between Adams and Henderson. The school building itself was in the Town of Adams. The present day school district boundaries put Smithville not in either South Jefferson Central or Belleville-Henderson Central but Sackets Harbor Central School. We will attempt to include the Smithville District School #5 in our future issue on the Town of Henderson early schools.

# Maxson District #6

The Maxson (S. Harbor Rd.) old schoolhouse was torn down in September 1893 and a new one was built. The older children in the district began attending Adams Center High School in 1913. They centralized with Adams Center in 1925.

The early history of the school is unknown. Commencing in 1929 the older students of the district where sent to Adams Center. They were 'bused' there by Fred Wright. Two of the later teachers of the district were: Hazel Langworthy (1919), Nellie Smith (1920).

# School District #8 (Ball District)

The school was located on Wright Street. Old school district records show that the schoolhouse was built before 1866 when it was moved across the road on land purchased from Leroy Bunce for \$53. The schoolhouse was maintained at least through 1929. In 1902 the district started sending the pupils to the Adams Center School. From 1912 to 1915 the children were again educated in the district. From 1916 on they attended the Adams Center School and the district paid \$400 for transportation for the year. Other interesting items in the old district clerks book include: in 1866 the district provided 9 cords of wood at \$1.50/ cord. In 1868 they spent 92 cents on repairs to the schoolhouse. The total school tax for 1881 was \$196.09

Trustees of the district from 1864 to 1924 were: L. R. Green (1864), G. W. Gardner (1866), E. G. Stewart (1867), E. S. Thompson (1868), DeWitt Strickland (1869), Lyman Saunders (1870), M. Saunders (1871), Wm. Empey (1872), Preston Nichols (1873, 1890-91), M. S. Babcock (1874, 1876, 1879-80), Eric Harrington (1875), C. C. Stewart (1877-78), LaMont Babcock (1881), Leonard Oatman (1882), Charles Babcock (1883), Levi Crandall (1884), Merrick Rudd (1885, 1921), George Gardner (1886, 1889), Mr. Whitford (1892), Elano Harrington (1893), Gaius Oatman (1894, 1904), A. D. Boomer (1895-97, 1905-08), Ernest Stewart (1898), G. Clark (1899), Mrs. Elano Harrington (1900), Ella Boomer (1901), F. A. Ball (1902), Eugenia Clark (1903), Mrs. Gaius Oatman (1909-10), Mrs. Stevens (1912), Pearl E. Ryder (1913-15), Reilly Harrington (1916), Joseph Whitley (1917), E. A. Remington (1918-19), E. Harris (1920), Mrs. Ross Catlin (1922), Ross Catlin (1923-24).

The teacher in 1880 was Emma Brown.

# Lyons Corners District School #9

In October 1895 there were 71 inhabitants representing 23 families in the district. Of these 23 families only two children were of school age, both boys, and only one attended school, Arthur Thomas, 11 yrs. Still the district maintained a good school with Annie Carley as teacher. Again in 1907 they considered contracting with an adjoining district but decided to keep the school open with Edna Bliss as teacher.

The students in May 1911 were: Edna, Laura, Arthur and Florence Thomas; Harold, Taddy and Polly Farr; Ruth Clark; Edna Trowbridge and Nellie Smith.

In 1915 E. A. Farr was the trustee, Ernest Stevens was clerk, George Shear was collector, and Ruby Nichols was the teacher. Hazel Langworthy was the teacher in 1923.

# Green Settlement District #10



Green Settlement District School #10

Contracted with Adams Center to take older children in 1899. Centralized with Adams Center in 1925.

The school district was organized on April 1, 1822 and was located at the corners on the east side of the road. The first clerk was Isaac Sheldon 1822-24, followed by Roswell Saunders Jr. 1825-1840. The first trustees were Paul Green, Nicholas Williams and William Green.

In 1822 a tax was levied to raise \$44.08 to buy a house, \$30 to pay for moving and repairing said house, \$25 to purchase a stove and pay for other repairs, and \$4 for wood. On March 16, 1840 they hired Keziah Green as teacher. She was paid \$1 per week and boarded herself. They also raised \$3 to pay for seven panes of glass, repair broken plaster in the room and get a new latch for the door. The teacher in 1896 was W. P. Jones.

School was closed in February 1922 due to an outbreak of scarlet fever in the district. Four families were quarantined when Mildred Lee, Kent & Ross Stoodley, Ken & Florence Marquette and Bessie Hockey became ill. The children all recovered.

The last teacher of the district before the students began attending Adams Center was Hazel Langworthy.

# Sand Street District #11

Also called Michael's Corners District, the school contracted with Adams Center in 1926 to take the older children and centralized with Adams Center in 1937. The schoolhouse was sold to John Owens for \$350 in August 1938.

# Thomas Settlement District #12

The early history of the school is unknown. Articles

from the journal give us the following information on the district:

Expenses in 1904 were: teachers wages - \$224; maps - \$12.75; stoves - \$15; repairs - \$12.95.

Students in 1909 were: Lewis, Carl & Floyd Noble; Jennie & Marion Thomas, Nellie Vandelinder, Sadie Miles, Ruth & Lena Paul, Joseph Pester, Harold Moore.

Students in 1916 were: Jared & Newel Maxon; Nellie, Frederick, Ruth & Doris Archer; Larkin Hovey; Gerald, Marjorie & Clifford Thomas; Leland & Nellie Schofield; Bert & Alonzo Weaver, Kenneth McIntosh, Edward Hicks, Frances Green, Lois Hodder, Carrie Mullen, Stanford Bates.

A new schoolhouse was built in the summer of 1921 by Fred E. Wright on the old school ground at the back of the lot. In the summer of 1934 electricity was installed in the schoolhouse for the first time. The school was maintained for 1st-6th grades until Adams Union School and Adams Center Central School centralized in 1962.

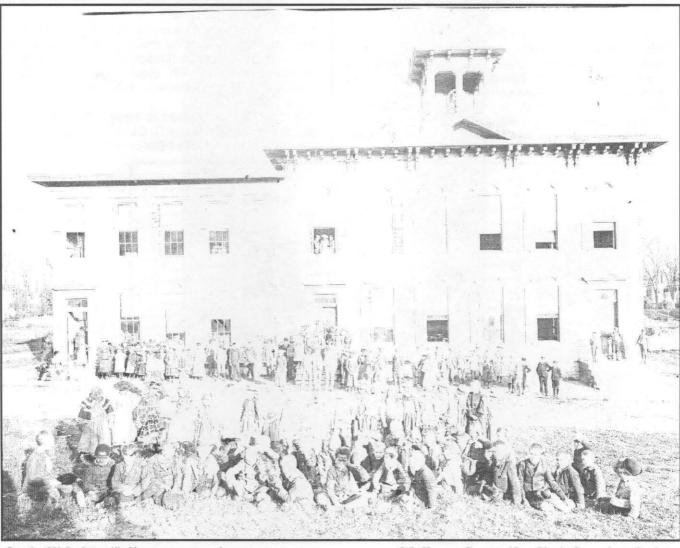

# Adams Village District #13

The Adams Village District School was established in 1802, and was located on South Main Street. By 1830

this building was the store of Jesse Hale. By 1830 there was one school building on Spring Street (District #13) and one on Church Street (District #16) across from the Presbyterian Church. The two districts were consolidated in 1865 and the Adams Grammar School District #13 was established. The building on Church Street was moved to the rear of the ME Church sheds, rebuilt and enlarged in 1876 at a cost of \$4,000. Wardwell Street was built at this time. The building was moved to a large lot because there was no adjoining lot at the old site that could be purchased. An addition was built in 1887. The school was originally built to accommodate 200 pupils and had 4 rooms. In the 1870's & 80's there was an average of 250 pupils and 6 teachers. At the annual school meeting on October 11, 1881 it was reported that their expenses included: teachers' wages \$700, \$60 for wood, and \$30 for a custodian to take care of the house. On April 7, 1897 David M. Greene gave the District School an exact copy of the Columbia Liberty Bell. It was made from the overflow left from the casting of the original Liberty Bell. It was mounted on a wooden

frame with the inscription 'Presented to the Public School of Adams, NY by Col. David M. Greene April 7, 1897'. A Union Free School was established in September 1899 and on December 1899 they received a charter for a four year high school under the name Adams High School. In September 1900 there were 189 students in the grammar school and 65 in the academic department. On May 4, 1903 the Grammar School building and grounds were sold to Dr. W. S. Rice for \$2,500 and all the students went to the Adams High School.

# Lisk Bridge District #14

Lisk Bridge District School No. 14 - District 14 was a joint district partly in the town of Adams and partly in the town of Rodman. The old district clerks record book shows that in 1832 the district provided 12 cords of wood at 56 1/4 cents/cord. In 1835 the district educated 44 pupils from Adams and 29 from Rodman. In 1840 the teachers wages totaled \$66.79 (\$61.28 from public money and \$5.51 from district taxes). A new schoolhouse was built in 1847.

Green, Elijah Walsworth Jr.; 1836 - Elias Babcock, Chester Dewey, Joseph Beard; 1837 - Abram Sheldon, Oliver McKee, John Cooper; 1838 - Rial Strickland George Cooper, Hiram Rose; 1839 - Joseph Beard, Philip Tournie, Elijah Walsworth; 1840 - Piam Thompson, John C. Cooper, James Lisk; 1841 - Nathan Foster, Ephraim Greene, Cory Payson; 1842 -Rial Strickland, John Cooper, Eldridge Walsworth; 1843 - Luman Loveland, George Cooper and Joseph L. Green; 1844 - George Cooper, Joseph Beard; 1879 - Wm. M. Patrick, George Cooper.

Teachers have included - Addie Pool (1880), May Hanson (1887), Mary Allen (1906), Minnie Hammond (1907), Jane Whitford (1908), Mrs. A. J. Crosby (1916), Jessie Gilbert (1920-1921), Addie McLane (1926).

Students in 1881 included: Curtiss Lawrence; Burney Getman; Emily & George Franklin; Mattie, Floyd & Fuller Rogers; Arthur Washburn and Fred Godfrey.

Students in May 1917 were: Frances, Hamilton and Mary Clark; Ceola & Margaret Gould; Ora, Anna & Harris Bezner; Dorothy Gale; Robert Smith; Charles Hallett; Bertha, Frances and Warren Hess.

Students in November 1920 were: Ida, Jessie & Jennie Sturtevant; Walter, Anna & Charles Fuller; Robert Smith; Norman Baldwin; Fern Ward; Lelia Eastman; and Fred Miner.

In 1928 there were only 11 scholars - 1st grade (Marilyn Rogers, Dorothy Hodder, Lewis Clark, Kenneth Smith), 4th grade (Mason Converse), 6th grade (Margaret Vickery), 7th grade (Evangeline Smith, Allan Clark, Elvin Converse), 8th grade (Irene Eastman).

The most famous person to have attended the Lisk Bridge School was Bruce C. Clark who became a four star general in the United States Army.

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1. JOHN T. CHAPMAN, son of LEVI and BETSY (MASON) CHAPMAN was born 1814 in Lyme, Grafton, NH. He died 17 May 1891 and was buried at Evergreen Cemetery Henderson, NY. John is listed as Levi's son in letter from Levi's grandson Dr. Eugene Chapman dated 1909. He worked as a blacksmith in Roberts Corners, Jefferson Co., and was a postmaster from 1850 to 1852 in Roberts Corners. He appeared on the tavern keeper census in 1850 in Henderson, as JOHN, his wife and 4 children, sister Lydia, plus Helen Overton (19) and William Sampson (18). Margin indicates residence was a hotel. Was William Sampson a relative through John's grandmother's side? He appeared on the census in 1865 in Henderson.

### **Biographical notes.**

1 May 1866. Marine disasters near Cape Vincent, NY: John Chapman of Henderson had a schooner fouled by the *Hiawatha*. (nnylin.net/st-lawrence-republican). He was supervisor from 1876 to 1878 in Henderson, NY. (history.raysplace.com/ny/henderson-ny.htm). He was a proprietor of saw and shingle mill, and a farmer in Henderson. He married 1836 Henderson, MIRANDA N. CONGDON who was born 1819 Vermont and died 13 Dec 1891 Henderson, buried Evergreen cemetery. She appeared on the census in 1865 in Henderson.

# He worked as a MD.

News was received here this morning of the death in Stafford Springs, Conn., about 7 Monday night, of Dr. Eugene Adelbert Chapman, former county clerk, and a well known veteran of the Civil war. Dr. Chapman was one of the best known veterans of Jefferson county, and was prominent at all reunions of the Tenth New York Heavy Artillery, of which he was a member. Death was due to apoplexy of the throat. He had been living in Stafford Springs for the last three years. His health had been gradually failing for some time and death was not entirely unexpected.

### Burial was near Belleville.

The body will arrive at Adams Wednesday morning and it will be taken to Woodside Cemetery about two miles west of Belleville, where burial will take place. The Belleville Lodge of Masons will have charge of the burial service, which will take place Wednesday afternoon. Dr. Chapman was born In Belleville in 1839, a son of John and Miranda Congdon Chapman. Dr. Chapman's grandfather, Levi Chapman, was a native of Lyme, N. H., and settled in St Lawrence County In 1817. Dr. Chapman's father was born in 1814 and settled in Robert's Corners in 1835. Dr. Chapman was the second of a family of five children.

### Studies Medicine.

He received his early education in the old Union Academy, an institution which has had many graduates who have been successful. After finishing his course at the academy he entered the medical school of the University of Michigan, after which he was graduated from the medical school of the University of Buffalo.

### Enlists In the Tenth.

The young doctor at once took up the practice of medicine, locating in Clayton, and soon built up a substantial practice. The civil war had just begun, and the patriotic fever ran high. Dr. Chapman abandoned his fine prospects for a medical practice and responded to the call for volunteers. Instead of seeking a commission as a surgeon he chose to belong to one of the fighting units, and entered the service as a private in Company G of the Tenth New York Heavy Artillery, Aug, 11. 1862. One month later he was commissioned first lieutenant and appointed adjutant In July, 1863. He was promoted to be captain. In November 1864, he was ordered to appear before the medical examining board in Washington, where he passed the medical examination and was made an assistant surgeon. Although this step reduced him in rank it enabled him to keep in touch with his medical profession. He was ordered to report to General Benjamin F. Butler at Fortress Monroe, where he was mustered out as captain and was re-mustered as assistant surgeon. Shortly after reporting for duty at Fortress Monroe he was ordered to Deep Bottom and was assigned to duty with the 127th United States Infantry. Shortly afterwards he was ordered to Point of Rocks Hospital, where he remained in service as an assistant surgeon until April 1865 when he received orders to report to the 127th Infantry which was sent to Petersburg, Va. and with this command he went to Appomattox. He was a participant to many spirited skirmishes incidental to the Shenandoah Valley campaign. He was in the bloody battle of Cold Harbor and at the siege of Petersburg when the mine explosion took place. He was at Appomattox at the time of the surrender of Lee. Dr. Chapman was ordered to Texas and he was made quarantine officer at the port of Brazna Santiago, holding that office until the summer of 1865 when he was mustered out of the service.

# A Country Doctor.

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Returning to civil life, he came back to Jefferson County and took up the practice of medicine in Henderson where for about eight years he lived the life of the average country doctor, making long rides into the country and in all kinds of weather on his missions of mercy. His health had been enfeebled by many vicissitudes during the war and the constant exposure and hardships incidental to his medical practice soon undermined his health so that he was obliged to give up his medical practice in 1873. He served as postmaster in Henderson in 1872 and 1873.

### **Recovers His Health.**

He was not constitutionally fitted to remain idle, however, and he went to Salamanca where he secured a position in [illegible] office. Diligently [illegible] his health and within about a year it had so improved that he felt he could resume the practice of his profession.

### Locates in Belleville.

He located in Belleville in 1873 and began building up a new business amid boyhood scenes and among friends of his school days. He took a prominent part in the civic affairs of his town and was elected president of the board of trustees of the Union Academy. He was elected coroner in 1870 and again in 1886. He served nine years as a member of the board of Supervisors and was elected chairman. He was the wise mentor and guide of the new members on the board and did much to make their path easier.

### **Elected County Clerk.**

In 1900 he was elected county clerk and took up his residence in Watertown. At the expiration of his first term in 1908 he was re-elected for another term of three years. He gave a most able administration and one that gained distinct popular approval. He was succeeded by Eli B. Johnson of Chaumont. Dr. Chapman was married in 1865 to Philinda M., daughter of Philo and Caroline Davis Hungerford. Three children were born to them: Clara M., who died in 1897; Florence L. and Walter E. Mrs. Chapman died in 1874 and in 1877 Dr. Chapman married Agnes G. McClure. Five children were born to them: Ross of Washington. D. C., John H. who died in 1901: Margery C. wife of Richard Valentine of Stafford Springs. Conn : Sanford T, who died about four years ago and Donald C, a noncommissioned officer in the United States Army. Dr Chapman was a great lover of fine Literature and throughout his life he had been an omnivorous reader. He possessed exceptional literary ability and now and then contributed interesting stories to the press. About 25 years ago he wrote a story called "Jennie" which was first printed in The Times and was later re-printed in a great many papers in the country. This was about the intelligence of a horse which he once owned when he was in the country medical practice. The story finally became a tract of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

"Dr. Chapman was a fine gentleman," said D. S. Miller this morning. "He was certainly one of nature's noblemen."

### Senator Cobb's Tribute.

Former Lieutenant Governor George H. Cobb, who had been a close friend of Dr. Chapman for many years, spoke with regret when he heard of the death. "Many residents of the county." said Mr. Cobb, "will learn with sorrow of the death of Dr. Chapman. He was a practicing physician at Belleville for many years and he was known and respected very highly by the people to whom he administered in that section. "He was the soul of honor, kind and gentle. Dr. Chapman was a conscientious physician and a very much respected citizen. He served as county clerk in this county and made an excellent record in that capacity. He lived a life of helpfulness and self-sacrifice, doing for others in whatever capacity he labored. Too much can not be said in his praise."

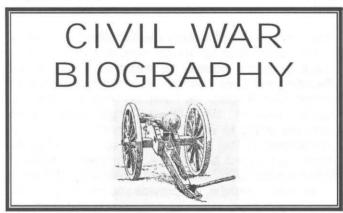
O. B. Cadwell associated with Dr. Chapman in army life and later as a member of the Tenth New York Heavy Artillery Veteran Association, said today: "When I first became acquainted with Dr. Chapman he was an adjutant In the Tenth New York Heavy Artillery. Soon after he was appointed captain of C Company. I remained at headquarters but our friendship continued. He was a man of unblemished character and very much a gentleman in every way. He was a man who stood very high and was thoroughly capable. He was one of the organizers of the Tenth New York Heavy Artillery Veteran Association and was always most interested in the organization. He served as president of the association from 1885 to Oct 20. 1910 when be gave up the office voluntarily. He was elected secretary and remained in that office until be departed from the city in 1912."

He appeared on the census in 1865 in Henderson, Jefferson, New York, USA. Listed as ERNEST in census. His cousin Ernest died in 1862, but Ernest's mother and her surviving son, Arthur, were living with or near IRVING'S parents. He worked at a boat livery in Henderson, Jefferson Co.



# Maj. James B. Campbell

Union Soldier - Distinguished Service

Major Campbell was mustered in as a Captain in Company M, 10th Artillery Regiment (Heavy), also known as the Black River Artillery, on 11 September 1862 at Sackets Harbor. Company M was recruited principally from the Pamelia, Lyme, and Cape Vincent areas and Campbell was presumably living in either Pamelia or Watertown at the time. His wife and family were certainly living in Watertown in February 1865 as he requested leave to see them there.

Campbell signed on for the duration of the war and was rapidly promoted to Major in February 1863. He was wounded in action at Bermuda Hundred in April 1865 and mentioned in dispatches for bravery in leading his men. It would seem probable his injury took him out of active field service as he was assigned to the staff of Major-General Hartstuff as acting assistant Inspector General later that month.

In August 1865 he was transferred to the 6th Artillery as Lt Colonel and then mustered out when the regiment was disbanded a little later.

I presume that he was married prior to the war as I put his oldest child's birth around 1857 counting back, but I have no idea of what his wife's name might have been at this point. I always figured she may have died fairly early as he seems to have been alone when he went to join his grown family in Chicago and certainly was when he came out here.

From a list provided by Benedict R. Maryniak of Lancaster NY who is the Chaplain for the 94th Regiment of Volunteers Reenactment organization. The dates following each post indicate the official date of chartering and surrender of the charter, that is, the time period for which the post was active. Notes following this information concern the soldier for whom the post was named.

**#424 - Town of Alexandria: Maj James B Campbell, 6th NYHA - Alexandria Bay - 1-17-83 to 1928** mustered as captain in Black River Artillery September 1862 age 37 - this became Co M 10th NYHA; made major Feb 1863; WIA 4-2-65 Bermuda Hundred; transferred to 6th NYHA 7-18-65; mustered out with 6th NYHA August 1865 at Washington DC (appted Lt Col but never mustered as such).

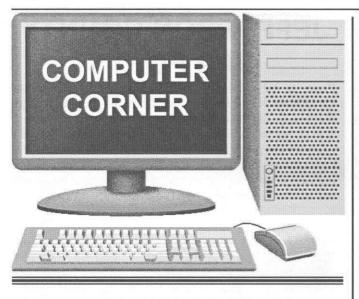

ARMY OF THE JAMES, January 28, 1865. Maj. JAMES B. CAMPBELL, Commanding Second Brigade, Provisional Division:

# MAJOR:

From information received, I have reason to believe that the enemy are determined to carry the right of your picket-line. They cover that point to aid them when their fleet comes down the river, which they intend to do soon, from all accounts. I desire you to use your own judgment and strengthen that portion of the line, as it must not be given up. You will also send a mounted orderly every evening to remain until morning at a point near the picket on the river to bring information in case of any movement in this direction. You can strengthen the right of your line at night, and caution your command of the intentions of the enemy, for their next attack will be a determined one. By command of Brevet Major-General Ferrero: GEG. A. HICKS,

Assistant Adjutant- General.

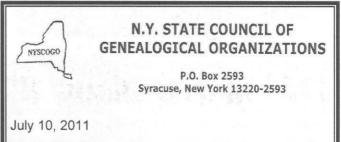


Whenever I look for items for Computer Corner, I always find sites I never heard of. "Weekly Buzz: GenealogyLinks.net" is no exception. The U.S. link, for example, leads to a page with links for every state, and links to every county within in that state. Naturally, I looked at Jefferson County, and found a Migrations page by Deb Axtman. Since your Jefferson County GenWebSite began a migrations page this year at "jefferson.nygenweb.net/migrate.htm," Jefferson County Migrations In and Out, I needed to compare. They are two very different takes on migration. The Jefferson County site gives more background, while Axtman's site concentrates on names.

The Weekly Buzz site also allows you to search by the type of resource such as cemetery lists, obituaries, marriage records, etc. The site offers a convenient way to browse available records, although the greatest value may be in surfacing previously unexplored resources.

"Statewide New York Genealogy Links" gives a broader view, more useful in particular cases. Unfortunately google has not yet caught up with the address change for the Jefferson County GenWebSite, but you can be pretty sure that when you get that annoying "404" message referring to a Jefferson County topic, the missing address is jefferson.nygenweb.net without benefit of Ancestry.com.

And for those folks who wring their hands over the lack of Jefferson County archives, usgwarchives.org supplies the following topics for Jefferson County, many of which have only one or two items: Bible Records, Biographies, Cemetery Records, Census, Church Records, History, Military Services & Pensions, Obituaries & Death Notices, Vital Records, Will Records, Probates & Indexes. Most of these titles are nearly empty. Your own Jefferson County GenWebSite has dozens, if not hundreds of names for most of these subjects. Take cemetery records, for instance: thanks to our founding members, John and Ellen Bartlett and Ellen's father, Gus Rogers, we have the most available records I know of. While Gus no longer updates them (anyone willing to volunteer out there?) we do make corrections as they come in. And speaking of volunteers: you do not have to live in Jefferson County to have access to current burials: Newzjunky, based in Watertown, I believe, will provide you with all the information you need, and is as accurate as any such service.

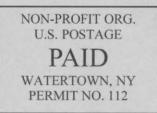



# McComb/McCooms

We include the following story of a work in progress because it illustrates the deductions and leaps of imagination that sometime have to go into solving our genea- riod John A. McCombs and his wife could have gotten logical puzzles. Dale Samuelson is searching for his McComb/McCooms ancestors.

This story is based on proven facts, a bit of supposition, a bit of hope, and maybe circumstantial evidence enough to make it essentially true.

We believe John A. McCombs was born to Joseph and Elizabeth (Batts) McCombs in Salem, Essex C., Massachusetts, a few years before 1790. Joseph and Elizabeth were married on 15 December 1782 and if John was the first born of the four children shown in the 1790 US census, he could have been born as early as 1783, or a couple years later. A Salem North Church report appears to show his birth in 1785.

Unfortunately, by 1790 Joseph had died and the head of household became Elizabeth "McCoombs." a widow, the only McCombs listed in the US 1790 census for MA. She is shown with one male under 16 (John at 5) and three females.

Interestingly, there are no McCombs (McCoombs, etc.) shown in the 1800 U S census for Massachusetts that we have been able to locate. There are two good reasons why we believe this is the correct John A. McCombs:

1. Three of his known children in their 1880 US Census reports: a daughter in Knox Co. IL (Rhoda Ann) and the others, a son in Marshall Co. KS (Albert), and a second son in Milton, IA (John) all said their father was born in MA.

2 John A. McCombs is the only young male McCombs in the 1790 census reported in MA.

There remains the possibility that John A. McCombs's wife was a member of the Badger family because in 1850 one of McCombs descendants (Albert McCombs and family in Knox Co. IL) had an 83-yearold man, Edmund Badger, living with them who could be the father of John A. McCombs wife. There were Badgers living in the Salem, MA area in the 1790/1810 period, and there were Badgers living in Morgan Co., IL before 1850.

A major problem confronting this information is that both the daughter, Rhoda Ann, and sons Albert and John mentioned above, relative to their reports for the 1880 US census, indicated their mother had been born in New York State. There is no statement, of course, as Ann, and her new husband, John Kenney, and then, at to where in NY she was born, but considerable weight must be given to the fact that these siblings were physically far apart when they separately provided the information that their father was born in MA and their mother in NY. A second daughter, Mary Jane, in the 1880 US census, did not answer the question on par-

ents' birthplaces, as though she did not recall.

We are left with the mystery of how in that time petogether. Where were they married? We assume it was in NY since that is where she was born and where they lived for so many years.

We know John A. McCombs was living in Champion, NY Jefferson County before 1820, by the fact he is in that town's 1820 US census. How and exactly when he moved with his family to Champion, NY before 1820 is not vet known. He is shown as John A. McCombs. and/ or John A. McCoombs, in the church membership records of the Baptist Church of Champion during the period of 1819 - 1824.

In the 1820 US census for Champion Township. John A. McCombs, then about 35, and his wife, are shown as having two boys under 10, (Albert, 6, and young John, 5) and at least one boy over 16. He has two unknown girls under 10 and one between 10 and 16. Also in the household is another man between 26 and 45. Three members of the nine are engaged in agriculture.

By the time of the 1825 NY State census, there were 5 males in the family including John A., and 5 females including John's wife, and Rhoda Ann and Mary Jane. There appears to have been at least 6 or 7 siblings plus a couple of others. Maybe one or more children of John A, and his wife had left home. It is evident that in addition to Mary Jane (1821), Rhoda Ann (1822), young John (1815) and Albert James (1816), there are brothers and/or sisters of whom we have no specific knowledge, yet their descendants exist and maybe someday will show up.

My great-grandmother, Rhoda Ann, was born in Champion on 25 March 1822, according to our family history.

We have added "young" John McCombs to the list of John A. McCombs's children because in 1850 "young" John was 35 years old and living and working right in the Philadelphia township area where the rest of his family had been living. His birth in 1815 would fit him right in with the young boys in the family, in addition to the fact his father was born in MA and his mother in NY.

In 1840, John A. McCombs is shown in the US census as living with or next door to his daughter, Rhoda this point, John A. McCombs disappeared! Whether he died at this time (he would have been only 55), or went west with an unknown member of his brood, we have been unable to determine.

Albert McCombs married Phoebe Jane Mosher 8 January 1838 (Possibly 1839).

Mary Jane McCombs married Reuben Mosher (brother of Phoebe Jane) in 1838.

Rhoda Ann McCombs and John Kenney were married 14 June 1840.

John McCombs (the younger) probably married his wife Dorothy about 1839. This is based on their oldest child, Nelson, being 10 in the US 1850 Philadelphia, Jefferson Co. census. In addition they had 3 other children, Samuel O., 8; Martin A., 5; and Emily 3.

Both John Kenney and Albert McCombs are known to have worked in the Sterling iron ore mines in Philadelphia township with the Kenney family actually having their home in Sterlingville, now part of Fort Drum. John hauled ore from the mine to the smelter in Sterlingville, a distance of about four miles.

Mary Jane (McComb's) and Reuben Mosher then moved to Knox Co. Illinois, in 1845. We have found no specific background information on what led to this move, but others in either the McCombs or Mosher families probably had preceded them in moving West.

Albert and Phoebe McCombs left for Illinois in 1848 where they are recorded in the US 1850 census for Knox Co. Edmund Badger, 83, is recorded living in their home.

Rhoda Ann and John Kenney sold their Sterlingville property in 1855 and followed Albert and Phoebe, and Reuben and Mary Jane to Knox Co.

Young John McCombs remained with his family working in the Philadelphia area at the time of the US 1850 census, and in 1860 moved to Alexandria Township in the western section of Jefferson Co., all yet together except that Samuel was living & doing farm labor for another family. Nelson C. had also left home, and a new child, Ann H., 8 years old, had been added to the family. Having been born in Ma born in NY, just as indi Rhoda Ann in their 188 ported again that she h both her parents were were living at dwelling IA US census for 1880. In dwelling 72, next

John Kenney became a successful farmer and he and Rhoda Ann remained in Knox Co. the rest of their lives. John died 6 January 1900 in Oneida, Knox CO; Rhoda Ann passed away 28 October 1903. A large headstone marks their graves in Oneida Cemetery.

The Kenneys had 13 children, seven born in NY and six in Illinois. All 13 lived to maturity. One died in the Civil War. There were 55 children in the third generation. The last member of the second generation, John Fowler Kenney II, died at Mineola, Iowa, 14 May 1945.

In 1856 Albert and Phoebe moved on to Iowa where they lived in Miscatine Co. They lived in Iowa for 23 years. They are shown in the 1870 US census in Cedar Co., Iowa. (The call number is M593 Roll 380.) Albert is 56, Phoebe 53, and six children (John, Jane, Caleb, Emma, Francis, and Julia) are still living at home.

By 1879, the family had moved to Kansas except for possibly some of the mature children. Caleb, 17, in the

Once in Kansas, Albert and Phoebe settled in Centralia, Nemaha Co. They had 10 children, five sons and five daughters, eight of whom survived their mother who died 9 February 1905. Albert had died 19 October 1892.

Mary Jane and Reuben Mosher lived in Knox Co. until about 1859 when they apparently moved directly to Nemaha Co. Kansas. They had nine children, five girls and four boys. In the Kansas State census of 1885, Mary Jane is described as a widow, 63 years old. Reuben had died between the 1880 US census where he is shown as 72 years old and 1885.

As a result of obtaining the complete 1880 US census on CDs from the latter Day Saints Church, we were able to locate John and Dorothy McCombs very quickly in Iowa. Along with them came a surprise! After carefully studying the CD and the Ancestry.com Images, the spelling seems to be McCooms, (sic) much as it was back in MA. Of course the enumerator was the transcriber, so we can't know what he heard. (My father who was probably born in Rhoda Ann McCombs Kenney's home in Knox Co. in 1883, always pronounced McCombs as if it had two long o's.)

Both John, 65, & Dorothy, 68, are shown at the proper age for 1880, and John's father is indicated as having been born in MA while his mother is shown born in NY, just as indicated by his siblings Albert and Rhoda Ann in their 1880 census reports. Dorothy reported again that she had been born in Canada and both her parents were born in NY. John & Dorothy were living at dwelling 71 in the Milton, Van Buren Co, IA US census for 1880.

In dwelling 72, next door to John & Dorothy are Charles, 34 and Ann Bartlett, 30, with their two young boys. Ann, by age, and the indication that she was born in NY, and that her father was born in NY, while her mother was born in Canada, make it pretty evident she is the daughter of John & Dorothy.

And next door beyond, at dwelling 73, is the family of Frank, 41 & Mary Badgley, 35 with their daughter Minnie. Frank was born in Michigan, but both his parents were born in NY. Mary was born in NY but her father was born in MA, while her mother was born in NY. I note a few unique aspects of this family that suggest they should be included in the family, with little evidence. The name Badgley is very similar to Badger, but that may be stretching things too far. This needs checking.

John and Dorothy's son, Samuel McCombs, was found in the 1880 US Census for Milan, Sullivan Co., Missouri. (See Microfilm T9-738, Sullivan Co., Polk

Township, p. 14, line 36.) He was married to a Mary, 32, born in IA, and they had 2 children, Anna, 4 and John, 1, as usual a first son named for his paternal grandfather. Samuel, a laborer, is shown as 39, born in so far on how Charlotta from Canada met Charles N. NY, with father born in NY, and, most importantly, mother born in Canada!

Then to make the identification even more positive, I found on the next page, p. 15, of the same census, his older brother, now shown as Charles N. rather than Nelson C. He is married to Charlotta, 32, born in Canada. She didnt know the birthplace of her mother, but her father was born in NY. They have one child, Charles N., 9. The facts for Charles Sr., the proper age and again that he was born in NY, his father was born in NY., and his mother was born in Canada!

Missouri, is just across the southern border of Iowa. near Van Buren Co., Iowa, so Samuel & Mary probably did not move far from her home in IA. No information McCombs, who in growing up somehow had reversed his given names.



# Computer Corner

### 10 minor Windows utilities I can't do without

I've written many articles in the last decade about my favorite little Windows utilities -- programs that perform small tasks or make little improvements to the way Windows works. Here's an updated list.

1. Tweak UI, from www.pcforrest.freeserve.co.uk/ tweakui.htm. (This site has a download link as well as a very important description of how to install Tweak UI. Please read it.) Tweak UI, created by Microsoft, fixes the user interface (the "UI") of Windows so it behaves better. It's a must. The program is free. (But why didn't Microsoft install these functions in Windows? Doesn't it care?)

2. TclockEx, from http://users.iafrica.com/d/da/dalen TclockEx turns the talentless clock in the Windows Taskbar tray into a clock that can show the time and the date at the same time. A single click on the clock opens a calendar. Because of a horrific time-and-date bug in Windows, the standard time-and-date display should never be opened casually. TclockEx, which has no such bug, is an essential replacement. It's free.

3. Cookie Pal, from www.kburra.com/cpal.html. Cookie Pal learns which Web-browser cookies you want to permit and which you want to turn down, and within a few weeks of Web surfing it's learned enough to automate just about everything. It's very easy to use, and it even lets you block cookies forever from an entire domain. It costs \$15.

4. NotepadEx, from www.notepadex.cjb.net. This easy-to-use and well behaved text editor does everything a text editor should do. There are dozens of good replacements for Notepad, Microsoft's incompetent text editor, and some have a lot more features than NotepadEx. But this one is free and works well.

5. List, from www.buerg.com. Vernon Buerg's file viewer and directory lister could be essential if you deal with a lot of standard text files (files that strictly texts, not word-processor documents), because List is the fastest way to view texts on a PC. It's also a wonderful file and directory tool, for copying, moving and deleting files within Windows and DOS. (List is a DOS program, but runs just fine under all versions of Windows also.) There are two versions, List Plus and List Enhanced. Prices start at \$18.

6. Intellipoint mouse software, from www.microsoft. com/hardware/mouse/driver/. If you have a Microsoft Intellimouse (a Microsoft mouse that has a little wheel in the middle), be sure to get this software. It's the best mouse software around. If you don't have a Microsoft Intellimouse but have a mouse with a wheel, install this software anyway; chances are it will work with your mouse. Be sure to try out my personal trick with the Intellimouse: I use the mouse software to turn the wheel into a double-click button. The software is free.

7. Shove-It, from www.phord.com/shoveit.html.
Shove-It makes program windows behave by keeping them from going off the screen. It also keeps them from slipping under the Taskbar when you have the Taskbar at the top, where it surely belongs. Cost: \$15.

8. Internet Explorer Web Accessories, from www. microsoft.com/Windows/IE/WebAccess/ie5tools.asp. I find this set of enhancements for IE 5 essential each time I battle with a Web-page frame; it lets me open the frame in a separate window with a single click. But there are other helpful enhancements, too. The software is free.

9. Hot Key Detective, from ftp://ftp.zdnet.com/ cmag/1996/0611/hkd.zip. (That's a direct download link, not a Web page.) Hot Key Detective does what Microsoft failed to do: It shows you all your Windows shortcut keys. If you know what a shortcut key is, you need this utility; it's the only way to see all your key assignments quickly and change any of them in an instant. The program is free.

10. Transparent, from http://people.ne.mediaone. net/jguerette/transparent. Transparent fixes a stupid design flaw in Windows so that the names, or captions, of your desktop icons can have a transparent background. Windows normally places an ugly band of color behind all icon captions. Transparent is wonderfully configurable. Icon captions can be white, black or any color in between. It's free.

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# WW I Draft Cards

## WORLD WAR I SELECTIVE SYSTEM DRAFT REGISTRATION CARDS, 1917-1918.

The National Archives has microfilmed World War I Draft Cards and they are available for viewing at the National Archives or may be ordered through a Family History Center. The Draft Cards for Jefferson County, New York are on 4 reels of microfilm and the LDS Film Numbers will be listed at the end of the page. At the beginning of each reel, there are several pages explaining the Selective Service Draft Registration of World War I. A condensed version follows.

On May 18, 1917, the Selective Service Act was passed authorizing the President to increase temporarily the military establishment of the United States. Under the office of the Provost Marshal General, the Selective Service System was made up of 52 state (or territory) offices, 155 district boards, 1319 medical advisory boards and 4648 local boards.

Local boards were established for each county or similar subdivision in each state and for each 30,000 persons (approximately) in each city or county with a population over 30,000. The local boards were charged with the registration, determination of order and serial numbers, classification, call and entrainment of draftees.

During World War I there were three registrations. The first, on June 5, 1917, was for all men between the ages of 21 and 31. The second, on June 5, 1918, registered those who attained age 21 after June 5, 1917. The third registration was held on September 12, 1918 for men age 18 through 45.

The information included on each registration differs somewhat but includes full name, date and place of birth, race, citizenship, occupation, personal description, and signature.

The registration cards consist of approximately 24,000,000 cards of men who registered for the draft, (about 23% of the population in 1918). It is important to note that not all of the men who registered for the draft actually served in the military and not all men who served in the military registered for the draft. Moreover these are not military service records. They end when an individual reports to the army training camp. They contain no information about an individual's military service.

After the signing of the armistice of November 11, 1918, the activities of the Selective Service System were rapidly curtailed. On March 31, 1919, all local, district, and medical advisory boards were closed, and on May 21, 1919, the last state headquarters closed operations.

For most states (including New York), the records are arranged alphabetically for each local board. In rural areas one should be able to find a registrant's card knowing his and name and the county in which he registered. In large cities and in some larger counties the search could be more difficult. In New York City, for instance, there were 189 local boards.

.....

Browsing through the occupations and employers was interesting. In Jefferson County, there were lots of farmers, railroad workers, and employees of the large number of paper mills (names of mills listed). A few occupations included: blacksmith, cheesemaker, drayman, druggist, electrician, motorcycle rider (racer), paper maker, peddler, sailor, saloon keeper, shoemaker, tailor, taxi operator, telegraph operator, traveling salesman, & truck driver.

Small nuggets of information can be found in these cards. There was at least one set of a father (b. 1879) and a son (b. 1898) from the same town who filled out Draft Cards. It was noted on another card that a man had failed to pass the eye exam for the Navy. Another man claimed exemption from serving based on the 13<sup>th</sup> Amendment. He must have been denied because his tombstone shows that he did serve. Most noted they were farmers, married, and had several children.

## Jefferson County, New York (3 Local Boards)

Local Board No. 1 covered the city of Watertown. Local Board No. 2 covered the southern half of Jefferson County Local Board No. 3 covered the northern half of Jefferson County

The above breakdown serves as a rough guide for locating your ancestors in Jefferson County.

## LDS Film Numbers for Jefferson County


The response for the first call for pedigrees was so large that we are holding the excess for the next volume. We welcome any pedigree that has some Jefferson Co. N.Y. background.
